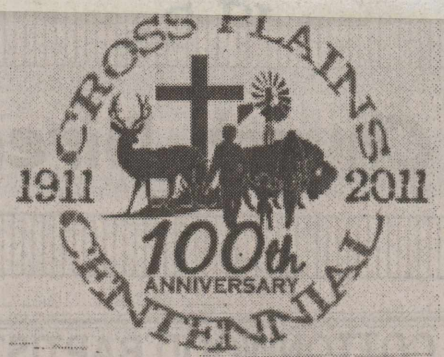

Cross Plains Lady Buffs District Champions

The Cross Plains Lady Buffaloes basketball team clinched the District Championship, Friday night, in De Leon. The win propelled them to 9-0 in district play, with one to play. The senior led group of Lauren Goode, Samantha Dickson, Zoie Walker, Shelby Ames and Rosa Salazar have a 27-3 overall record on the year. The three losses of the season were handed to them by 2-A power, Comanche, currently ranked #21 in the Texas Association of Basketball Rankings, Goldthwaite and Dublin, both in the Dublin Dr. Pepper Tournament.

They are currently riding a 17 game winning streak; the last nine have been in district play, although it has not come easy for the Lady Buffs. After a 68 to 22 win over Ranger in the district opener, the Lady Buffs travelled to Albany to take on the always tough Lady Lions.

The Lady Buffs were able to take a 2-0 district record after beating the Lady Lions 58 to 35. Shelby Ames (7 pts), Lauren Goode (9 pts) and junior, Cheyenne Cowan (11 pts) helped the Lady Buffs to a big win.

Next on the list of teams to fall were the Eula Pirates, the young Lady Pirate team was no match for Cross Plains at home, defeating the Lady Pirates by a score of 61-29. Lauren Goode had 18 and sophomore, Nicole Eisenbach chipped in with 10. The Lady Buff defense held all Eula scorers in single digits.

Despite De Leon having the likes of senior, Micah Cisneros, more than capable of playing at the next level, the Lady Buffs

were able to dominate. Great defense by senior guard, Samantha Dickson, helped shut down Cisneros and give the Lady Buffs a 4-0 record in district play. Leading scorers for the Lady Buffs were Lauren Goode with 19 and Cheyenne Cowan finished 15. Dickson, Goode, Ames and Walker (2) each hit shots from behind the arc.

With that 4-0 record the #17 Lady Buffs would set up for a showdown as they travelled to Santo to face the #5 Lady Wildcats. A slow start in the game for Cross Plains would help the Lady Wildcats build a big lead against the Lady Buffaloes. At times the play of the point guard and strong post play would seem to be too much for the Lady Buffs to overcome. The girls would not be denied as they continued to fight. Down 19 with a few seconds left in the third quarter, senior guard, Shelby Ames was able to hit a big three as time expired going into the final quarter of play. Score, Cross Plains 21, Santo 34.

Stiff defensive play and lights out three point shooting would help the girls build a steady comeback. Down two with 9 seconds left on the game clock, senior guard, Lauren Goode was able to draw a foul on a shot. Out of a time-out, she stepped up to the line and knocked down both free throws to tie the game at 42-41. The Lady Wildcats were unable to get a good shot off sending the game to overtime.

The overtime period belonged to the Lady Buffs as Samantha Dickson, stole a ball and laid it in for two to get it started. Lauren Goode would hit the game

winner on a rebound put back to give the Lady Buffs a huge 48 to 46 victory. Lauren Goode finished with 19 points, followed by 11 points from Cheyenne Cowan. Zoie Walker hit three 3 point field goals, Ames had 1 from behind the arc, and Goode hit all three of her 3 point field goals in the fourth. The 19 point comeback and overtime win would give the Lady Buffs a sweep in the first half of district.

The next test would come at Ranger, the Bulldogs' effort would be strong, but not enough to knock the Lady Buffs off track. Final score Cross Plains 61 - Ranger 16. Leading scorers were Goode (21), Cowan (10) and freshman center, Jurnee Thomas with 8 points.

Albany was up next as they travelled to Cross Plains for redemption, led by sophomore Kami Norton, the Lady Lions gave it a valiant effort forcing the game to overtime. Senior guard, Rosa Salazar's deadly shooting kept the Lady Buffs in it. She came off the bench to spark the team by hitting 4 three's in regulation, she would finish with 14 on the night. Then it was Goode's turn once again. The senior guard stepped up, making 13 of her 14 total points in the second half and overtime, and hitting a game winning go ahead 3-point basket to give the Cross Plains Lady Buffaloes another comeback win in overtime, 44 to 41 and a 7-0 district record.

