School Lunch Program

The Cross Plains Independent School District participates in the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Program. Children in the households receving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits (formerly the Food Stamp Program) or TANF can get free meals regardless of your income. Your benefit letter from the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) is your documentation for free meals. If you have not already received a letter from your school stating that your household is eligible for free meals, you may take your HHSC benefit letter to the reviewing official to be certified for free meals. If a child in your household is directly certified due to receiving SNAP or TANF benefits, all childre in your household are eligible for free meals. If you have questions, call the school at 254-725-6121 to speak to Tammie Tennison, the reviewing afficial.

Your childen can get free or reduced price meals if your household income is within the limits on the Federal Income Chart. For an application and Income Chart, please call or come by the school offices and one will be provided to you. Application forms will be mailed out to every enrolled student's household. Only one application per household should be completed; all children in the housedhold can be included on one form.

Children need healthy meals to learn. CROSS PLAINS ISD offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs \$1.151; lunch costs Pre-k through 6th grade \$2.00 and 7th grade through 12th grade \$2.30. Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced-price meals. Reduced-price is .30cents for breakfast and .40cents for lunch. If you received a notification letter that a child is directly certified for free meals, do not complete an application. Let the school know if any children in the household attending school are not listed in the letter.

The questions and answers that follow and attached directions provide additional information on how to complete the application. Complete only one application io. all the students in the household and return the completed application to Cross Plains ISD 700 N. Main, Cross Plains, Texas 76443. If you have questions about applying for free or reduced-price meals call (254)-725-6121 Tammie Tennison .

1. Who Can Get Free Meals?

- Income-Children can get free or reduced-price meals if a household's gross income is within the limits described in the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines.
- Special Assistance Program Participants Children in households receiving benefits from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), are eligible for free meals.
- Foster -- Foster children who are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals.
- · Head Start, Early Head Start, and Even Start-Children participating in these programs are eligible for free meals.
- · Homeless, Runaway, and Migrant-Children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant qualify for free meals. If you haven't been told about a child's status as herneless, runaway, or migrant or you feel a child may qualify for one of these programs, please call or email Stacy Jones, homeless
- liaison and migrant coordinator at (254)-725-6121. · WIC Recipient -- Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
- 2. What If I Disagree With the School's Decision About My Application? Talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to PHIL MITCHELL, SUPERINTENDENT, 700 N MAIN, CROSS PLAINS, TX (254) 725-6121

3. My Child's Application Was Approved Last Year. Do I Need To Fill Out A New One? Yes. An application is only good for that school year and for the first few days of this school year. Send in a new application unless the school has told you that your child is eligible for the new school year.

4. If I Don't Qualify Now, May I Apply Later? Yes. Apply at any time during the school year. A child with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free and reduced-price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.

- 5. What If My Income Is Not Always the Same? List the amount normally received. If a household member lost a job or had hours/wages reduced, use current income.
- 6. We Are in The Military. Do We Report Our Income Differently? Basic pay and cash bonuses must be reported as income. Any cash value allowances for offbase housing, food, or clothing, or Family Subsistence Supplemental Allowance payments count as income. If housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include the housing allowance as income. Any additional combat pay resulting from deployment is excluded from incom
- 7. May 1 Apply If Someone in My Household Is Not a U.S. Citizen? Yes. You, your children, or other household members do not have to be U.S. citizens to apply for free or reduced-price meals.
- 8. Will Application Information Be Checked? Yes. We may also ask you to send written proof of the reported household income
- 9. My Family Needs More Help. Are There Other Programs We Might Apply For? To find out how to apply for other assistance benefits, contact your local assistance office or 2-1-1.





19 More Texas Counties Eligible for FEMA Public Assistance

AUSTIN, Texas - Nineteen more Texas counties are now eligible for Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) disaster aid. The aid includes all categories of work, including debris removal, emergency protective measures and infrastructure repairs in the wake of severe storms, tornadoes, straight line winds and flooding in Texas from May 4 to June 22.

Eligible applicants in **Bosque**, Brazoria, Collingsworth, Colorado, Coryell, Duval, Erath, Hall, Hardin, Jim Wells, Lubbock, McLennan, Palo Pinto, Shelby, Smith, Somervell, Tom Green, Washington and Young counties can now apply for FEMA Public Assistance (PA) reimbursement for repairs to roads and bridges, water control facilities, city- and county-owned buildings and equipment, utilities, parks and recreational facilities and other public as well as some private facilities.

Supplementary funding under the PA program goes to the state and its agencies, local governments, and certain private nonprofit organizations. Under the program, FEMA obligates funds to the state for 75 percent of eligible costs, with the state and local governments sharing the remaining 25 percent of costs. The state forwards the federal funds to the eligible local governments or organizations that incurred costs

In a down economy with rising gas prices, many can't afford to take vacations that involve air travel. For that reason, many people were pleasantly surprised when they received a letter from their national airline company offering two free flights worth almost \$1300.


