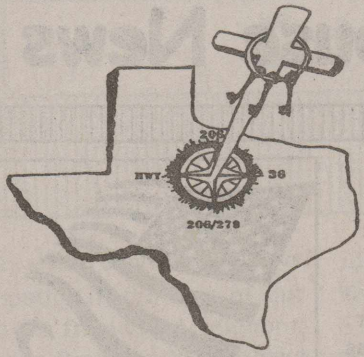

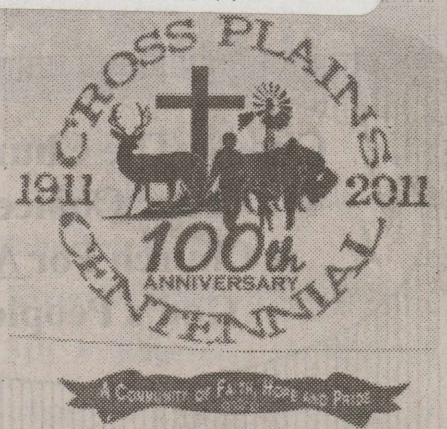

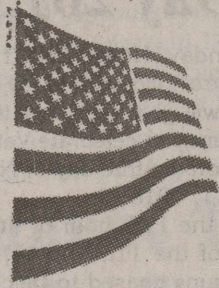

Yvonne was preceded in death by her parents, a brother and a sister of the heart, Faye Brown.

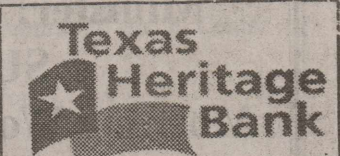
ANNUAL FALL CLEANUP

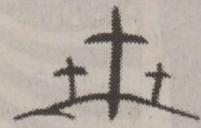

Friends of the library will be busy baking lots of treats for your holiday table: pecan pies, pumpkin pies, fudge, divinity,

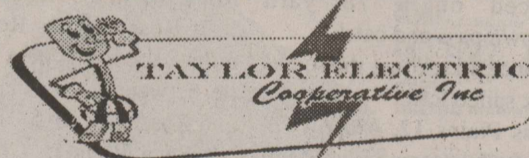

Traditions of the Lord's Acre Continue

Candy remembers thinking, WOW! When asked to elaborate, she figured out that she was thinking, how do we really feed turkey and dressing to 300 plus people? How can that possibly happen in one fairly small facility?

Jerry and Carol George had much the same reaction as they experienced their first festival last year. As Jerry recalled, I just stood there in amazement,

watching that drive through system work like clock work! He was quick to commend the church youth and the National Honor Society students who took the orders and money at the traffic stop, passed both on to an adult worker at the door where the money went one way, food came from another direction, students headed back to the customers, delivered an armload of food and signaled the next car to pull up. Totally unbelievable! pretty well summed it up for Jerry.

Tiffany Traweek (who just happens to be the daughter of the George's) also experienced her first Lord's Acre last year. Conflicts had always prevented her from attending similar events in another church. But, here, I was so totally impressed with the wide variety of items that showed up for the auctions. Then in true Texanese, she continued that she had been unable to attend the actual live auction last year because she had a bull bucking already on her schedule!

Jack Baum grew up in this church and remembers some of the earliest days of the festival. One of his memories? Tommy Harris always dedicated the income from one acre of his farm to the Lord's Acre. If that field was in wheat that made 25 bushels per acre, then he donated the income of 25 bushels. Much

to his surprise, when he and Barbara moved back here a few years ago, the Lord's Acre was still going strong with the same spirit of dedication and some adaptations to the changing times.

Although Pastor Kevin and Lee Anne Morton had been an integral part of such festivals at both Weatherford and Coleman, he was totally awed as they became a part of the local Lord's Acre. This thing just runs like a well oiled machine; it starts rather quietly in late Sept., picks up throughout Oct. and hits full speed in early November. He feels that this event has been so successful for so many years because there is such a sense of pride among the church members and everybody is involved year and year. Another aspect of the event that makes it so special to Pastor Kevin is that the monies generated are put back into the missions of the church, both locally and within the larger programs of the Methodist Church. It's definitely the hand of God that enables us to reach out and help others.

And all this has always been, and always will be the premise of the Lord's Acre...using our God-given talents to help others.

The 2013 Lord's Acre will be all day Sat. Nov. 9, starting at 9:00 and running at least 12 hours with something for everybody.