Tuesday, January 31st, the Lady Buffaloes traveled to Eula. The young Eula squad did not have enough to derail the girls dream of a district chase. The 51-30 win bumped them to 8-0 and just a win

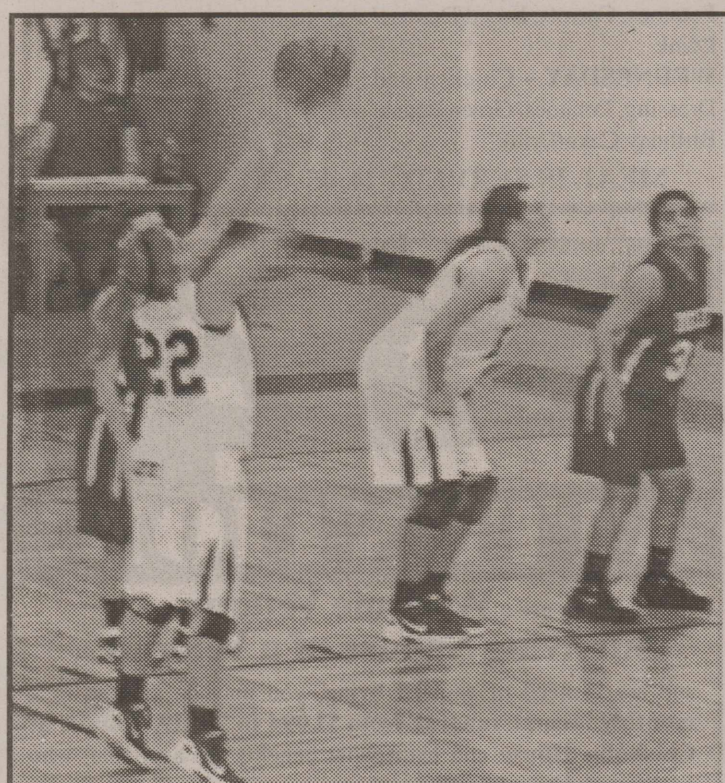

