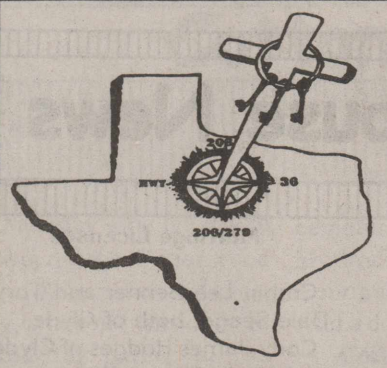

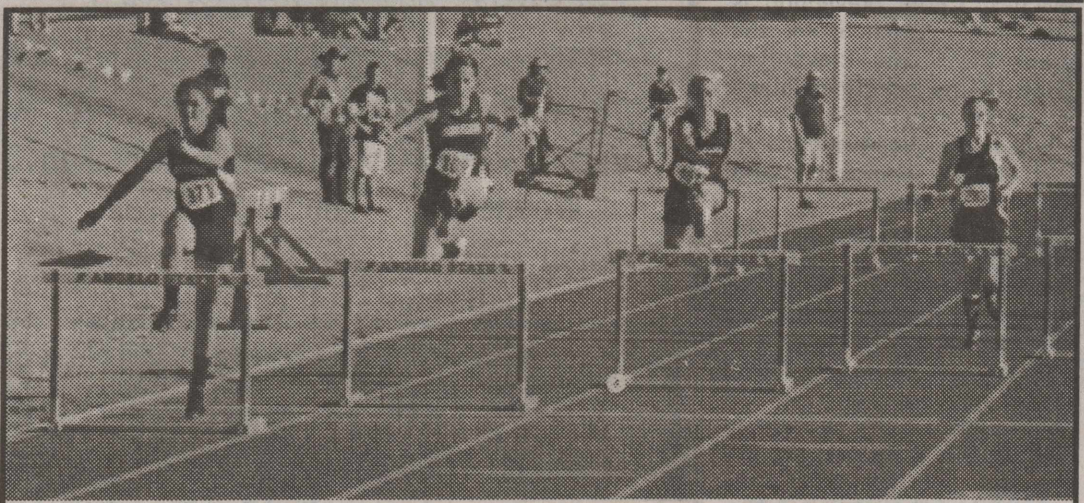
## Children's Choir To Present Spring Musical

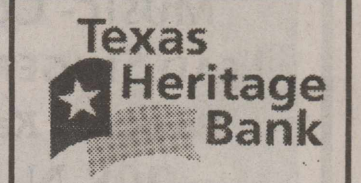
## Services Held for Esther Kerr Monday, April 29th

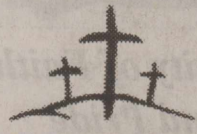

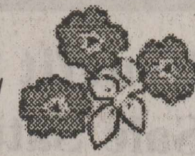

### Cornyn introduces measure to bring new transparency to Obamacare

WASHINGTON—U.S. Senator John Cornyn (R-TX) introduced the Patients' Right to Know Act, legislation that would require the disclosure of all new Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) fees and taxes affecting premium costs.

Despite the promises made by the President when this law was passed, Obamacare is causing health insurance premiums to rise.

"Texans have the right to know just how much this law is costing them, and this bill would bring much needed transparency to the onslaught of higher costs families will be facing."

**Background on the Bill**

"Requires health insurance issuers or sponsors of group health plans, beginning in 2016, to disclose the following:

- The annual fee on health insurance issuers;
- The Patient Centers Outcome Research Institute tax;

- Reinsurance contributions;
- Health insurance exchange user fees;
- Risk corridor payments, and;
- Risk adjustment charges.

"Protects insurance issuers and group health plans from administrative action by the Secretary of Health and Human Services (HHS) or by a state authority if disclosures are made based upon good faith estimates of the information.

"Requires the Government Accountability Office (GAO) to conduct a study of methods of calculating the impact on average premium costs associated with other PPACA mandates.

