
Driver's License Office in Baird is open again

It started as a small grass fire in the ditch on Highway 36 outside Cross Plains. One ember jumped the road and caught the grassy fence line on fire and moved towards Cottonwood, then it took a hard turn towards Cross Plains. Our volunteer firefighters quickly called for back up and by the time the fire was out almost 30 units from surrounding towns came to help.

Many people were out of town visiting family for the holidays and received the devastating phone call that their houses had burned. Generous people from across the state traveled to Cross Plains to help volunteer or sent donations.

Though our small town experienced a devastating tragedy that would have made most towns give up and move on, our small community pulled together and built Cross Plains into the prosperous town it is today. Dozens of houses have been rebuilt including the Methodist Church. The lives of those lost in the fire have been honored in great ways in our community.




CPVFD- Chili Supper January 9



LOVE'S TRAVEL STOP TAKING SHAPE-The new Love's Travel Stop that will be situated on 12 1/2 acres of land on the northeast corner of I-20 & Highway 283 in Baird continues to take shape in preparation for a spring 2015 opening. Bill Gleason, Real Estate Project Manager for Love's, said the Love's Travel Stop to be located in Baird will consist of a 10,000 square feet store, with either one or two restaurants inside the travel stop. Gleason said the restaurant brands coming to Baird have yet to be determined. There will be eight gas pumps on the site, and another eight diesel pumps for truckers, Gleason said. He said there will be paved parking for 80 semi-trucks at the travel stop. Gleason added there will be a tire store inside the travel stop, and Love's Travel Stop in Baird will also provide roadside assistance along Interstate 20 through Love's Truck Tire Care vehicle fleet. Currently there is one Love's Travel Stop on the western edge of Sweetwater along I-20 and a smaller Love's convenience store located in Ranger, also on

I-20. Gleason said the Baird Love's Travel Stop will be similar in size to the Loves in Sweetwater. Gleason said the Love's in Baird will cater to the truckers along I-20. He said the Baird travel stop will have five shower stalls inside the travel stop for the truckers. He said all the restrooms in the Love's Travel Stop will have extra-large facilities. Gleason said Loves makes it a mission to provide big clean restrooms for the traveling public. Gleason said the Baird Love's Travel Stop will employ between 40-50 full-time employees. He said these jobs are good paying, with 401K retirement benefits and insurance offered to its employees. He pointed out that these jobs in Baird will stay in Baird, that Love's will remain a fixture of the community for generations to come. Construction of the Love's Travel Stop is expected to be completed by mid-spring 2015, Gleason said. He said Love's builds about 20 stores a year and will be general contractor for the Baird Love's construction.







More than a dozen international students studying in Texas have lost thousands of dollars in a bogus travel agent scam. Campus police at Texas A&M University report 17 tickets from Jasmine Travel. One of the students had done a search online as "airline tickets to India", and this site popped up: www.sulekha.com , which was described as India's version of Craigslist. From there she found Jasmine Travel was offering airfare to India for \$700 cheaper than anyone else. Without checking into the company, she wired \$1000 to them and contacted her friends, all of whom did the exact same thing. No one stopped to wonder why or how this company could offer such low airfare.

Investigators have found that they were using an address in Forest Hills, NY that was actually a Citibank office. In Los Alamitos, CA the office was actually another travel agency called Adam Intelligent Travel. BBB is requesting assistance

in alerting international students and anyone planning overseas visits about this scam.





Callahan County's jobless rate drops to 3.4% in November

The unemployment rate in Callahan County dropped twotenths of one percent to 3.4% in November 2014, according to jobless figures released Friday, December 19th by the Texas Workforce Commission. The unemployment rate in Callahan County one year ago in November 2013 was 4.3 percent.

Callahan County's unemployment rate was 3.6% in October, 2014.

