## Robert E. Howard Days - 29 years and still going strong

Back in 1986, when Project Pride was still in the infant stages of organization, several things fell into place rather simultaneously that changed Project Pride and the Robert E. Howard Museum forever. Joan McCowen just happened to be in the library on a Saturday when a very surprised Rusty Burke wandered in. Taking a break from his work at the Johnson O'Conner Research Foundation, Inc., Burke had driven up from Houston more or less on a whim to search for anything related to Robert E. Howard.

What transpired on that day was an invitation to Burke to bring a small group of other fans to Cross Plains to enjoy a day of visiting at the library, driving by and viewing the house where Howard had grown up and had done all of the writing that has gained a world-wide audience, and enjoying a Texas BBQ at Charles and Lou Rodenberger's home. Burke and Bill Cavalier of IN were among that first group and have attended every year since that the official Robert E. Howard Days have been held.

Twenty-nine years later that

small gathering hosted by a handful of visionaries has become an annual event that continues to draw scholars and serious fans from around the world. The Robert E. Howard United Press Association was the primary cosponsor for the event, joined in recent years by the REH Foundation. It has always been a very productive relationship; they do the planning and Project Pride does the facilitating.

Now, once again Project Pride members are gearing up for the event, scheduled for Friday and Saturday, June 12-13. Headquartered at the Howard Museum, there will be early morning coffee and donuts, a hot dog lunch, tours, a special postal cancellation, swap meet and panel discussions. Friday events will conclude with a celebration dinner and silent auction in the Community Center. Guest of Honor, Mark Schultz from PA will deliver the keynote address as he talks about his personal history of illustrating Howard's works. Saturday will be pretty much the same, except there will be some 'free time' to visit the Barbarian Festival over in

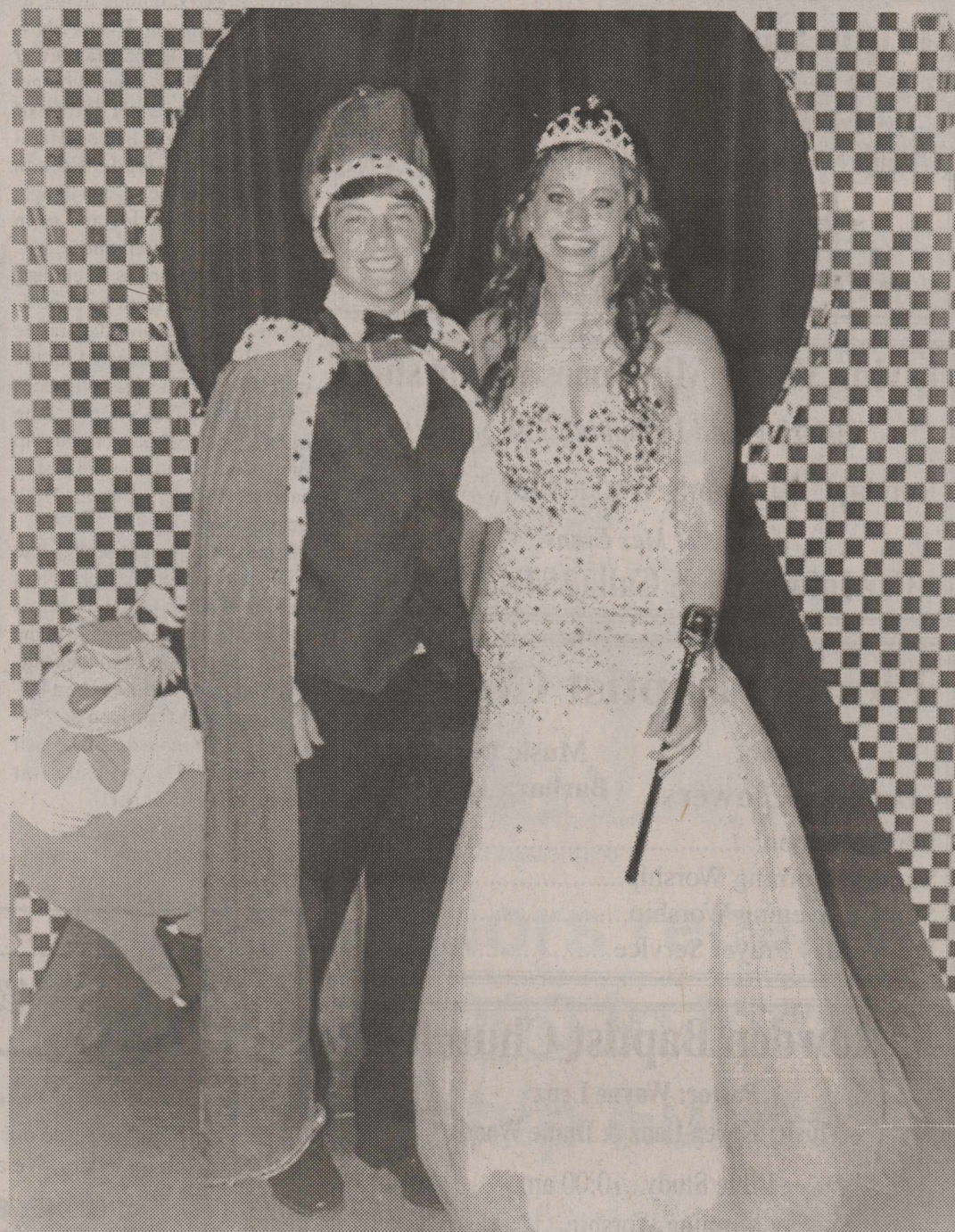
Treadway Park. The visitors spend a lot of time sitting around the Pavilion networking with each other on possible collaborations of publications, sharing the latest research findings on Howard's writings and in general, just enjoying the company of folks with the same deep interest in the local writer.

