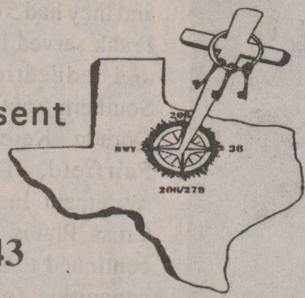

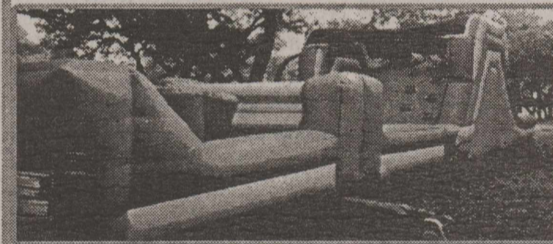

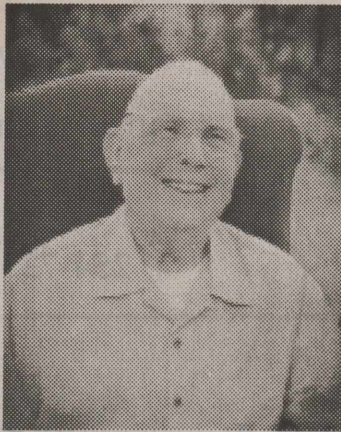

Frank O'Banion, age 80, went home to be with his Lord and Savior on Monday, October 6, 2014 with his family around him. Funeral services will be held at First Baptist Church, Cross Plains, Texas, on Thursday, October 9 at 2:30 p.m. Visitation will be from 5-6 p.m. on Wednesday night at Higginbotham Funeral Home in Cross Plains. An additional visitation will be held on Thursday from 1-2 p.m. in the parlor at First Baptist Church for out of town guests to greet the family prior to the service. (Frank Jennings O'Banion was born on August 17, 1934 to Guy Frank and Nettie Gertrude Wilkerson O'Banion in San Antonio, Texas. He was saved at Northside Baptist Church in San Antonio and surrendered to full time Christian ministry at the age of 12 at Alto Frio Baptist Camp. During his retirement, he enjoyed working and volunteering at the Heart of Texas Baptist Camp, and singing and playing in local nursing homes. His greatest joy in life came when he had the opportunity to use his musical gifts to minister to others. He also enjoyed his retirement on the farm and loved his cows. He battled a long illness, but never lost his optimism and trust in God's plan for his life. 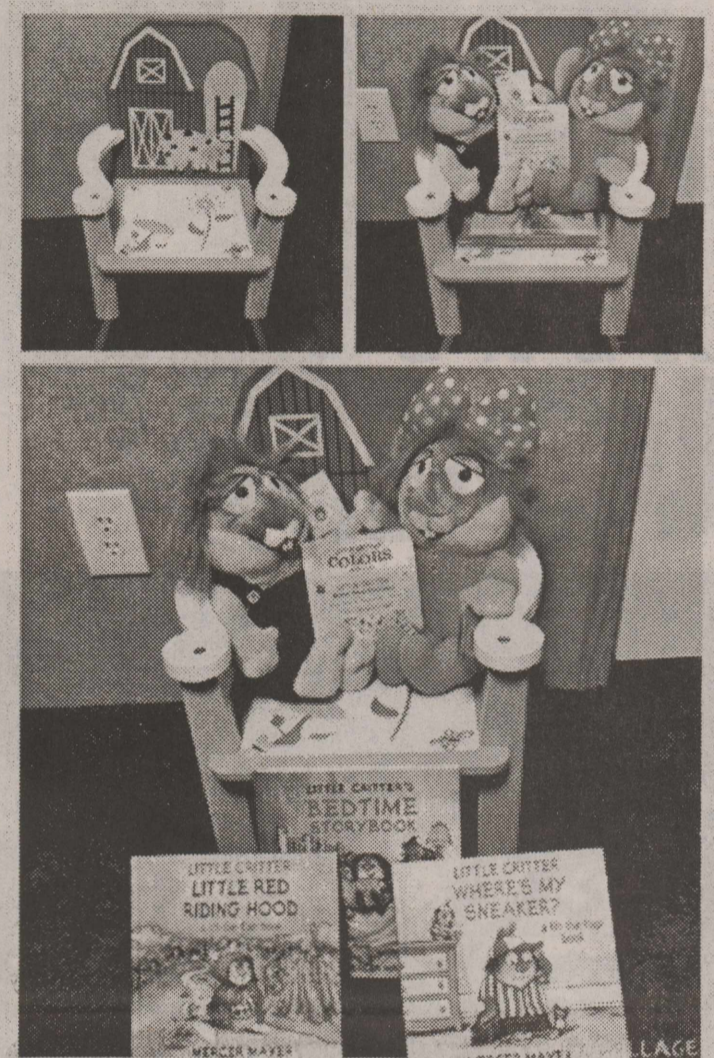

