Friedrich Nietzsche, a German philosopher and atheist coined the phrase "God is dead". His teaching and his European following in the late 1800's and early 1900's helped make him a most successful philosopher as he popularized the notion that man is sovereign, not God.

We see the fruit of his reasoning as he and other intellectuals of his day (like Karl Marx) dominated European thought and fostered the rise of fascism and communism.

These "godless" movements fomented countless anarchies subsequent world wars, retaliations against enemies of the state, and left near 100,000,000 (one hundred million and still counting) dead in their wake. Quite a sobering testimony for those who examine the evidence compiled by history.

This is not a new temptation nor did it begin with Nietzsche and Marx. In Genesis 3:5 we learn that Satan coined the phrase "You will be like God" and the deception and fall of man was established. Despite God's revelation of goodness, righteousness, and exhortation to love a large majority want to choose their own way. In the end each of us turns to God and recognizes his presence. The question for you and I is whether we do it today or wait till its too late.

Cross Plains' retail sales begin 2010 down over 4%

The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments in 2010 are now running over four percent lower compared to 2009 sales tax payments, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office.

Texas State Comptroller Susan Combs reported the city's sales tax payment on Friday, January 8th.

Cross Plains' 2010 sales tax payments for the year totalled \$14,421.32, which is 4.48 percent lower than the \$15,098.34 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2009.

January 2010 was the same as the yearly total.

Comptroller Susan Combs announced today (Friday, January 8th) the state collected \$1.65 billion in sales tax revenue in taxinfo/allocsum/ December, down 11.6 percent compsum.html. compared to December 2008.

"Declining sales tax collections, beginning in February 2009, have now extended through December 2009," Combs said. "As has been seen the past several months, collections are down across most major sectors of the Texas economy, including oil and natural gas, construction, manufacturing and retail trade. It is expected the double-digit declines in tax collections seen over the last halfyear will first moderate with collections returning to growth during the first or second quarter of 2010."






