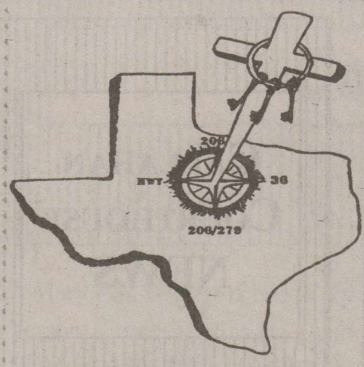

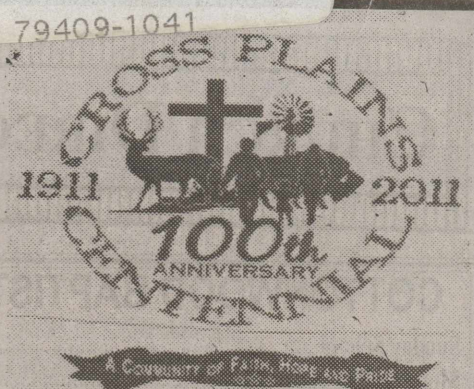

Buffaloes' running attack stampedes Baird, 41 - 6

Cross Plains' running attack proved too much Friday night for Baird as the Buffaloes raced to a 41-6 win over the Bears in a District 7-1A Division II game at the Bears Den. It was the sixth straight loss for Baird, which fell to 1-6 overall and 0-4 in district. Cross Plains improved to 5-2 and 4-0.

The Buffaloes had 341 yards rushing, led by running back Blake Hutchins, who gained 224 yards on 26 carries and scored three touchdowns.

"A couple of big plays hurt us," Baird coach Quinn Conley said. "It was really more like a 21-6 game."

Hutchins scored on a 61-yard run on the game's first play. He added a 1-yard TD run later in the first quarter, but Cross Plains held just a 13-0 lead until the final play of the first half when quarterback Tristen Stephenson scrambled 68 yards for a score, lifting Cross Plains to a 20-0 halftime advantage.

"He must have run 130 yards on that play," Conley said of Stephenson. "We missed him a bunch of times. That was a backbreaker."

Baird had its best offensive

game since the season-opening win over Menard. The Bears, who didn't have a turnover in the game, had 141 yards rushing, led by Jake Green's 77-yard effort, and quarterback Chandler McCombs threw for 91 yards.

"We moved the ball pretty well," Conley said. "We had some opportunities, but we didn't capitalize when we had a chance."

A dropped pass near the end zone on Baird's second possession of the game cost the Bears an early score. McCombs' 32-yard TD pass to Zac Inman gave Baird its only touchdown in the opening minutes of the third quarter, trimming Cross Plains' lead to 20-6.

"The kids played hard, but we wore down at the end," Conley added.

Cross Plains tacked on three fourth-quarter touchdowns to put the game out of reach. Stephenson scored on a 1-yard sneak and threw a 31-yard TD pass to Christopher French, while Hutchins added a 21 yard run for the Buffaloes' final touchdown.

Baird will travel to Albany to face the state-ranked Lions (6-1, 4-0) at 7:30 p.m. Friday. Albany, which pounded Roby

54-19 last week, is the best team in the district "by a long way," according to Conley.

"We have looked at three films, and we haven't seen them punt yet," Conley said. "That tells you something."

Albany is led by quarterback Jake Bumgardner, who rushed for 191 yards and passed for another 137 yards last week against Roby.

Conley said Baird will play host to Albany in a junior high game at 5 p.m. Thursday, followed by a junior varsity contest at the Bears Den.

Every Vote Does Count

It is often said that decisions are made by those who show up. Nowhere is that statement more true than at the voting booth.

The state of the economy and the nation's dismal employment statistics make this election one of the most important of our lifetimes. We are at a crossroads, faced with a clear choice between two fundamentally different visions for our country; the path we choose on November 6th will determine what kind of America we will have in the future.

