





Callahan County student enrollment varied for 2014 with Eula ISD and Cross Plains ISD reporting a big jump in enrollment over 2013, while Clyde CISD was down big and Baird ISD little changed from last year. The first day of school for the

four county school district's was Monday, August 25th.

According to Clyde CISD Superintendent Keith Scharnhorst, the school district reported 1,355 students in 2014, down 49 students from 2013.

Scharnhorst said Clyde High School, with grades 9-12 reported 388 students for the start of school this year, which is down nine students from the 397 students at the start of school in 2013.

Scharnhorst reported Clyde is also down about 75 kids from the conclusion of school in 2013. He said at Clyde Junior High School, with grades sixth through eight grade, there were 328 students to report for the first day in 2014. He said in 2013, Clyde Jr. High had 355 students, which is a drop of 27 students.

Clyde Intermediate School, with grade third through fifth grade, has 313 students, which is down nine students from the 322 students reported in 2013.

Clyde Elementary School, with grades Pre-K through second grade, reported 313 students in 2014, which also included 13 students in the Head Start program. That number is also down 17 students from the 2013 enrollment of 330 students.

Eula ISD reported enrollment of 395 students in 2014, an increase of 46 students compared to 349 students in 2013. **Eula Superintendent Tim Kelley** said enrollment is also much higher than the end of school in 2013 when Eula had 372 students enrolled.

Kelley said Eula High School reported 112 students in grades 9-12, which is up 25 students from 2013 when just 87 students were enrolled. He said EHS had a small senior class last year, which can account for some of the increase.

### Raccoon

Many times, animals are given human emotions such as anger, mischief, or even love by people who desire to have something in common with the natural world around them. The proper term for this is anthropomorphism. This column is not the avenue to debate whether this is a true assessment for animals or not. However, the almost personable

Raccoon is one such animal that even the most diehard antianthropomorphismist has to concede displays some attributes that can be construed as mischievous behavior.

Raccoons (Procyon lotor) are one of the many species of animals that can be observed throughout Texas, although they occur more commonly in the eastern two-thirds of this great state. They inhabit a wide variety of habitats, ranging from marshes and bottomland swamps in the east, corn and maize farmlands in the Panhandle, thornscrub in south Texas, and the high elevation areas of the Chihuahuan Desert mountains in the Trans-Pecos. The most common denominator in these natural habitats is water availability, and their distribution is heavily influenced by its presence.

Raccoons are a medium-sized mammal that can be easily identified by two very distinctive morphological characteristics. The first is the black facial mask that is made prominent by the white outlining surrounding it. The second is the black and times of scarcity they will debrown banded bushy tail that is just less than one foot in length. The body, which is just over two feet in length, and the head are both covered with coarse grayish fur that is sprinkled with orange along the spine and black throughout the rest of the upper fur. They have five toes on each foot and the tracks that are made are easy to identify as the entire back foot touches the ground when they walk. Raccoons are rotund animals, with adult animals weighing as much as twenty eight pounds.

Raccoons are highly nocturnal, and their nightly forays will generally begin when the sun sets and will not end until the sun reappears the following morning. Their activity during the daylight hours is limited to resting in their dens that are usually located in secretive areas such as rock ledges or in tree trunks. They are primarily solitary, although occasionally females will gather in groups of two or three individuals. Mating season is annual and can begin as early as February, although



studies have shown that most females mate in March and give birth to as many as 4 young in late April or early May. The young are born with a ring less tail and with their eyes closed and they will often stay with the mother for as long as a year after their birth. Most Raccoons live less than five years in the wild. Their primary predator is man, and raccoons are the most important furbearer in the state economically.

These mammals are omnivorous, meaning they will eat both plant and animal matter. During times of abundant food sources, they will be selective, while in vour just about anything. Fruits and acorns make up well over fifty percent of the diet, while insects, small mammals, and birds constitute the remainder. They do not hibernate, but rather will acilize whatever fat they have stored in their bodies while they remain in their den for several days during the coldest portions of the year.


Luter stated the hand-drawn logo will now be professionally completed before being used by the County Historical Commission.

AUSTIN —With more than 50 local bond elections coming in May, Texas Comptroller Susan Combs today announced updated "Debt at a Glance" Web for every city, school district, and community college district in the state.

Debt at a Glance is a userfriendly online web resource that outlines debt totals and trends as well as details on tax rates. bond elections, authorized but unissued debt, certificates of obligation and links to the comprehensive annual financial report (CAFR). The list now includes pages for 1,215 cities, 1,026 school districts, 50 comas the 100 largest counties in Texas.

According to the website, Baird was home to 1,492 Texans in 2012, down 1.7 percent in population since 2003.



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
## **Campfire Tales and Star Gazing at** Fort Griffin this Saturday

### **DPS reminds drivers to WATCH for** Children as new school year starts

year begins, the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is reminding all drivers to watch out for children walking to and from school or waiting for school buses. Drivers must also follow all traffic laws related to school buses and school zones.