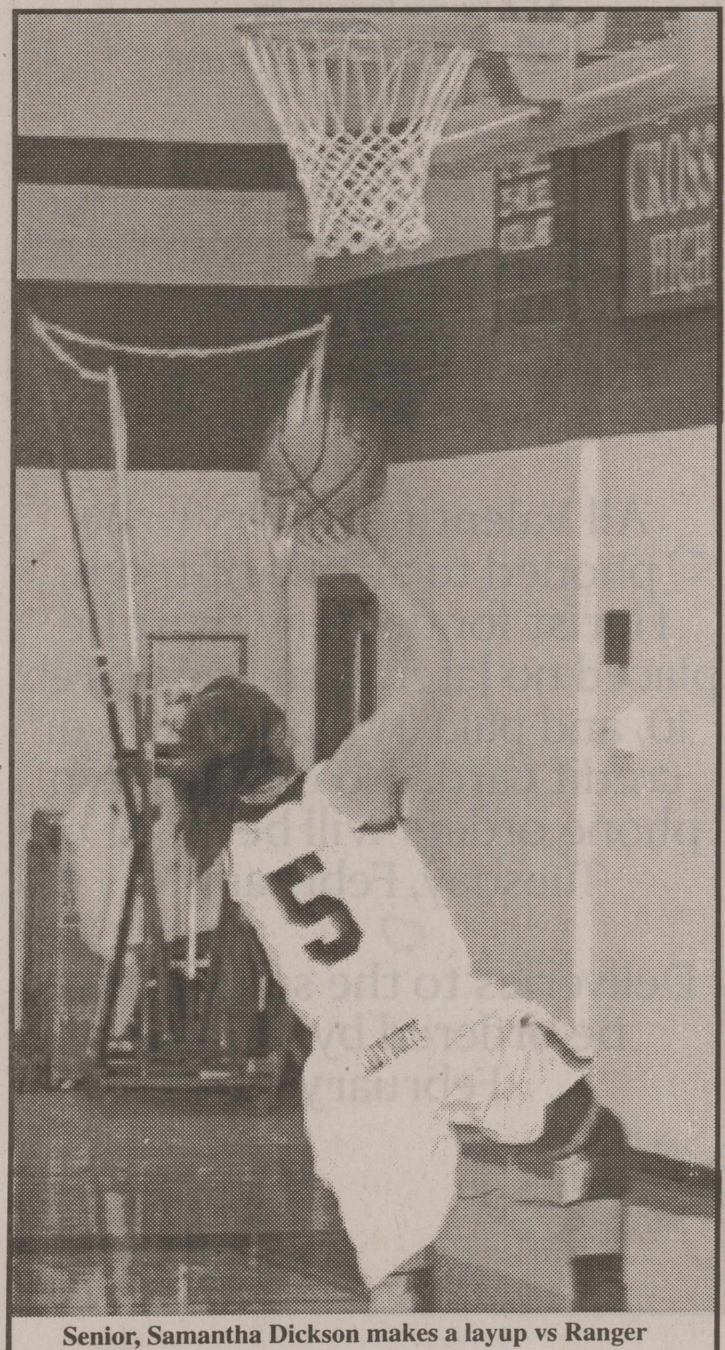

Proceeds from the dinner benefit the Cottonwood Volunteer Fire Control Group.

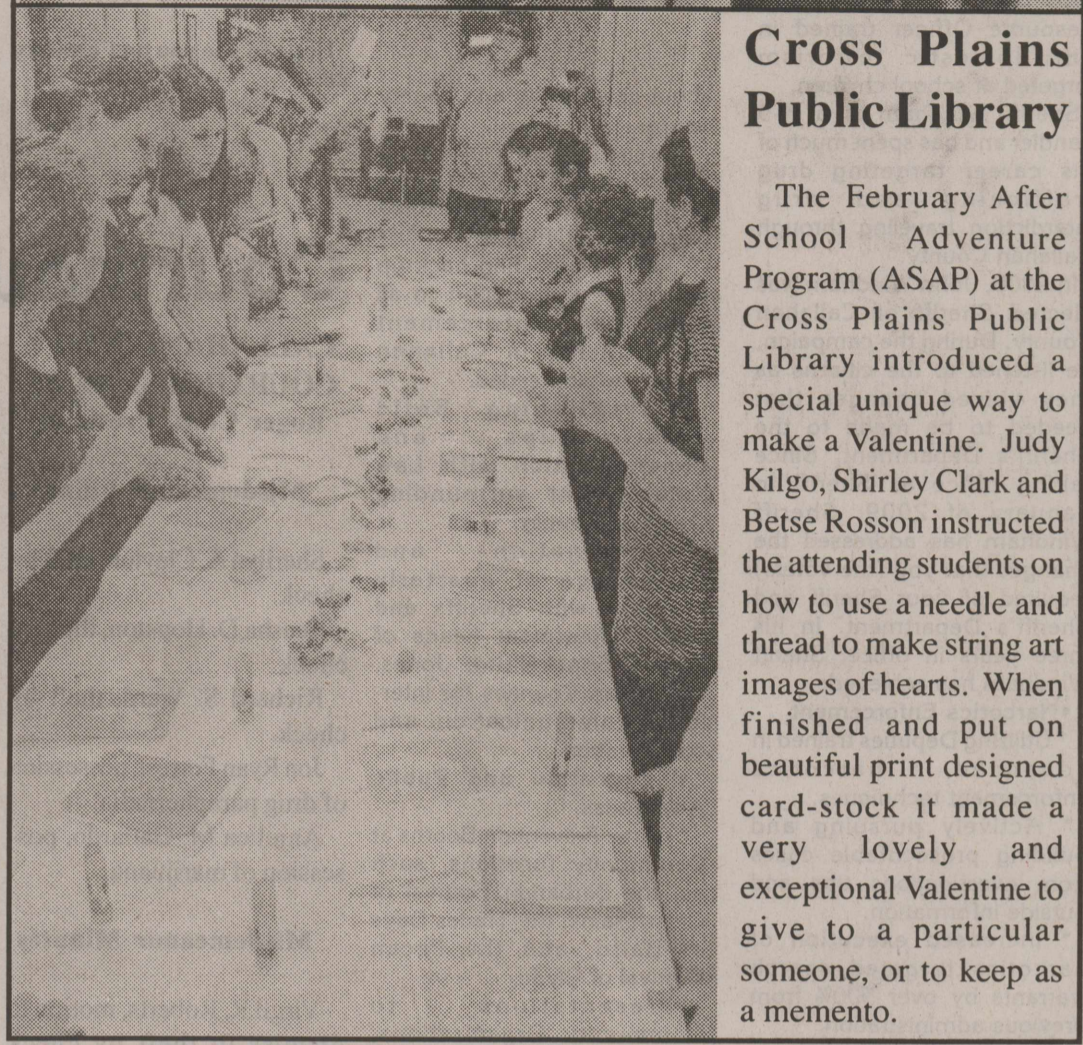
Callahan County Sheriff's Department seizes Hydroponic Marijuana

