Cross Plains ISD wins Lone Star Cup award in Class A

sity Interscholastic League an- take place in the fall at events nounced the six winners of the 2014-15 UIL Lone Star Cup presented by State Farm on Wednesday.

Cross Plains High School secured its first Conference 1A UIL Lone Star Cup victory with a costate championship in girls track and field, a state runner-up finish in academics and one-act play and a regional semifinalist in girls basketball.

In Conference 6A, Southlake Carroll High School won its sixth overall and fourth consecutive UIL Lone Star Cup earning 100 total points. The Dragon boys cross country, golf and swimming and diving teams each took home state championships while the girls cross country team placed fourth at state. Southlake Carroll won district and regional championships in academics and had regional finalist teams in football and girls soc-

Reigning marching band state champion, Austin Vandegrift, added state titles in boys golf and girls swimming and diving on its way to the first Conference 5A UIL Lone Star Cup victory in school history. In addition to top five finishes at state in girls golf and boys swimming and diving, the Vipers were also state finalists in girls soccer and state semifinalists in football.

Argyle High School set a school record with 127 UIL Lone Star Cup points after earning state championships in academics, baseball, girls basketball, boys golf, and marching band. The Eagles were also state finalists in volleyball and football. The Conference 4A cup victory is Argyle's fourth consecutive and sixth overall.

The Brock Eagles took home their third overall UIL Lone Star Cup trophy, first in Conference 3A, by setting a school record for points in the competition with 75. Brock won state championships in boys basketball and boys golf, were state finalists in volleyball and regional finalists in football.

Also earning their third UIL Lone Star Cup award was Conference 2A winner Shiner High School, which last won in 2002. The Comanches are reigning state champions in marching band, won the softball state title and placed in the top five at state in girls track and field.

The UIL Lone Star Cup recognizes six high schools (one in each of the six UIL conferences) based on their overall team achievement in a variety of sanctioned academic, athletic and music championships. All UIL member high schools in good standing are included for contention for the UIL Lone Star

Callahan County Clerk Donna also continue to publish "En-Bell reported Callahan County is now accepting same-sex marriage licenses at the Callahan County Courthouse in Baird.

John William (J.W.) "Mousy" Fore

J.W. "Mousy" Fore passed away on June 30, 2015 at the age

Graveside services were held at 10:00 a.m. at the Cross Plains

John William Fore (J.W.) was born on January 23, 1920 to John Franklin and Eula (Ellis) Fore in Pioneer, Texas. He attended all his school years there and graduated in 1937. As a boy J.W. played football, basketball and ran track. J.W, confided that he was better at basketball and track, as he never was a

heavyweight. J.W. accepted the Lord as a

youth and was baptized in Pioneer lake. J.W. and several other students helped build the Pioneer Community Center which now houses the Pioneer Quilting Club. This building project was to teach students building skills and good work ethics. Shortly after graduation, J.W. joined the U.S. Army. He went to Camp Campbell in Kentucky for training and then from there to maneuvers at Camp Barkley in Abilene, Texas. He was shipped out of Camp Shanks in New York on a troop ship called the "Tasker H. Bliss" and landed in England. They stayed there two weeks and crossed the English Channel into France. Then they started the campaign. The troops fought from England into France, across Germany and into Austria, to the Bavarian Alps were J.W. and his division were when the war ended in 1946.

J.W.'s division liberarted several German concentration camps and witnessed the atrocities against the Jews, and captured American soldiers. The 12th Armored Division was assigned under General Patton's Command. They were known as the Mystery Division.

Upon returning home in 1946, J.W. went to work for the gasoline refinery plant Rudco Oil and Gas in Pioneer. Long time friend Roy Stambaugh worked there also after his service in the army. After working for Rudco for 20 years, he operated the Mobil gas station on the corner of highway 36 in Cross Plains for 20 years.

Lifetime Pioneer friend Bob Dean and J.W. rode Harley Davidson motorcycles to the Gulf of Mexico and stopped with their front tires in the ocean. On another adventure J.W., Bob, Tommie Burl Conlee and Dean Tyler rode their motorcycles into New Mexico and toured the Carlsbad Caverns.