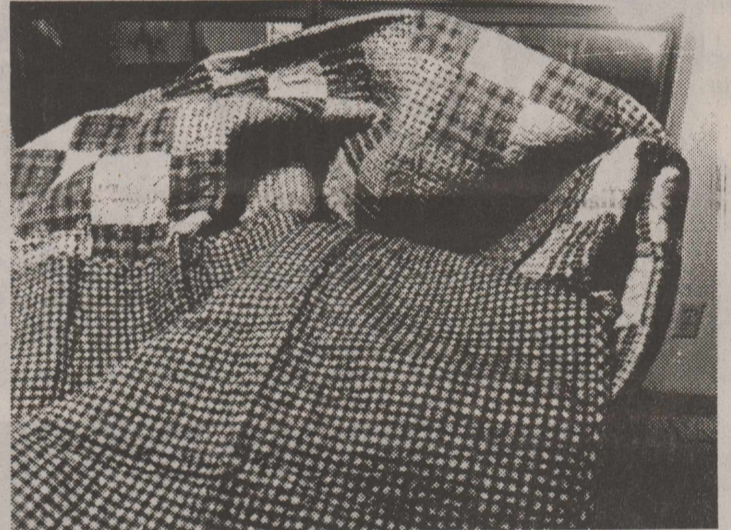

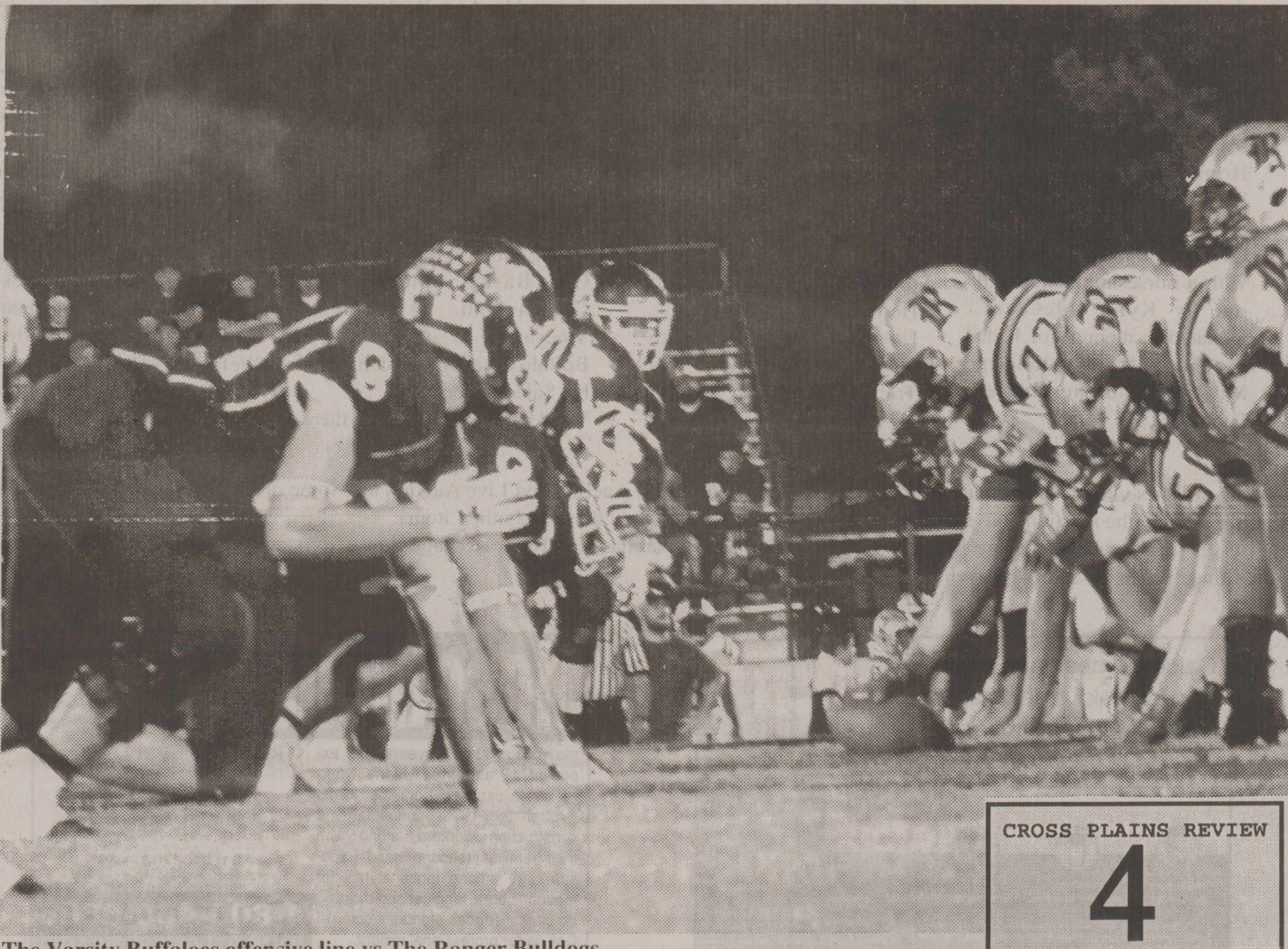

pass to Sanders, who then made a 23 yard run and scored. With just over five minutes left in the game, Senclair made an eight yard run and scored a final touchdown.