"With children heading back to school, drivers can help keep Texas students safe by obeying all speed limits - especially in posted school zones - and stopping for school buses," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "Individuals who illegally pass stopped school buses endanger our children, and DPS officers will not tolerate drivers who

AUSTIN - As the academic approaching drivers stop when a bus is stopped and operating a visual signal - either red flashing lights or a stop sign. Drivers should not proceed until the school bus resumes motion; the driver is signaled by the bus driver to proceed; or the visual signal is no longer activated. A driver does not have to stop for a school bus if it is on a highway with roadways separated by an intervening space or physical barrier. (If a highway is divided only by a left-turning lane, the roadways are not considered separated, and drivers must stop

> for school buses.) Drivers who illegally pass school buses face fines up to \$1,250 for a first offense. For individuals convicted of this offense more than once, the law allows DPS to suspend the driver license for up to six months. (A ticket for illegally passing a school bus cannot be dismissed through defensive

# **Callahan County's jobless rate** remains steady at 4.1% in July

The unemployment rate in Callahan County remained steady at 4.1% in July 2014, according to jobless figures released Friday, August 15th by the Texas Workforce Commission. The unemployment rate in Callahan County one year ago in July 2013 was 4.7 percent.

Callahan County's unemployment rate was 4.1% in June, 2014.

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County included: 3.6% in May 2014, 3.4% in April, 4.0% in March, 4.3% in February, 4.2% in January 2014, 4.1% in December 2013, 4.3% in November, 4.5% in October, 4.9% in September, and 4.7% in August, according to the unemployment figures.


Big Country area counties, bordering Callahan County, and the counties' unemployment rates for July 2014 include: Brown, 6.2%; Coleman, 5.6%; Eastland, 5.1%; Jones, 5.5%; Runnels, 5.5%; Shackelford, 2.4%; Stephens, 4.6%; and Taylor County, 4.5%.

The Abilene MSA (Metropolitan Statistical Area) unemployment rate, which includes Taylor, Callahan and Jones Counties, stood at 4.5% in July, 2014, according to the Texas Workforce Commission. The Abilene MSA Combined Labor Force is 84,200. There were 80,400 employed during July 2014, while 3,800 were unemployed, giving the Abilene MSA an unemployment rate of 4.5%.

The Abilene MSA reported the workforce was 84,100 in June, 2014. Total employment of 80,400 was reported in June 2014, while 3,700, or 4.4% were unemployed in June 2014.

The Abilene MSA unemployment rate for July, 2014 was 5.5%. The total workforce was reported at 84,200, with 79,500 employed and 4,700 or 5.5% unemployed in July, 2013.

The state's unemployment rate for the month of July, 2014 was 5.6 percent. The total Texas labor force was 13,079,600 in July 2014. The total number of Texans employed is 12.349.700. The total number of unemployed Texans was 729,900 in July

Highlights of the Texas Labor Force (Not Seasonally Adjusted)

The Texas unemployment rate rose one-tenth of a percentage point to 5.6 percent. This unemployment rate increase was due in part to typical seasonal fluctuations experienced during the summer months. This was the fourth rate increase since January and the lowest July rate since 2008. The unemployment rate decreased 1.1 percentage points over the year. The unemployment rate for the United States increased two-tenths of a 'percentage point to 6.5 percent. This was the 92nd consecutive month in which the Texas unemployment rate has been at or below the national unemployment rate.

The Civilian Labor Force (CLF) grew by 47,700 individuals to a total of 13,079,600 Texans. This growth far exceeded the average June-to-July increase of 14,000 persons over the previous five years. The CLF expanded by 174,600 individuals over the year, a growth rate of 1.4 percent.

• In July, the number of jobholders increased by 28,500 individuals, bringing the number of employed Texans to 12,349,700 people. This was the largest June-to-July employment gain since 2009. The past three months have shown an average gain of 10,800 people per month. The number of jobholders has increased by 310,500 individuals over the year. The number of Texans seeking work grew by 19,200 people over the month. This was the lowest June-to-July increase since 2010. This unemployment rise was typical for the summer months as local schools and universities took a break. Over the year, the number of unemployed Texans fell by 135,900 persons

Port Arthur MSA had the largest over-the-month rate gain at 0.5 percentage points. The Midland MSA continued to have the lowest unemployment rate at 2.9 percent.

• The number of Texans seeking continued unemployment insurance benefits increased by 1,800 people over the month to 128,400 individuals. Since January, the number of benefit claimants has fallen by 5,800 people. Fifteen MSAs decreased in unemployment claim activity over the month. The Tyler MSA posted a 10.8 percent drop in unemployment claims over the month.

#### Kohl's Opens Operations Center

DALLAS, TX (Dallas Business Journal)-Kohl's Department Stores has opened its new customer service operations center in Dallas. The two- building, three-story facility in far north Dallas will be used to support the Kohl's Charge payment program and Kohls.com. It is expected to create more than 1,500 full-time and part-time jobs within the next four years. The Wisconsin-based company expects to begin hiring about 500 employees in the next few months

The space that was leased by Kohl's last year was formerly occupied by Plano-based Alliance Data. Kohl's also operates a 951,000 square-foot distribution center in Corsicana and an e-commerce fulfillment center in DeSoto. Kohl's has 85 stores in Texas, 27 of which are in Dallas-Fort Worth.

