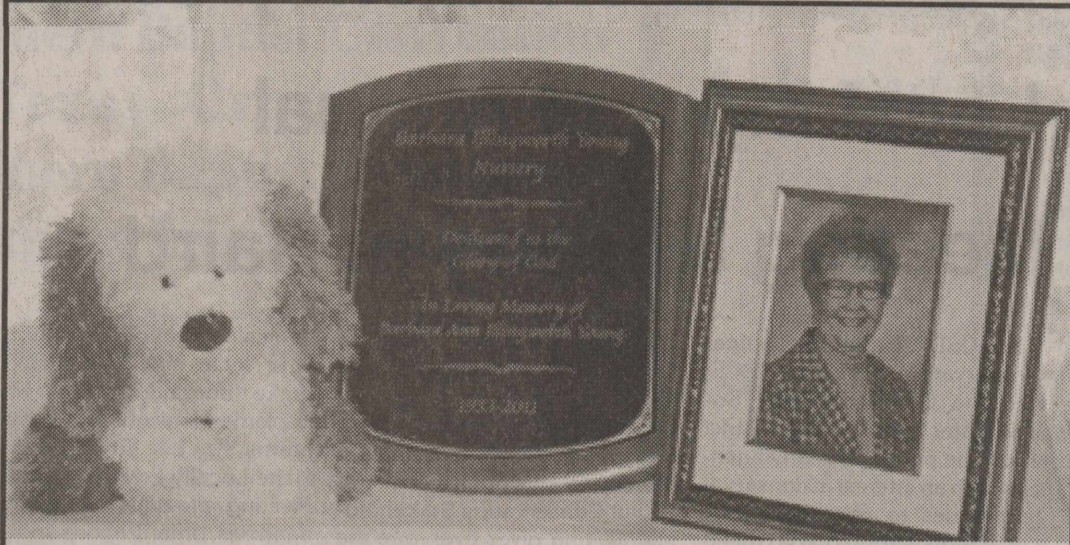

The tax holiday weekend has been an annual event since 1999.

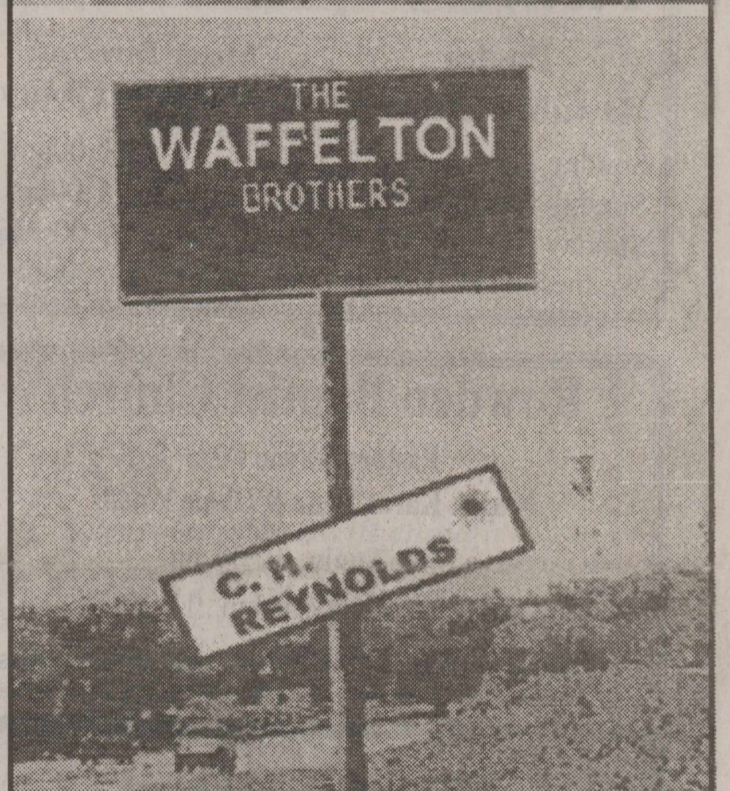
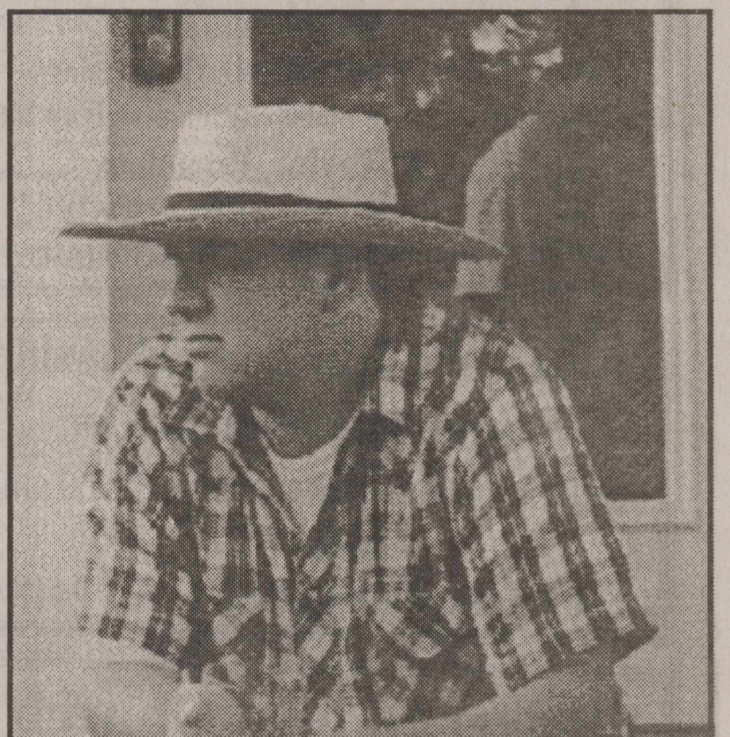
## Planning a Labor Day Weekend Picnic?