A growing number of visitors are now arriving early; several with plans to attend the dinner at the Senior Center and to view the Barbarian Festival parade on Thursday. It seems that such small town celebrations are not a part of life in their big cities.

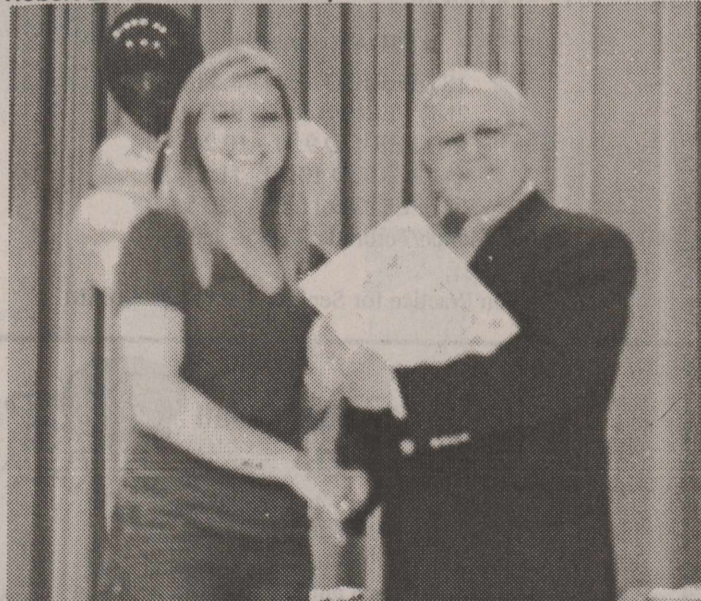

**Wind Scorpion**

With the advent of the Internet, the amount of informational resources has increased exponentially from what was available just a few years ago. However, just as the wealth of accurate information that is more accessible, the amount of misinformation is also staggering. This misinformation is more often than not the source of many urban legends, particularly when it comes to creatures that are associated with fearful reactions. Such is typically the case with an order of scorpions that contains over a 1,000 described species worldwide, including here in west Texas.



Wind Scorpion (order Sulifugae)

The Wind Scorpion (order Sulifugae) is a huge order of arachnids that can be encountered almost worldwide, with the exception being the Antarctic region and curiously, Australia. In Texas, these fearsome looking scorpions are found throughout the arid areas of western and southern portions of the state. They can be quite abundant in the Trans-Pecos region, while less frequently seen in the other areas that they inhabit.

Just as with other arachnids such as spiders, Wind Scorpions have eight legs, although the first pair of legs is smaller and are actually not utilized in movement as much as they are for feeling the surroundings. Like other scorpions, they have a large set of pedipalps that are used primarily in the same way that insects use their antennae. Unlike other scorpions, however, these pedipalps do not have pinchers. It has two body parts, with the cephalothorax being the body part where the legs are attached to, and the abdomen which is often covered with prickly hairs and set off by anywhere from eight to ten segments. Both body parts are dark brown, while the legs are a light to medium yellowish coloration. Full length is achieved by adults at about two inches. There is a large set of eyes set on the front half of the cephalothorax.

