




# Local Teacher Recognized for Commitment to Agricultural Science



screen-printing.



# **The School Lunch Cross Plains ISD Program For Meal Charge Cross Plains ISD** Policy 2014-2015

The Cross Plains Independent School District participates in the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Program. Children in the households receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits (formerly the Food Stamp Program) or TANF can get free meals regardless of your income. Your Benefit letter from the Texas Healtha and Human Services Commission (HHSC) is your documentation for free meals. If you have not already received a letter from your school stating that your household is eligeble for free meals, you may take your HSSC benefit letter to the reviewing official to be certified for free meals. If a child in your household is directly certified due to receiving SNAP or TANF benefits, all children in your household are eligible for free meals. If you have questions, call the school at 254-725-6121 to speak to Tammie Tennison, the reviewing official.

Your children can get free or reduced price meals if your houshold income is within the limits on the Federal Income Chart. For an application and Income Chart, please call or come by the school offices and one will be provided to you. Application forms will also be included in the registration paket of each enrolling student. Only one application per household should be completed; all children in the household can be included on the form.

If you would like an application, have other questions or need help, please call 254-725-7430

### Students may charge up to five your child's balance, please call (5) days per student. After the fifth charge, until the balance is paid, since we will not allow a srudent to go hungry, a peanut butter and jelly lunch will be offered to your child.

There will be no charges allowed the last three weeks of school.

# **Cross Plains' retail sales in** 2014 are 4% ahead of 2013

The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments in 2014 are just over four percent higher than 2013, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office.

Texas State Comptroller Susan Combs reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday, August 6th.

Cross Plains' 2014 sales tax payments for the year totalled \$153,805.82, which is 4.30 percent higher than the \$147,460.14 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2013.

The payment to the city for August 2014 was \$22,159.58, which is 5.02 percent higher than the \$21,099.43 payment made in August 2013.

"The growth in sales tax revenues reflected strength in both business and consumer spending," Combs said. "The increase was led by remittances from the construction, services, and oil and natural gas-related sectors, as well as from retail trade and restaurants. Fiscal year-to-date, state sales tax collections are now up 5.3 percent."

Combs will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their June local sales tax allocations totaling \$706.9 million, up 5.3 percent compared to August 2013.

Combs sent Texas cities \$462.8 million in August 2014, which is higher by 4.4 percent compared to August 2013 and higher by 6.4 percent year-todate.

She reported \$44.6 million in August 2014 allocations to Texas counties, which is higher by 4.3 percent compared to August 2013 and higher by 3.7 percent year-to-date.

The Texas transit systems received \$157.6 million in August 2014 sales tax allocations, which is 4.7 percent higher than August 2013 and up 6.6 percent vear-to-date.

Special Purpose Taxing Districts received \$41.9 million in August 2014 allocations, which is 21.6 percent higher than August 2013 and higher by 19.2 percent year-to-date.

Total sales tax allocations were \$706.9 million in August 2014, which is 5.3 percent higher than August 2013 and up 6.9 percent year-to-date.

The sales tax figures represent monthly sales made in June as well as April, May and June sales by businesses that report tax quarterly.



# **Time to Submit Comments** on EPA Water Rule


In 1972, Congress established the Clean Water Act (CWA) to create a basic structure for regulating water quality standards and discharges of pollutants into "waters of the United States." Under this act, "waters of the U.S." are classified as bodies of water that are "navigable." In other words, the EPA has jurisdiction over a body of water you can sail a steamboat or large ship through.

While Congress gave the EPA authority over "navigable" waterways, the EPA is again trying to abuse and expand its authority. The agency announced a new rule proposal in March that would redefine "waters of the U.S." to expand the water and land that falls under its jurisdiction

This proposal amounts to the largest land grab in history. Essentially, it would give the agency control over all bodies of water. This includes ponds, streams, creeks, ditches, puddles, manmade conveyances, wet areas on pastures, etc. Basically, the federal government would control every drop of water in the country.