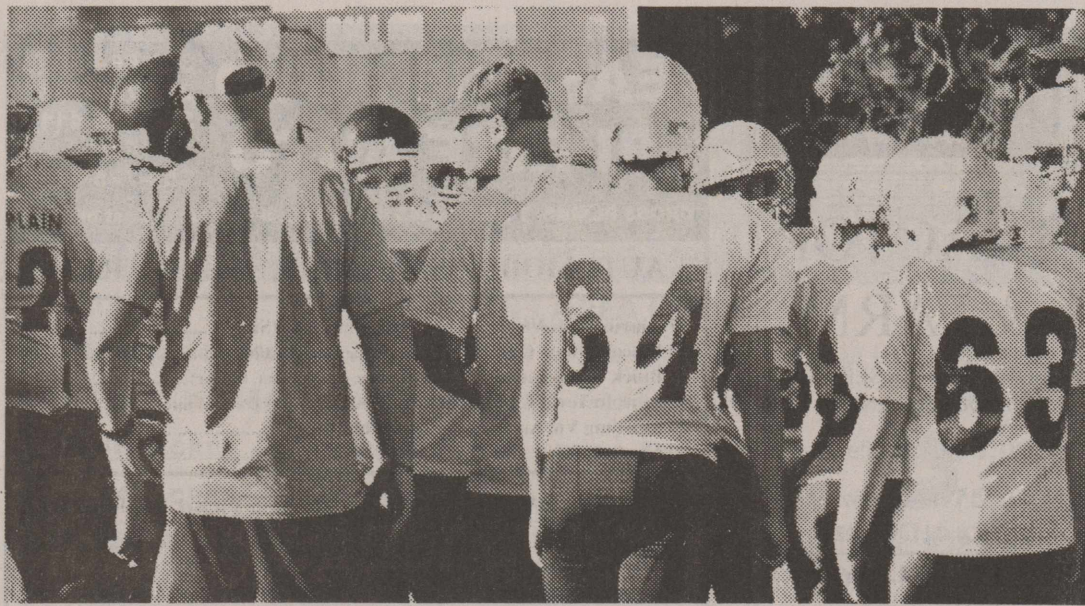

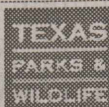

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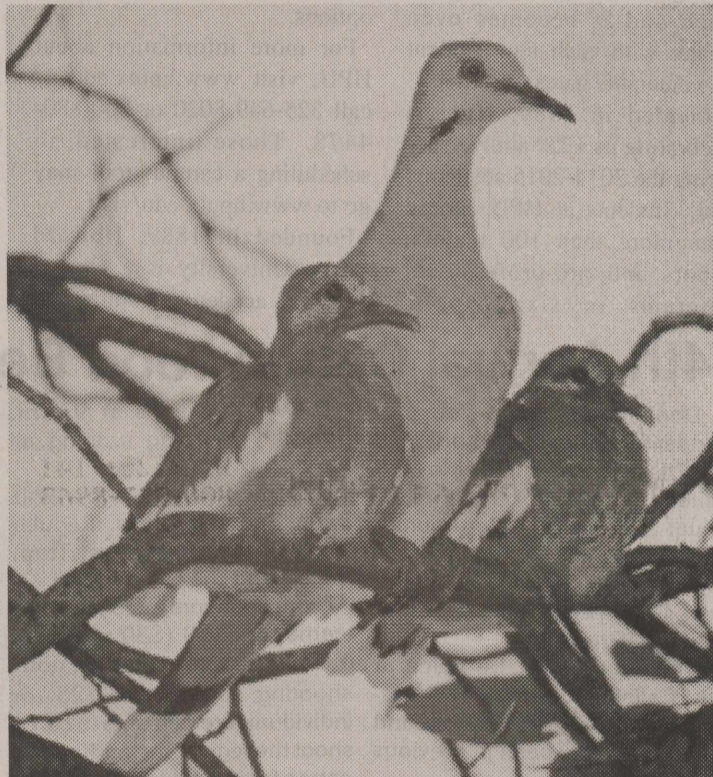
White-winged Dove

"Just like the white-winged dove." These lyrics were made famous back in 1982 when Stevie Nicks (of the band Fleetwood Mac) released the single "Edge of Seventeen" from her debut solo album titled "Bella Donna". So popular was this song that it reached #11 on the Billboard Top 100 that particular year. One has to wonder whether Nicks could have possibly understood the impact of those lyrics on a young naturalist, "... sings the song that sounds like she's singing who, who, who."

The White-winged Dove (*Zenaidura macroura*) is a large species of dove whose natural range lies primarily in Mexico. It can also be observed in the United States in a slim line from southern California eastward to southern Florida. In Texas, it is a summer migrant in the Panhandle but occurs year-round in the Big Bend, Edwards Plateau, and Tamaulipan thornscrub eco-regions.

At first glance, this large species is somewhat drab in coloration. It has grayish brown upper and underparts with a distinctive large white patch on the outer edges of its wings. These distinctive white patches on the wings are where this species common name is derived from. It also has smaller, less noticeable white patches on the relatively short and rounded tail. The head, aside from the brilliantly colored orange-red eyes surrounded by blue skin is colored like the rest of the bird. The bill is dark blue, and only slightly curved, while the throat is grayish and typically unmarked. The legs are comparatively short and red colored. With a body length of about twelve inches and a wingspan that approaches eighteen inches, it is the second largest species of dove that can be encountered in the west Texas.