The most distinctive, as well as the most fearsome, characteristic of this order is the four large, vertically curved jaws (known as the chelicerae) that project forward from the mouth area. These jaws are used to dissect its prey, liquefying the victim to be ingested through the mouth. Fortunately, it feeds only on small arthropods such as beetles and other insects, although small lizards, snakes, and even young rodents have been documented as food items. They search for

their prey almost exclusively at night time, using the combination of their eyes as well as their pedipalps to locate their potential food items. They can often times be observed feasting on insects while underneath street lights in rural areas. The remainder of the day is spent underground in burrows built by other animals, or under other moisture-retaining habitats such as rocks, fallen logs, or dead yucca plants.

Very little has been documented on the reproductive habits of this order. The males are shorter than the females, as well as having much thinner abdomens. The fifty to one hundred eggs are laid in a burrow that is dug by the female who will then remain on site to guard this nest. Hatching takes approximately three weeks, and young achieve adult size within their first four months. They are not long-lived, with most individuals dying within a year of being hatched.

Wind Scorpions are known by a number of names, and each name gives a different perspective

on its behavior. The name Wind Scorpion derives from the fact that it is extremely quick and elusive, like the wind. The order Sulifugae can be translated into Latin as "those that flee from the sun". Other names include Sun Scorpions, Sun Spiders, and in the deserts of the Middle East, Camel Spiders. In fact, there is an urban legend in this region of the world that these "Camel Spiders" can attain lengths of up to two feet and this misinformation has circulated around the internet, generally with a US soldier holding a dead Wind Scorpion that has been impaled with a sharp object. However, these photos are an optical illusion, as the dead arachnid is placed closer to the camera and thus appears to be much larger than it truly is. Another legend pertains to the erroneous belief that they are venomous, and while their bite can be painful, it is in no way harmful or dangerous.

## Robert E. Howard Days in Cross Plains

Co-sponsored by the Project Pride organization in Cross Plains, the international group known as the Robert E. Howard United Press Association, and the Robert E. Howard Foundation, the annual Robert E. Howard Days will be held on Friday, June 12 and Saturday June 13. Headquartered at the REH Museum at 625 West Highway 36, the two day conference will include panel discussions, special tours of the Museum and the surrounding areas, a special postal cancellation, an award ceremony, celebration dinner and silent auction.

Howard was an extremely prolific writer who lived in Cross Plains during his entire writing career. Although he is probably best known for his Conan the Cimmerian stories, Howard also wrote western, detective and boxing stories, poetry, as well as creating numerous other characters: Solomon Kane, El Borak, King Kull, Bran Mak Morn, and his somewhat bumbling mountain man, Breckenridge Elkins.

Mark Schultz, well known illustrator of Howard stories, has been named Guest of Honor and will share 'A History of Illustrating Robert E. Howard' at the celebration dinner on Friday. He will also lead a couple of the panel discussions on both Friday and Saturday at the Cross Plains Public Library. In addition to his work with the Howard stories, he has either scripted or drawn many popular fiction icons, including Flash Gordon, The Spirit, Tarzan and Superman. He has also scripted the Prince Valiant Sunday comic strip for the past 10 years.

He has promised to bring a variety of his work with him and some lucky bidder in the Silent Auction will be going home with some original, autographed Mark Schultz art!

Attendees at this year's REH Days will get a sneak preview of two games featuring Conan the Cimmerian. To be released later this year is a game developed by the French company, Monolith, LLC. This one is a strategy board game that uses miniature figurines on a game map to simulate combat in the Hyborian Age. The second game is a traditional role-playing game along the lines of the popular Dungeons and Dragons, in which players take on the part of adventurers in the Hyborian Age of Conan. ### Local News

High winds, with a thunder storm in the evening, accompanied by rain made up the weather record for yesterday.

Stock in this neighborhood is all fat.

Doc. Rust has had the little building joining the post office, and lately occupied by John Borgman, the tailor, torn down and moved to his residence lot.

