ASCS Sign-Up Dates Revised

Danny Noble, County Executive Director with the ASCS office, released the following revised sign-up dates Tuesday morning.

1992 SMALL GRAIN ACREAGE REPORT

The final date to certify or request aerial measurement services for wheat, rye, barley, oats, and triticale, regardless of use, program or non-program, ACR or CU, has been extended until May 22, 1992. This is also the final date to certify to zero acreage planted if the farm has a base for that commodity. Remember!!! If you miss your acreage report by the larger of five percent or 1.0 acre, not to exceed 10.0 acres, up or down, it can cause the farm to be ineligible for program benefits. Please don't guess.

SMALL GRAINS LEFT STANDING

If you have wheat or other small grains on ACR or CU that will be left standing for re-seed and not substantially destroyed by May 22, 1992, you must file a request to leave the small grain standing and pay a \$10.00 inspection fee by your final certification date.

HAYING AND GRAZING

Haying and grazing ACR and CU for payment acres is permitted during the seven month non-grazing season only. This is October 15 through May 14. The non-haying and non-grazing period is May 15 through October 14. Remember, no haying and/or grazing CRP land anytime.

MAINTENANCE OF ACR, CU/PAY, AND CRP

Weed control measures must be carried out in a timely manner on acreage designated as ACR and CU for pay throughout the calendar year. Weed control measures also must be carried out timely on CRP land throughout the lifespan of the CRP contract. Failure to control noxious weeds, wind and water erosion, could result in total loss of farm program benefits, and/or your CRP contract.

ELIGIBLE LAND FOR ACR AND CU/PAY

Land designated as ACR or CU for payment including the required eight percent of MPA, must be cropland that has been planted to a small grain, row crop, and other crops planted annually or designated

for ACR or CU for pay in one of the last five years. Land designated for ACR or CU for pay must average at least 1.0 chain in width and contain at least 5.10 acres. Exceptions:

1. One area per farm may be reported as ACR and one area per farm may be reported as CU for pay that is less than the minimum requirement to complete the balance of the required AR and CU for pay.
2. Entire permanent fields that are less than 5.0 acres.
3. Skips in an established skip-row pattern, if the skip is at least the larger of four normal rows or 150 inches from plant to plant.
4. There is no minimum size and width requirement for CU for pay areas between skips in an established cotton skip-row pattern (cotton only).
5. Contiguous and noncontiguous strips, including end rows, terraces, and sod waterways, that average 33 feet wide and are required by the CPO.
6. Contiguous and noncontiguous strips, including end rows, terraces, and sod waterways, that are planted to a perennial cover and average 33 feet wide.

EXCESS ACR

If excess ACR is a result of a producer certifying more acreage than is required, the excess acreage cannot be revised or reclaimed for other uses. Producers must understand that any acreage certified as ACR must remain ACR throughout the calendar year.

1992 COMPLIANCE

Walk-A-Thon Set Here Saturday

All you boys and girls, or anyone wishing to walk or ride their bike in the 'Miles For Muleshoe' Walk-A-Thon -- Bike-A-Thon Saturday, May 16, you need to be at the New City Park, parking lot beside the concession stand either at 9 a.m. or at 2 p.m. and take your pledge sheets. Due to Little League Baseball beginning on Saturday two times have been set.

You may either walk or ride your bicycle around the park (two and a half miles). All proceeds go toward the purchase of fireworks for the Fourth of July celebration.

The Jennyslippers will write in the hours that you walked or biked and give your sponsor list back to you. Return to your sponsors and collect your pledges. Checks should be made out to the Jennyslippers.

All participants will receive "Muleshoe Spirit" Cap (with pledges).

CHANGES

Spot Checks: Beginning this year, if a producer is spot checked and found to be out of compliance, the producer must request to the COUNTY COMMITTEE to determine that a good faith effort was made when measuring. If the producer fails to make this request or the Committee is unable to determine good faith, all advance payments issued on the farm shall be refunded and liquidated damages will be assessed on all participating program crops. In addition, all crops on the farm will be come ineligible for any program benefits, including loans.