"The Secretary of HHS is required to make all information reported by the health insurance issuers, as well as the information included in the GAO report, available to the public through a website.

brushing time), Tips for Healthy Teeth educational info for parents in both Spanish and English, and a summary of MHS services.

According to Oral Health in America: A report of the Surgeon General, tooth decay is the single most common chronic childhood disease — five times more common than asthma and seven times more common than hay fever. Poor children are affected by this epidemic more frequently than other children, with nearly 12 times more restricted-activity days due to dental issues than children from higher-income families. With more than 1.5 million Texas children living in poverty, there is a great need for preventive dental care.

Dental problems also directly

affect success for children, with more than 51 million school hours lost each year to dental-related illness. Teachers have judged both classroom performance and classroom behavior to be significantly poorer among children in need of dental care. Pain and suffering due to untreated disease can also lead to problems in eating and speaking.

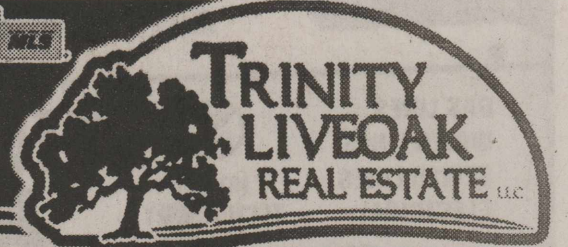

The current permit authorizes the disposal of treated domestic wastewater at a daily average flow not to exceed 87, 500 gallons per day via surface irrigation of 79.6 acres of non-public access agricultural land. This permit will not authorize a discharge of pollutants into waters in the State. TCEQ received this application on July 25, 2012. The wastewater treatment facility and disposal site are located approximately 2,500 feet west of State Highway 279 and 4,000 feet south of State Highway 36 in Callahan County, Texas 76443. The wastewater treatment facility and disposal site are located in the drainage basin of Pecan Bayou Above Lake Brownwood in Segment No. 1420 of the Colorado River Basin. The TCEQ Executive Director has completed the technical review of the application and prepared a draft permit. 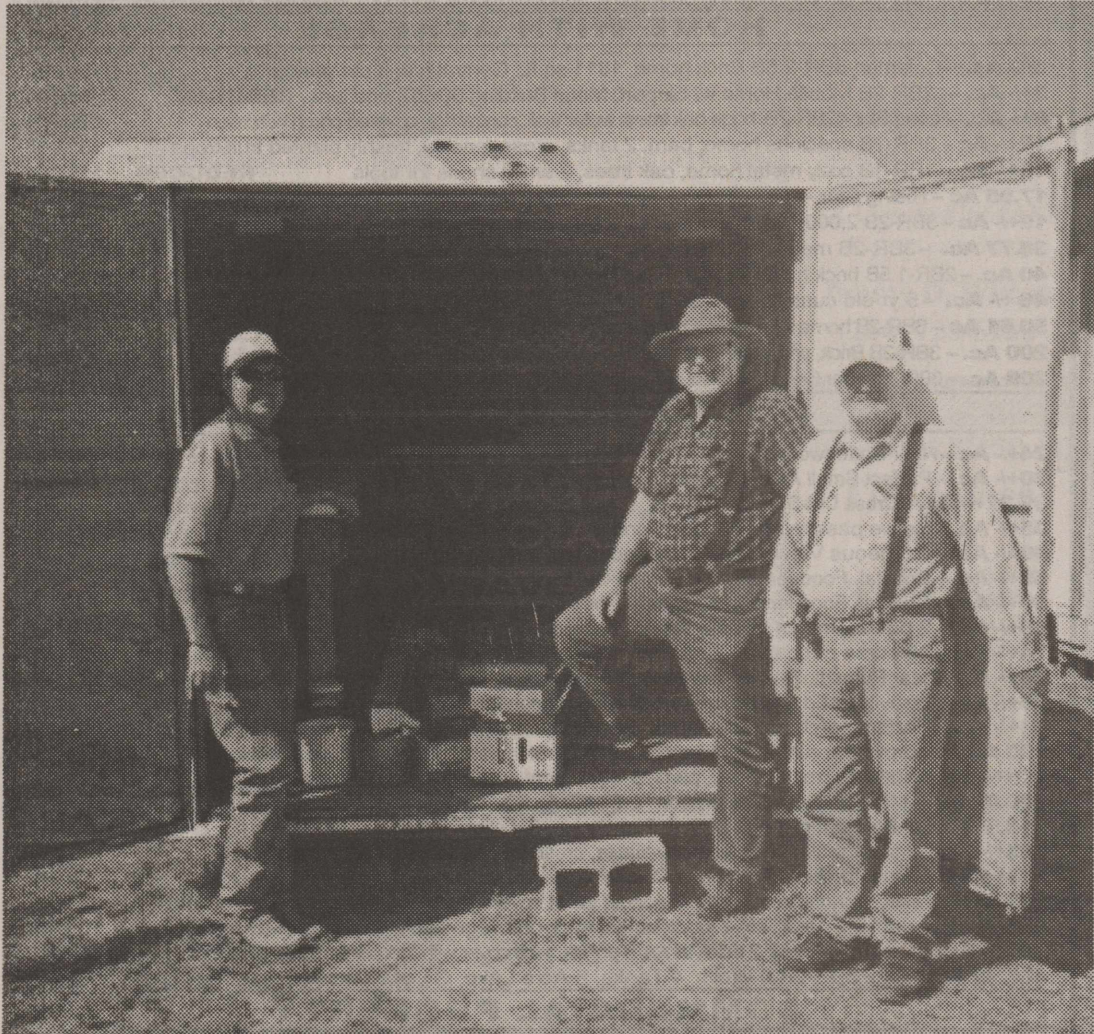