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County included: 3.9% in September 2014, 4.1% in August, 4.1% in July, 4.1% in June, 3.6% in May, 3.4% in April, 4.0% in March, 4.3% in February, 4.2% in January 2014, and 4.1% in December 2013 according to the unemployment figures.

Big Country area counties, bordering Callahan County, and the counties' unemployment rates for November 2014 include: Brown, 4.1%; Coleman, 4.3%; Eastland, 4.0%; Jones, 4.7%; Runnels, 4.2%; Shackelford, 1.9%; Stephens, 3.8%; and Taylor County, 3.6%.


The Abilene MSA (Metropolitan Statistical Area) unemployment rate, which includes Taylor, Callahan and Jones Counties, stood at 3.7% in November, 2014, according to the Texas Workforce Commission. The Abilene MSA Combined Labor Force is 83,100. There were 80,100 employed during November 2014, while 3,000 were unemployed, giving the Abilene MSA an unemployment rate of 3.7%.

The Abilene MSA reported the workforce was 83,300 in October, 2014. Total employment of 80,100 was reported in October 2014, while 3,200, or 3.9% were unemployed in October 2014.

The Abilene MSA unemployment rate for November, 2013 was 4.6%. The total workforce was reported at 84,300, with 80,400 employed and 3,900 or 4.6% unemployed in November, 2013.

The state's unemployment rate for the month of November, 2014 was 4.6 percent. The total Texas labor force was 13,069,200 in November 2014. The total number of Texans employed is 12,464,400. The total number of unemployed Texans was 604,800 in November 2014.

Last month's statewide unem-



was 5.5%. The United States unemployment rate one year ago in November, 2013 was 6.6%.

Highlights of the Texas Labor Force (Not Seasonally Adjusted)

The Texas unemployment rate decreased by two-tenths of a percentage point to 4.6 percent in November. The drop in the unemployment rate was typical for November due in part to the holiday season. The past three months have shown an average rate decline of three-tenths of a percentage point.

 The November unemployment rate was the lowest Texas has seen since May 2008. Over the year, the unemployment rate decreased 1.2 percentage points. The national unemployment rate remained unchanged at 5.5 percent. The Texas unemployment rate was 0.9 percentage points below the national rate and has remained at or below the national unemployment rate since December 2006.

• The Civilian Labor Force increased by 1,500 people to a total of 13,069,200 Texans. This was the lowest October-to-November over-the-month change in the Civilian Labor Force since 2005. The past three months have shown an average gain of 18,000 individuals. The Civilian Labor Force had an annual growth of 187,000 persons, a growth rate of 1.5 percent.

• The number of jobholders increased in November by 22,100 individuals, bringing the number of employed Texans to 12,464,400 persons. This increase tracked the five-year average October-to-November gain of 30,600 jobholders. The number of employed Texans grew by 333,700 individuals over the year. The number of jobseekers fell by 20,600 individuals over the month to a total of 604,800 persons. This was the lowest number of unemployed Texans since June 2008. Since January, the number of jobseekers has declined by 138,800 people. The unemployment rate dropped in 22 Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSAs), while two MSAs remained unchanged, and



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



Steel safety cables on I-20 fail to prevent head-on collision with fatality

The steel safety cables designed to prevent head-on collisions on Interstate 20 failed to prevent one collision which killed a Georgia man Sunday morning, December 28th east of Clyde.

Clyde Police Chief Robert Dalton said the Clyde PD responded to a head-on vehicle accident around 10:00 a.m. Sunday morning, December 28th near the 303 mile marker of Interstate 20, east of Clyde.

A 2003 Honda Accord, driven by Rashmi Shringer, 30, of Abilene, was travelling west bound on I-20 when the vehicle lost control, went through the center median through the safety cables and collided head-on with a 2014 Nissan Rogue, driven by Michael Hamelin, 43, of Georgia

Chief Dalton said Hamelin and his wife, Elizabeth, were travelling back to Georgia at the time of the accident. Elizabeth was transported by helicopter to John Peter Smith Hospital in Fort Worth and is listed in serious but stable condition.