Unfortunately, many people whose lives will be irrevocably affected by November's choices will not exercise the most basic right of a democratic system. Voter turnout in America is lower than it should be. In the last presidential election, the turnout of 56.8 percent of eligible voters was considered high - it was the highest, in fact, in 40 years. Turnout for mid-term elections is even lower, and has not topped 40 percent since 1970.

By not exercising their right to vote, tens of millions of Americans are handing over decision-making power over fundamental aspects of their lives: healthcare, education, employment. And since our elections are often decided by the thinnest of margins, every vote really does count.

This election matters for ev-

eryone: for the homemaker worried about paying bills, for the parents worried about their children's educations, for the soldier coming home to a bleak job market, for the small-business owner hoping to expand. Every American has a personal stake.

Each of us also has a personal responsibility. True liberty comes not merely from having fundamental rights, it comes from exercising them. Our nation's founders fought and died for the principles of democracy, as have countless others since. The brave men and women who worked to ensure universal enfranchisement made our country truly inclusive. We should never take these rights for granted; they are the precious result of great sacrifices. As the writer Louis L'Amour put it, "To make democracy work, we must be a nation of participants, not simply observers. One who does not vote has no right to complain."

Every election is a reaffirmation of our democratic principles; every vote is an exercise of freedom. Early voting in Texas starts October 22nd. Whether in person or by mail, early or on election day itself, I urge every Texan to exercise the right that is the cornerstone of our democracy: the right to vote.

Orders will be taken until January 31, 2013 expected delivery date on February 15, 2013.

