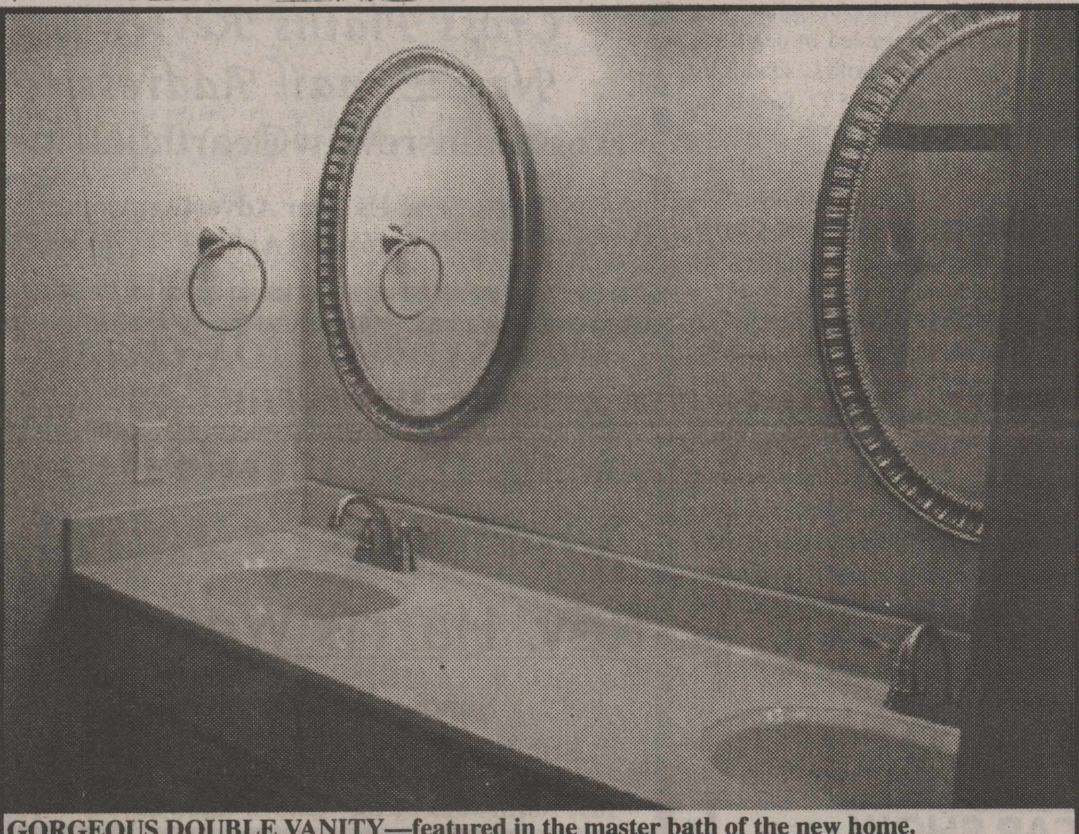

Open House Reveals Many Special Features of New Home

Available housing in Cross Plains is scarce, especially since the fire of 2005. The Cross Plains Area Housing Initiative in conjunction with Texas Heritage Bank have been working hard to help relieve the issue by buying the lots across from the school, where four homes burnt down, and planning new construction. The first home is nearly completed and was open to the public this past Saturday.

If you did not attend the Open House for the newly constructed home across from the school, then you missed a very pleasant surprise. The home is stunning from the first glimpse in the door, and it just gets better as you go along.

There are more special features than you can shake a stick at, which includes 3 bedrooms and 2 full baths, 9 foot ceilings, 1,500 sq. ft., and an open floor plan.

The kitchen looks like a dream out of a magazine, with custom maple cabinetry, stainless steel appliances, maple pantry, built-in microwave, beautiful tile counter tops and custom tile backsplash. The kitchen also features a cozy breakfast nook with a window seat and storage space under the seat.

This home has a formal dining room with a location versatile enough to convert the room into a home office or playroom if desired.

The living room is a comfortable size with big

windows and a lot of natural light. Although the floors aren't complete, the concrete inside is stained and sealed giving a warm feeling, and should be considered a plus as the buyer can choose the type of flooring they prefer.

There are two bedrooms on one end of the house, separated by the second bathroom with a custom maple vanity and linen closet in the hall that follows with the custom woodwork. Both bedrooms have great windows and natural light with plenty of closet space and ceiling fans.