J.W. was the best man at Bob and Nelda (Purvis) Dean's wedding and Johnnie Mae Meador was maid of honor. That was the starting point of there dating and they married April 13,


Pioneer Quilting Club Announces "Kansas Sunflowers" Quilt Winner


The Great Plains Skink (Plestiodon [Eumeces] obsoletus) is one of eight species of skinks that live in Texas, and it has the largest area of distribution. It occurs throughout the western 3/4 of the state; roughly defined occurring west of an imaginary line drawn from the DFW southward. Outside of Texas, it occurs northward to southern Nebraska, westward to central Arizona, and southward to the central plateau regions of Mexico.

The habitats that this sleek lizard prefers are the grasslands and prairies of the Panhandle that have small rocky areas and other surface debris under which it can hide. It can also be observed in rocky areas in the arid to semi-arid sandy regions of the Trans-Pecos and Edwards Plateau eco-regions.

'Mass of Remembrance' will be held in Clyde to honor Marine Lance Corporal Miguel (Mike) Hernandez Keith on July 11, 2015 at St. Joachim/St. Ann Catholic Church

A "Mass of Remembrance" highest award for bravery that Church in Clyde, to honor Marine Lance Cpl. Miguel (Mike) Hernandez Keith, son of Eliadora Delores Keith of Baird.

Portions of this article were given to each of five families as they were awarded the Medal of Honor for their sons' heroism.

Washington, D.C. September 9, 1971 (USMC)- Five Marines who were killed in Vietnam were posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor today, during a ceremony held in the Indian Treaty Room, Executive Office building, adjacent to the White House.

The families of the five Marines, were presented the Nation's highest award "The Medal of Honor" by Vice President Spiro T. Agnew.

Eliadora Keith of Baird, lost her son in Vietnam. LCpl. Miguel Keith was born in Texas, but later the family moved to Omaha, so close were Keith and Omahan John Easly that Easly lived with the Keith Family. The boys went to school together.

Miguel later joined the Marines and shiped out to Vietnam and John Easly stayed in Omaha. One evening Easly was

told him he'd better get home. Easly said when he saw the Marine Corp. vehicle in front of the Keith home he knew his buddy was dead.

Keith is buried at Forest Lawn Cemetery in Omaha, NE.

Mary Easly, John's wife will attend the "Mass of Remembrance" here in Clyde and take Miguel's medals back to Omaha to a museum near where he is buried and the Lance Corporal Miguel (Mike) Hernandez Keith Park is located.

LCpl. Miguel Keith was killed in action on May 8, 1970 while serving as a machine gunner with Combined Action Platoon 1-3-2, 3rd Marine Amphibious Force.

Keith suffered injuries in a ground attack when his unit came under heavy attack by a large enemy force.

Despite his wounds, LCpl. Keith crossed a fire-swept area to check vital defensive positions and then, exposed to enemy view, dispersed them with a hail of machine gun fire to stop an attack against the command post.

Keith was severely wounded again by a grenade blast, but attacked again, charging more than two dozen enemy troops who were massing to attack, eliminating five of them, and causing the remainder of the group to flee for cover.

Keith was mortally wounded by an enemy soldier while breaking up this attack. Keith was just 18 years old.

Survivors include his mother and step-father, Mr. and Mrs. Bobbie B. Keith of Baird, Texas and his father Miguel Hernandez, San Antonio. The Medal of Honor is the

Celebration will be held here on can be given to any individual July 11, 2015, at the St. in the United States. In judging Joachin/St. Ann Catholic men for receipt of the medal, each service has established its own regulations. The deed must be proved by incontestable evidence of at least two eyewitnesses; it must be so outstanding that it clearly distinguishes the recipient's gallantry beyond the call of duty from lesser forms of bravery; it must involve the risk of his life; and it must be the type of deed which, if he had not done it, would not subject him to any justified criticism.

The idea for the Medal of Honor was born during the Civil War as men fought gallantly and often times displayed great heroism. George Washington originated the "Purple Heart" in 1782 to honor brave soldiers, sailors and marines. From that time until the Civil War, Certificates of Merit and a "brevet" system of promotions were authorized by the American Government as a badge of valor was the Medal of Honor for enlisted men of the Navy and Marine Corps. It was authorized by Congress and approved by President Abraham Lincoln on December 21, 1861. The medal for the Army and Voluntary Forces was authorized on July 12,

The medal is awarded "in the name of the Congress of the United States" and for this reason, it is often called the Congressional Medal of Honor. It is only on rare occasions, however, that Congress awards special Medals of Honor. An Executive Order, signed by President Theodore Roosevelt on September 20, 1905, directed that cememonies of award "will always be made with formal and impressive ceremonial" and that the "will, recipient when practicable, be ordered to Washington, D.C. and the presentation will be made by the President, as Commander in Chief, or by such representative as the President may designate."