The EPA doesn't want to pass this rule through regular order in Congress. They have tried this twice and failed. Instead, the agency plans to bypass Congress and force us to comply through a rulemaking process. If adopted, the new rule would not be good for the Texas cattle industry. For the first time, certain ditches would be defined as jurisdictional tributaries under Clean Water Act programs. Additionally, conservation activities not complying with the **USDA Natural Resources Con**servation Service (NRCS) prac- as the First Vice President of tice standards would be required the Texas and Southwestern to have a 404 dredge-and-fill permit.

This means you would be subject to additional permitting re-

quirements for applying pesticides, grazing cattle, conducting construction projects and performing other routine maintenance on your land. These permits can cost around \$30,000 and take up to a year to receive. Failure to obtain them would likely result in a penalty.

When the EPA drafted this flawed rule, they didn't consult with agricultural industry groups or you as producers. Instead, the agency was too concerned with finding ways to expand its jurisdiction, while in-turn creating more burdensome regulations for the men and women who work daily to provide the food and fiber of our country. This proposal presents signifi-

cant challenges for us, but there is a way we can help stop it. I encourage you, your family, friends and neighbors to comment on the rule in the federal register before the deadline ends Monday, October 20, 2014. Your participation is important as we must let the EPA know how detrimental this rule would be to our industry and livelihood. You can submit your comments by visiting our web site at TSCRA.org, and clicking on the "EPA Land Grab" button. We need to get at least 10,000 comments by this deadline, and anyone is welcome to comment. Also, let your Congressmen and Senators know they should oppose this rule.

It is crucial that we send a clear message to the EPA that we will not allow this proposal to be implemented, and its desire to expand onerous government regulations will not be tolerated. It's time to get rid of this rule. The future of our industry depends on it.

Burn Ban The Burn Ban order follows:

### CALLAHAN COUNTY. **TEXAS ORDER PROHIBITING OUTDOOR** BURNING

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 240.906 of the Local Government Code, the Callahan County Commissioners Court had found that dry conditions in the unincorporated areas of Callahan County create a public safety hazard that would be exacerbated by outdoor burning; and, whereas, such a finding authorizes the issuance of an order which prohibits or restricts outdoor burning.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDERED that the following regulations are hereby established for all unincorporated areas of Callahan County, Texas. (1) Action prohibited:

A. A person violates this order if he or she knowingly, intentionally or recklessly burns any combustible material outside of an enclosure which serves to contain all flames and/or sparks, or orders such burning by others

B. A person violates this order if he or she knowingly, intentionally or recklessly engages in any activity outdoors which could allow flames or sparks that could result in a fire, or orders such activities by others. (2) Enforcement:

A. A violation of this order is a Class C Misdemeanor. B. This order may be enforced by any duly commissioned peace officer in Callahan County

(3) This order is effective and enforceable for 90 days after the date of adoption which is indicated below.

(4) This order does not apply to outdoor burning activities related to public health and safety that are authorized by the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission for firefighter training; public utility, natural gas pipeline, or mining operations, or, harvesting of agriculture crops.

kinds in west Texas. While some of these varieties have minute differences from each other and others have obviously different characteristics, they all have several things in common that can be used to describe them.

Cicadas are insects, and like others of this group, they have three body parts: the head, the thorax, and the abdomen. Each one of these body parts has a specific purpose, with the head being the area where the eyes and feeding appendages are, the thorax is where the leas and wings are attached, and the abdomen is where the majority of the internal organs are housed. Also like others in the insect group, the skeletal structure is on the outside of their body. This structure is known as the exoskeleton. They have six legs, as well as two pairs of wings that are utilized for flight. The body size ranges from just over onehalf inch in one endemic species to over two inches in another. The clear wings are about twenty percent longer than the body. The eye placement is on each side of the head and they are known to have particularly good vision.

