> A reception of purely Texas finger foods will introduce the visitors to an even wider aspect of Texas than they will experience elsewhere during their visit.



JOHN DEE BURLESON

John Burleson passed away peacefully at his daughter's home on May 27, 2014.

He was born in Gorman, Texas on February 16, 1934 to Dee Burleson and Doris Miears Burleson.He attended many different schools, graduating from Eastland High School in Eastland, Texas in 1951. He attended and graduated from Texas Tech University with a Mechanical Engineering degree in 1956, winning the intramural football championship with the BSU Bums and earning the nickname 'Crazy Legs Burleson'. He enlisted in the Air Force and served on active duty for 3 years and 12 years in the Reserves, receiving his honorable discharge at the rank of Captain.

After the Air Force he worked for Halliburton Company as a Professional Engineer in Jacksboro, Texas, Las Vegas, Nevada and El Tigre, Venezuela. While in Venezuela, he enjoyed fishing and hunting on the rivers and in the jungles of South America. He then returned to his beloved Texas in 1969 and worked as an engineer for West Texas Utilities in Abilene Texas. After retiring from WTU, he started his own company, Burleson Engineering and was a licensed Land Surveyor.

While station with the Air Force at Chanute Air Force Base in Rantoul, Illinois, he met Donna Jean Tillotson during a Sunday school class. They were engaged 3 months later and 4 months later, married on April 27, 1957 in Waterloo, IA. They were married for nearly 53 years. until her death in 2010.

John was a deacon at the First Baptist Church in Cross Plains. He also served as the Sunday School Director for a period of time. He taught the young boys Sunday school class and was the Royal Ambassadors leader.

He was the Little League president and a Boy Scout leader during his time in Cross Plains, and in his later years, enjoyed traveling to New Mexico and Arizona to watch his grandchildren perform in sports and dance.

He and his wife moved to Lake Brownwood and enjoyed building a log home in 2004. After the death of his wife in 2010, he remained there until 2013. At that time, he moved in with his daughter in Abilene.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Dee and Doris Burleson, his brother, Don Burleson and his beloved wife, Donna Burleson.

He is survived by his children, Ruth and husband Ronnie Hutchins of Abilene, TX, Bill and wife, Tess Burleson of Phoenix, AZ, Matt and wife, Susan Burleson of Mabank, TX and his sister-in-law, Colene and husband, Alan Sachanowski. He has 6 grandchildren, Clint Hutchins, Katharine Morris of Abilene, Kyle Hutchins of Fort Carson, CO, Jessi Ruiz of Phoenix, AZ, Amanda Burleson of Albuquerque, NM and Cole Burleson of Phoenix, AZ. He has 3 great-grandchildren, Coleson Hutchins and Kaiden Hutchins (yet to be born)of

Abilene, TX and Aubree Nivison of Phoenix, AZ.




Burkett Activities 2nd Weekend in June







DPS Joins National Effort to Inspect Commercial Vehicles

AUSTIN - Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) troopers, inspectors and investigators will participate in intensified commercial vehicle inspections from June 3rd -June 5th as part of Roadcheck 2014, a nationwide three-day enforcement effort to increase motor carrier, vehicle, driver and cargo safety and security. DPS troopers will be on the lookout for 18-wheelers and buses with serious equipment violations and drivers not in compliance with state and federal requirements.

"DPS is committed to making sure Texas roadways are safe for all travelers, and Roadcheck 2014 is another opportunity for us to continue our commitment promoting safe driving practices and compliance regarding commercial vehicles and their drivers," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "In order to reduce crashes and protect public safety, we call on all drivers - commercial and passenger - to obey traffic laws

and avoid aggressive driving behaviors in the interest of saving lives and reducing serious injury."

In addition to Roadcheck, DPS periodically carries out additional enforcement efforts in targeted areas where unsafe trucks or buses may be operating.

During Roadcheck 2014, specially trained troopers and civilian personnel will inspect commercial vehicles for equipment violations involving brakes, tires, lights and loading standards. Troopers will check driver licenses and log books, which document how long the driver has been on the road. In conjunction with these efforts. DPS will also be watching for aggressive passenger vehicle drivers, the cause of most commercial vehicle crashes.

In 2013, DPS and other Texas law enforcement agencies participating in Roadcheck inspected 9,228 commercial vehicles, compared to approximately 8,100 in 2012. The inspections found that

approximately 21 percent of the vehicles had serious violations that required the truck or bus be placed out of service until repairs could be made. Inspectors also placed 248 drivers out of service for various violations, including not properly tracking hours of driving and failing to have the proper type of license for the

vehicle being driven. Sponsored by Commercial Vehicle Safety Association (CVSA), the Roadcheck program, which stretches from Mexico to Canada, is designed to reduce commercial vehicle highway fatalities through increased vehicle safety. According to the CVSA, the program has been responsible for more than a million roadside inspections and saved hundreds of lives to



Horse Lubber

When one is in the field observing the natural world around them, occasionally something will look like it just doesn't belong. Such is the case with a strikingly colored grasshopper that calls the dry portions of the Trans-Pecos its home.


The Horse Lubber (Taeniopoda eques) is one of the largest and most distinctively colored grasshoppers that can be seen in this area. It naturally takes up residence from southern California eastward to central Texas, and can be quite common in the Trans-Pecos eco-region during the normal monsoonal rains. It appears slightly less commonly throughout the remainder of its Texas range.