No action was taken on the Countywide Burn Ban, which means the Burn Ban remains lifted in Callahan County.

—Under public comments,

there were none.

—Under the agenda item to appoint a representative for Callahan County Emergency Medical Service Board, Commissioner Farmer made a motion to table the item until the next meeting. Commissioner Hicks seconded the motion and the motion passed with a 5-0 vote.

—Commissioner Farmer made a motion to table the Appraisals Report until new appraisals of County buildings have been performed. Commissioner Windham seconded the motion and the motion carried with a 5-0 vote.

—Commissioner Hicks made a motion to pay the approved bills. Commissioner Kirkham seconded the motion. The motion carried with a vote of 5-0.

—Commissioner Windham made a motion to adjourn the commissioners' court meeting at 9:45 a.m. Commissioner Farmer seconded the motion, which then carried with a 5-0 vote.

—Commissioner Hicks made a motion to pay the approved bills. Commissioner Kirkham seconded the motion. The motion carried with a vote of 5-0.

## TxDOT begins seasonal seal coat projects in Callahan County

ABILENE—The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) Abilene District will begin a project May 6th to preserve area highways with seal coating.

More than 257 miles of state-maintained roadways are part of the district's 2013 seal coat program. Roadways in Nolan, Mitchell, Howard, Borden, Scurry, Fisher, Taylor, Callahan, Haskell, Jones, Stonewall and Shackelford counties will receive \$7.9 million worth of preventive maintenance seal coat work.

"Maintenance and system preservation is our largest expenditure, and seal coating provides a variety of benefits to the roadway, including a waterproof surface that prevents moisture from entering and weakening the roadbed," said Snyder Area Engineer Mike Molter, P.E., who is overseeing the project. "Seal coating also reduces deterioration and cracking of the asphalt surface, which will prolong the life of the pavement."

Weather permitting, the work will take three weeks to complete. Motorists can expect lane closures and a pilot car to guide traffic through work zones. Drivers are asked to be on the lookout for workers and to avoid distractions.

"Safety is the top priority at TxDOT and the basis for planning, building, and maintaining our transportation system," Molter said. "Our road network requires constant maintenance and preservation. The public depends on transportation every day, and TxDOT is responsible to Texas drivers, our partners and others to be responsible stewards of our state's resources."