Schwab to Bring Tech Jobs AUSTIN, TX (Austin American-Statesman-Laylan Copelin and Brian Gaar)-Financial services firm Charles Schwab wants to add 823 high-paying jobs to its North Austin regional office, according to the governor's office. Governor Rick Perry said the state would grant \$4.5 million to the company, pending approval of local incentives by the Travis County Commissioners Court.

Travis County Judge Sam Biscoe said that the planned site is at IBM's Tivoli Software campus, which is across Burnet Road from the Domain shopping, office, and residential center in North Austin. Currently, Schwab has about 1,000 employees in Austin working in technology, retirement plan services, trading, marketing, human resources, and other areas, Sarah Bulgatz, director of public relations for Charles Schwab, said. The first phase of office construction should be completed by the end of 2016. A second phase of construction is due completion by the end of 2023.

El Paso to Gain Jobs

EL PASO, TX (El Paso Times)-The Charles Schwab Corporation is going to create about 445 data entry and processing jobs with an average income of \$35,000 a year in El Paso at a new operations center, officials announced. The operations center, which will be in West El Paso by early 2015, was announced by Mayor Oscar Leeser. Leeser said during a news conference at City Hall, "This is so exciting for our community. It's exciting because of the interest that these companies are showing in our community. These are jobs that will impact the quality of life in El Paso in a positive way."





**Texas A&M AgriLife Extension** Service to Offer Professional Food Manager Certification Training Course

Statistics indicate that foodborne illness continues to be a health issue in the United States. Each year, 1 in 6 Americans will become sick, 128,000 will become hospitalized, and 3,000 will die due to a foodborne illness.

If under the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) jurisdiction each food establishment is required to have one certified food manager on site.

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, Taylor County, is offering a professional food manager certification training course. This program will be offered for

insurance, and medical bills. With these statistics, knowledge of how to prevent foodborne illness is essential. The benefits of improved food safety include:

 Increased customer satisfaction

• Improved relationships with health officials

• Prevention of bad publicity and law suits due to foodborne illness

By attending the course, foodservice managers will learn about:

 identifying potentially hazardous foods and common errors in food handling

• preventing contamination

be paid to producers this year since the STAX program from the 2014 Farm Bill will not be implemented until 2015. Signup for that payment began August 11th and runs until October 7th. This is not automatic for producers. The DCP program has expired, so if they want this transition payment they need to go sign up for it.

The second deadline is a crop insurance deadline. The Supplemental Coverage Option (SCO) will be available to producers that sign-up for the new Price Loss Coverage (PLC). SCO will not be available for producers that sign up for the Agricultural Risk Coverage (ARC). The issue is that wheat producers will not have had time to evaluate their program choices by the wheat crop insurance deadline of September 30th.

It is recommended that all wheat producers inform their crop insurance agents that they want SCO on their wheat for 2015. If at program sign-up a producer decides to sign a particular farm up into ARC, the producer will be able to opt back out of the SCO (With RMA's blessing). This opt out is a onetime offer for this year only. If a producer does not declare his intention of purchasing SCO by September 30th, and he does sign up with PLC, he will not be able to buy an SCO policy until the 2016 wheat crop. Crop insurance agents are aware of this provision, and should be communicating this to their customers.

The world's population is predicted to reach 9 billion by 2050; about 60 percent more food will be needed. Meat consumption is expected to rise as the world's population becomes wealthier. China is expected to lead the change in the demand for meat, Fernandez said.

With U.S. cattle herds at their lowest since the 1950's, the beef supply is low while demand remains strong. This is pushing cattle prices to record highs. Ag economists Glynn Tonsor of Kansas State University and Lee Schultz of Iowa State University predicted strong prices through the next three years. Both predicted that the U.S. cow herd will not recover to its record high 1970's era in the foreseeable future, if ever.

"This means prices should stay strong unless external factors such as changes in the Farm Bill, country of origin labeling issues, government shutdowns or feed prices change significantly," Fernandez said.

#### **BVD Testing Pays**

For the second consecutive year, research shows cattle buyers are paying a higher premium for calves that test negative for being persistently infected (PI) with bovine viral diarrhea (BVD). According to an analysis of Superior Livestock Auction data of more than 400,000 head marketed during 2013, the average premium paid for BVD-PI Free status calves was \$2.97 per hundredweight - a 23 percent increase from the previous year.

Similar to what producers have experienced with premiums paid for value-added vaccination programs, this BVD-PI Free premium translates into more profit per calf - an additional \$14 per head on a 600-pound animal. "Using BVD-PI testing results

Fire and Goats: A Potent Rangelands

When Indians and native wildlife were its only inhabitants, West Texas was much different than it is today.

Instead of dense brush, there was a sea of grass only occasionally dotted with large trees and patches of shrubbery along waterways.

Goat grazing browsing can cut juniper stands by half and can actually increase plant biodiversity, when properly managed over many years. 