Cicadas are well known for their noise-making capabilities, and this noise production is either utilized for defense, or more commonly, for love. Males are the songsters, often carrying on incessantly while perched on the side of a tree, usually during the hottest part of the day. The females of this family are silent, being incapable of making any such music that the males make. These rhythmic songs are one way to differentiate one species from the next and are performed by males to attract females. A secondary use for this noise is self-defense. When a cicada is captured by a bird, it will emit a high-pitched shrill, and occasionally this will startle the predator enough into opening its beak and allowing the insect to fly away to safety.

Cicadas have a very unique life cycle. After mating, the female cicada will lay her eggs along tree branches; then after fulfilling her reproductive duties, she dies. Upon hatching, the young, known as nymphs, drop from the tree limbs to the ground below, where they bury themselves. They develop underground, drinking liquids from roots. The time frame of this development varies by species, but regardless of what kind it is, time is the issue. Some species develop quickly, only taking three years to reach the point of maturity. Other kinds can take longer, up to seventeen years in one species! After this time of development, the nymphs will dig to the surface, usually at night, leaving hollow black holes in the ground from whence they came. They will then find a tree or other structure to dig their enlarged front claws into, split

the back of their temporary exoskeleton open, and emerge as a winged adult. The wings are wet upon this "hatching" and it can take several hours for them to dry enough for flight use.


So, the next time you see a strange, empty exoskeleton left on a tree or a house, allow your mind to imagine the time frame of this development of the life of this boisterous insect. The bug that left it might be longer-lived than some of the momentous occasions that we celebrate in our lives.

# **Hunting and fishing license** on sale August 15, 2014

AUSTIN - New licenses for the 2014-15 hunting and fishing seasons go on sale Friday, August 15th. The current year (2012-2013) Texas hunting and fishing licenses (except year-to-date fishing licenses) will expire Aug. 31st.

Every year, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department issues about 2.5 million hunting and fishing licenses through the agency's 28 field offices, more than 50 state parks and at over . 1,700 retailers across the state. Licenses may also be

purchased online through the TPWD website at www.tpwd.state.tx.us/buy or by phone at 1-800-895-4248. Call center hours are Monday through Friday, 8 p.m. to 5 p.m. and there is a required \$5 convenience fee for each phone or online transaction. The online transaction system is available 24/7. For online and phone orders, a physical license will be mailed within three business days. During that time period, a transaction receipt will be provided via email that will be sufficient proof of hunting license that can be used for dove hunting, though it will not be allowed for the take of fish or wildlife that require a tag.

Hunting and fishing regulations for the new season can be found in the 2014-2015 Outdoor Annual, available at license retailers August 15th and online at www.txoutdoorannual.com. Starting this fall, hunters and anglers can take the Outdoor Annual with them in the field or on the water via a new app available by the end of August for free download on iPhone and Android platforms.

### **Education Certification**

In addition to a hunting license, anyone born after Sept. 1, 1971, must successfully complete a hunter education training course or purchase a one-time deferral good for one license year in order to hunt legally in Texas. The certification is valid for life and is honored in all other states and provinces.

Duck hunters also need to purchase a Federal Duck Stamp.

There are other mandatory endorsements to consider at the time of license purchase. An Upland Game Bird Stamp (\$7) is required to hunt all nonmigratory game birds, including turkey, quail, pheasant and chachalaca.

# State-run institutions for Texans with intellectual and developmental disabilities in need of reform and consolidation

August 5th), the Center for Health Care Policy at the Texas Public Policy Foundation released a policy paper on State Supported Living Centers (SSLCs), which provide residential care to Texans with intellectual and developmental disabilities. Texas operates 13 SSLCs across the state, and has not closed one in 18 years despite a steadily declining SSLC population, sharply rising costs, and persistent problems maintaining adequate quality of care at these institutions.

"The fact is, Texas maintains more state-run institutions for people with intellectual and developmental disabilities and houses more people in each institution than any other state. Texas is an outlier and not in a good way," said John Davidson, senior health care policy analyst at the Foundation. "It's long past