However, if the Committee determines that a good faith effort was made, a failure to fully comply penalty will be assessed. This penalty is now farm specific rather than crop specific. In other words, if you are penalized due to one crop being out of compliance the penalty exceeds the payment for that crop, the penalty will carry over to the other crops on that farm until the penalty is collected.

FAILED ACRES

Any program crop that has failed due to drought, excessive moisture, hail, or for any other reason beyond the producer's control, must be certified and an ASCS-574 (Disaster Application) filed before the crop is disturbed in order to be eligible for program benefits.

CRP SIGNUP

Sign up for the 12th Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) will be from June 15, 1992 through June 26, 1992. Bids during this sign up will be for the 1993 crop year. Bailey County will be accepting bids for windbreaks and shelterbelts (Trees Only). For further information, please contact this office.

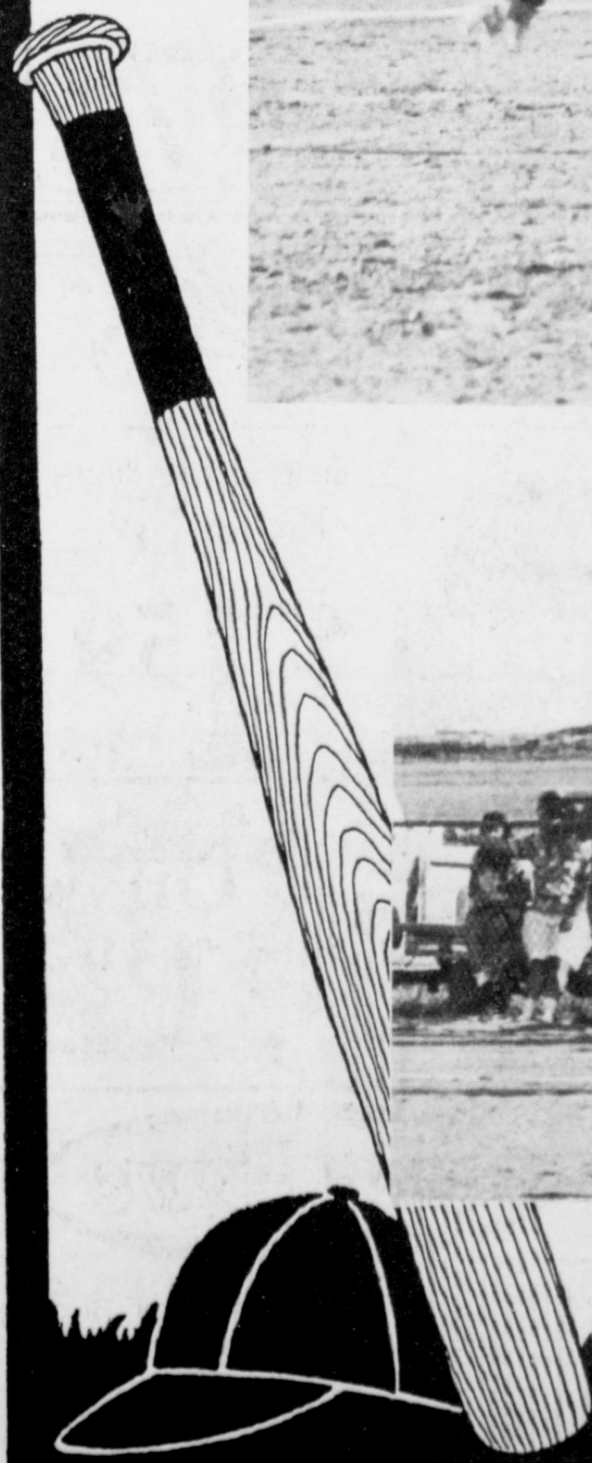
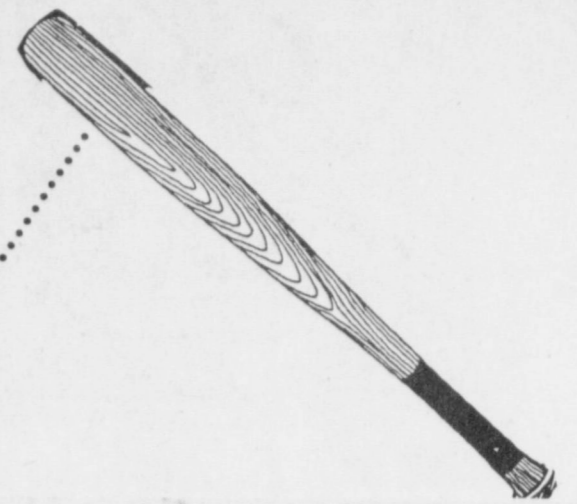

