

Charles Anderson "Anse" Barr

Charles Anderson "Anse" Barr, age 97, passed away peacefully June 27, 2015 at Holiday Hill Nursing Home in Coleman, Texas. Anse was born June 9, 1918 to Charlie and Essie Dee Barr. He attended school in Cross Plains, Texas and was a member of the Cross Plains Buffalo football team.

In January 1942, Anse enlisted in the Army Air Force as a member of the 86th Fighter Group, 12th Air Force P47 Thunderbolt Fighter Group. As crew chief for the air ship "Bunny", which flew 102 missions over enemy territory, Anse was awarded the President's Citation Ribbon, six Bronze Stars and the EAME Campaign Medal. Anse was honored for leadership qualities Lieutenant Colonel Commander George Lee, and was part of Watson Wizards, the first US jet unit. Honorably discharged in September 1945, Anse returned home to work in the oil industry for Roy Arrwood

In 1953 he married Lucille Edington Holland, and her two

daughters Barbara Ann and Jo Ellen became their girls. They bought a farm in Cross Cut, Texas and Anse continued to work in the oil industry while farming and raising cattle. He was the best Grandad to his three grandchildren, teaching them to fish, swim and drive.

During retirement, Anse and Lucille moved to town and he served on the Cross Plains City Council and was a member and deacon of First Presbyterian Church. Years later, they moved to Care Nursing Home in Brownwood, Texas to be closer to doctors. In 2008 they became residents of Holiday Hill Nursing Home in Coleman, Texas, where they enjoyed many happy days together playing dominoes and listening to Elvis.

Anse is survived by his wife Lucille; two daughters, Ann Long of Brownwood and Jo Ellen Barr and husband James of Coleman; grandsons Donald Charles Long of San Antonio and Jody Barr of Coleman; granddaughter Leslie Barr Janca and husband I.G. of Georgetown; great-grandsons Sam Janca and wife Kaci of San Angelo and George Janca of Georgetown; great-granddaughter Reagan Barr Hadden and husband Matt of Coleman; Great-Great-Grandsons Luke and Connor Hadden of Coleman; nieces Charlsye Barr Morris of Brownwood, Dorothy Barr Arnwine of Merkel, Linda Lair of Belton, and Emma Dee Worthy Coppinger of Miles; Billy Doris Harris of Baird; and numerous great nieces and nephews.

Clara Julia McInnis 1913-2015

Clara Julia **McInnis**

Clara Julia McInnis of Mason, Texas, passed away on Thursday, June 25, 2015, at the age of 101. She was born on November 23rd, 1913, in Travis County, Texas, to Alfred and Emma Gertsman Rosenbusch, and was the third of eight

Clara's family operated a small farm in the community of Mudd (Pace Bend), Texas, and spoke only German until the children started school. She met Dayton McInnis at a local dance and after a short courtship they declared their love for each other and married on January 29th, 1935. They settled in the Spicewood community and began a ranching/farming career. Money was scarce for the newlyweds so a generous uncle loaned them \$200 to buy furniture with enough left over to supply them in groceries for about a year. Their first home was a small 4-room clapboard house with no insulation. In the winter they would take turns getting up each morning to start a fire in the woodstove, and many times food left on the counter would be frozen by morning. At 11:05 AM on October 17, 1938, they welcomed their first daughter, Virginia Carroll. Four years later, at 11:05 AM on June 14, 1942, Janice Marie came into their lives. Their son David Russell was born at 11:05 AM on June 6, 1946, completing their

Clara and Dayton spent 37 years farming and ranching in Spicewood, and in 1972 sold the property and relocated in Cottonwood in Callahan County, Texas, where they raised and sold registered Red Brangus cattle. Dayton died in 1992 and Clara sold the herd, but remained on the ranch until 2007 when she moved to Mason to be near her daughter, Virginia. Her time in Mason was made exceptionally happy by the many wonderful friends she made, as well as times spent in Ft. Worth and Dallas visiting her daughter Janice and her family and in Carlsbad, NM, visiting her son David and his family.

Clara experienced much progress and many changes in the 101+ years she lived on this earth. There was the introduction of telephones, electricity, indoor plumbing, television and numerous technological changes. She lived through the Great Depression, World War II and saw her only son go off to war in Viet Nam. She witnessed the evolution of the automobile and, being born only 10 years after the Wright Brothers made their first flight, also witnessed the progression of air travel to space travel and astronauts walking on the moon.

She and Dayton managed through the drought of the 50's with their ranch intact, although Dayton was forced to drive to Austin each day for several years Hospice of the Big Country, or to work as a carpenter, leaving the farm and ranch work almost solely to Clara; however, even with this additional workload she continued to tend her vegetable garden, sew for the three children and run the household on her own, all of which is a testament to her fortitude and perseverance. When asked how she accomplished all this she simply said,

> "I just did what I had to do, and the Lord was always with me".

Clara selflessly shared her faith in God, her love, and her time. Her legacy will live on in the hearts of her family, friends and community.

Clara was preceded in death by her husband Dayton McInnis; brothers Walter, Raymond, Edwin, and infant Arthur Rosenbusch; sister Alma Naumann; and great grandson, Trey Jacks. She is survived by her daughters Virginia Durst and Kenneth of Mason, Janice Bristow and David of Fort Worth and son David McInnis and Patty of Carlsbad, NM. She is also survived by sisters Frieda Hinson and Hilda Rylander, sister-in-law Margie Rosenbusch, and grandchildren Kathy Ross and Mike, Janie Smith and Kenneth, Mike Durst and Keryn, Dane McInnis, Kacy Zaleski and Steve, Amy Kitchens and Wesley, David McInnis II and Danna Andrews and Shane.