## Senior Citizens: REACHING for GOALS recent Benefit Bash moved them closer to their aim

Cross Plains has a vision for the future and it includes providing for our Senior Citizens. The Cross Plains Senior Citizens Center serves 1400-1500 meals each month. These meals are delivered to homes by loving people of the community who volunteer their time and resources to see that our homebound are fed and see a friendly face during the week.

The Senior Citizens Center of May also picks up meals 3 times a week for their residents. In addition, an average of 25-30 meals a day are served at the Center. All the meals are prepared in Cross Plains and Vivian Wooten does a great job of planning menus and running the kitchen. She is a good steward of the funds we have available, without compromising the quality of the meal that is served.

During the benefit Saturday night, hosted by J's Art and Soul (story and photos will be

available at a later date), the question was raised as to why the Center needed to raise money. As food prices continue to rise, there will be ongoing challenges to provide nutritious and tasty meals on a budget. Even with budget constraints, there is no set amount for the meal, (there is a suggested donation), but no one is turned away, if they cannot make a donation.

As with all property there is upkeep. There is a need for flooring, updated lighting, and a larger or additional air conditioning unit as well as normal repairs for a building that is used each week day.

The goal of the Senior Center is to have an inviting gathering place to fellowship and by relocating the fountain that was enjoyed by many as Mozelle served a short Coke or two dips and a squirt, or gathered around her table and visited with friends

over a cup of coffee in her variety store, that goal can become a reality.

## Conservation Agency Seeks Local Input at Annual Meeting Monday in Baird

The USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and the Callahan Divide Soil and Water Conservation District invite the public, and any agencies with an interest in conservation issues to participate in a Local Work Group (LWG) meeting to be held at the Callahan Co. Courthouse on the second floor. The courthouse is located at 100 W.4th Street Baird, TX 79504. This meeting will be on August 20th at 9:00 a.m.

Each year, the Local Working Group hosts a public meeting to determine the resource concerns and needs of the area and how to best address those needs. The NRCS and their local conservation partner, the Callahan Divide SWCD, provide agriculture producers with professional consultation and financial assistance through Farm Bill conservation programs to apply conservation practices on their land that address soil erosion and health, water quality and quantity issues, as well as wildlife habitat. The Local Working Group includes community agricultural producers, owners/operators of nonindustrial private forest land, professionals representing agricultural and natural resource interests, and individuals representing a variety of disciplines in the soil, water, wetland, plant, forestry, and wildlife sciences who are familiar with agricultural and natural resource issues.