Horse Lubbers are grasshoppers, and grasshoppers are insects, and like others of this group, they have three body parts: the head, the thorax, and the abdomen. Each one of these body parts has a specific purpose, with the head being the area where the eyes and feeding appendages are, the thorax is where the legs and wings are attached, and the abdomen is where the majority of the internal organs are housed. Also like others in the insect group, the skeletal structure is on the outside of their body. This structure is known as the exoskeleton. They have six legs, as well as two pairs of wings and two antennae.

This particular species of grasshopper is quite attractive with their shiny black bodies adorned with bright yellow bands and flecks. There are three characteristics that can be utilized to separate this species from other grasshoppers that occur in this area. The first characteristic is the black head that has a yellow line that runs diagonally from the crown to the mouth parts, also known as the mandibles. The second is the yellow "v" that runs from the front legs to the center of the thorax. The last identifying characteristic is the bright red coloration that is on the underside of the black and yellow flecked wings.

While allowing the animal to stand out against the habitat that it normally prefers, this brilliant color pattern actually aids in its protection because in the animal world, these colors generally signify a bitter taste, and studies have shown this is the case with this species.

Males and females are sexually dimorphic, which means they have different morphological characteristics. Males are the smaller sex, only attaining a body length of just under two inches, while the females are somewhat larger, reaching lengths of up to two and one-half inches. Males can be distinguished from the females as well by the length of the aforementioned wings. Males have wings that extend in length to the end of their abdomen, while the wings of females barely extend past the thorax region. Therefore, females are grounded while males have the ability to fly, and it is while in this action the red-colored underwings are

Living in the desert heat for diurnal (day-active) animals can present challenges. The first challenge is locating food. However, this species of grasshopper has overcome this challenge because it has adapted to feed on a variety of plant-life, including many species of plants that have been determined to be toxic. Another challenge that

most desert animals have to deal with is avoiding predation by larger animals. As mentioned earlier, this grasshopper is adorned with the brilliant colors that state "I taste bad!", so most predators that happen to test whether this is true or not rarely does so again.

The last challenge that desert animals face is the heat. Many animals, including many insects, are nocturnal, meaning they will limit their activity to the cooler evening hours. The Horse Lubber is active during the day, and it has adapted a variety of behaviors to overcome this challenge. One of the strangest activities is the usage of its wings. As the daytime temperatures rise, this species will open its wings to allow air flow pass over its body. When this is no longer effective, it will utilize its wings as a fan by beating them quickly for short bursts over its body.

Texas summer meals program increased by 8%

distributed today by the Texas Food Bank Network (TFBN) finds that Texas expanded the number of needy children fed at state-sponsored summer meal sites by eight percent in

The report, authored by the Washington, D.C.-based Food Research and Action Center (FRAC) tracked the addition of 297 summer meals sites across Texas that year, increasing the daily number of children served to 280,018.

Much of the increase was attributed to school districts serving more children during summer school.

"We applaud schools and nonprofit sponsors for serving more hungry kids," said Celia Cole, CEO of TFBN. "But we still only reach a small portion of those who need food during the summer months. We know that these sites can and want to do more."

Summer meals sites in Texas currently reach just 11.9 children for every 100 who qualify for subsidized lunch during the school year. If Texas were able to increase participation to forty children for every 100 receiving school lunch, the state could draw

The increase in summer meals served at schools is a direct result of state legislation passed in 2011 requiring schools to serve meals, no less than thirty days during the summer.

"The thirty days requirement has been successful in increasing participation, but we continue to hear from sponsors that they struggle to reach more kids," said Cole. "We need to enact policies that help improve outreach to families, increase

transportation to sites and remove barriers that prevent kids from accessing meals near them."

Congress is expected to reexamine the law governing summer meals in 2015. This year, the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) has chosen Texas as one of five states receiving targeted assistance to increase program participation.

"The new plate depicts a camping scene of a tent under a starry sky with a campfire in the foreground, evoking memories of fun times in parks with family and friends," said Brent Leisure, TPWD State Parks Division director.

"Conservation license plates represent a great way for outdoor enthusiasts to support their state park system," said Leisure. "The proceeds generated through the sales of both the camping and bluebonnet plate help to provide funds necessary for the stewardship, maintenance and visitor services that all Texans have come to expect in their state parks."

In a competition to select a plate topic, the camping design received more than 6,000 votes through an online survey of Facebook followers and state park newsletter subscribers in 2013. Statistics show that camping is a very popular activity that park visitors enjoy.

Last year, Texas State Parks recorded more than 2.3 million overnight visits. Some of the most popular parks for camping include Garner State Park, Inks. Lake State Park, Cedar Hill State Park, Huntsville State Park and Brazos Bend State Park.

TPWD first launched its conservation license plates initiative in 2000. The new camping plate design will join the four other available plates: the horned liz-

The new plate will sell for \$30, with \$22 directly benefitting Texas State Parks. This annual fee is in addition to the regular registration cost.


Since its debut 14 years ago, the Conservation License Plate Program has generated more than \$6.7 million to support state parks, outdoor recreation and conservation projects in Texas. Some of the projects funded by the license plate proceeds include community outreach programs, wildlife surveys, fishing programs, and habitat restoration.