Great grandchildren include Amanda, Robert, Andrew, and Daniel Durst; Tristan and Zackary Zaleski, Tia and Jason Kitchens; Matthew, Mark, and Laura Ross; Melissa Bennett, Katy Mulkey and Logan, Samantha Auten, Kristen Auten, and Jacob Groening; Walker McInnis, Grant and Reagan Jacks, Kennedy Andrews; and Brittany McInnis.

Great great grandchildren are Clara, Dayton and Jaxson Mulkey; Hailee Blocker; Trevor Bennett, and Addilyn Ernst; numerous nieces and nephews, and special friends Mary Ellen Merkel and Earlene Bode.

Clara remained a member of the Cottonwood Baptist Church, but attended the Art United Methodist Church for the 8 years she lived in Mason.

Funeral services were held on Monday, June 29, at 10:00 a.m. at the Art United Methodist Church with Rev. John Alsbrooks leading the service. Interment followed in the Gooch Cemetery. Serving as pallbearers



Callahan County's jobless rate rises to 3.9% in May 2015

lahan County increased twotenths of one percent to 3.9% in May 2015, according to jobless figures released Friday, June 26th by the Texas Workforce Commission. The unemployment rate in Callahan County one year ago in May 2014 was 3.6 percent.

Callahan County's unemployment rate was 3.7% in April, 2015.

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County included: 4.1% in March 2015, 4.0% in February, 4.1% in January 2015, 3.1% in December 2014, 3.4% in November 2014, 3.6% in October 2014, 3.9% in September, 4.1% in August, 4.1% in July, and 4.1% in June, according to the unemployment figures.

Big Country area counties, bordering Callahan County, and the counties' unemployment rates for May 2015 include: Brown, 4.1%; Coleman, 5.6%; Eastland, 4.3%; Jones, 5.3%; Runnels, 3.3%; Shackelford, 2.3%; Stephens, 3.9%; and Taylor County, 3.5%.

The Abilene MSA (Metropolitan Statistical Area) unemployment rate, which includes Taylor, Callahan and Jones Counties, stood at 3.7% in May, 2015, according to the Texas Workforce Commission. The Abilene MSA Combined Labor Force is 76,500. There were 73,700 employed during May 2015, while 2,800 were unemployed, giving the Abilene MSA an unemployment rate of

The Abilene MSA reported the workforce was 76,800 in April, 2015. Total employment of 74,200 was reported in April 2015, while 2,600, or 3.4% were unemployed in April 2015.

The Abilene MSA unemployment rate for May, 2014 was 4.3%. The total workforce was reported at 77,500, with 74,100 employed and 3,400 or 4.3% unemployed in May, 2014.

The state's unemployment rate for the month of May, 2015 was 4.1 percent. The total Texas labor force was 13,114,000 in May 2015. The total number of Texans employed is 12,575,300. The total number of unemployed Texans was 538,700 in May 2015.

Last month's statewide unemployment rate was 4.0 percent in April 2015. The state's unemployment rate in May of 2014 was 5.0 percent.

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
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
Mallard Duck

Some animals are so uncommonly observed that people who have lived in an area their entire life have never seen it, or even know that it exists. However, there are other species of wildlife that is so recognizable, even those not familiar with the outdoors will be aware of it. DPS Increasing DWI Patrols for July 4th Holiday

Department of Public Safety (DPS) will increase DWI patrols for a 12-day period that includes the July 4th holiday. From June 26 - July 7, DPS troopers will focus DWI patrols in high-risk locations at times when alcoholrelated crashes are most

"As Texans make their plans for the Fourth of July, DPS is urging everyone to enjoy the holiday responsibly," said DPS Director Steven McCraw.

"Driving while impaired can have deadly consequences, so Texans who plan to drink alcohol should always designate a sober driver or choose alternate forms transportation. During the holiday, DPS troopers will be increasing patrols to help keep travelers safe and take

dangerous drivers off the road." During the 2014 July 4th enforcement period, DPS troopers made more than 1,050 DWI arrests during the enforcement period. Of those arrests, 219 were the direct result of a Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) grant, which allowed increased patrols in high-risk locations during times when alcohol-related crashes are most frequent. During the same period, DPS enforcement also resulted in more than 15,000 speeding citations and more than 2,500 seat belt/child safety seat

According to TxDOT, in 2014 more than 1,000 people in Texas were killed in motor vehicle crashes involving a driver who was under the influence of alcohol, accounting for 29

Potluck Spareribs

Prep Time: 10 Minutes Bake Time: One and one-half hours Ingredients:

- * 6 pounds pork spareribs
- * 1 1/2 cups ketchup
- * 3/4 cup packed brown sugar
- 1/2 cup white vinegar
- 1/2 cup honey
- 1/3 cup soy sauce
- 1 1/2 teaspoons ground ginger
- * 1 teaspoon salt
- * 3/4 teaspoon ground mustard
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic powder
- * 1/4 teaspoon pepper



Directions

- * Cut ribs into serving-size pieces; place with the meaty side up on racks in two greased 13-inch x 9-inch baking pans. Cover tightly with foil. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 1/4 hours or until meat is tender.
- * Remove racks; drain and return ribs to pans. Combine the remaining ingredients; pour over ribs. Bake, uncovered, for 30-40 minutes or until sauce coats ribs, basting occasionally. Ribs can also be grilled over medium-hot heat for the last 30-40 minutes instead of baking. Yield: 12 servings.




