

We will be taking 2013 membership applications into the Association. With the success of our program the Board of Directors were able to reduce the Annual Membership fees for the 2013 year. The new membership fees are \$10 per landowner with no additional fees for acre-

The objectives of this organization are to assist landowners and tenants in eradicating the feral hogs and coyotes throughout the county by working with a private aerial contractor which can assist us in obtaining grant funds to cover a portion of the expenses. Callahan County received a \$7,500 Grant from TDA for the current 2012 year that has helped cover a portion of

The Callahan County Predator Department of Agriculture, county County Grants for Implementation of Feral Hog Abatement Technologies will be requested again this year giving Callahan County the eligibility to compete for USDA Grant Funds. Eligible Counties will be competing for one of five grants to assist in eliminating feral hogs. Grant amounts of \$20,000-\$10,000 will be awarded for the 2013 year. Some of the program details are as follows:

The agriculture department estimates that hogs cause about \$400 million in damage yearly. They are predators of lambs, kids and calves. They also destroy crops and wildlife habitats rooting for bugs and seeds for food and wallowing during the hotter months. "Feral Hogs commonly destroy urban yards, parks and golf courses, as well as rangeland, pastures, crops, fencing, wildlife feeders and other property," according to the agriculture department. The hogs also spread E. Coli and other diseases through streams, ponds and watersheds.

Jerry Warren, County Extension Agent has the Feral Hog Harvested Certification forms available in the Extension Office and will also be available at local Feed Stores in the County for 2012 through December 31, landowners and tenants to 2012; or if it is trapped, snared, pickup. 

Compiling Notes for Upcoming Edition — Texas Highways to feature Robert E Howard Museum, Dale Weisman, free lance contributor to the Texas Highway, was in town recently to work on a story about the local museum for a section in an upcoming issue. His speciality with the magazine is writing about those delightful little towns and attractions hidden among the highways and byways of the state. Weisman was hard pressed to decide what was his favorite aspect of the museum, the over-all restoration that met the standards of the National Register of Historic Places, the detailed efforts to retain the legacy of Howard's literary contributions or maybe it was the items in the house that were actually there when the Howard's lived in town. Or maybe it was the wonderful resource it provides for students. Or maybe the once-a-year gathering of scholars from around the world. Or maybe it was the gift shop with pictures of visitors posted all over the world map and locally produced souvenir items. Or maybe it was that such a small town could even have such an attraction.

The visitor was totally impressed with our little town; stopped to take pictures of the City Hall grounds, was able to check out the Howard section in the Library even as it was closed to the public on Saturday. Tested Rick's Texas sized porch swing and looked in the windows of everything up and down the street.

On a personal note, Weisman has long been a fan of Howard's writings. He admitted to getting hooked on the Lancer Conan paperbacks with cover designs by the famous Frank Frazetta before moving on to the other genres.

When he's no traveling around the state on his trusty motorcycle, Weisman works for the Silicon Labs in Austin. There he's a part of an industry that makes semi-conductor chips for almost all the electric items we use.


