

Abilene Community Foundation and the Big Country Hall of Fame announce two scholarship endowments to benefit area high school students

The Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame, working through the Community Abilene Foundation, has established two scholarship endowments to be available for the first awards in Spring 2011.

The first endowment, The Nancy and Ted Paup Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame Scholarship,

was established with a gift from these long-time Abileneans. This inspired the Board of Directors for the Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame to match the Paup endowment with their own, enlarging the number of recipients to be chosen each spring.

Purpose and Eligibility: Between these two endowed scholarships, students from every county within the Big Country area will be given the opportunity to apply. These Knox, Kent, counties are: Stonewall. Haskell, Throckmorton, Scurry, Fisher, Shackelford, Jones. Stephens, Mitchell, Nolan, Taylor, Callahan, Eastland, Runnels, Coleman, Brown, and Comanche.

Eligibility includes: a graduating senior from an accredited high school in the 19-county area; having attended the eligible high school for the previous three years; participated as an athlete in varsity athletics; graduating in the top 25% of his/her class. Recipients will be selected on the basis of scholastic achievement, extracurricular involvement and demonstrated integrity and character. Financial need will be considered as a tie-breaker. Participation in college/ university athletics is not a requirement of these awards.

The amount of the awards will range from \$500 to \$1,000 depending on the return from endowment funds. Awards will be solicited through the counseling and athletic offices of the area accredited high schools. The Abilene Community Foundation's scholarship selection committee will review the applications and choose the recipients before notifying the Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame. The recipients will be recognized, along with their parents, at the annual induction dinner each year.



It was during Ted's tenure as President of the Abilene Rotary Club that the seeds of an athletic Hall of Fame were first planted. Ted wanted to initiate a program much like the Houston Rotary Club's Lombardi Trophy, so he started the Chuck Moser Coaches of the Year Award. Ted added, "After speaking with the first recipient, Coach Art Briles, we knew we had hit upon a winning tradition." After that, he helped organize the Chuck and Doris Moser Scholarship at the Community Foundation of Abilene.

It was also during this time period, that Nancy was head of Development for the Texas State Technical College campuses in West Texas. Nancy candidly admitted, "Raising student scholarship monies at a two-year technical college in West Texas was one of the most challenging jobs I've ever had. We were always searching for creative and innovative ideas to collaborate and partner with both business and cultural organizations to raise awareness and scholarship monies for TSTC. Due to the success of the Chuck Moser programs, Nancy and Ted met with Al Pickett to toss around a few ideas. At the meeting, Al suggested that he had envisioned an Athletic Hall of Fame, not only for Abilene, but covering the entire Big Country. Al mentioned that the Abilene ISD had tried this previously but discontinued it

In 2002, Nancy, with the help of Homer Taylor and Johnnie Lou Avery Boyd, TSTC administrators, organized a benefit golf tournament for TSTC West Texas, with mostly corporate sponsors, to benefit a scholarship fund and provide for the first Big Country Athletic Hall of Fame Banquet. Both were extremely successful and began to grow year after year.



It will also be administered by the Abilene Community Foundation with the same eligibility criteria and

In 1988, the Abilene ISD and the Abilene Reporter News joined forces to create an AISD athletic hall of fame. With little fanfare, the first five members were inducted that year, with five more inducted in 1989. Because it had no home or budget, the induction process was discontinued until 2002 when TSTC sought to revitalize the high school athletic hall of fame with the blessings of the AISD and ARN, and to enlarge it to include the 19-county Big Country area, renaming it the Big Country Athletic Hall of

In 2005, a Hall of Fame Board began incorporation process to become a standalone organization with the blessings and support of TSTC. The Abilene ISD offered to house the displays in the Athletic offices wing at the new AISD administration office in downtown Abilene.

On May 10, 2010, with specially designed display cabinets, the Big Country Hall of Fame had its official dedication attended by over 200 people from all over the 19-county Big Country.

CEU Night Course

Many producers with a Texas Department of Agriculture pesticide license have a hard time attending daytime educational programs that offer CEU's (Continuing Education Unit) for recertification of their license. Therefore, a special three (3) hour pesticide recertification night course has been set for Dec. 13th in the Callahan County Extension Office located on the 2nd floor of the County Courthouse in Baird. Registration begins at 5:30 p.m. and the program starts at 6:00 p.m. Texas Department of Agriculture has approved the program for one hour in laws and regulations, one hour in integrated pest management, and one hour of general. These hours will apply to commercial, noncommercial,

individuals that we enjoy the basic necessities of life - food, clothing and shelter - in abundance and at a lower percentage of our expendable income than anywhere else in the world.





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Conservation Reserve Program Sign-Up Benefits Producers, Protects Sensitive Habitat

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14, 2010 - Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack today announced that USDA will accept 4.3 million acres offered by landowners under the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) general signup. The selections preserve and enhance environmentally sensitive lands, including wetlands, while providing payments to property owners.

"Interest in this open enrollment period was high, and I'm pleased that producers and landowners across the nation continue to realize the environmental benefits of enrolling land in the CRP," said Secretary Vilsack.

