She is beloved, and she will be missed.

Donna was born October 3, 1935 in Waterloo, Iowa and was raised in Jesup, Iowa. She attended nursing school in Iowa at the Allen Memorial Hospital Nursing Diploma Program. She scored the highest in the state nursing exam upon graduation. She shared this important fact on her first date with USAF Lt. 
# Willingham Family **Reunion set** for Memorial **Day Weekend**