SWEET PEPPER CALZONE

- 1/2 pound Tennessee Pride Country Sausage (mild or hot)
- 2 C. thinly sliced onion wedges
- 1 C. green pepper strips
- 1 C. red pepper strips
- 1 package (6.5 oz.) Martha White Pizza Crust Mix
- 1/2 C. hot tap water
- 1 t. vegetable oil
- 1 1/2 C. (6 oz.) grated Swiss cheese
- 1 egg, beaten

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. F. Grease a large baking sheet; set aside. Cook sausage, onions and peppers in a large skillet until sausage is browned; drain and set aside. Combine pizza crust mix and hot water in mixing bowl. Stir vigorously with a fork until blended (about 30 strokes). Form into a ball and grease with about 1 teaspoon oil. Cover and set in a warm place for 5 minutes. On a floured surface, roll out dough into a 14-inch oval. Transfer to prepared baking sheet. Cover half of dough with sausage filling to within 1/2 inch of edge. Sprinkle with cheese. Drizzle with beaten egg. Fold plain dough over filling. Moisten edges with water; press to seal. Bake 20 to 25 minutes or until golden brown. Cool on wire rack 10 minutes before cutting. Slice into strips with serrated knife or pizza cutter. Makes about 10 servings.

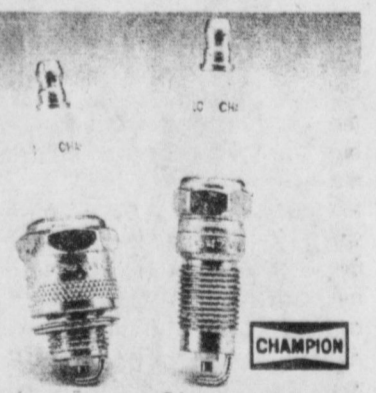
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Ben and Dana Marney

Ben and Dana Marney Relate Travel Experiences

Ben and Dana Marney were in Muleshoe for a visit recently. Dana is the former Dana Damron, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Damron.

During their visit they related several of their experiences while traveling and singing aboard three different cruise ships. The Marneys have been in the entertainment business for 19 years, performing with show bands worldwide.

They had their own TV show for a number of years and have met and interviewed many well-known musical artists and movie stars.

While aboard the Royal Viking Sea in 1990, Ben and Dana traveled from Vancouver to Alaska and from there to Japan and the orient. It was an eleven day crossing and they were hit by a typhoon enroute.

In Japan they visited the cities of Kobe, Kyoto and Nagasaki, taking a bullet train to Kyoto.

Among their most vivid memories of the orient is a visit to the Peace Museum in Nagasaki. It tells the story of the bombing of Pearl Harbor and the resulting efforts to establish peace between Japan and the U.S.

Another of their favorite places in the orient was Hong Kong. "Silk was so cheap," notes Dana. "We bought silk robes for \$9." They found the cost of living in Hong Kong, unlike many other parts of the orient, to be still quite reasonable.

In contrast, the cost of living in Japan has skyrocketed. Coffee there is \$3 a cup.

Singapore reminded Ben of downtown Houston because it is so cosmopolitan. "Singapore is an extremely clean city," they note. "In Singapore, there is a \$300 fine for throwing down a cigarette."