## Urgency marks reaction to Day-of-Prayer Plan

"We need to do this every week - starting right now" WASHINGTON - The tea-party political movement started in earnest with a rant by Rick Santelli on CNBC.

Could the next big spiritual movement begin with a column in WND?

That's what Joseph Farah is asking himself this week - just four days after the publication of a commentary he published calling for Sept. 11, 2013, to be "A National Day of Prayer and Fasting" to beseech God's help in, what he calls, "saving America from itself."

It all started last Friday with the publication of "A day of prayer and fasting." Farah says he was blown away at 8 a.m. that morning when his email inbox was filled with nearly 1,000 responses from Americans saying they were on board with his idea for designating 9/11/13 as just such a day.

"There's been a tremendous outpouring of support for this idea," said Farah. "I'm hearing not only from thousands of Americans from coast to coast, pledging participation, but also from members of Congress, from top Christian leaders, even from the media."

Farah has set up a page at which people can register their support for the plan and be kept up to date on the latest

developments.

Farah's original column pointed out that when "America's founders faced challenges, they often had the wisdom and insight to call for a national day of prayer and fasting. America is facing challenges today that, in many ways, rival anything we've seen since the start of World War II."

"I am now convinced that something wonderful is going to happen on 9/11/13 - or at least as a result of the prayer and repentance by hundreds of thousands or even millions of Americans who take part in this very American tradition in times of crisis," he said.

Farah is not only impressed with the sheer numbers responding, but also their level of enthusiasm and urgency.

"We need to do this every week - starting right now," wrote one respondent.

Other responses also reflected the sense of urgency: "I am certainly on board," wrote Barry McClellan. "I just hope 9/11/13 is not too late. In addition, perhaps you could encourage family fasting and prayer now, and then everyone together on 9/11."

"It is quite evident by your commentary titled, 'A Day of Prayer and Fasting' that you now see that there is little or no hope for recovery through political methods and perhaps not even by the powerful communications of the pen," wrote Otto Gershon. "For the most part, too many people are just not listening. They are under a spiritual slumber,

anesthetized by years of lukewarm preaching and temporal living. I agree with you that fasting and prayer is our only recourse. Even so, I believe that the open window for this to be still effective is diminishing. If there is not a spiritual revival in this nation very soon, it will become critically necessary, based on what I know of the Bible, to get out of the country and perhaps off of the continent. Even so, to be sure, the world of nations would be a very dark place without the light that still shines from the United States of America."

"September 11, 2013, will be scheduled for prayer and fasting," wrote Joseph McClelland. "That date is far off in the sense of the absolute shocking 'urgency of the hour' as I see it."

But things are happening right now, explains Farah.

"People are already beginning to pray for repentance and revival," he said. "They're recognizing the government is hopelessly broken. The culture is breaking down. Man's conventional answers are not going to work. We need a miracle. We need a move of the Holy Spirit in America."

Farah personally became convinced of this more than a year ago when he began producing what became the most successful faith movie of 2012 and 2013 - "The Isaiah 9:10 Judgment."

Based on Jonathan Cahn's teachings as revealed in his record-breaking bestseller

"The Harbinger," the movie had a profound impact on Farah.

As Farah puts it: "God's Word tells us in 2 Chronicles 7:14: 'If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land.' We've got our instructions. God is waiting on us to act - His people. He's not waiting on the whole world to act. He's not waiting on a majority of Americans to act. He's waiting on us - his children, his followers, his believers."

His action plan includes the following:

Make a note on your calendar now to join in the commitment to participate;

Help spread the word to the remnant of Americans who understand what we're up against on Facebook and Twitter and by word of mouth;

Talk to pastors and Bible study leaders and get them on board;

Sign up to register your expression of support and your intention to participate.

"This is a matter between God and His people," Farah says. "Will we follow His command and accept His promise to forgive our sin and heal our land? How can we choose otherwise?"

## Multi-County wheat tour May 3rd

## Let us pray for Hunter Hanner

Hunter Hanner has been sick from an unknown disease most all of his life, running fever and dealing with infections which would sometimes become internal abscesses that had to be surgically removed.