For this 39th general sign-up more than 50,000 offers were received on more than 4.8 million acres, nationwide. Enrollment of the 4.3 million acres will keep the program enrollment close to the 32 million acre statutory cap, which will maintain and enhance the significant environmental benefits the program has already achieved. CRP's 39th signup will bring

the total enrollment in the program to 31.2 million acres, leaving sufficient room under the 32 million acre cap to continue enrollment in the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program, continuous signup and other CRP initiatives through FY

Under CRP, farmers and ranchers plant grasses and trees in crop fields and along streams or rivers. The plantings reduce soil and nutrients from washing into waterways, reduce soil erosion that may otherwise contribute to poor air and water quality, and provide valuable habitat for wildlife. Plant cover established on the acreage accepted into the CRP will reduce nutrient and sediment runoff in our nation's rivers and streams. The CRP has restored more than two million acres of wetlands and associated buffers and reduced soil erosion by more than 400 million tons per year. USDA selected offers for

The average rental rate per acre for this signup is about \$46. USDA implemented a number of measures including using additional EBI point incentives for producers to submit cost-effective offers, and producer outreach activities to encourage competitive offers on the most environmentally sensitive lands. These measures will maintain the environmental benefits while decreasing the historic cost of the program.

Under CRP, there are more than 31.3 million acres enrolled on more than 473,000 contracts. These 10 to 15 year contracts provide long term enduring conservation benefits in return for an annual rental payment.

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Safer roads contribute to significant drop in highway fatalities

AUSTIN—Motorists across Texas are safer on today's highways for many reasons more people wearing seat belts and public campaigns that discourage drinking and driving but there's no doubt that safer highways have also contributed to the significant decline in fatalities across Texas.

Last year, there were 388 fewer fatalities on Texas highways, an 11 percent decrease from the previous year.

In the last five years, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) has dedicated \$1.2 billion toward highway projects that have the greatest potential for reducing traffic crashes. The money comes from the Texas Safety Bond Program, which comprises 20 percent of the funds available from Proposition 14 highway bonding authority, approved by Texas voters in 2003.

So far, the Abilene District has spent \$2,438,407 on six safety projects. One project was to install warning signals and signs at the intersection of FM 1750 and S. 27th in Abilene and the other five were to install 33.97 miles of cable barrier in the divided highway medians along I-20.

Proposition 14 revenue bonds are secured and repaid by the State Highway Fund, including motor fuels taxes and vehicle registration fees. The results of this targeted investment in safe highway design are making a difference in annual crash statistics that demonstrate a decline in fatalities, both in Texas and nationwide.

Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) attributes the 2009 decline to a number of factors seat belt usage, drunk driving and distracted driving public safety campaigns, safer vehicles, motorists driving less, and safer roads.

In a recent report, the Texas Transportation Institute's (TTI) Center for Transportation Safety estimated that the money spent on safety improvements in the last few years could save as many as 1,800 lives and prevent 21,000 injuries in the next 20 years.

It comes down to safer roads and safer drivers, said Deirdre Delisi, Texas Transportation Commission Chair.

"Texas has been fortunate enough to have the money for highway safety improvements," she noted. "Part of the requirement for the Proposition 14 bonds was that we apply a portion of the funding to safety projects. Our legislative partners asked us to do this we did and the result has been phenomenal."

Delisi added that safer drivers have also contributed to the decline in crashes and fatalities.

"TxDOT and its law enforcement partners across the state conduct a variety of outreach campaigns encouraging motorists to drive safer. The agency's annual Click it or Ticket and the Drink, Drive, Go to Jail campaigns are examples of educational programs designed to change driver behavior," she said.

The Click It or Ticket campaign has shown its success with a recent new record of 93.8 percent statewide seat belt usage for 2010.

But, transportation officials know for certain that safer roads have played a significant part in reducing fatalities. Widening narrow two-lane roads, adding left turn lanes and installing concrete and cable barrier in divided highway medians are a few of the improvements that make it safer to travel Texas highways.

Efforts are paying off. On Interstate 10 in the San Antonio District, cable barrier was installed on a 17.2-mile section of highway. This area had a history of crossover collisions with seven fatalities in the three years before installation. Since the cable barrier has been in place, the district has not received any reports of fatal crossover collisions.

By the time all the safety bond projects are completed, TxDOT will have widened nearly 2,200 miles of narrow two-lane roads, added 272 left turn lanes, built 38 highway interchanges, and installed 1,030 miles of concrete and cable barrier.

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

The commissioners' court took the action Monday, September 27th during the commissioners' court regular meeting.

Callahan County Agent Jerry Warren spoke to the commissioners' court about signing the Notice of Intent.

On a motion by Commissioner Cliff Kirkham and a second by Commissioner Tom Windham, the commissioners' court voted 5-0 to sign the Notice of Intent to participate in the Texas Department of Agriculture feral hot abatement program. Some information about the state program follows:

Feral Hog Abatement Grant Program

Texas is home to nearly 2 million feral hogs, the largest feral hog population in the U.S. Their numbers are continuing to increase because of their high reproductive potential and the lack of natural predators. Feral hogs wreak havoc on property, livestock, crops and pastures across the state and frustrate landowners because of their destructive nature. Landowners have recrops, fences, roads, ponds, fields and feed loss. Texas AgriLife Extension Service estimates that statewide annual has the largest contiguous tract economic damage caused by feral hogs is \$51.7 million. And, unless aggressive control measures are undertaken, the feral cialists conduct removal serhog problem is expected to worsen in the years ahead. 



An added feature this year will be BEEF BRISKETS available for sale the day of the event. These will be prepared by professional cooks Gary McGinn and David McInroe. For details