There is a separate laundry room off of the kitchen with more custom maple cabinets for easy storage and a convenient tankless water heater, which will help keep the energy costs of the home low. The master suite is spectacular. This suite features a space conscious design, lots of windows, and an unbelievable master bath. Of course you see more of the beautiful maple in here in the linen closet, double vanity and framing in the whirlpool tub. The separate walk-in shower shows off a bench seat and custom tile work, and the same tile work is carried through to the tub. At the back of the bathroom is an enormous closet, sure to win someone's heart!

The huge back yard is a sight to see with a covered back porch and recessed lighting, privacy fence and enough space that the possibilities are almost endless. The front yard is just as spectacular as the back with pretty landscaping and a built in sprinkler system.

The asking price of this home is \$125,000 as completed at cost. Although this may seem a little pricy for the Cross Plains area, as most homes here average around the \$50,000 range, there were no details spared in the design and construction of this home not to mention the fact that the bank is offering a low down payment, lower interest rate, long term fixed rate financing, and the Housing Initiative is putting up the money for closing costs. David Estes, President of Texas Heritage Bank, stated that they wanted to build a home that anyone would be comfortable living in.

The unfortunate weather conditions Saturday made it difficult for people to venture out, but the open house did receive around 10 visitors give or take a few. And although there aren't any solid offers on the table at this time, bank representatives are happy to report that they are excited about the possibility of a potential buyer.

Construction on the second home the Cross Plains Housing Initiative and Texas Heritage Bank plan to build can begin once they close the sale of the first home.

All of the special features that this home boasts, along with all of the buying incentives from the bank and housing initiative, are attractive enough to draw anyone to this home. It doesn't get any better than having a home with all the amenities you'd find in the city while living in one of the best communities in the Big Country.

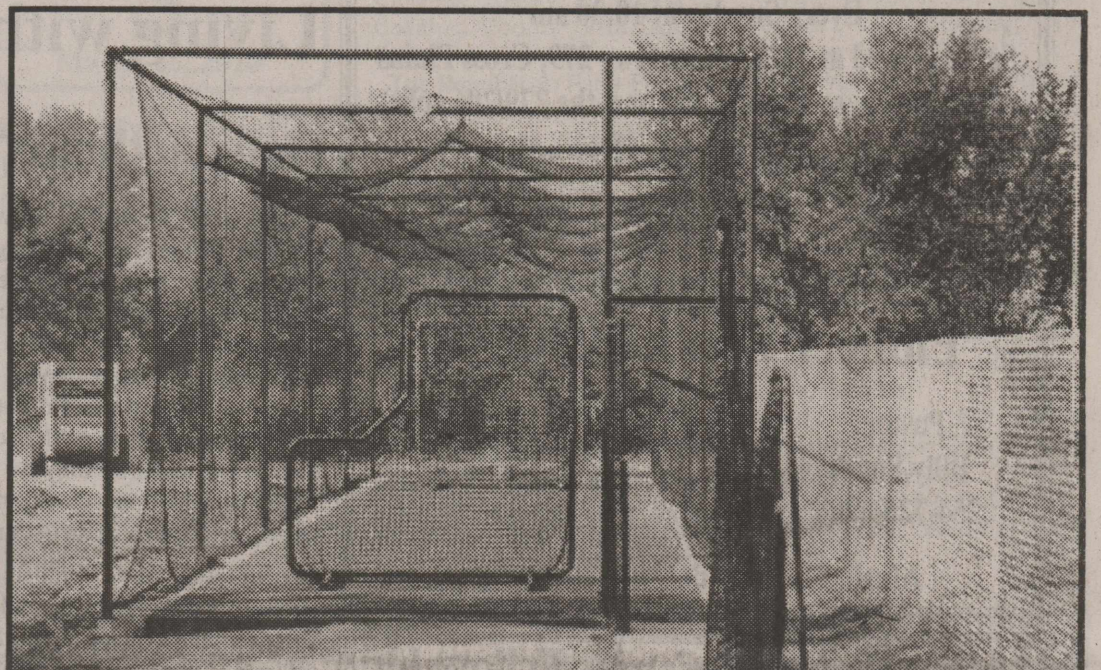
The serving line for the chili and stew starts at 5 p.m. with the

Joint Efforts Result in Major Baseball Park Improvements

Over the last eighteen months the Cross Plains EDC, City of Cross Plains, the Cross Plains School District along with tons of local businesses have raised over \$50,000 to go towards renovations of the local baseball park.