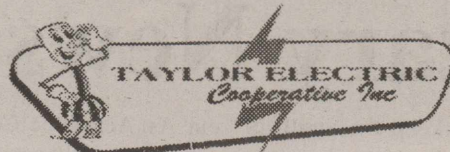

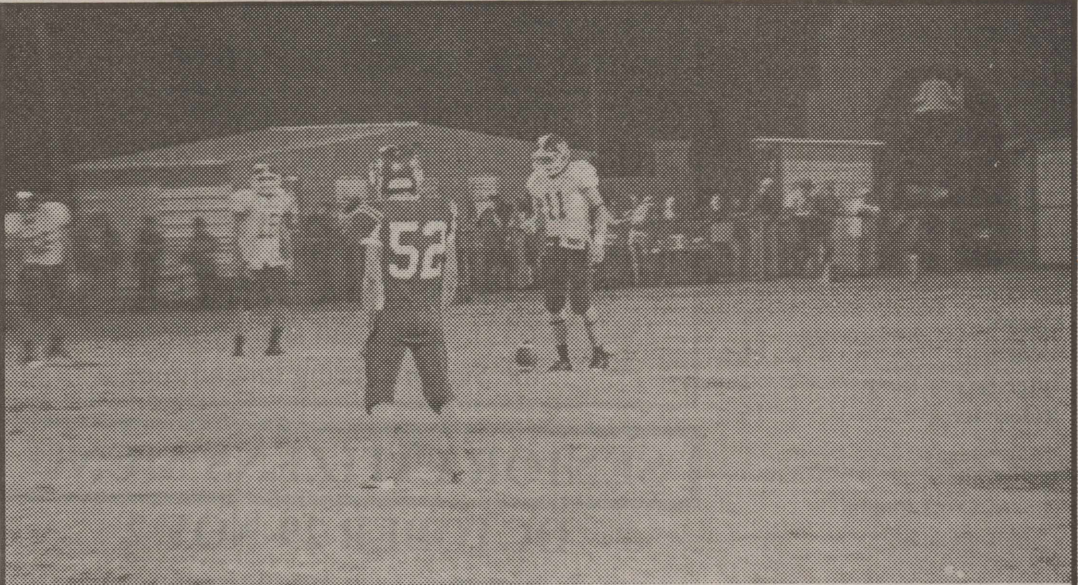

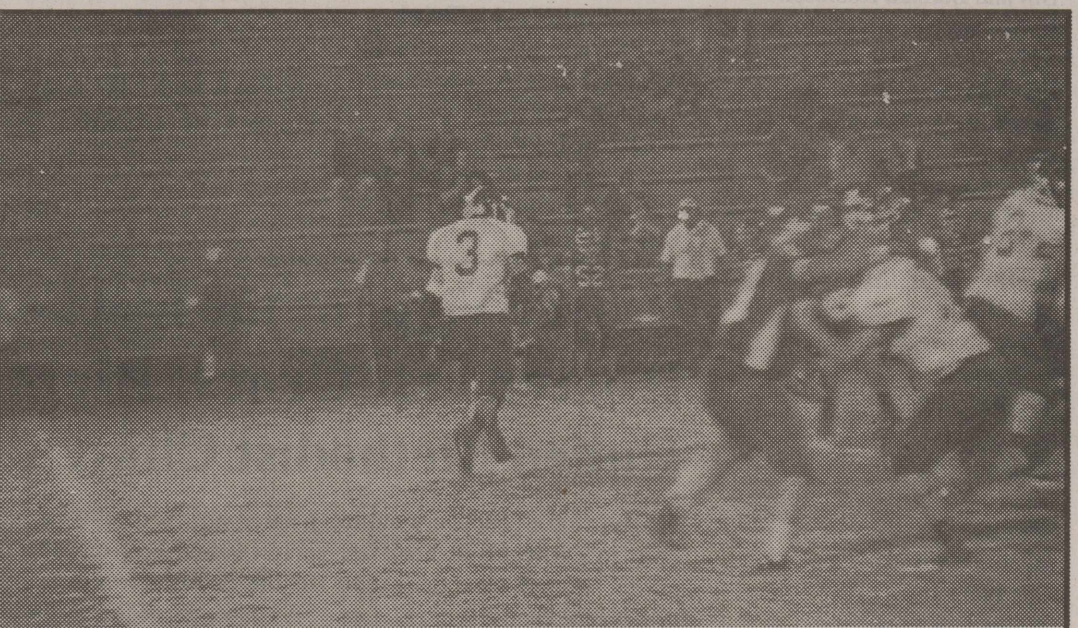




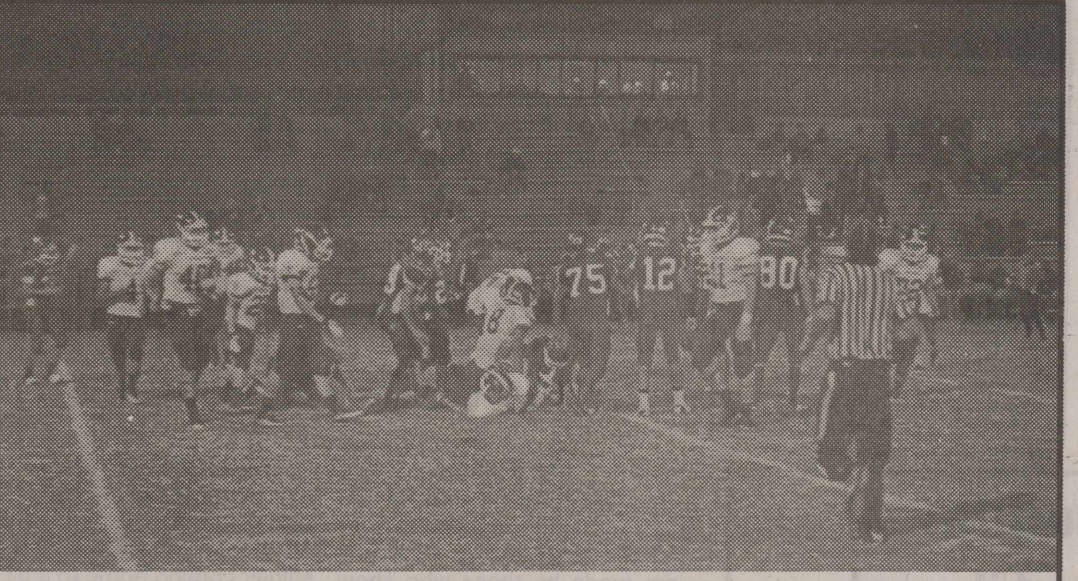
Buffaloes know their game — Buff defenders bring down Baird rusher.

