

Guests musicians were Dean Ables of Breckenridge and E. J. Browning from Rising Star. Their performances were enjoyed as well.



School Breakfast Feeding More Needy Texas Children State still leaving \$59M in annual federal aid on the table

AUSTIN - A new national report finds that sixty-one lowincome Texas children ate school breakfast for every 100 that received subsidized school lunch in the last school year. This slight increase over the previous year means that an average of 1.5 million lowincome children ate a free orreduced-price breakfast each school day. The report estimated that an additional \$59M in federal aid would flow to Texas schools each year if the state were able to reach seventy out of every 100 needy students.

"Texas has done a good job making this program available, but students clearly still face barriers and stigma in order to

eat breakfast before the first bell," said Celia Cole, CEO of the Texas Food Bank Network. "Universal, in-class breakfast strategies have the potential to boost participation in the existing program, significantly improving student learning and health at no cost to the state.

Texas mandates that nearly all public schools offer the federally-funded breakfast program. A new law passed by the state legislature in 2013 aims to boost participation by asking high-need schools to make breakfast available to all students without cost.

"Anything we can do to boost the academic performance of children from low-income families is going to have a significant pay-off for the state," added Cole.

The School Breakfast Scorecard, released annually by the Food Research and Action Center (FRAC), measures the reach of the School Breakfast Program nationally and by state. School district-level data is also available for Austin, Dallas, Fort Worth, Houston and San Antonio.

tific community and the general layman disagree on what to call things in the natural world around them. One local example of this in plants is the Juniper tree, commonly (and mistakenly) known locally as a cedar tree. An example of this disagreement in the animal kingdom lies in a small, colorful, and common fish known locally (and mistakenly) as a perch.

The Bluegill Sunfish (Lepomis macrochirus) is one of ten species of the genus that inhabit the state of Texas, and is arguably the most common. It is a moderately sized species of freshwater fish that occurs in just about every lake, pond, creek, and river in the great state of Texas. Outside of the state, it can be found in every state roughly east of the Rocky Mountains to the Atlantic Ocean, northward to near the Canadian border, and southward to the northern Mexican states of Coahuila and Chi-

This commonly seen member of the black bass and sunfish family can be quite attractive in coloration. In adult specimens, the background coloration is typically a shade of light green with six to seven dark bars extending vertically on the lateral sides. In large adults, these black bars may be faded or lacking altogether. As the common name implies, this species has a dark shade of blue coloration surrounding the area around the gills, although again, in many large specimens this coloration will have a tendency to fade. The most accurate diagnostic for identifying this species is the small dark spot at the posterior edge of the dorsal (top) fin, although again, as you may have guessed, in many older adults this spot too is faded or lacking. Immature specimens lack the definitive black spot on the dorsal fin, lack the blue coloration, and have between nine and twelve dark vertical bars on the

Like other members of this fish family, the Bluegill Sunfish is of

moderate length and build. Adults may reach up to sixteen inches in total length, although most average six to eight inches. Juveniles have a more streamlined outline, and begin their aquatic life as small as one-

sixteenth of one inch in length. Bluegill Sunfish are opportunistic carnivores, feeding on a variety of small invertebrate as well as vertebrate prey items. Smaller specimens obviously prefer to feed on smaller items such as microscopic organisms like water fleas while the adults will not hesitate to feed on smaller fish, insects, frogs, leeches, and crayfish. It is a swift hunter and relies on a suction style of acquiring its food. It will suck up a large amount of water rapidly into its mouth, and in doing so,

its prey will too be pulled in. The access water goes harmlessly through the gills, while the prey item will be swallowed and di-

While mature specimens may live up to ten years, few sunfish survive for that long. Many other larger vertebrates prey on Bluegill, including a myriad of aquatic birds, turtles, raccoons, snakes, and other fish, including larger animals of the same species. Some people will fish for this variety for food purposes, and due to the size, shape and method of cooking this fish, in many places of the country it is commonly known as panfish.

Nalco Champion to Build Headquarters

HOUSTON, TX (Houston Chronicle)—Energy services company Nalco Champion announced plans to build a new headquarters in Sugar Land to house 1,000 employees. The 133,000-square-foot building will be next to the company's current Sugar Land operations. Employees working at Nalco Champion sites in Houston and Fresno will relocate to the location once it is completed in 2015.

The project will also include renovations to the company's existing 45,000 square-foot Sugar Land building, where the company plans to expand research, development, and engineering lab facilities. Nalco Champion provides chemical solutions and technologies for upstream and downstream oil and gas companies.

Skinner Bakery to Expand

PARIS, TX (eParis Extra)—The Paris City Council voted unani-Development

Corporation's cash incentive offer of \$1.2 million to J. Skinner Bakery in exchange for the company's plan to invest \$25 million and create 393 jobs over the next five years. Audie Keeton, chief executive officer for the Omaha-based company,

The former Sara Lee plant in Paris that Skinner purchased a year ago will figure prominently in Skinner Bakings operations, Keeton said.