Scott Byrd, President of the Cross Plains Little League Association, stated that they have a 3-4 year total overhaul plan in the works, along with various maintenance and upkeep plans for the park.

With the help of local businesses and many local volunteers of moms, dads and kids, the Cross Plains area has managed to start their overhaul and make multiple dramatic improvements to the park and the playing fields.

These improvements include new grass, sprinkler system, back

stop for the Pony League, new dugout, lights on the field and cages, facelifts for the concession stand and bathrooms and a new batting cage, just to name a few. The difference is more than recognizable if you've been down to the park recently.

The new pitching machine has improved hitting for the little kids, as this machine throws the ball at a consistent 37 m.p.h.. And the group plans to purchase 2 more of these machines in the future. These machines cost about \$2,000 a piece, but the improvements they can bring to batting will be priceless.

The new batting cage is an impressive sight, even before its completion, and soon it will be receiving a top-of-the-line new net.

Be sure to keep an eye on the park as several more improvements will become evident as time goes by.

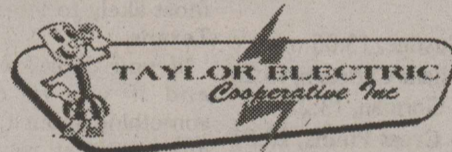
Turkey Creek Rodeo Club Meeting—New Location