The letter states that the company tried to contact the reader many times without success. They then advise the reader to call a toll-free number to claim their flight vouchers. When the reader calls the number a high-pressured salesperson advises the reader of the necessity of attending a presentation about the company in order to claim the flight vouchers.

How to avoid:

When receiving any correspondence promising something for nothing, beware. You will

most likely be pressured in to making a purchase that is often more expensive than the price of two legitimate airline tickets. The Better Business Bureau reports that these letters are on the upswing, so be on the lookout. Your best bet if you receive one is to throw it away. You can also report the scam on this page: Federal Trade Commission Report.

Scams can come in many different ways: letters, emails, or even phone calls, they may ask for your personal information such as your drivers licences number, social security number, credit card information or ever you bank account information such as account number and routing number. Never give out your personal information. Remember if it seems to good to be true it likely is.


Commissioners set two public hearings on 2015 proposed tax rate





The games began on Sunday afternoon, July 26th with "Gun Check-in" and ended on Saturday afternoon, August 1st with "Awards".



Paper Shuffling Pays Off -An individual stopped by the Brownwood law enforcement office asking for information on his boat so he could report it as stolen. Office clerks were helping the customer when they realized the boat had been registered the week before in the customer's name but with a different address. The clerks showed the paperwork to a game warden, who began a search for the stolen vessel. When he found the boat, the suspected thief admitted partial guilt. Other suspects were interviewed, but the vessel was returned to its rightful owner.

Turn Around, Don't Drown -A Brown County man ignored warning signs, drove his pickup truck across a flooded roadway and was swept away. A deputy saw the pickup floating downstream with the man on top of the cab, until at one point the water became too strong and the man fell in. The deputy observed the man being washed downstream with a blue bag in hand until he was out of sight. Two wardens launched their boat and began a search and rescue, which continued for several days with no luck. Eventually, they found the blue bag, and then recovered the body of the 61year-old disabled vet from under a pile of logs.

The Disappearing Child -Small children standing up in cars tend to attract attention. A small child did just that when a Williamson County game warden passed by on his way to Austin. The warden waited for the car to pass him so he could get a better look, but by that


The following items are com- When he passed them again, he piled from recent Texas Parks looked into the back seat and could not see the child or a child seat. He pulled the driver over and found the kid hiding on the back floorboard and the driver without a license. When asked if she had ever been ticketed for her lack of license, the lady replied she had been ticketed a couple of times and even had a warrant for her arrest. The warden instructed her to find licensed drivers who could bring a car seat, and she said he sister would be there in 20 mir. utes. But almost 45 minutes later, the sister arrived on foot to drive the car back, but without a child's seat. The warden called for a wrecker who took possession of the vehicle, and the driver was placed under arrest for her warrant and was issued two citations: one for driving without a driver's license, and one for the child not in a seat.

> Two are Better Than One -An overturned yellow kayak caught the attention of two Bexar County game wardens on Calaveras Lake. While navigating the choppy water to examine the kayak, the wardens observed another kayaker waving his arms to get their attention with good reason. His 80-yearold friend had flipped out of the upturned kayak and had been floating for several minutes, exhausted. The wardens were able to get the elderly man and his friend out of the water and into their vessel. Both were taken to the bank where the San Antonio Fire Department was waiting to provide medical attention. Both of the friends checked out fine after some rest.

A Reason to Sweat - A red passenger van was driving slowly on the shoulder of the road near Dumas. A warden stopped the point, the child had disappeared. van and noticed a white crystal substance on the driver's shirt and a loaded syringe on the floorboard. The driver was confused and profusely sweating. The warden found 2.7 grams of liquid heroin in the syringe on the floorboard alongside .30 grams of methamphetamine. The driver, who had an invalid license, was arrested and taken to the Moore County Jail.

Uniform Doesn't Match the Badge - In Lubbock County, a man wearing a McDonald's uniform and claiming to be a police officer, was flashing a security guard badge as he asked for gas receipts for tax write-off purposes. A warden tracked him down, and he insisted, "You know me, I'm one of you, I'm an officer, too." He said he worked at the Lubbock County Sheriff's Office, but he had left his badge at the office. In reality, he was a volunteer in the ministry for the Lubbock County Sheriff's Office and possessed an expired security officer license and badge. An arrest warrant was obtained and he was booked for impersonating a public servant; as well as, a security officer.

More than One Reason -Two men with their watercrafts were stopped by wardens on Lake Georgetown for safety violations and expired licenses. The wardens were escorting them to their truck to retrieve their identifications, but after a brief exchange between the boaters, one of them took off at high speed. 