Buffaloes Beat Bears

In what is believed to be the first time ever, the Cross Plains Buffaloes got a win at the Bears' Den Friday night in Baird. Looking back, Cross Plains had never won at Baird, and they did just that in a dominating 41-6 performance.

The ground game and defense was the backbone for success as the Buffaloes rushed for 358 rushing yards, and holding Baird to just 121 rushing yards. Behind the Cross Plains defense, defensive ends Michael Carpenter and Josh Branch combined for 13 tackles, 5 sacks, 8 tackles for a loss and one forced fumble between the two.

Sheldon Libey had 9 tackles, 1 sack including 2 tackles for a loss, and Alex Jackson pitched in with 7 tackles and 1 pass break up. The Buffaloes defense as a team forced 8 sacks, 14 tackles for a loss, and forced a fumble.

As the defense would do their part, the offense would play second to none, as they broke out of the gates early. Cross Plains returned the opening kickoff to the 39 yard line, and on the first play from the line of scrimmage running back Blake Hutchins would hit the sideline from 61 yards out with just 8 seconds ran off the game clock. Hutchins' extra point attempt was short, making the score 6-0.

The Buffaloes would force a four and out on Baird's next drive, then returned the ball on a punt to Baird. Baird then turned the

ball over on downs after going for it on fourth down to finish out the quarter Cross Plains 6 Baird 0.

Cross Plains would get on the board again, this time with 7:39 to play in the first half. After a 10 play drive, Hutchins would rumble in from 2 yards. His kick was true to give Cross Plains a 13-0 lead.

The defense would force a Baird punt once again, but they would be pinned back deep with time winding down in the half. After a big run by Hutchins was called back by holding, Stephenson would look to pass, the defensive backs would cover up his receivers, and Stephenson took it on his own avoiding tacklers to the right and finding his way back across the field with help from blockers to score on a 78 yard amazing run with 2.6 seconds in the half. That play would be the gas on the fire as Cross Plains made the extra point and never looked back.

Going into the half, Cross Plains led 20-0. Baird would get on the board in the third on a 11 yard pass play, the kick failed making it 20-6 with 7:19 in the half. The score would stand going into the fourth.

The fourth quarter was all Cross Plains' as quarterback Stephenson would rush in from one yard out, hit senior wide receiver Chris French on a 31 yard strike across the middle, and Hutchins would end the night on a 21 yard touchdown run. The 21 point

fourth quarter helped the Buffaloes to a convincing 41-6 win over their arch rivals from Baird.

Hutchins had a big night with 26 carries for 226 and three touchdowns. Stephenson was solid rushing and throwing with 8 carries for 121 yards and two touchdowns, as well as going 3 of 4 through the air for 82 yards and a touchdown.

The win sets up a big battle with the Hamlin Pied Pipers Friday night. Hamlin is 5-2, 4-0 in district just like the Buffaloes. Each team has won five straight coming into Friday's game at Buffalo Stadium. Be sure to come out and support the boys as they get another district test.

