
This is just one of many rave reviews for Dan L. Smith's The Bankhead Highway in Texas. You can meet Smith on Sept. 22 at 6:30 p.m. at the Cross Plains Senior Citizen's Center where he will speak for the Cross Plains Public Library's "Meet the Author" series.

A native of Miami, FL, Smith is a recognized historian who is retired and now resides in Fort Worth. His first encounter with the Bankhead Highway occurred while bicycling on the back roads in Parker County near Aledo. One narrow country road seemed to belie the nearby street sign which identified it as the Old Bankhead Highway. Few seemed to know much about the old road, and even less was known about the Bankhead Highway. Years later the author began his research which soon revealed the historical significance of the unassuming road. Originally referred to as Kuteman's Cutoff, the overgrown country lane he encountered had once been part of Texas Highway No. 1 and was a link in

the nation's first all-weather transcontinental highway. Travelers in the 1920s and 1930s also knew it as part of the "Broadway of America" and U.S. 80.

The Bankhead Highway in Texas adds to the documentation of one of America's most significant early highways. It also provides a guide to the earliest Bankhead route across the state. All along the way are remarkable stories yet to be told about the people who built and traveled the long road.


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
Garden Spider

Many species of spiders are so small and so non-descript that they are often just overlooked. However, there is a large species that occurs in west Texas that does not fit that bill.

Garden Spiders are a diverse group of spiders that can be found throughout the Americas, save for the coldest of the Arctic and Antarctic regions. Taxonomically speaking, these spiders belong to the family known as Araneidae, also known as the orb-weavers. In Texas, this family is represented by twentyseven genera and eighty-five species, while the species that are the best known in this area are the two species that belong to the genus Argiope.

Garden Spiders, like other species of arachnids, have a body that consists of two parts (the cephalothorax and the abdomen) as well as the customary eight legs. The dorsal coloration varies upon species, with the Yellow Garden Spider (Argiope aurantia) having an abdomen that is boldly marked with black and yellow, while the Banded Garden Spider's (Argiope trifasciata) coloration is not so distinct with light lines of yellow, species are long and spindly, the web and discarded. half of that of the female.



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Cross Plains 2015 retail sales higher by 5%

The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments in 2015 are just over five percent higher than 2014, according to the Texas State Comptroller's

Texas State Comptroller Glenn Hegar reported the city's sales tax payment on Wednesday, August 12th.

Cross Plains' 2015 sales tax payments for the year totalled \$161,586.99, which is 5.05 percent higher than the \$153,805.82 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2014.

The payment to the city for August 2015 was \$23,047.10, allocations to individual cities, amounting to \$783,017.19 which is 4.00 percent ahead of the \$22,159.58 payment made to Cross Plains in August 2014.

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said today, Wednesday, August 12th, he will send cities, coun- site ties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their August local sales tax allocations totalling \$760.2 million, which represents an increase of 7.6 percent compared to July

Hegar also said today that state sales tax revenue in July was \$2.4 billion, up 2.7 percent compared to July 2014

"July's modest growth in sales tax revenue is in line with the biennial revenue estimate issued in January," Hegar said. "Stronger growth in receipts from consumer driven sectors, including retail trade, restaurants and services offset declining receipts from oil and gas-related sectors.

Hegar will send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts their July local sales tax allocations totaling \$760.2 million, up 7.6 percent compared to August 2014 and 5.6 percent year-to-date.

Hegar sent Texas cities \$496.1 million in August 2015, which is higher by 7.2 percent compared to August 2014 and higher by 5.1 percent year-to-date.





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

Preserving Our Hunting Heritage in the Wake of CWD

By Jenny Sanders

We have long known certain deer breeding practices threaten native wildlife and hunting on a number of levels and the movement of captive deer around the state in livestock trailers creates significant risk to our wild deer population.

Texas hunters are still reeling from the June discovery of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD), an always fatal, highly contagious brain disease similar to Mad Cow disease, in a deer breeding facility in Medina County. The shocking reality is that deer from this one breeder have been shipped to 66 Texas counties, and during that time, CWD went undetected in his pens. There are approximately 100 animals in this facility that remain to be tested, while the source of the disease is still unknown. With 4 million wild deer in Texas, and a disease with no cure, we must ask ourselves--is the deer breeding industry worth the added risk?

Deer breeders represent a selfcentered, short-sighted industry that has been allowed to hide under the veil of legitimate wildlife management for far too long. They treat wild animals like livestock, and operate in a no-man's land where neither wildlife nor livestock rules apply. Deer breeders have only been compelled to conform to a more appropriate regulatory framework upon the discovery of CWD in a breeding

Letter from Belle Plain Belle Plain, June 22, 1882 Ed. Clarendon: By your permission I will give your readers a few notes from this

We have had a good rain here and in consequence crops are growing finely.