Mr. Bent Mitchell's steam thrasher has arrived, but it is in a very damage condition, it having been thrown of the car at Cisco by careless switching in the yard. He will probably send for another one Mr. Chas. Kenyon, from New York, arrived her last Friday with 104 head of Spanish merino sheep,

(all bucks) from Vermont, which he is offering for sale at this place. If he does not sell out his lot here he will take the balance of them to Colorado.

Mr. R.H. Overall, Coleman county's most prominent sheep man, has been in town this week negotiating the sale of his wool, aggregating in the neighborhood of 60,000 pounds, which he sold to A.V. Pichard, of Galveston, at the snug price of 26 cents per pound. This is the best sale made this year. Mr. Overall has been in the sheep business but a few years, but by strict attention to business, he is now on the high road to fortune. Mr. O. is a very popular and deserving gentleman, and we are glad to see him thus reaping the benefits of his industry. Quite a number of teamsters have been busy bringing in his fleecy staple.

It is very gratifying and encouraging to see the business and general prosperity in and about Baird, just as we predicted some weeks since, times would be very prosperous here, and that time has fairly come now. The railroad company is doing an immense freight business, the traffic in cattle, horses and sheep is very large while every available building and shed

in town is being converted into a wood depot, and our merchants all tell us that business is improving rapidly, while to add to the general appearance of prosperity there is hardly a time that one or several immense herds of cattle, enroute north, are not in sight.

A Mexican cow-boy, who was with a cattle outfit under control of Mr. Birke, in attempting to lariat a horse near the Jim Ned creek, near Coleman, met with quite a serious accident, last Monday. The horse that the Mexican was riding, while in a gallop, stumbled and fell, throwing the rider to the ground and rolling over him. The companions of the young man carried him back to Coleman, where his injuries, which consisted of one or two broken ribs, a fracture in the skull and several bruises, seemed to be suffering considerably. It was deemed unsafe to take further with the outfit. After reaching Baird, Mr. Birke found a party of Mexicans that were from San Antonio, the home of the wounded man, and as they intended going home by rail, he got them to take the sufferer with them. They left Thursday night. But little hope is entertained of his recovery.

# District Clerk's Office to begin taking credit cards

Callahan County Commissioners voted to approve a request from District Clerk Amber Tinsley to begin using NCourt credit card services in the District Clerk's Office.

The commissioners' court took the action Friday, May 22nd during a regular meeting held at the County Courthouse in Baird.

Tinsley requested the commissioners' court begin using NCourt credit card services for fees in the District Clerk's office. She told the commissioners' court that to be able to accept credit cards would be a good customer service for her office.

Sam Goldsmith with Goldsmith Solutions told the commissioners' court that other Callahan County Offices were already using the services of NCourt now, including the County Clerk's office. The Court Clerk's office accepts credit cards from Visa, MasterCard, Discover and American Express.

On a motion by Commissioner Bryan Farmer and a second by Commissioner Tom Windham, the commissioners' court voted 5-0 to sign a contract with NCourt for credit card services in the District Clerk's office.

Other agenda items brought before the commissioners' court included:

—The meeting of the commissioners' court was called to order at 9:30 a.m. by Judge Roger Corn with Commissioner Precinct #1 Harold Hicks, Commissioner Precinct #2 Bryan Farmer, Commissioner Precinct #3 Tom Windham, Commissioner Precinct #4 Cliff Kirkham, County Treasurer Jan Windham and County Clerk Donna Bell present. Also attending the meeting were: Sam Goldsmith with

Goldsmith Solutions, Callahan County Sheriff Terry Joy and Julie Lemon with the Callahan County Sheriff's Office.

—The minutes of the previous commissioners' court meeting were reviewed and signed.

—There was no public comment received.

—No action was taken on the Countywide Burn Ban. The Burn Ban remains lifted.

—Sam Goldsmith with Goldsmith Solutions updated the commissioners' court on the progress of the new contract with Windstream for telephone system and the upgrade of the internet service and equipment. No action was taken.

—Commissioner Hicks made a motion to approve the Sheriff's monthly report for April. Commissioner Kirkham seconded the motion and the motion carried with a 5-0 vote. Julie Lemon also gave a report on the jail inspection.

—Discussion was held by the commissioners' court, Sam Goldsmith, Julie Lemon and Sheriff Joy on the proposed dispatch fees. No action was taken.

—No action was taken on the courthouse repairs.