The White-winged Dove is a gregarious species, commonly observed in large groups. It has been reported that these groups can number in the thousands in certain areas in the west, although groups of more than twenty are rarely encountered in west Texas. They feed almost exclusively on grains and other seeds, although fruits from cacti and trees are occasionally accepted. The flight pattern is easily recognizable as it is a direct path with strong and rapid wingbeats. The strength of the

wingbeats is often heard in the sound of whistle as the bird flies by.

These social birds pair up during the breeding season, with the male and female remaining monogamous during such time. The nest is placed either near the ground in various cacti plants or shrubs, or more commonly, in trees up to thirty feet above ground. The nest is made up of grasses, sticks and stems. More often than not, the male gathers the materials while the female is charged with the nest building. The two (rarely three) eggs are medium-sized (just over one inch in length) and unmarked and cream-colored. These eggs hatch in less than two weeks after the males and females alike take turns at incubating them. After hatching, both sexes con-

tinue to tend to the helpless young until they leave the nest just two weeks after hatching. Juveniles are colored similar to the adults, and up to three broods per year have been recorded.

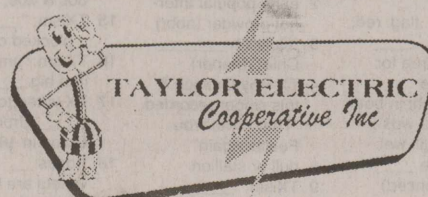
White-winged Doves have been reported to fly over twenty miles to obtain drinking water. This is another species of bird that has adapted quite well to human habitation, utilizing man-made cattle tanks to supplant the need for natural water courses. The use of birdbaths and bird feeding stations with small seeds will attract this common species of dove to your yard for closer observation.

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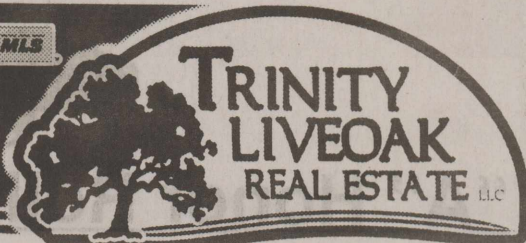

DPS Arrests 1,100 Drunk Drivers During Holiday Enforcement

AUSTIN – Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) troopers made more than 1,100 DWI arrests during a special enforcement period recently, which included the Labor Day holiday. The targeted DWI enforcement was in effect from Aug. 15th through Sept. 2nd. "Removing dangerous and impaired drivers from Texas roads helps protect all travelers," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "DPS' enforcement effort this Labor Day holiday helped prevent potentially deadly crashes and make Texas highways that much safer."

DPS Highway Patrol troopers made 1,175 DWI arrests during the Labor Day enforcement period, and 106 of those arrests were a direct result of additional patrol hours funded by a Texas Department of Transportation grant.

This DPS enforcement effort also resulted in 18,615 speeding citations, 2,840 seat belt/child safety seat citations, 838 fugitive arrests and 665 felony arrests.

DPS to Assist Medical Professionals with Drug Change

Hydrocodone products moving to more-restrictive Schedule II class

AUSTIN - In preparation for the rescheduling of hydrocodone combination products (HCPs), the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) has increased staffing and resources to respond to medical practitioners serving Texas patients who require prescriptions for HCPs.

Effective Oct. 6, 2014, HCPs will move from the classification of a Schedule III drug to the more-restrictive Schedule II. The U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration's rescheduling of HCPs as Schedule II controlled substances will increase the restrictions on prescribing and dispensing practices for hydrocodone combination drugs.