All landowners and land managers in Callahan County are encouraged to attend and participate in this meeting. This open discussion public meeting will focus on identifying area natural resource concerns that can be addressed using conservation programs and activities. "Effective conservation stems from a locally led process," says Sammy L. Wilson NRCS District

Conservationist for Callahan County. "The Callahan County NRCS office operates on the concept that local residents best understand local issues and are the key to solving problems." "Our Conservation Stakeholders Meeting gives everyone the opportunity to decide how the assistance from the NRCS and Farm Bill funds can be most beneficial for our community," adds Sammy L. Wilson.

Through the Callahan Divide SWCD, the Local Working Group will provide recommendations to the NRCS District Conservationist on local natural resource priorities and criteria for conservation activities and programs planning for the upcoming fiscal year. These issues will be especially important in decisions made for financial assistance when implementing the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP). This program is administered by the NRCS and provides incentive payments for the installation of several conservation practices on eligible participant's land. The information gathered from these meetings will be used to help carry out the EQIP and other programs in 2013.

While the NRCS brings the technical expertise and Farm Bill funding to the table, the goods and services are delivered through the local SWCD board. SWCDs are local units of government made up of five members elected by the public. Their office is usually co-located with the NRCS office. Members of SWCD Boards are actively engaged in farming and ranching.

These meetings provide landowners, agencies, organizations and any other interested individuals the opportunity to help identify natural resource concerns within the parish and how to help direct technical and fi-

ancial assistance decisions that your local NRCS and SWCD make throughout the year when implementing conservation programs.

The Locally Led Conservation Meeting provides landowners, agencies, organizations and any other interested individuals the opportunity to help identify natural resource concerns within the Calcasieu Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD). The Calcasieu SWCD includes Vernon and Beauregard parishes. At this meeting, individuals will be able to voice concerns, provide comments and help to identify conservation issues. The public is encouraged to attend and participate in the meeting.

Following the Locally Led Conservation Meeting, the Local Work Group Meeting will be held. At this meeting the resource issues identified from the first meeting will be prioritized. This meeting will be chaired by the Calcasieu SWCD.

The issues identified and prioritized in these two meetings will be used to help direct technical and financial assistance decisions that your local NRCS and SWCD make throughout the year. These issues will be especially important in decisions made for financial assistance when implementing the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP). This program is administered by the NRCS and provides cost share and incentive payments for the installation of several conservation practices on eligible participant's land. The information gathered from these meetings will be used to help carry out the EQIP and other programs in 2012.

Both meetings are scheduled to end by 2:00 p.m. For more information contact your local NRCS office at (325) 854-1349.