CITIZENS OF CALLAHAN COUNTY

I have been encouraged by many Callahan County citizens to run for Sheriff, something I have always felt I wanted to do. On Thursday, December 15, 2011, I filed the necessary forms to become a candidate for Sheriff. I am in good health, both physically and mentally, and I am fully capable of accepting the responsibilities of Callahan County Sheriff.

I was born in Callahan County, and my wife's family lived in the Eula area. I grew up in the Admiral Community on a small farm where, early in my life, I learned the meaning of hard work. I worked on our farm as well as for other farmers in the area. I was baptized at the Admiral

Baptist Church when I was 12 years old; and, I am a Christian conservative. I rode the school bus to the Baird schools where I completed all 12 grades. I played all sports and was the quarterback of the football team and pitcher of the baseball team. After graduation, I signed a contract as a pitcher with the Boston Red Sox Farm League in Waterloo, Iowa. I attended Spring Training Camp in Ocala, Florida.

After returning home, I helped build the missile bases in this area. Following that, I worked for Bowman Lumber Company in Abilene for 5 years. While working for Bowman, I built my first home in Baird, a home that I still own. During this time, I also attended night school at Cisco Junior College and Hardin-Simmons University.

In 1966, after seeing an ad in the Abilene Reporter-News searching for applicants for Police Officers in Lubbock, Texas, I submitted an application and was one of those selected for their training academy. After completing training, I was assigned to city traffic accident investigations. During this time, I continued my college education.

While I was in Lubbock the newspaper reported that the State of Texas was taking applications for Texas Game Wardens. I applied, passed the test, and all the interviews, and was accepted as a Game Warden Trainee. In 1967 the Game Warden Training Academy was at A & M University. The training consisted of 17 semester hours, primarily in wildlife biology courses. The training also consisted of classes in game, fish and water safety laws and departmental policies and procedures.

After completing the Game Warden Training Academy, I was assigned to Llano County, the whitetail deer capital of Texas, also called "the land of legend and lure." There was plenty to do for a Game Warden in Llano County. I enforced the game, fish, and water safety laws on Lakes Buchanan, Inks, and LBJ, and also the Llano River. I was entrusted with a key or combination to every rancher's gate in the county. The State assigned my wife, Lenora, a radio house-set and ranchers and hunters would call my house any hour of the day or night. Lenora would dispatch the call to me and

I always responded promptly whatever the hour. Many, if not all, of the ranchers and citizens of Llano County remember us as a team. I know I can rely on them for a good character reference.

In 1985, after my children graduated from high school, I applied for supervisor of the Midland District and was awarded the job. We moved to San Angelo where the Regional Office is located. This is a large district and I would stay in a campouse a night or two each week when supervising the far western part of the district. There were 10 counties, 10 Game Wardens, and 2 office clerks in this district.

In 1992 I transferred to the Brownwood District which consisted of 10 counties, 13 Game Wardens, and 2 office clerks. Callahan County was one of the 10 counties in my district. This move finally brought us back home to Callahan County. We soon moved back into the same house we were living in when we first left Callahan County. In this district and in the other districts, I worked to maintain a good rapport with the sheriff in each of the counties.

During my 36 plus years in law enforcement, I attended numerous TCLEOSE approved law enforcement training schools and an upper level management class. I am qualified to train other law enforcement officers, and I am a certified firearms instructor. Also, during this time, I completed a college degree in Criminal Justice.

Since retiring in 2002, I have been a substitute teacher, substituting at Clyde High School, and, more recently, substituting at the Robertson and Middleton prison units near Abilene. The experiences at the various levels of education have been learning and rewarding experiences.

When I am not substitute teaching, I work at restoring old houses and buildings. One of the houses I restored is a 1920s Sears and Roebuck Catalog kit house located at the corner of 4th and Arch in Baird.

If I become Sheriff of Callahan County it will be the fulfillment of a lifetime dedicated to Law Enforcement.