Shringer was also transported by helicopter ambulance to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene and has since been released, Chief Dalton said.

He said both of the Hamelins had to be cut out of their vehicle by the Clyde Volunteer Fire Department personnel.

Chief Dalton said all involved were wearing their seat belts. He said he's not sure why Shringer lost control of her vehicle, but said blood samples were taken from her, as is the case in all fatalities. He said there was no indiction she was intoxicated.

Chief Dalton said the Clyde Police Department is handling 603 exit at Eula. the investigation of the case because the accident scene is inside the city limits of Clyde. He said the Clyde city limits extends along I-20 to the Baird Hill west all the way to near the FM



Lesser Earless Lizard

This column is being written based on the conversation that I had recently with two separate farmers in the Texas Panhandle who had both observed (and one photographed) a species of lizard that they had never witnessed before in their lifetime. Whether this lack of notice was due to them not being observant previously or just the plain innocuousness of just an "ordinary" lizard, I will not even begin to speculate. However, it was clear that both of these gentlemen had observed a very unpretentious lacertian species that is fairly common, and that variety was the Lesser Earless Lizard.

The Lesser Earless Lizard (Holbrookia maculata) is one of three species of this genus that occurs in Texas. It can be commonly observed throughout the Panhandle region, the Big Country, the Trans-Pecos, and less frequently along the northern periphery of the Edwards Plateau. Outside of the borders of Texas, it may be spotted northward to South Dakota, westward to southern Arizona, and southward to central Mexico.

The primary habitat that this relatively discreet lizard prefers is arid to semi-arid naturally occurring grasslands. However, most of the native grasslands in this state have been severely overgrazed or completely replaced by agriculture fields of plants like cotton and wheat. It is in these areas where this species has adapted to thrive in spite of the exposed soil with less covering. A less frequented habitat selected is the creosotestrewn gravelly soils of the Trans-Pecos.

some individuals there is a secondary row of obscure blotches along the sides of the body; these spots are divided from the primary blotches by a faint light stripe. Both sexes are decorated with 2 vertical black bars immediately behind the forelegs; these bars are more prominent in the males than in the females. The scales on the back are small and granular in appearance and texture, and as the common name implies, there are no external ear openings. Males are the larger sex, achieving total lengths of nearly five inches. Unlike many other lizard species, the tail is quite short, usually only 35% of the total length of the lizard.

Lesser Earless Lizards, like other lizard species, are "coldblooded", or ectothermic. This means that they do not generate heat from the inside of their body, as mammals and birds do, but rather are dependent on outside sources for heating and

> with great enthusiasm. The Lesser Earless Lizard is oviparous, which is a fancy way of saying that it lays eggs. After emerging from the winter-long brumation period (reptiles do not hibernate in the true sense of the word), males will search out females to mate. After mating, the female will lay a small clutch of eggs (between two and six, average of four) in moisture retaining soil. After approximately two months of incubation, the 1.5 inch long young replicas of their parents emerge from their underground nest prepared to fend for and care for themselves. Depending on the summer rainfall amounts, a female may lay anywhere from 2 to 5 clutches of eggs during a 5-month spring/summer span.

> Lesser Earless Lizards are common, but not commonly seen. They are adept at quickly running short distances between shaded areas, quickly disappearing into the shadows of small covered areas. It is often found in Prairie Dog towns, and many individuals will utilize the bur-



1) February 11, Three Fatalities from Icy Roads on U.S. Highway 87

Widespread light freezing drizzle caused a thin glaze of ice to form on roads and walkways throughout the morning across a large part of West Central Texas. Many school districts and government offices in Abilene, San Angelo, Brownwood, Brady, Haskell, and surrounding areas closed for the day. Three people were killed and one was injured in Tom Green County when an ambulance traveling from Sterling City to San Angelo on. U.S. Highway 87 flipped over and

burned.