Physicians who prescribe HCPs will be required to use prescription pads provided by DPS. To accommodate these changes and to assist medical professionals, DPS is offering the following customer service enhancements:

- Extended customer service

availability from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.;

- An automated call-back system allowing customers to make an appointment for an agent's return call;
- Increased staff to help process registration modifications to allow practitioners to change their approved schedules; and
- Extended work hours for staff in both the customer contact center and order fulfillment areas.

In addition, medical practitioners needing assistance can either call (512) 424-7293 or visit the customer contact center at <https://www.txdps.state.tx.us/rsd/contact/default.aspx> and then select "Texas Prescription Program" from the drop-down menu.

HCPs are drugs that contain both hydrocodone - which by itself is a Schedule II drug - and specified amounts of other substances, such as acetaminophen or aspirin.

The federal Controlled Substances Act places substances with accepted medical uses into one of four schedules, with the substances with the highest potential for harm and abuse being placed in Schedule I, and substances with progressively less potential for harm and abuse being placed in Schedules II through V. (Schedule I is reserved for those controlled substances with no currently accepted medical use and lack of accepted safety for use.)

ABILENE – The Alzheimer's Association - North Central Texas Chapter will screen Angel's Perch, a new independent feature film that examines the delicate relationship between past and present, memory and loss, as depicted by a family struggling with Alzheimer's disease. 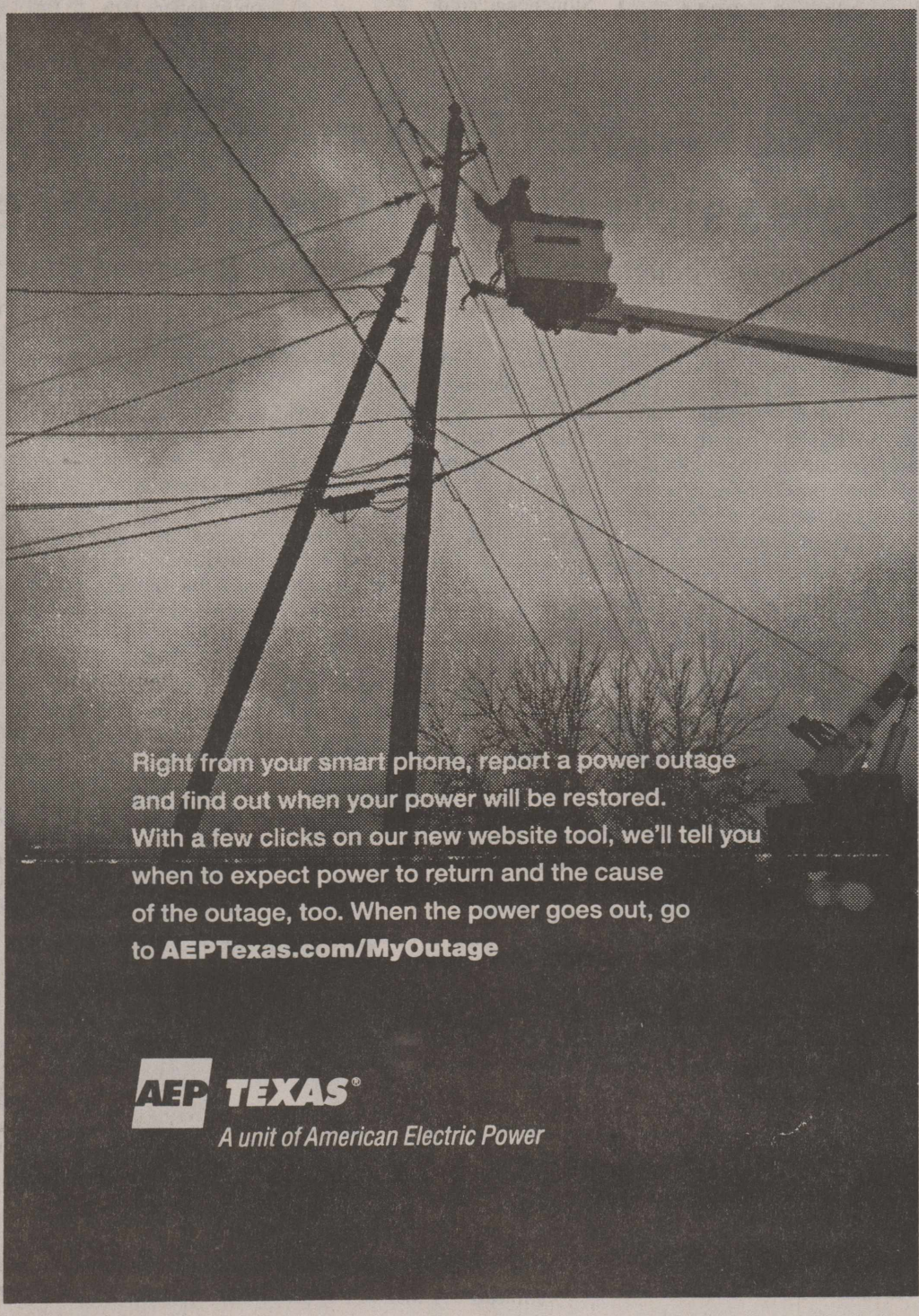

