



During high school, she lived with her grandparents, Lena Belle and Virgil Fulton, in Cottonwood, along with her sister, Marjorie, who died in 1956. Claire is survived by another sister, Roxie Bynum, of San Angelo, and her daughter, Joan Sodowsky, and son, Lynn, both of Arlington, Texas. She is also survived by her brother-in-law, Wallace Bennett and wife Carol, of Cottonwood, nephew, Greg Bennett, of Lakewood, Colorado; a grandson, Eric Edwards; a greatgranddaughter, both of Arlington, and a nephew, Roy Alvin Bynum of Plano.

Claire was well known in Cottonwood and Cross Plains. Although she lived in Arlington for many years, she kept active with her roots here. She was a Friend of the Cross Plains Library and specifically, visited often the Cross Plains Genealogy Association, providing much resource information and assistance in research.

Claire was a Regent with the National Society of the Daughters of American Revolution (DAR). and served as President one year in Arlington. In addition to the many support activities of the DAR, such as student scholarships and working with the Children of the DAR, she was always helping other new members in their research to find

Callahan County Commissioners' voted to pay over \$2,000 for the county's contribution to receive a state grant of \$20,000 for maintenance of Flood Plain Sites in Callahan County.

Troopers set to issue tickets to drivers breaking the law

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is one of the most dangerous times of a student's trip; and drivers who pass a stopped school bus create a potentially deadly situation," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "The safety of Texas children is paramount, and DPS will not tolerate those who break the law and put our children at risk."

During National School Bus Safety Week, troopers in many areas across the state will be riding on or following school buses to catch motorists who disregard the law. Troopers will also be patrolling areas where school buses pick up and drop off students, looking for motorists violating the school bus law. Drivers who violate the law could face fines as much as \$1,250, which was increased in September by new legislation.

In 2012, Texas Highway Patrol troopers issued 449 tickets for passing a stopped school bus. Last year, 840 crashes in Texas involved school buses, according to the Texas Department of Transportation,

According to Texas statute, a driver - traveling in either direction - must stop when approaching a school bus that is stopped and operating a visual signal. The driver may not proceed until one of the following occurs: the school bus resumes motion; the operator is signaled by the bus driver to proceed; or the visual signal is no longer activated. If a road is divided only by a left-turning lane, drivers on both sides of the roadway must stop for school buses with alternating red flashing lights activated. However, if the lanes are separated by an intervening space or physical barrier, only motorists going in the same direction as the bus are required to stop. School buses, by law, must stop at all railroad crossings.

Wild About Texas sponsored by: Happy Trails Rustic Western MICHAEL PRICE

As a budding naturalist growing up in the southern portion of the Panhandle of Texas, I became very familiar with the squirrels of that region. Thirteen-lined Ground Squirrels and Fox Squirrels were abundant, and so it was only when I moved to the Concho Valley that I observed for the first time the conspicuous Rock Squirrel.

Rock Squirrels (Spermophilus variegatus) inhabit the Trans-Pecos and Edwards Plateau ecoregions of Texas. They are the largest of the four species of the genus of Ground Squirrels that occur in Texas, rivaled only in size by the ground-dwelling and closely related Prairie Dog. Adults of this species may approach nineteen inches in total length, of which nine inches is the tail. Adult males can weigh as much as two pounds. The body is two-toned, with the forward half being a dark brown to jet black coloration while the latter half is mottled with brown and gray. The moderately bushy tail is reddish brown and edged in white.

As the name implies, this animal is almost always found in association with rocks, including rocky outcroppings, cliffs, canyons, talus slopes, and boulder piles, particularly in areas of permanent water. The rocky riprap that is often along the edges of lakes are a favored habitat. Rock Squirrels are diurnal (day active), with the majority of their activity limited by temperature. They avoid midday activity during the summer months, being active in the mornings and evenings, while during the spring and fall seasons they can be observed readily throughout the day. Like many other mammals, they will go through a hibernation period during the winter, although that too is dependant upon temperatures.

They are also extremely wary, running into the nearest hideaway upon the slightest hint of danger. Although they spend the majority of their lives near the ground, they will not hesitate to climb trees as readily as their arboreal cousins to evade predators such as badgers, bob-

destructive, feral cats.

Being a typical ground squirrel, the Rock Squirrel feeds primarily upon plant matter that is berries, wild gourds and cactus tuna. Unlike other ground squirrels however, it can also be highly carnivorous, feeding on insects such as grasshoppers and crickets, arachnids such as spiders, as well as smaller rodents. They have also been observed actually catching and feeding on range in Texas, and although ground nesting birds, although they are extremely wary, they this is definitely not their normal behavior.