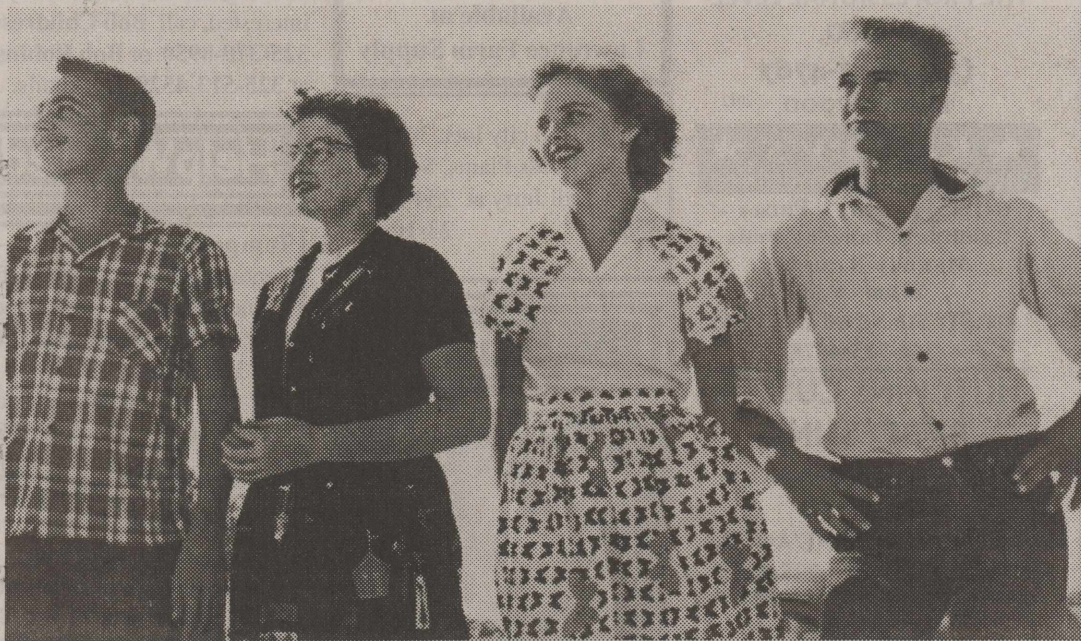

## Clyde CISD, Cross Plains ISD meet Adequate Yearly Progress requirements

AUSTIN - Forty-four percent of Texas campuses met Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) targets this year due to a substantial increase in requirements, the Texas Education Agency announced today, Wednesday, August 8th.

In Callahan County, as a district, only Clyde CISD and Cross Plains ISD met the AYP requirements. Locally, Clyde CISD and all four Clyde campuses met the AYP requirements.

Under this federal school accountability system, a school or district this year met AYP requirements if 87 percent or more of their students passed the state reading/English language arts test; 83 percent of their students passed the state mathematics test; 95 percent of their students participated in the state testing program and, depending on the grade level, had either a 75 percent graduation rate or a 90 percent attendance rate. Twenty-eight percent of Texas districts met these high standards.

These requirements are comparable to Recognized or Exemplary level performance in the 2011 state accountability system. No state ratings are being issued this summer because the accountability system must be retooled to use results of the new State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness (STAAR).

The state's request to use a similar approach with the federal system and carry over the 2011 AYP ratings into 2012 as the state transitions to the new testing program was denied by the U.S. Department of Education.

Under the current structure of the No Child Left Behind Act, the passing standards in the federal accountability system must rise to passing rates of 100 percent on the mathematics and reading tests by 2014. This means steep increases in the

requirements each year now through 2014. Last year, a passing rate of 80 percent on the reading/English language arts test and 75 percent on math test were required to meet AYP. That year 50 percent of the districts and 66 percent of the campuses met AYP requirements.

Along with the graduation or attendance figures, 2012 AYP evaluations are based on 10th grade Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) results and scores on the STAAR tests for grades 3-8. Because passing standards have not been set yet for the STAAR for elementary and middle school grades, the Texas Education Agency conducted a bridge study to determine the raw score on the STAAR that is equivalent to the TAKS passing standards. These equivalency scores were then used in the AYP calculations for this year only.

Using this methodology, 3,773 schools and 339 school districts met AYP requirements. Additional AYP information is available at <http://www.tea.state.tx.us/ayp/>.

Districts or campuses that miss AYP for the same reason (reading, mathematics, graduation rate, or attendance rate) for two or more years and receive Title I funds move into the school improvement program and are subject to sanctions. Title I funds are federal funds that are to be used for the education of low-income students.

Non-Title I schools that miss AYP must revise their already existing campus improvement plans to address the reasons that the campus missed AYP.

The majority of Title I districts and campuses that missed AYP are in Stage 1, having missed AYP for the same reason for two years in a row.

Of the 513 Title I districts that missed AYP, 285 or 56 percent of them are in Stage 1 of the

School Improvement Program. Among campuses, 976 or 84 percent of the total 1,159 Title I schools that missed AYP are in Stage 1. These districts or campuses must develop an improvement plan and campuses must offer students the option to transfer to a school that meets AYP requirements.