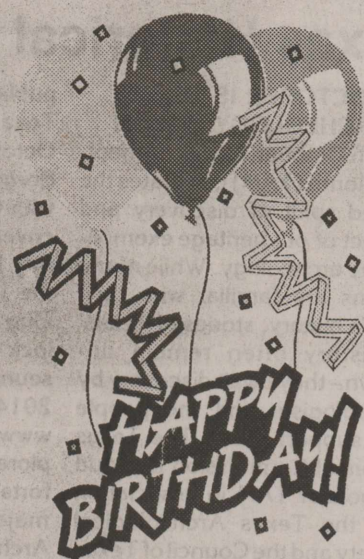

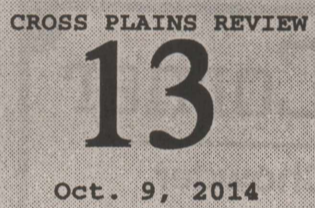

On October 25th, the Caddo Mounds State Historic Site will rededicate its visitors center as part of the El Camino Real de los Tejas Festival. National Watershed Conference in Fort Worth May 17th-20th

The National Watershed Coalition (NWC) has announced the 14th National Watershed Conference and National Watershed Program Partner Summit, which will be held at the Worthington Renaissance Fort Worth Hotel in downtown Ft. Worth, Texas on May 17-20, 2015.

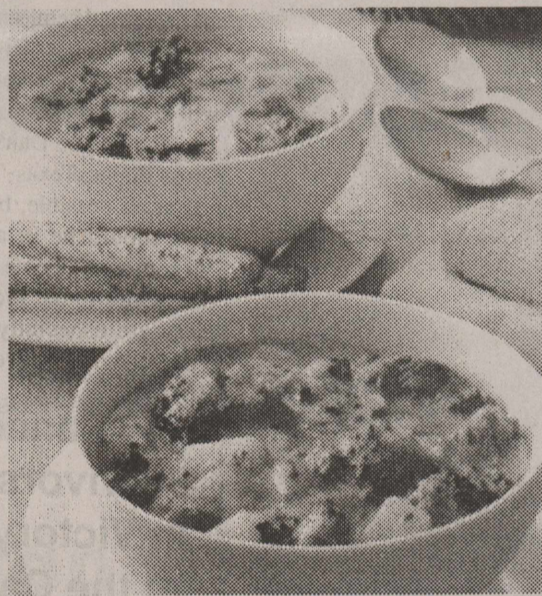


The Recipe Corner