From Kowloon's shopping district they took a water ferry. The Marneys saw thousands of sampans in this region.

The Marneys recommend Bali, Malaysia for a low cost vacation. Bali is located off the tip of Java and is a popular resort area for Australians. Food is quite inexpensive there and one can rent an ocean front suite for \$60. Some beaches around Bali are covered with black sand.

"Bali women wear oriental dresses in their dances that are just magnificent," notes Dana. Kaula Lumpur, the capital of Malaysia, is a "gorgeous city," she says.

While still on the Royal Viking cruise ship, the Marneys traveled to Thailand. They were amazed by the number and magnificence of the religious temples and mosques in that region.

From Thailand, Ben and Dana traveled to Madras, India. While in Sri Lanka, an island off India, the two rode elephants. Ben commented on the terraced mountains there. They are terraced for agricultural purposes.

Travel through Bombay put the Marneys close to the Gulf crisis. There they were surrounded by helicopter gunships at one point, but were able to move to a relatively safe area. "It was a scary experience," Ben notes.

In India, the Marneys, like all tourists to the area, saw gorgeous buildings next to beggars dying in the streets. "It's much worse than Mexico," said Dana.

"Being a beggar is an honorable profession in India," comments Ben. "Many parents deform their children at birth so that they can become beggars rather than face starvation."

While in India, the Marneys visited Ghandi's home and learned more about his philosophy.

Shopping in Bombay is among the best in the world, according to the Marneys. They bought beautiful furniture with inlaid ivory and a multi-paneled screen in the Thieves Market there.

Traveling on to various islands off Kenya, Africa, the Marneys visited a factory where elephants and giraffes were carved. Dana commented that "one of the coolest

places you will find is under a thatched roof."

"But the most interesting place of all is Zanzibar. The alleyways are like a maze and the whole atmosphere is like that you find in the 'Arabian Nights.'" Ben says. "Zanzibar is an eerie place," Dana says.

The Marneys found the friendliness of the people in Madagascar to be overwhelming. There they visited an open market and the Seyshelles Islands where a Garden of Eden-like beauty astounded them.

In the Seyshelles, mountains rise dramatically out of the water creating a much different topography than anything seen in the United States.

Asked for advice on traveling outside the U.S., the Marneys emphasized the importance of trying to become a part of the culture in the country you are visiting. "Absorb the culture. Don't try to find what is American about the place you are visiting. Look for the differences," says Ben.

From January to November of 1991, the Marneys entertained aboard the cruise ship NCL Skyward. The ship made seven stops in the Caribbean. Among them, the cities of San Juan, Puerto Rico and St. Thomas in the Virgin Islands.

From November 1991 to January of 1992, they traveled and worked aboard the Starward. That ship

stopped in San Juan, Barbados, Martinique, St. Marteen and Antigua.

The Marneys have been in or performed in every major city in the U.S. They suggest seeing the U.S. first. "The Florida Keys are as exotic as any region of the world," notes Dana. "Remember that people in other countries want to come to the U.S. I don't think there is any region prettier than that around Austin," Ben comments.

Both agreed that Alaska is one of the most interesting areas one can visit.

Ben is now project manager for Casino Creek Limited in Cripple Creek, Colorado. Currently, they have a building project underway to construct the Bank Casino in the historic bank of Cripple Creek.

After the Bank Casino is constructed, Ben and Dana will sing there regularly.

