# **Burglars** busted with a bang

On March 22, 2010, at 7:50 p.m., a call came into the Callahan County Dispatch center reporting a possible burglary of a fireworks warehouse. This was reported by the owner, who was in Oklahoma and had been informed by the individual who was looking after the property for him.

Deputies Ed Bogart and Steve Livingston were dispatched to the scene to investigate the burglary. Upon arrival it was determined someone had broken in through a backdoor and approximately \$3000 worth of property taken from the warehouse.

The reporting party advised Deputy Livingston that a person who formerly worked for him had bought a large amount of fireworks from an individual. Through the course of his investigation Deputy Livingston located several items from the burglary at a residence in Abilene leading to the arrest of three individuals. Other items taken in the burglary were also recovered.







### **USDA** Releases 2010 Benchmark State Yields and Actual 2009 **State Yields**

(WASHINGTON, April 1, 2010 - USDA today released 2009 actual and 2010 benchmark yields for Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) program for wheat, long grain rice, medium grain rice, oats and barley in a majority of states. USDA will publish data for additional states and other crops as it becomes available.

Actual and benchmark yields are used in calculating payments through ACRE, which provides producers an option to protect themselves against declines in market revenue. The latest benchmark and actual yields, along with detailed information about the ACRE program and ACRE calculations, can be found at: http://www.fsa.usda.gov/dcp. USDA also reminds producers they have until June 1, 2010, to enroll their farms in either the 2010 Direct and Counter-cyclical Program (DCP) or the ACRE program. The decision to enroll in the ACRE program is irrevocable. Once enrolled, the farm shall be enrolled for that initial crop year and will remain in ACRE through the 2012 crop year. The June 1, 2010, deadline is mandatory for all participants.

Locally, AAH groups participating in the Don't Mess with Texas Trash-Off include a variety of civic organizations, school students, church groups, business owners and families. Each year the department spends millions of dollars on litter pickup, funds that could otherwise be spent on maintaining and beautifying roads across the state.

"Without volunteers, it could cost even more to keep Texas roads clean," said Doris Howdeshell, Travel

Information Division Director for TxDOT. "That's why we have to continue changing peoples' behavior through the Don't Mess with Texas litter prevention campaign, and we are so grateful to our dedicated volunteers who help keep Texas clean and safe.

Last year about half of the district's 139 AAH groups participated in the Trash Off and this year we are hoping that more join in, Kilgore said. "It's quite possible while driving around on April 10th, that you may spot some of your family and friends doing their part to keep Texas clean."




