



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

Crested Caracara


While in the field making observations about the wildlife present, occasionally an animal will really grasp the attention of the observer, particularly when that species is not commonly seen in that area. Such is the case for me with the largest species of US falcons, the Crested Caracara.

The Crested Caracara (Caracara cheriway) is one of six species of falcons that call Texas home, and it is the only one in its genus. It ranges from the southwestern Edwards Plateau southward through the Tamaulipan thornscrub country of south Texas through the Sierra Madre Oriental on the eastern side of Mexico. There is another population that occurs in southern Arizona and ranges southward through the Sierra Madre Occidental on the western side of Mexico. These two populations connect along the southern portion of the Mexican Plateau. There is also an isolated, but stable population in southern Florida. It is expanding its range in Texas, and more verified reports of sightings occur annually throughout west Texas.

Caracaras are the largest species of falcon that lives in Texas, with adults attaining a body length of more than two feet. The wingspan is also impressive, reaching lengths of four feet. The legs are long and are colored a bright yellow or yellow-orange. The crown and crest on the head are black, as are the body and wings. The breast is white with a transverse of thin horizontal black bars. The tail is black on the upper wings, but the undertail is a creamy white. The sides of the head and the long neck are white, and there is a distinctive patch of naked skin from the eye to the nostril that can be either orange or red. The thick bill is white. The white head, tail and wingtips are easily noticeable when the bird is in flight, making identification easy when observed from beneath.

Caracaras are most commonly seen perched on fence-posts or telephone poles while foraging for food, although they are not too uncommonly observed walking on the ground searching for prey. They are not too particular in their dietary requirements as recorded prey items include insects, fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds and small mammals. They will occasionally even feed on carrion along with vultures, and many times they will actually dominate the carcass.

Like other species of falcons, Caracara pairs are monogamous, and breeding occurs once or twice annually. They are solitary nesters, and they are unique

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
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Cross Plains Garden Club **Tours Local Garden**

The Cross Plains Garden Club met on Friday, June 5, 2015 at the home of Larry and Judy Killgo for a garden tour.

The Killgo's warmly welcomed Garden Club members Diana Miller, Russ Miller, Carlene Howard, Johnny Howard, Sarah Stone, Debbie Eudy and additional guest Cher Ptacek into their lovely home for an informal discussion prior to beginning the garden tour. This was the Garden Club's second year to tour the Killgo's garden and the following includes last year's as well as this year's additional tips from Larry who enjoys all types of gardening; his lifelong passion is raising vegetable gardens.

Larry began by saying it has been a tough year for vegetable gardening with the cool, cloudy and wet weather. He had to take his potatoes out early. Larry recommends adding plenty of organic matter to the soil. This includes leaves, manure and all unused vegetable parts "green manure". When adding other composted materials he avoids any that include Bermuda grass hay. Larry also adds wood ash to his soil but cautions that it will change soil from acidic to alkaline so you will want to test your soil ph after a heavy or repeated application. Larry typically rototills his garden in early spring to loosen the soil and get rid of winter weeds. He'll till again just prior to planting to remove newly germinating

Production of flavorful tomatoes is probably his favorite ongoing gardening experiment. He's found that he most enjoys Sun Gold thus far - slightly larger than a cherry tomato and gold in color. Last year he began planting several varieties in addition to Sun Gold including heirloom.

The species is named after Alexander the Great, who is credited with the exporting of numerous specimens of this bird from Punjab into various European and Mediterranean countries and regions, where they were considered

prized possessions for the nobles and royalty.

The species name eupatria has its origins from Greek. Where the prefix eu translates into good or noble and the suffix patria is a Greek word translating as either fatherland or ancestry. Consequently, the species' scientific name means something in the line "of noble ancestry", "of noble fatherland" or "of noble nation". The species has naturalized itself in numerous European countries. Particularly in Germany, in the south of England, in Belgium, in Greece, in western Turkey and in the Netherlands where it generally lives amongst or alongside flocks of naturalized Psittacula krameri (ringnecked or rose-ringed parakeet). 

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

Governor Abbott signs legislation expanding Texans' second admendment rights

AUSTIN - Governor Greg Abbott, signed HB 910 (Phillips, R-Sherman; Estes, R-Wichita Falls) and SB 11 (Birdwell, R-Granbury; Fletcher, R-Cypress), which expand Texans' Second Amendment rights. Both bills implement proposals in the Governor's Bicentennial Blueprint.

HB 910, known as "open carry," authorizes individuals with a license to carry a holstered handgun openly in all locations that allow the concealed handgun. SB 11, known as "campus carry" authorizes individuals with a license to carry a concealed handgun on campuses of public institutions of higher education.

"Today I am proud to expand liberty in the Lone Star State," said Governor Abbott. "By signing these bills into law, Texans can be assured that their Second Amendment rights will be stronger and more secure than ever before."


Governor Abbott signs legislation expanding Texans' second amendment rights

AUSTIN - Governor Greg Abbott, signed HB 910 (Phillips, R-Sherman; Estes, R-Wichita Falls) and SB 11 (Birdwell, R-Granbury; Fletcher, R-Cypress), which expand Texans' Second Amendment rights. Both bills implement proposals in the Governor's Bicentennial Blueprint.

HB 910, known as "open carry," authorizes individuals with a license to carry a holstered handgun openly in all locations that allow the


licensed carrying of a concealed handgun. SB 11, known as "campus carry" authorizes individuals with a license to carry a concealed handgun on campuses of public institutions of higher education.


Texas Concealed Handgun License class