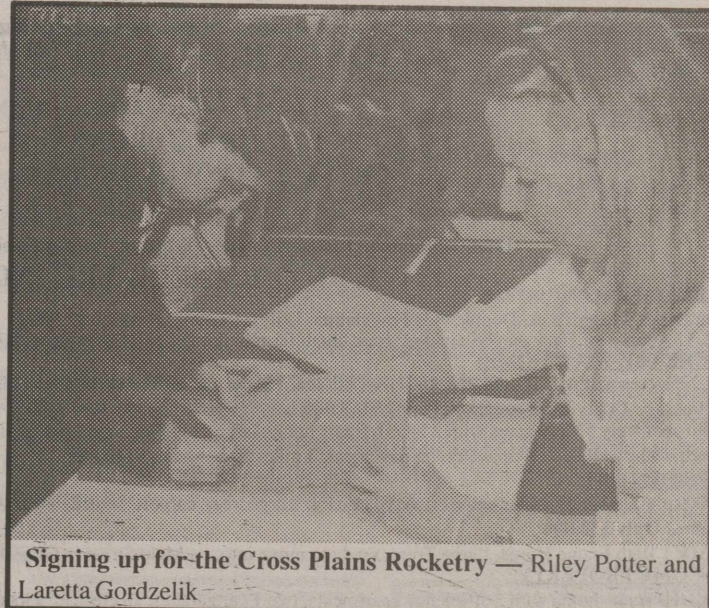

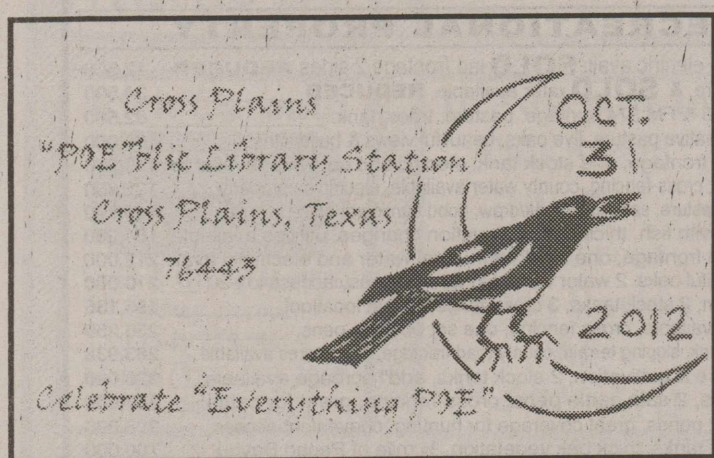

Texas unemployment rate drops to 6.8 percent in September

AUSTIN - Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate fell to 6.8 percent in September, down from 7.1 percent in August. The state's unemployment rate is down from 7.9 percent a year ago, and is well below the national unemployment rate in September of 7.8 percent. Texas added 21,000 seasonally adjusted nonfarm jobs in September for a total of 262,700 jobs added since last year.

"We saw encouraging signs in our state's labor market in September and a decrease in the unemployment rate last month," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Andres Alcantar. "Texas continues to add jobs and we now have a record number of people employed in our state."

Seven of the 11 major industries in Texas expanded in September. The largest gain was in Professional and Business Services, which grew by 13,600 jobs. The industry

has grown by 47,200 positions over the past year.

"It is clear that employers are benefitting from the available skilled workers in our state," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Ronny Congleton. "I'm encouraged to see that 3,800 manufacturing jobs were added last month, which indicates a growing demand for goods made here in Texas."

Jobs in Trade, Transportation, and Utilities grew as employers added 9,100 positions in September for a total of 54,700 positions since last year. Education and Health Services reported 6,600 additional jobs in September, totaling 39,000 jobs added in that industry since September 2011. Employment in Leisure and Hospitality increased by 3,700 jobs in September for a total of 50,300 jobs added over the year.

"Thanks to low taxes, a sensible regulatory environment, and an entrepreneurial spirit, Texas remains the number one state in America to do business," said TWC Commissioner Representing Employers Tom Pauken. "Since last year, the Texas economy has added 272,400 private sector jobs. That's a 3.1 percent annual growth rate for Texas compared to the national rate of just 1.7 percent."

The Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area (MSA) had the lowest September unemployment rate in the state at 3.3 percent. The Odessa MSA came in second at 3.9 percent, and the Amarillo MSA third at 4.4 percent (not seasonally adjusted).

Cross Plains 7th and 8th Grades Prepare for ROCKET LAUNCH

Whatever is going on in Mrs.

Kelley's classroom? There are round cylinders stacked up in one corner and nosecones standing in another, and on Fridays there are tables full of wooden disks, harnesses and parachutes! It's just the 7th and 8th grade students building their ammonium perchlorate composite propelled rockets to be launched on Friday, November 9th, as part of the NASA "Summer of Innovation" Mini-Grant Program. The school was awarded \$2500 for the students to design-build-launch their own under the watchful eyes of science teacher Rhonda Kelley and rocket expert Pat Gordzelik.

Students have finished their design phase and are now into the building phase. During the design phase students used their laptops and a computer program, called w.r.a.s.p. (Windows Rocketry Altitude Simulation Program), in a trial-and-error method to determine the best rocket size, manufacturer and model for use in their projects, based on cost and the airspace restriction of 5,000 ft.

It was decided to purchase kits with a G10 fin construction, dual deployment, phenolic slotted air-frame including reinforced kevlar recovery harnesses from wildmanrocketry.com. Then each class was divided into two teams (for a total of 8 teams) and each group selected a team name and a color for their largest parachute, the "main" parachute, a 48" diameter chute that will be deployed approx. 500' above ground.

The other parachute, a smaller 18" chute known as a "drogue chute", also deployed via on board electronics, will be released at apogee, or the highest part in altitude of the flight. Teams then used w.r.a.s.p. to determine the best motor to meet their criteria: must not go above 5,000 ft, must be 38mm, and must have a descent rate of 20 ft./per second or less.

It was decided to use a Binder Design Excel Plus motor on each rocket and (since the budget allowed) to purchase 8 main parachutes, 8" drogue Chutes, and 8 Adept altimeters capable of dual deployment. These electronic devices are also capable of reporting maximum altitudes attained.

The rocket motors decided on a Aerotech 1 211 power plants, capable of producing approximately 50 lbs of thrust. That is enough power to propel these 6' rockets almost 450 MPH!

Once the kits arrived, students began sanding the wooden components and dry-fitting the pieces together. Last Friday, some students mixed a two-part epoxy and glued the motor-mount casings and the altimeter bays together. Other students used a protractor, compass, and their math skills to figure out how to make a fin jig out of cardboard and then made one for each rocket. Gordzelik drilled holes for students to attach the I-bolts to the nose cones and altimeter bays.

This Friday teams will use the fin jigs to attach their fins. This is a critical step because if not done properly, the rockets will spin out of control. They will also attach their parachutes—another critical step to keep their rocket from becoming what scientists refer to as "a lawn dart." Then, on Wednesday, October 31st, teams will move outdoors to spray paint the rockets in their team colors. Finally, once the motors arrive, the mounting assembly will be completed and each rocket will be weighed.

Two days before launch, students will once again use w.r.a.s.p. to check the effects that the environment will have on their rockets. Each team will enter criteria into the rocket simulation program: the make and model of their rocket, the type of motor, the altitude of Cross Plains above sea level, the weather forecast (for humidity), the shape of the nose cone, the weight of the rocket, etc. and then print out this criteria and a prediction of how high their rocket will go before it reaches apogee. On launch day, the altimeters will be put in place and the arm whose rocket comes closest to their prediction (and lands safely) will be declared the winner.

The NASA Summer of Innovation (Sol) program is designed to support student interest in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) by strengthening the capacity of organizations that schools that inspire and engage female, minority or high poverty middle school students in STEM content. The Sol focuses on organizations that provide student experiences during the summer and through extended learning efforts designed to keep students involved in NASA-themed STEM activities during the academic year.