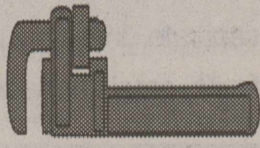
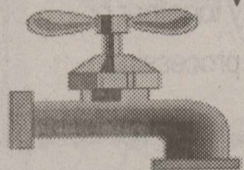

The Justice of the Peace for Precinct #1 is currently held by Roy Chapman, while the Justice of the Peace for Precinct #3 is held by Steve Odom. Burlie Taylor of Cross Plains is currently the Justice of the Peace for Precinct #4.

Pillans said although candidate filing officially begins on November 9th, he will not be available to take candidate applications until Tuesday, November 12th. The party chairman said that candidate filing will continue through December 9th.

Pillans said if anyone is unable to attend the candidate filing on Tuesday, November 12th, they can apply later by calling him on his cell phone at 214-803-5515 or at home at (254) 725-4168.

The Republican Primary Election is scheduled for Tuesday, March 4, 2014.

Early voting for the 2014 Republican Primary Election will take place from May 19, 2014 through May 23, 2014.

Monarch Butterfly

For a naturalist, living in west Texas definitely has its share of fringe benefits. The diversity of the flora and fauna that can be observed here is nothing short of amazing. One of the amazing feats of nature west Texans are privy to are the roundtrip travels of a small insect. Of course, one does not have to be a naturalist to be impressed with the epic journey that the Monarch butterfly makes every year, as well as the beauty that this species possesses.

The Monarch Butterfly's (*Danaus plexippus*) natural range is rather mushroom-shaped in appearance. It frequents the small Mexican states of Michoacan and Mexico during the winter months, while it occupies a large east-west ranging portion of the northern United States and southern Canada during the summer months. It is during its travels to these haunts that it passes through the corridor of west Texas. The Monarch will typically make its appearance here first in mid-April to early May as it heads north to its summer home, and then appear here again in late September to early November as it travels back to the warmer climate of its winter home. The Monarch is the only butterfly known to migrate on a regular basis.

The Monarch Butterfly is one of the most distinctive and colorful butterflies that occurs in west Texas. The upper wings are dark orange in coloration and are bordered in black. There are numerous small white spots randomly situated inside this black border, as well as along the rear edges of the orange-colored wings. There are also several orange spots close to the tips of the forewings, and the veins and margins are deep black. The head and thorax are black and the head is littered with small white spots, while the thorax is solid black. The abdomen has several pairs of white lines that traverse either side of this body part. As this butterfly lands, the wings are clasped together to reveal the under wings, which are yellow-orange in coloration, rather than being dark orange like the upper wings. The under wings also have larger white spots than the ones that appear on the upper wings. This species is also sexually dimorphic, which means that the males and females have differences in coloration. Males have a black patch of scales along the hind wings that are responsible for the release of female-attracting pheromones, and the black lines on the veins are much narrower than those that appear on the female. Males are also the larger sex, with adults achieving a total

wingspan of approximately four inches, while mature females only attain a wingspan of about three and one-half inches.

This type of butterfly is an almost plant-specific feeder, feeding on the flowers of most milkweed species. It utilizes an appendage known as a proboscis to feed on these items. The proboscis is long and almost threadlike, and in times of non-use is curled up under the head of the butterfly.

The Monarch, like other butterfly species, undergoes a four-stage life cycle that can be described as nothing short of miraculous. In the beginning stage, their life begins as an egg, which hatches after a few short days into the next stage. Upon hatching, the larvae are known as caterpillars, and at this stage, the growth rate is highly accelerated. Caterpillars can eat twice their body weight in a single day, and as such, grow quickly. As they grow, they literally grow out of their skins, and they shed their outer layer of skin up to five times (known as molting) before they enter the next stage of their life cycle. Caterpillars of the Monarch are quite colorful as they are banded with white, black, and yellow rings, and attain a length of about two inches. After the caterpillar finds a spot

in which it feels is secure, it will pupate as it forms a protective shell about it known as a chrysalis. The chrysalis version of the Monarch is pale blue-green with small golden spots. Inside of this shell, the larvae changes into the butterfly that it will soon become. After about a week, the adult will emerge from this shell with its wings intact, although they are crumpled into small balls on the sides of the body. The butterfly will then pump a clear fluid into the veins of their wings, causing them to expand much the same way a stick can reinforce a kite.