Severe thunderstorms resulted in giant hail and damaging downburst winds mainly along and east of a line from Anson to Abilene to Junction. One of the severe thunderstorms pelted the city of Abilene with hail the size of softballs (4.5 in.) and DVDs (4.75 in.), causing 12 injuries and about 400 million dollars of damage to vehicles, roofs and windows. It may have been one of the costliest hail storms to ever impact Abilene. The town of Rochelle was also severely impacted by the destructive thunderstorm winds estimated near 95 m.p.h.. Ballinger and Junction reported 4.50 inch size hail, while Brady Airport measured a thunderstorm wind gust at 78 m.p.h..

3) June 11, San Angelo and West Central Texas Severe Weather Outbreak

Another round of severe thunderstorms mainly along and west of a line from Anson to near Wall (located just east of San Angelo) produced downburst winds extending from 1 mile northwest of Carlsbad to 3 miles east northeast of Wall. These winds damaged roofs, uprooted trees, broke tree limbs and knocked utility lines and poles across the north half of the city of San Angelo as thunderstorm winds gusted to approximately 95 m.p.h.. Two weak tornadoes formed on the leading edge of the damaging winds. A severe thunderstorm with damaging thunderstorm winds around 80 m.p.h. also produced a haboob

or a wall of dust as it impacted Rotan. These high winds also peeled a section of a metal roof off of the Rotan Baptist Church, uprooted numerous trees and knocked down power lines in Rotan.


4) April 15, West Central **Texas Hard Freeze**

A late season arctic cold front brought freezing temperatures on the morning of April 15. Temperatures dropped into the lower to mid 20's for several hours across a large part of the area. There were a few readings around 30 degrees near Mason, San Saba, Coleman and Sonora. These freezing temperatures damaged a significant amount of winter wheat and young garden plants across the area. Cost was unknown.

5) West Central Texas Drought

The U.S. Drought Monitor placed much of West Central Texas in extreme to exceptional drought categories during the month of May. As welcome rainfall fell in late May, this moisture alleviated the intense drought south of Interstate 20. Meanwhile, the severe to exceptional drought persisted along and north of Interstate 20 until beneficial rainfall arrived in November. Although the drought loosened its grip across a large part of West Central Texas by late December, the severe to extreme drought continued to plague Haskell, Throckmorton and the northwest corner of Shackelford County.

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2014 are 5% ahead of 2013

The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments in 2014 are just over five percent higher than 2013, according to the Texas State Comptroller's office.

Texas State Comptroller Susan Combs reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday, December 10th.

Cross Plains' 2014 sales tax payments for the year totalled \$243,126.38, which is 5.47 percent higher than the \$230,498.83 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2013. The payment to the city for

Combs said today, Wednesday, compsum.html. December 10th, that states sales tax revenue in November was \$2.66 billion, up 10.7 percent compared to November 2013.

"The growth in sales tax collections was fueled by increased remittances from both business and consumer driven sectors," Combs said. "The gains were led by oil and natural gas-related sectors, while collections from retail trade and restaurants also rose strongly.'

Combs will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their December local sales tax allocations totaling \$645.9 million, up 11.4 percent compared to December 2013.

Combs sent Texas cities \$417.3 million in December 2014, which is higher by 10.7 percent compared to December 2013 and higher by 7.0 percent year-to-date.

She reported \$42.6 million in December 2014 allocations to Texas counties, which is higher by 11.5 percent compared to December 2013 and higher by 6.3 percent year-to-date.

The Texas transit systems received \$147.0 million in December 2014 sales tax allocations, which is 11.9 percent higher than December 2013 and up 7.6 percent year-to-date.

Special Purpose Taxing Districts received \$39.0 million in December 2014 allocations, which is 18.1 percent higher than December 2013 and higher by 20.1 percent year-to-date.