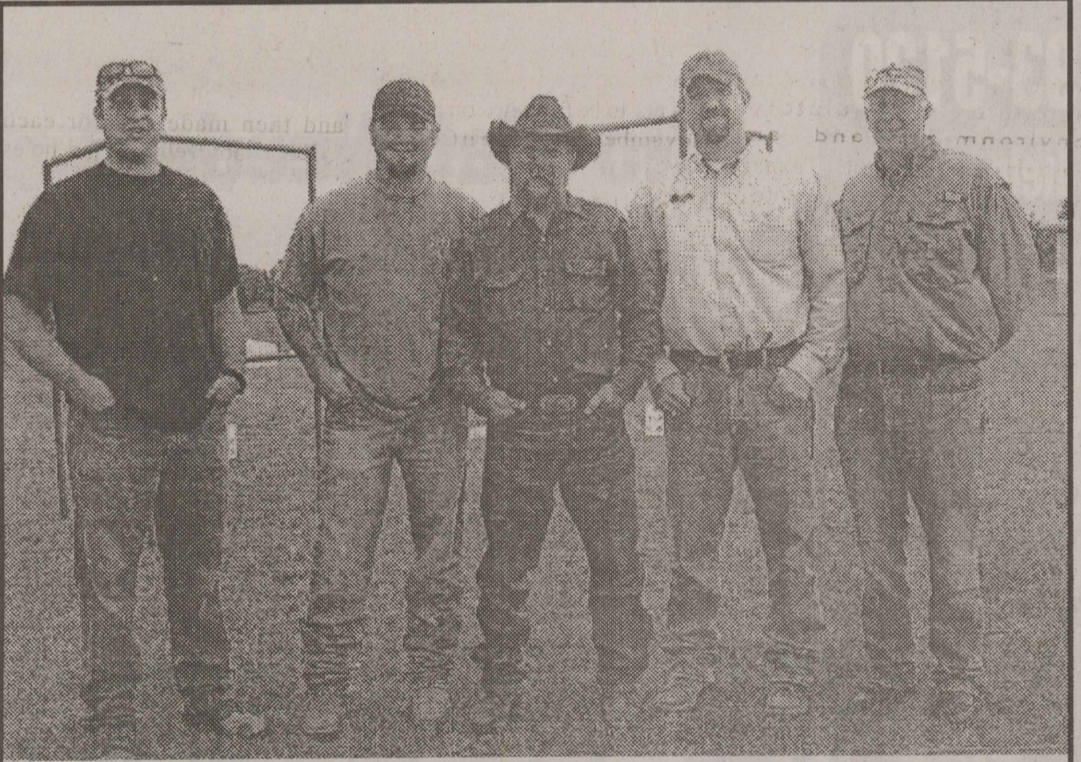

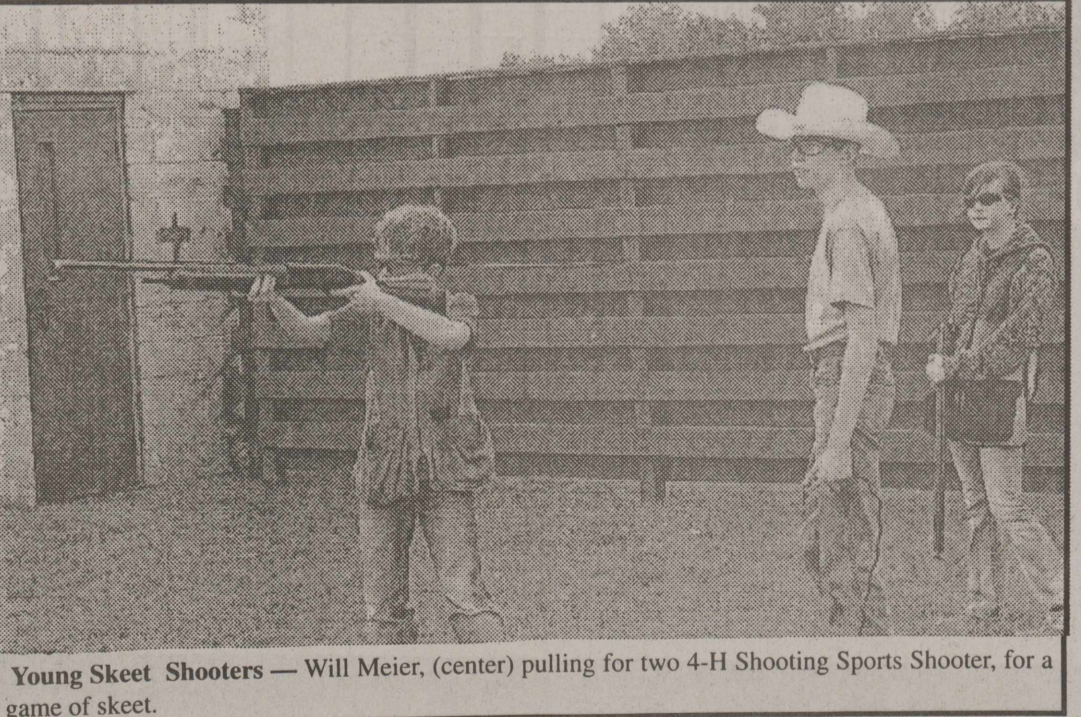

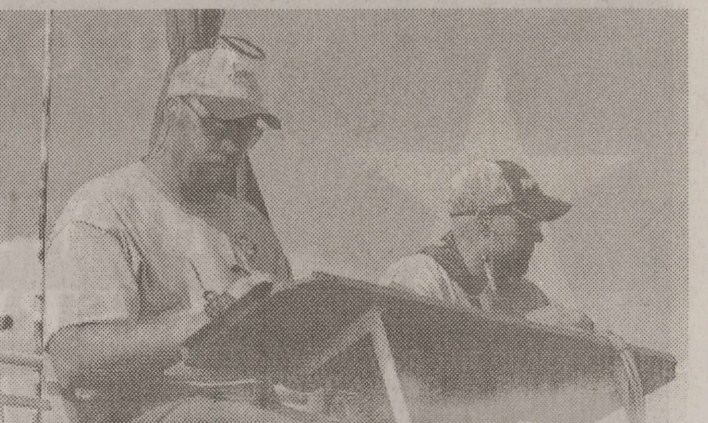

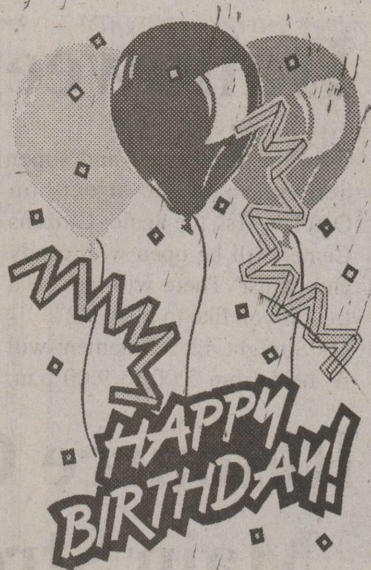
Big Tex Rally Riders stop at Museum — Shown above are just three of the 13 participants in the state-wide motorcycle rally who stopped at the Museum last weekend to take a picture of Robert Howard's typewriter. As luck would have it, members of Project Pride happened to be working at the Museum on Friday when the riders started coming in for the picture. Over the next two hours, 10 riders had stopped; coming as far away as KY, Chicago, OK, one transplant from England and a hand-full of Texans. Then on Saturday, three more came through, but they had to make phone calls, hoping to find somebody to get there with a key. These three riders were from TN, TX, and Canada.

The rally is the first such event to be held in Texas and was open to only 50 riders.