Schools or districts that are in Stage 2-5 face stronger sanctions at each additional stage. A school that has reached Stage 2 sanctions, for example, must offer tutoring to its students.

The Texas Education Agency is revamping the Supplemental Educational Services (SES) or tutoring component with the intent of enhancing the quality of tutoring services provided to students. The new statewide SES system is expected to be available by the time school starts.

At Stage 5, which is the most advanced intervention level, a school must adopt an alternative form of governance. Fifty-nine schools have reached this level. Along with offering transfer and tutoring options, a school at Stage 5 could:

- Reopen as a charter school;
- Replace all or most of the school staff;
- Contract with a private management company to operate the school;
- Turn the school's operation over to TEA; or
- Adopt any other major restructuring of school governance.

If a school has been at Stage 5 for two or more years, agency staff will meet with the campus and district staff to discuss ways to revise the restructuring plan to make it more successful.

**Back To School On The Texas Frontier**

In just a few weeks, Texas students will say a bittersweet goodbye to summer break and make the return to school - early morning wake-up calls, long days of back-to-back classes and often, after-school activities or sports. As Texas students begin the 2012-2013 school year, many will ride the bus to school or be driven by their parents or a carpool. They'll sport new backpacks or lunch boxes and come ready with supplies like markers, folders and notebooks.

With the hustle and bustle of the back-to-school season, it's probably safe to say most of these students have their sights set on the future - whether it's the day ahead or even the year ahead - and not the distant past. Even so, it is worth a few moments to take a glimpse back in time, to see how much life has changed and how different the experience was for their predecessors - the students of the Texas frontier.

On the frontier, as settlements were founded, the demand for schools and teachers grew. Trustees - typically two or three male leaders from the settlement - were appointed in each community to manage everything from determining the location of the school to hiring and firing teachers. While a few concerned themselves with the minute details of school management, most were consumed with their day-jobs - farming - and did not have time to micro-manage school affairs.

In *The Empty Schoolhouse*, author Luther Bryan Clegg presents firsthand accounts of rural West Texas life, with a focus on experiences in one-room schools, from the first half of the 20th Century. One former teacher recalls the communication barrier that often arose between teachers and trustees: "Most trustees were farmers or ranchers and seemed embarrassed to do business with a woman. If I asked what or how they thought I should teach, they'd say, 'You just teach the school, we'll do the plowing.'"

Trustees determined the size of their school districts - typically 36 square miles - and the location of the schoolhouse based on the distance students would have to travel to school. Most students traveled on foot, many times in groups with neighbor children. Depending on weather conditions, the distance to school could be nearly an hour for some students. Often, the hour-long walk to school posed a number of distractions. There were berries to be found or mesquite wax - the sap found on mesquite trees - which could be chewed much like chewing gum. As one former student put it, "It's a wonder we ever got to school."

There were three major requirements for the construction of one-room schoolhouses - a well or cistern for drinking water, a wood-burning stove to keep the schoolhouse warm in the winter months, and outhouses. Teachers were responsible for arriving at school early to build a fire and maintain it throughout the day. Trustees often were charged with hauling the firewood to the school, where older male students would chop it down to size. Female students would help with keeping the schoolhouse clean - sweeping daily. In one Texas frontier school, an older student with good penmanship was tasked with writing signs that read "No smoking" and "No spitting on the floor."

With only one school per settlement, the frontier school educated students of all ages together. Most frontier schools taught students from first to eighth grade. The students were seated according to age, but it was common for the best pupils in each grade to assist students who were not performing as well.

The basic curriculum of the frontier school focused on reading, writing and arithmetic. Most days centered around the recitation bench, where students would take turns reciting passages from their readers. Christian teaching was also included, with students reading passages from the Bible as part of their

daily lessons. The typical school year was scheduled around farming activities. School normally began in the fall when crops were harvested and ended in the spring when it was time to plant. If sickness fell on the community, school was "turned out," or dismissed, until the epidemic had passed. Because of a lack of compulsory attendance, many parents kept their students at home arbitrarily to help with chores at the house or on the farm.

