

Retired Chaplin (Lt Col) Wallace J Bennett, 89, of Cross Plains and Arlington, passed away Friday, November 14, in Arlington, Texas. Funeral Service were in Cross Plains at First United Methodist Church on Wednesday, 2:00 p.m. Visitation was Tuesday evening 5 to 7 pm at Higginbotham Funeral Home in Cross Plains.

Wallace was a retired U. S. Army Chaplain, but was a man of many interests, vocations and talents. After retiring from the Army in 1969, he and his family settled in Arlington. He served as associate pastor at First United Methodist Church of Euless for a year and a half. He was a vocational rehabilitation counselor for clients with drug addictions for Texas Rehabilitation Commission for eight years. He was a writer and editor of the Central Texas Conference page of the United Methodist Reporter newspaper for 13 years. His love of history led him to publish many articles for local magazines, including one on J. Frank Norris for the Dallas Times Herald Sunday magazine.

Wallace Bennett is a Veteran of WWII, the Korean War, and

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Viet Nam.

He was born on December 16, 1924, in Cottonwood, Texas. After graduating from CPHS in 1942, he obtained his father and mother's approval to join the armed forces even though he was underage. In the U.S. Navy, he served aboard a destroyer escort, the U.S S Brough, DE#148, and the ship escorted four convoys across the Atlantic.

He was then assigned to a liaison group to sail with the British Pacific Fleet, and served on a Troup Transport, a Headquarters Ship, and two destroyers.

He was discharged in 1945 and attended three years at Texas A&M University where he received a commission in the U.S. Army Signal Corp. At the start of the Cold War and before graduating, he was called to active duty. He saw duty in Washington DC, Ft. Gordon, Georgia, and then was assigned to Korea in 1950.

Heeding a call to the ministry, after Korea he finished his degree at Texas Wesleyan College (now University) and attended Perkins School of Theology at SMU to obtain Masters of Divinity degree. He reentered the Army to serve as a Chaplain for the last 12 years of his 27 years of service.

Wallace's first wife of nine years, Marjorie Jordan, of Cottonwood and CP, died when he began the ministry. Marjorie and Wallace had one son, Greg Bennett of Lakewood, Colorado. Wallace and his surviving wife of 57 years, Carol, have four sons, Jeffery and wife Mary, of Alpine, Texas; Bryan, and wife Grace, of Cross Plains, John and wife Michelle, of Arlington; Gary of Arlington.

After retiring from the Army, they lived in Arlington and Ft Worth until 2000, when they moved to Cottonwood, where he was born and grew up. Carol has returned to Arlington and will

reside there

Additional survivors include brother John Franklin Bennett of Cross Plains, eight grand-children, two great grand-children, many wonderful nieces, nephews, brothers-in-law, Michael Turpin and wife Brenda, Ron Turpin and wife Fran, sister-in-law, Pam Crocker and husband Mark, and many friends in the field of rehabilitation and in the United Methodist ministry.






First Callahan County Historical Marker Dedication

Black Bear

Many large carnivores that once inhabited Texas have been wantonly killed until populations have either decreased or disappeared all together. A few of these have held on for literal dear life, and one in particular has apparently made a successful comeback.

The Black Bear (Ursus americanus) is the largest carnivore that still calls Texas its home, surpassed in total size only by the Cougar. It is one of two bear species that at one time inhabited this state, the other being the extirpated Grizzly. Early on in the previous century, this bear could be observed almost state-wide. Until the late 1980's, the Black Bear was thought to be extinct in with an average total body length Texas, although signs posted in Big Bend National Park warned tourists to be wary of their possible presence. During the last decade of the century however, many confirmed sightings occurred in the Chisos Mountains

in southern Brewster county. Recently, many more confirmed sightings have occurred in the Chisos mountains, as well as in the Guadalupe, Davis, and Glass mountain ranges. They have even been observed as far east as the limestone canyon areas around Comstock in Val Verde county, and my son and I were fortunate enough to recently observe one in the Black Gap Wildlife Management Area south of Marathon late one sum-

mer evening. The increase in Black Bear sightings can be attributed to the fact that just across the international border in the Mexican state of Coahuila, Black Bear populations have soared due to landowner and government involvement. This area is now known as having the highest density of Black Bear in the Chihuahuan Desert, and these populations are now spreading into the areas of southwestern Texas. On a related note, appearances of Black Bear recently in the northern Panhandle near Dalhart can be explained by the population explosion in mountains of adjacent New Mexico.

Black Bears prefer wooded habitats, and the canyons of the isolated "Sky Islands" of the Trans-Pecos mountains amply provide the cover that is required. They are more at home on the ground than in trees, although individuals, particularly young ones, will retreat to the treetops to evade perceived threats.

They are a medium-sized bear,

of nearly five feet. The tail is relatively small, only attaining less than ten percent of the total length. At shoulder height they average just over twenty four inches. Black Bears are stocky creatures, with an average weight that is roughly between two hundred twenty-five and three hundred pounds, although large males can achieve weights of nearly a whopping five hundred pounds.

The color of the Black Bear can best be described as being, well, black. Having said that, they come in two color phases, most often black, but occasionally brown as well. The snout is brownish in both phases, and from the side view is very straight, not curved in appearance. The front claws are slightly longer than those on the hind feet, and are curved; very well adapted to both climbing and digging in hard soils in search of food.

The dietary prowess of the Black Bear is rather surprising to most people, with the majority of individuals being mostly herbivorous. Plant food items include apples, nuts, acorns,

grass, clover, berries, and even poison oak. However, they will feed on other animals as well, with fish are the most common animal prey item, as well as carrion. They are large consumers of the products of the nests of honey bees, ants, and other insects. Garbage is also a favored meal, and many are seen in campgrounds rummaging through trash.

The Black Bear's propensity of feeding on trash in camping areas is a reminder why it is important to properly discard of waste material. Many encounters with bears could be avoided simply by the use of the bear-proof trash receptacles provided by most campgrounds where bears occur. Sightings of this animal, while more common now than just a few years ago, are still something of interest to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. If you are lucky enough to witness this uncommon beast, please be sure to notify the department.


First Callahan County Historical Marker Dedication