TopGolf Plans Openings in

SAN ANTONIO/HOUSTON, TX (San Antonio Business Journal)—TopGolf, based in Dallas, is expanding to San Antonio. The company plans to begin construction on a 65,000 square-foot golf entertainment facility on the city's far Northwest Side. The three-level facility will house up to 2,900 square feet of private event space and 102 climate-controlled hitting bays. TopGolf's chief development officer, Randy Starr, estimates the facility will serve approximately 400,000 visitors in its first year of operation. TopGolf plans to hire about 450 personnel for the San Antonio

Center. Roughly 100 of those hires will be full-time positions. According to the Houston Business Journal, TopGolf plans on opening a second Houston area facility. The company plans on building a similar facility off of Interstate 45 in Spring, Texas north of Houston. The company anticipates hiring 450 people for the location expected to open in April. The first TopGolf facility in west Houston, located off of Interstate 10, has welcomed more than 250,000 guests in its first six months of operation.







Common Sense Transparency for Economic Development

How much access to their government do Texans deserve?

Some Texas laws would say "not so much." This is especially true regarding how little citizens are allowed to know about how their local governments offer special incentives to lure business prospects.

This process, called economic development, is one of the leastdiscussed public policy matters around, and yet the vast majority of Texans are affected by it. That's because most Texans live in at least one jurisdiction that has engaged in economic development.

It works as follows. A business prospect will approach a locality, or a locality will approach a business, and then enter into negotiations about the business receiving incentives for moving inside the local government's boundaries. The government then decides what to offer, whether the reduction of taxes over a period of time, offering a sum of cash, giving away land, or all of the above, to mention only a few of the many possibilities. Then the governing body meets to pass whatever agreement was reached, if any.

Except for the passage of the. agreement, which must be at a public meeting, every other step in the aforementioned process is done completely in secret, in closed session.

These closed, sometimes called "executive" sessions, are meetings held behind closed doors that are only allowed for specific purposes by the Texas Open Meetings Act, which otherwise requires all government

Since 1999, economic development negotiations have been exempt from that requirement. As a result, virtually every special deal negotiated between a city, county, or school district and a private business is done outside of public scrutiny. After a deal is reached, while the agreement is passed publicly, there is rarely any time for public review of the agreement.

That is unfortunate because many economic development agreements involve private businesses receiving tax dollars directly, as in a cash incentive, or indirectly, as in public land being given away at no cost. Another common incentive is the reduction of property taxes for a particular business prospect. Regardless of what incentives are offered, agreements reached are usually outside of the annual budget, and certainly involve major decisions affecting a com-

For these reasons, local governments and their citizens should work together to make the economic development proing common sense reforms to allow more public input in these change that. important decisions.

Localities should adopt an economic development incentives policy outlining the kinds of deals they are willing to make private businesses with public resources. The policy should spell out what incentives might be offered by the governing body to a private entity. This allows the public to know what is on the table, even if they cannot see the negotiations process.

decisions to be made in public. view any agreement that is reached before it is passed. This seemingly obvious measure is absent from the economic development process today, whereupon deals struck in secret are passed immediately out of closed session. Local governments should wait two weeks and hold a hearing for public comment, just as they are required to do for their annual budget, before sealing a deal with a private company.

Finally, the details of existing agreements should be posted on the local government's website, so that the public can see what has been agreed to previously. Citizens shouldn't have to jump through the hoops of filing open records requests to see such agreements. They should be easily available.

These common sense proposals do not require local governments to change how they offer public money to private businesses. Whether that is appropriate is another discussion entirely. For now, in Texas, government handouts to businesses are the rule, and transparency in c'ess more transparent by enact- the process is the exception. These proposals would help

> Local officials and citizens interested in shifting that balance back to the people should consider making these common sense steps towards good governance.

Anderson has coached at Forney, Fort Worth Paschal, Oklahoma State, Texas Woman's University, Charleston Southern, Carroll University and is now an assistant basketball coach at Abilene

The Lady Loboes, led by Baker. won the Class 2A state track team championship in 2001. In addition to her success on the track, Baker was named all-state in basketball all four years in high school by both the Texas: Girls Coaches Association and the Texas Basketball Coaches Association. She was the TABC Class 2A Player of the Year as a senior. She then played basket-

ball and ran track at TCU. Jim Millerman was a member of Abilene High teams that won two state championships in the same calendar year. Brad Pursley of Merkel and Abilene Christian University was a state champion and NAIA and NCAA national champion in the pole vault. He competed internationally and qualified for the U.S. Olympic trials three times. Pursley was ranked as high as No. 3 in the world and was ranked among the top five U.S. pole vaulters from 1981 to 1987. He is a member of the NAIA and ACU Halls of Fame.