Belle Plain has been lively for the last few days, as there has been considerable traffic in the beef market. J. D. Merchant has had been buying cattle and selling horses, in fact he is the most active man I have ever met when he is doing business in his line.

Mr. Davidson has been branding and having his herd inspected preparatory to taking the trail.

Mr. Huffman gave me an invitation this evening to visit his farm and garden and I was agreeably surprised to find prospects for so good a crop. His market garden is situated just below a large tank from which the garden is irrigated. Mr. H. says he has gathered and sold six hundred pounds of onions and I should judge that he has twelve or fourteen hundred still growing, and besides he has other vegetables in abundance, such as beans, peas, tomatoes, cabbages and other things too numerous to mention; he has beets which average two and one fourth pounds each. From the garden we went to the house which is situated in a beautiful grove of oaks, and all unoccupied space is planted in shrubbery and shade trees; we next visited the orchard, which is planted in garden

stuff and looks well; his orchard consists principally of peach trees and they have considerable young fruit on them; he also has apple and pear trees and grape vines. We then went to the farm; and there again I was surprised, for in place of inferior land and poor crops, I found very good land and corn that promises thirty or forty bushels per acre, and oats (the White Prussian variety) that promise a yield of sixty bushels per acre. Mr. Huffman's farm and buildings are well arranged and he is prepared to enjoy his old age.

We had speaking this evening by one of our candidates for Congress, Mr. Silas C. Buck; he delivered a good speech on the political issues of the day, i. e. finance, import duties, revenues, national bank monopolies and railroads. Mr. Buck has a number of friends and acquaintances in this neighborhood and will perhaps get a good support here.

Our business men are doing a good business and your humble reporter is doing something in his line. I have





Government Intrusion at Its Worst

My husband and I have been ranching in South Texas for many years, and we have worked hard to care for the land my family lives on today. This same testament holds true for millions of other ranchers and landowners across the country.

Sadly, it seems like every time we turn around the federal government finds another way to try claiming the land and resources that constitutionally

One issue that has raged for years is the U.S. Bureau of Land along a 116-mile stretch of the Red River on the Texas-Oklahoma border. The Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association (TSCRA) has heard from members along the Red River who are worried about the federal government taking control of their land, and TSCRA shares their concern.

this property has been under its control since the 1803 Louisiana Purchase. Ironically, the federal government has surveyed land, and the results are highly questionable. The survey method they used differs greatly from the accepted gradient boundary survey method estab-

believe the BLM's claim to this property is completely bogus. Those who live and own agricultural operations on this stretch of land hold the deeds and continue paying the property taxes. 



2015 tax values continue to increase throughout County

Tax values in Callahan County increased just over five percent. according to Callahan County Appraisal District's Chief Appraiser Don Jones.

Jones presented 2015 tax values to all entities recently in Callahan County, including both schools and city municipalities. He said in Callahan County,

the tax values for the upcoming year increased 5.5 percent over 2014. He said the taxable values were up due to market value increases, new construction and utility value increase. Jones reported land values in the county remained the same from last year. He also reported oil tax values were down in 2015.

Jones said tax rates for all the entities in Callahan County are currently being established by the county, school districts and cities. Jones said property tax notices went out on May 18,

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Loaded Breakfast Potatoes

Prep Time: 45 minutes Bake Time: 10 Minutes

Ingredients:

- 6 medium baking potatoes (about 3 pounds)
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 each small sweet red, orange
- and green pepper, finely chopped 1 cup finely chopped fresh mushrooms
- * 1/4 cup finely chopped red onion
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- * 1/4 teaspoon pepper * 6 large eggs, beaten
- 1 1/4 cups (5 ounces) shredded cheddar cheese, divided
- 1/4 cup plus 6 tablespoons sour cream, divided
- 6 bacon strips, cooked and
- crumbled or 1/3 cup bacon bits
- 3 green onions, chopped



Directions

- 1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Scrub and pierce potatoes with a fork; place on a microwave-safe plate. Microwave, uncovered, on high 15-18 minutes or until tender, turning once.
- 2. When cool enough to handle, cut a thin slice off the top of each potato; discard slice. Scoop out pulp, leaving 1/4 in.-thick shells.
- 3. In a large skillet, heat butter over medium heat. Add peppers, mushrooms and red onion; cook and stir 4-6 minutes or until tender. Stir in salt, pepper and 1 cup pulp (save remaining pulp for another use). Add eggs; cook and stir until eggs are thickened and no liquid egg remains. Stir in 1/2 cup cheese and 1/4 cup sour
- Spoon egg mixture into potato shells. Place on a 15x10x1 in. baking pan. Sprinkle with remaining 3/4 cup cheese. Bake 10-12 minutes or until heated through and cheese is melted. Top with remaining sour cream; sprinkle with bacon and green onions. Yield: 6 servings.