Though the school of the frontier faced many challenges, the teachers and trustees made an important investment in the children of their communities - the gift of education. They challenged students to set goals and accomplish them. As Mr. Clegg puts it, "The one-room school was a reflection of its time, the means by which a community could teach curricula, values and mores it deemed important. Although beset by limitations, it was a noble effort to provide instruction for the young."

As the new school year begins, much has changed since the days of the one-room schoolhouse on the Texas frontier. But the focus remains the same - to invest in the youngest generation so that they may learn more, go farther and push past barriers. Our teachers and administrators deserve our heartfelt thanks for the positive difference they are making in the lives of today's children and tomorrow's generation of leaders.

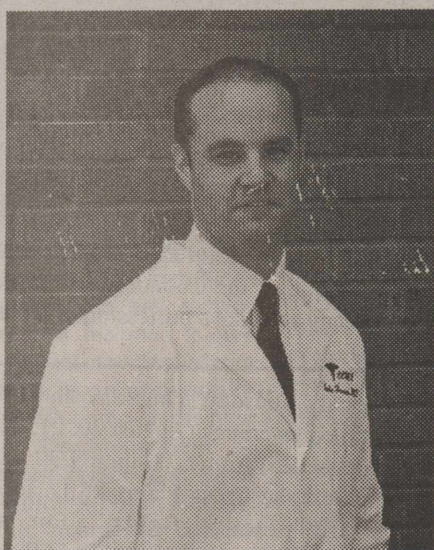
A delicious meal was served with wonderful desserts. To top it all off, 4His Glory, that consists of Matt Sowell, Amanda Sowell,

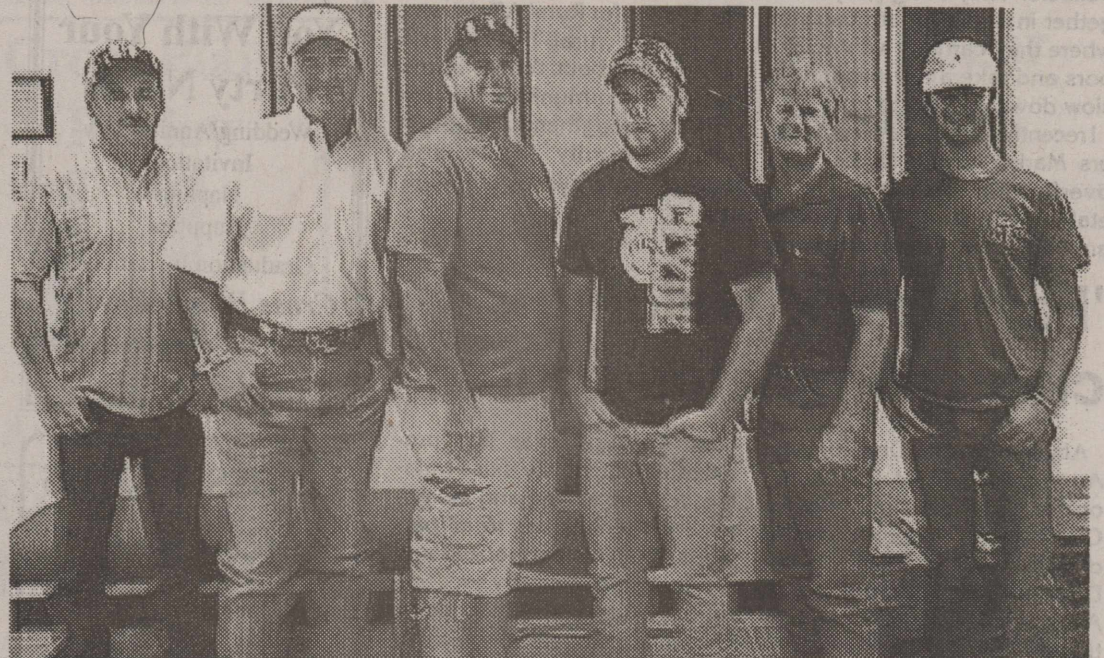

Because of this successful partnership, the program has been extended and more class sessions are being developed.