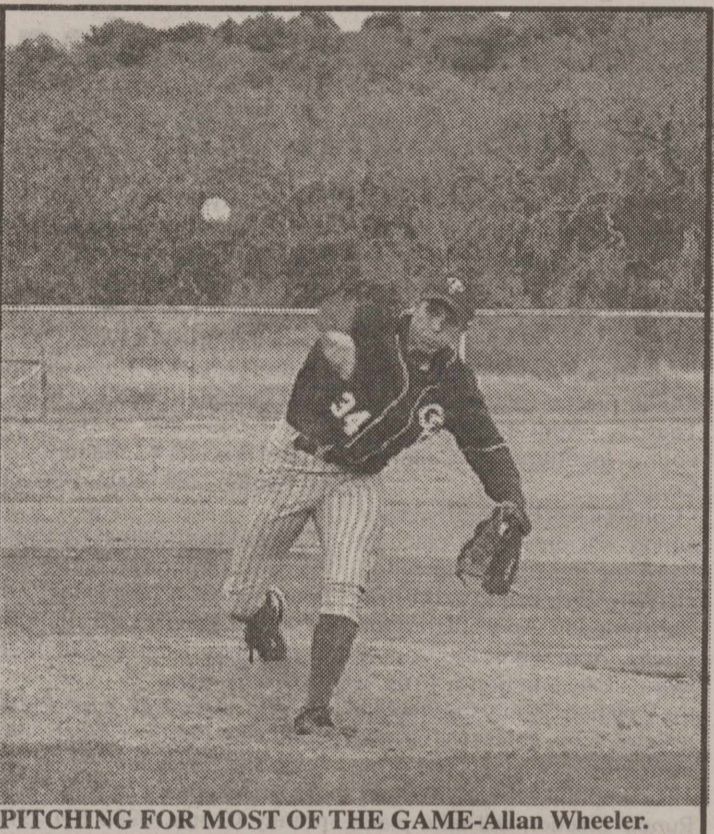



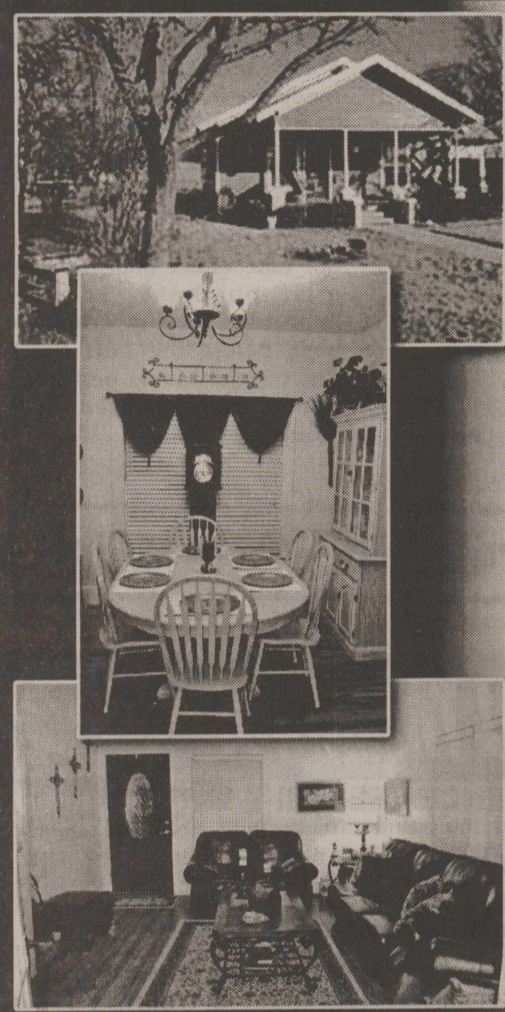

Flood Insurance makes good sense for residents of Texas

DENTON, TEXAS - Most Americans ignore the risks of flooding, assuming they aren't in a flood zone. The reality is, floods are America's number one natural disaster and can happen anytime, anywhere. In fact, 90 percent of all natural disasters in the U.S. involve flooding. That's why federal and state officials are urging residents to buy flood insurance before the next flood hits.

"Even if you weren't flooded recently, you may still be vulnerable to rising water," said Regional Administrator Tony Russell of the Federal Emergency Management Agency. "The risk of flooding is almost three times greater than the risk of fire over the period of a 30-year mortgage, yet most people are insured against fire but not floods," Russell noted. "Obviously it makes good sense to insure for both."

In 1968, Congress created the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) to help individuals insure themselves for a reasonable cost against flooding. Local governments must first agree to participate in the NFIP before its residents can purchase the insurance. Almost 40 years after its creation, NFIP oversees more than 5 million flood insurance policies in more than 20,200 communities across the U.S.

Most people who live in NFIP participating communities including business owners, homeowners and renters are eligible to purchase federally-backed flood insurance. A residential building can be insured up to \$250,000 and its contents up to \$100,000. Renters can cover belongings up to \$100,000; and non-residential property owners can insure their buildings up to \$500,000, and contents up to \$500,000. The premiums for an NFIP policy, averaging about \$500 a year, can be less expensive than the monthly payments on a federal disaster loan.

The National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) maintains its

Floodsmart Web site (www.floodsmart.gov) so people can assess their vulnerability to flooding, calculate their costs for structure and contents insurance and find nearby agents who sell NFIP policies.

All areas are susceptible to flooding, although to varying degrees. It is advisable to have flood insurance in high risk areas and even in low-to-moderate flood risk areas; last year, one-third of all claims paid by the NFIP were for policies in low-risk communities.

Flood insurance policies do not take effect until 30 days after purchase, so it is important to buy coverage now, before the next flood. There is no waiting period if a policy is purchased at a mortgage closing.

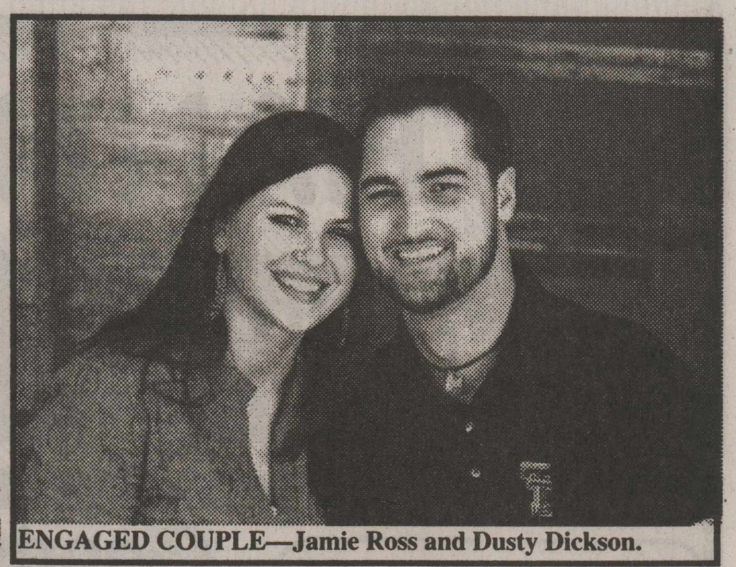