The Navy Medal of Honor is made of bronze, suspended by an anchor from a bright blue ribbon, and is worn about the neck. The ribbon is spangled with a cluster of 13 white stars representing the original States. Each ray of the five pointed star contains sprays of laurel and oak and is tipped with a trefoil. Standing in bas-relief, circled by 34 stars representing the 34 States in 1861, is Minerva who personifies the Union. She holds in her left hand the fasces, an ax bound in staves of wood, which is the ancient Roman symbol of authority. With the shield in her right hand, she repulses the serpents held by the crouching figure of Discord. The reverse of the medal is left blank, allowing for the engraving of the recipient's name and the date and place of his deed.

The President of the United States in the name of The Congress takes pride in presenting the MEDAL OF HONOR posthumously to LANCE CORPORAL MIGUEL KEITH, UNITED STATE MARINE CORP CITATION:

For conspicious gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty while serving as a machine gunner with Combined Action Platoon 1-3-2, III Marine Ampibious force, operating in Quang Ngai Province, Republic of Vietnam. During the early morning of 8 May, 1970, Lance Corporal Kieth was seriously wounded when his platoon was subjected to a heavy ground attack by a greatly outnumbering enemy force. Despite his painful wounds, he ran across the fire-swept terrain to check the security of vital defensive positions, and then, while completely exposed to view, proceeded to deliver a hail of devastating machine gun fire against the enemy. Determined to stop five of the enemy approaching the command post, he rushed forward, firing as he advanced. He succeded in disposing of three of the attackers and in dispersing the remaining two.

At this point, a grenade detonated near Lance Corporal Keith, knocking him to the ground and inflicting further severe wounds.

Fighting pain and weakness from loss of blood, he again braved the concentrated hostile fire to charge an estimated twenty-five enemy soldiers who were massing to attack. The vigor of his assault and his well-placed fire eliminated five of the enemy while the remainder fled for cover. During this valiant effort, he was mortally

wounded by an enemy soldier. By his courageous and inspiring performance in the face of almost overwhelming odds, Lance Corporal Keith contibuted in large measure to the success of his platoon in routing a numerically superior enemy force, and upheld the finest traditions of the Marine Corps and of the United Sattes Naval Service.

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

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Same-Sex Couples Marrying or Soon to Marry in 80% of Texas Counties

Austin, Texas -Nearly 80% of Texas Counties are either already making marriage licenses available to same-sex couples or are planning to make licenses available shortly after technical changes to software and physical marriage certificates as of Tuesday, June 30th, according to Texas for Marriage.

Texas for Marriage staff called counties across Texas on Tuesday, June 30th to determine whether clerks were offering marriage licenses to same-sex couples. 149 counties out of 254 — nearly 60% — indicated over the phone that they were already making marriage licenses available to same-sex couples. Those counties are listed below.

"Nearly sixty percent of Texas clerks are following the law by making marriage licenses available," said Nick Hudson. "We are encouraged by the swift implementation of the Supreme Court's ruling by most counties, but we won't stop pushing until every clerk in Texas complies with the law and makes licenses available to loving and committed gay and lesbian couples."

In addition to the 149 counties offering marriage licenses to same-sex couples on Tuesday, 46 counties indicated that they plan to issue marriage licenses to same-sex couples after making updates to software and physical marriage certificates. Most said they expected changes to be made this week.

"All county clerks should make licenses available to couples who come in, because that is what the law requires," said Nick Hudson.

At least one county clerk -Kim Wells in San Saba County — had indicated on Monday that she would not be making marriage licenses available to samesex couples because of personal religious beliefs. On Tuesday, Wells reversed course by joining the majority of Texas counties making licenses available to same-sex couples.

"Religious liberty is a fundamental right protected by the First Amendment," said Nick Hudson. "But that doesn't mean that government officials can use their personal religious beliefs to avoid following the law regarding marriage.