He spent his second birthday at Hendrick Hospital and as Hunter describes the situation himself "things were not looking good". "But this is where it became evident God was taking care of me".

Hunter is in a hospital with an abscess on his liver and no one seems to know what is happening or why.

Hunter's family doctor, Doctor Faehnle suggested his parents take him to Texas Children's Hospital in Houston.

After spending some time in the hospital there and having the liver abscess removed, they figured it out!

The diagnosis was Chronic Granulomatous disease CGD, an extremely rare disease.

What CGD means is that Hunter's blood lacks the enzyme to kill bacteria. His cells can recognize bacteria and infection, they just can't kill it. That's why he was having the infections and abscesses or

granulomas.

Doctors put Hunter on a new medication called Bactrim, and two year old Hunter goes home.

At age six Doctors tried yet another new drug interferon. The interferon was a miracle. Doctors didn't fully understand why it worked, but it did work.

During the next ten years things were relatively calm. Hunter got married to his lovely wife Jennifer and they had three boys. Jennifer wondered if cord blood from the boys would be helpful. Doctors said no, but this got Hunter's GDC doctor talking to transplant doctors at Texas Children's Hospital specifically about Hunter's illness and they decided he needed a marrow transplant from and unrelated, perfect match.

Editors note: This part is Hunter telling his story.

"They had a hard time 100% recommending I do the transplant because of my good health, but after talking to my doctors and a whole lot of praying, we decided that we were going to do it. We had prayed for God to close the door if it was not what we were supposed to do, and He just kept shoving it wide open it seemed like.

So, I was admitted to

Methodist Hospital on April 16, 2013 to begin my chemo, and should get my transplant on the 25th or 26th. I'll be in the hospital for around a month and in the Houston area for around 100 days.

I know it will be tough physically and emotionally on me and my family. I ask for your continued prayers. God is capable of giving incredible strength, healing, and peace. I know; I've seen it my entire life. I don't think I've ever felt more loved than I do right now. Thank you, Thank you. We'll keep you updated.

## Michael Palmer is new Extension Agent in Coleman County

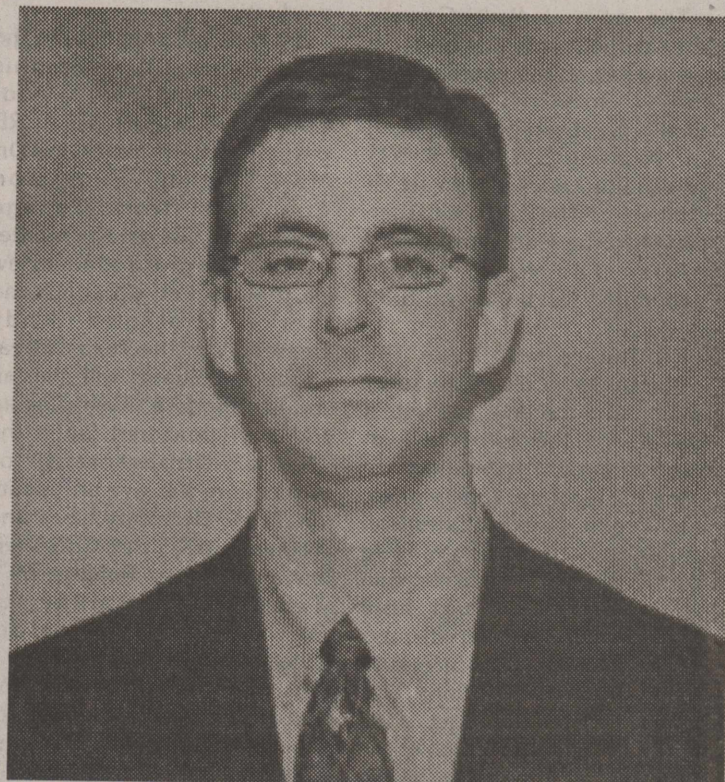