Upon reaching maturity, the Monarch will immediately begin searching for food, water and a mate. After mating, the males will continue their search for other receptive females, while the females will begin to look for a site suitable to lay eggs so a brand new life cycle can begin. Like its close relative the Queen, the Monarch is a poisonous species of butterfly, said to be quite bitter and distasteful. As such, the Viceroy, another species of butterfly, has adapted to look like, or mimic, the Monarch.

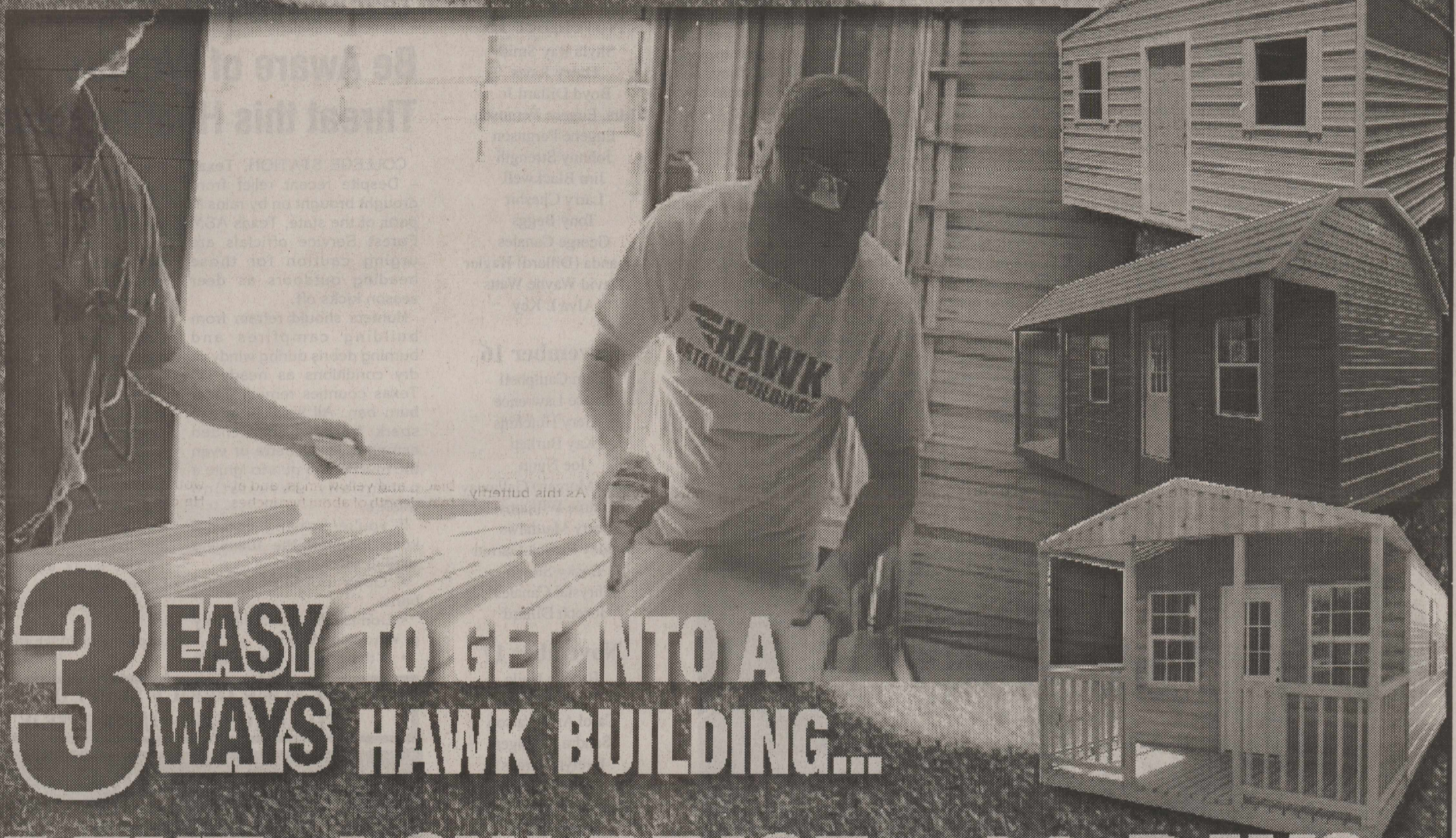