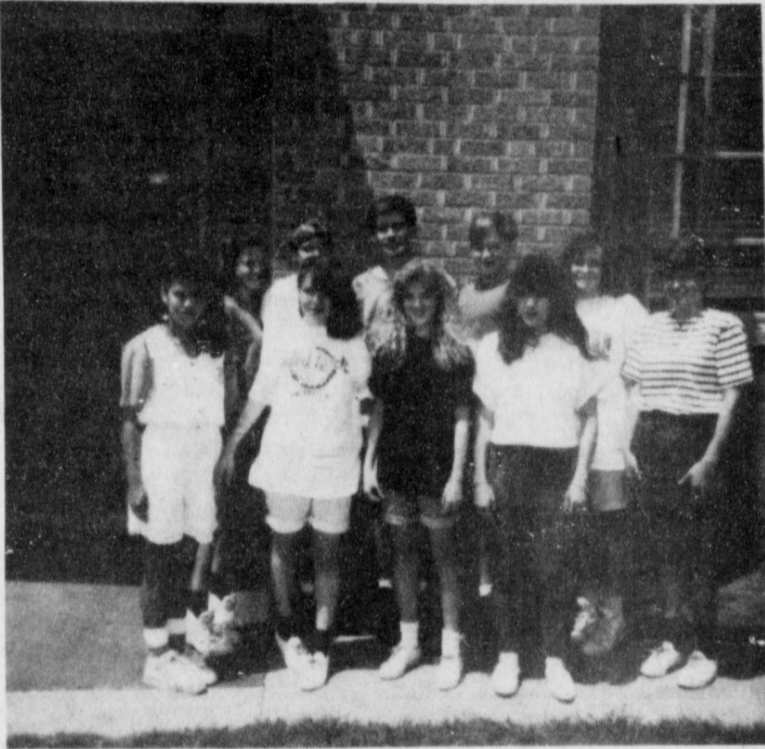

CHICKEN CORDON GRITS

- 1 C. Jim Dandy Quick Grits
- 4 C. chicken broth
- 1/2 t. salt
- 1/2 t. black pepper
- 1 1/2 C. grated Swiss cheese, divided
- 1/2 pound ham, diced
- 1 egg
- 3 T. water
- 8 chicken breast tenders
- 1 C. Italian-style dry bread crumbs
- 2 T. butter or margarine
- 1 T. vegetable oil
- Paprika

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Grease a 13 x 9 x 2-inch baking dish. Bring chicken broth to a boil in large saucepan. Stir in grits, salt and pepper; return to a boil. Cover and reduce heat to low. Cook 5 minutes until thickened, stirring occasionally. Stir in 1 C. cheese. Pour into prepared baking dish. Sprinkle ham over grits; set aside.

Whisk together egg, water and salt in small shallow dish. Dip chicken pieces into egg mixture, then dredge in bread crumbs. Melt butter and oil in a large skillet over medium high heat. Cook chicken tenders just until browned on both sides. Do not overcook. Place browned chicken pieces over ham in baking dish. Sprinkle with remaining 1/2 C. cheese. Sprinkle lightly with paprika. Bake 20 minutes, or until cheese is melted. Makes 6 servings.

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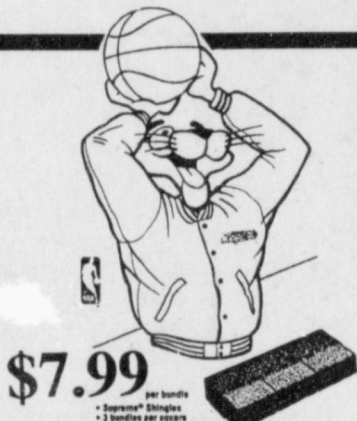

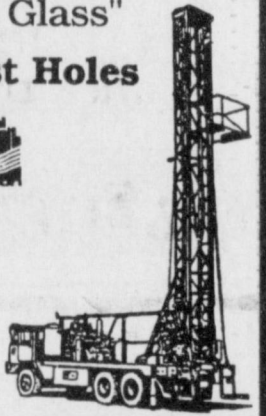

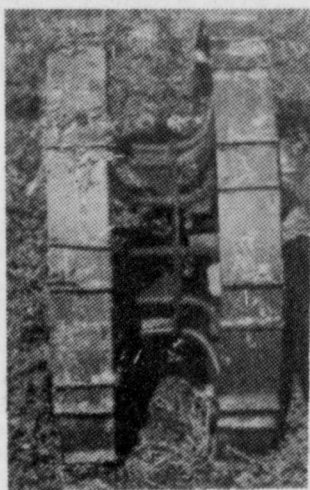