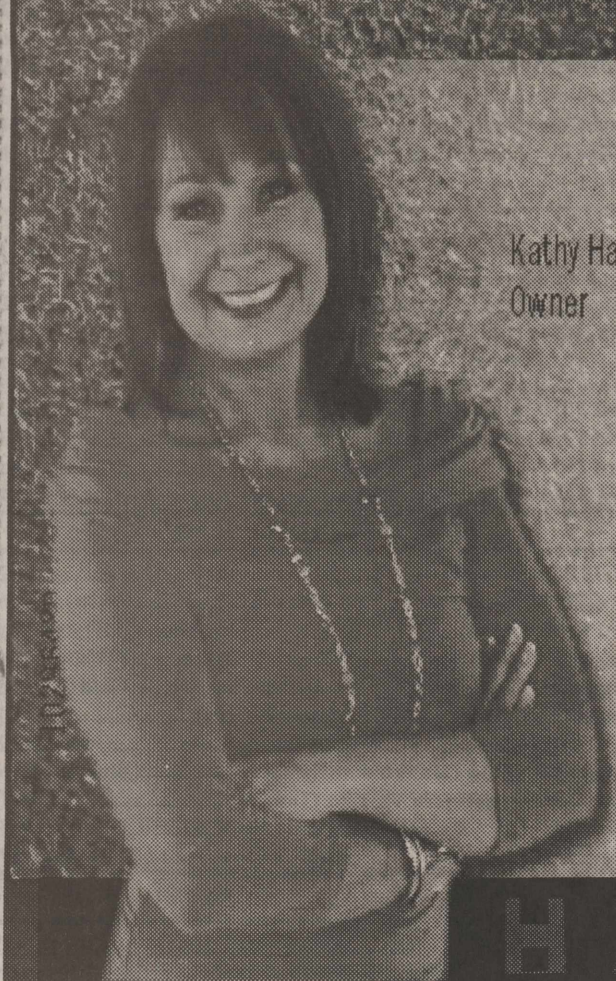

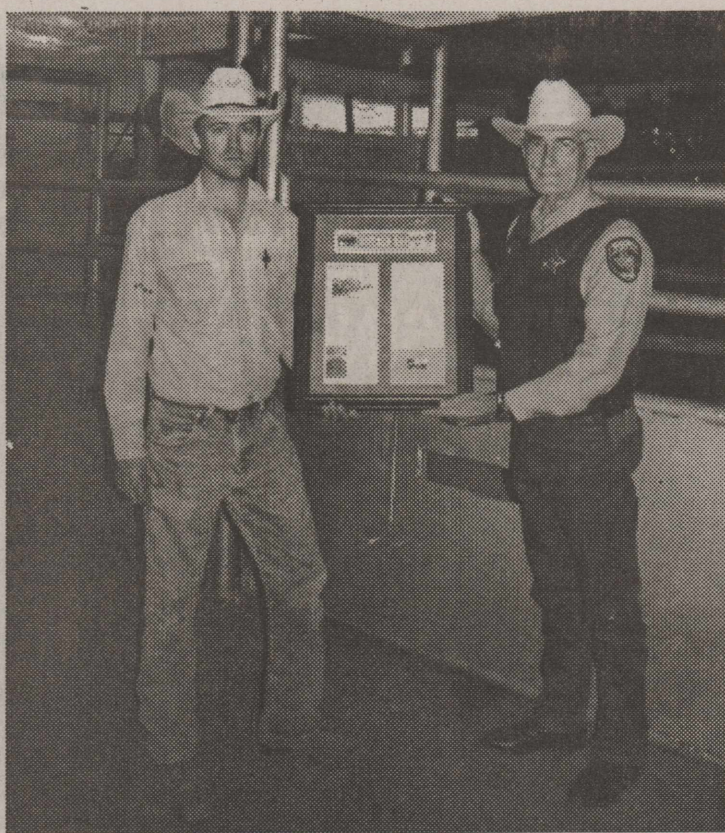

Veterans developing ALS at alarming rate

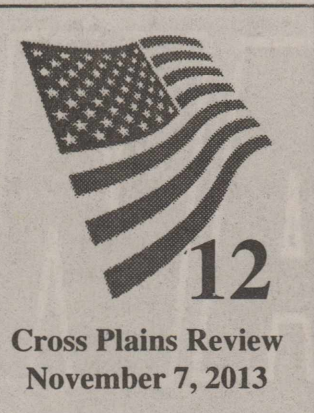

- Make sure the fire is extinguished and cold to the touch before you leave it.
- Avoid burning feed bags.

- Drive only on designated trails. Don't park or idle vehicles in tall, dry grass, which can be ignited by contact with a hot muffler.
- Use caution with cigarettes and matches.
- Use spark arresters on all power equipment.

• Don't build a fire during dry or windy conditions.
