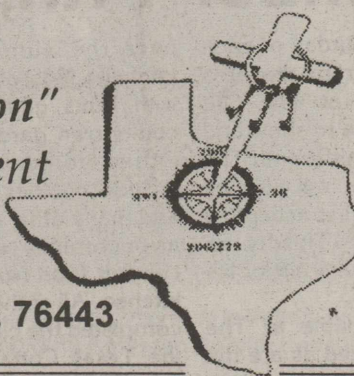

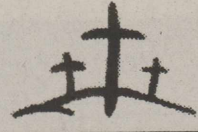

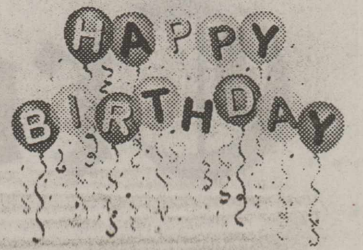

The Recipe Corner

Cheesy Ham Chowder

Prep Time: 30 Minutes Cook Time: 30 Minutes



Ingredients:

- * 10 bacon strips, diced
- * 1 large onion, chopped
- * 1 cup diced carrots
- * 3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- * 3 cups milk
- * 1 1/2 cups water
- * 2 1/2 cups cubed potatoes
- * 2 teaspoons chicken bouillon granules
- * Pepper to taste
- * 3 cups (12 ounces) shredded cheddar cheese
- * 2 cups cubed fully cooked ham



Directions

1. In a Dutch oven, cook the bacon over medium heat until crisp. Using a slotted spoon, remove to paper towels to drain. In the drippings, saute onion and carrots until tender. Stir in flour until blended. Gradually add milk and water. Bring to a boil; cook and stir for 2 minutes or until thickened.
2. Add the potatoes, corn, bouillon and pepper. Reduce heat; simmer, uncovered, for 20 minutes or until potatoes are tender. Add cheese and ham; heat until cheese is melted. Stir in bacon. Yield: 10 servings.

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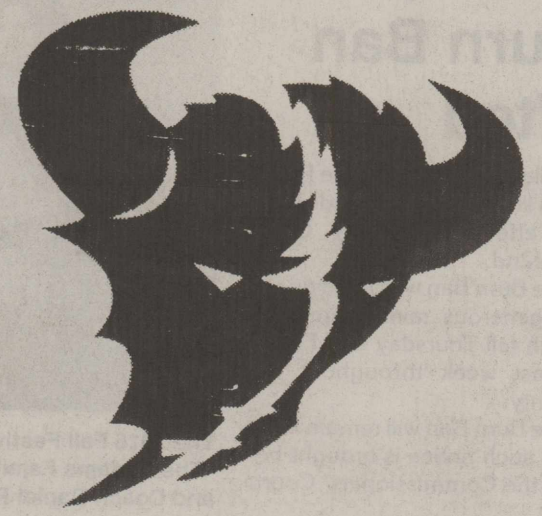

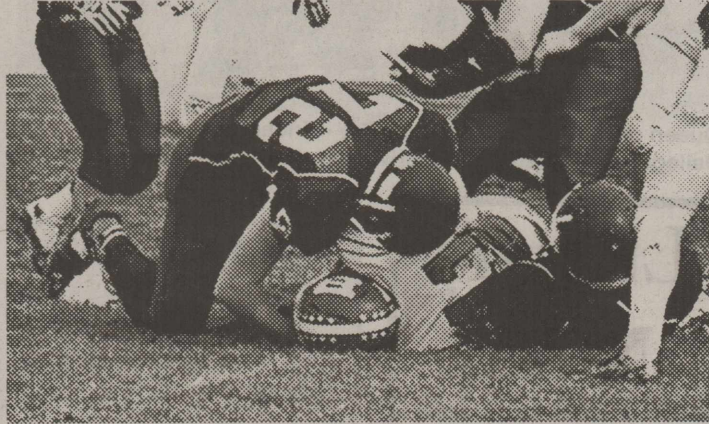

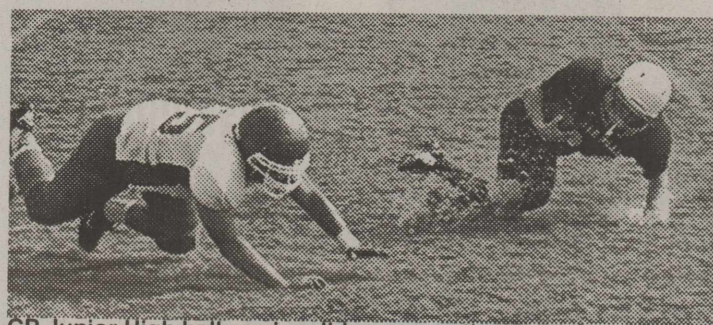

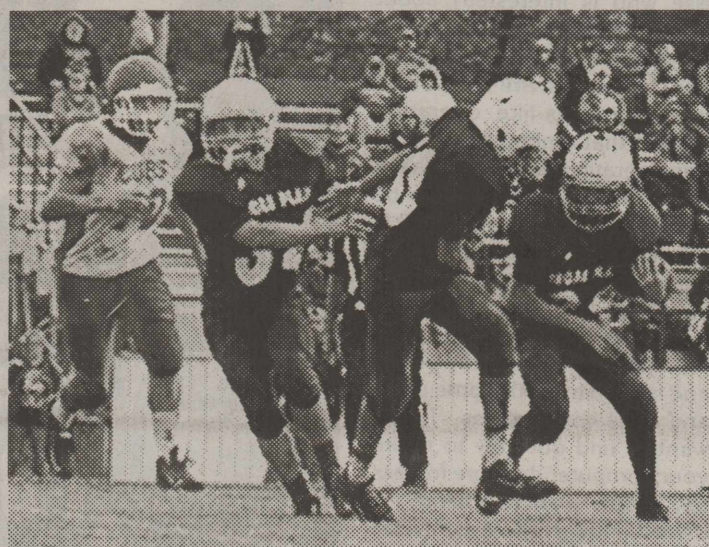

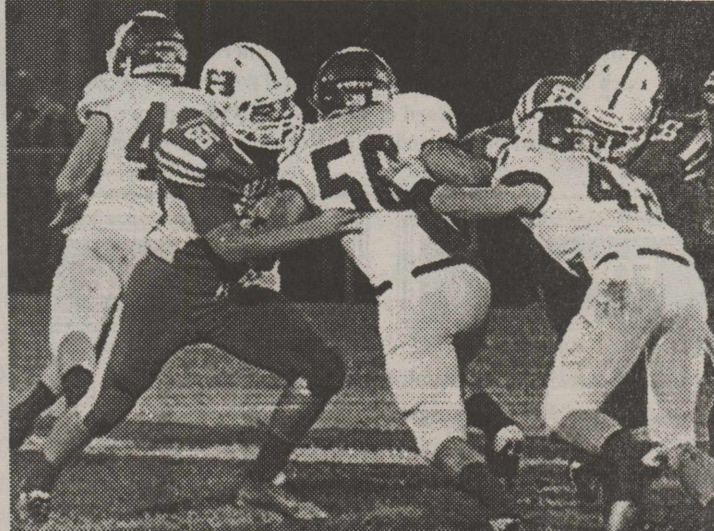

Callahan County Sheriff Terry Joy will seek Re-election

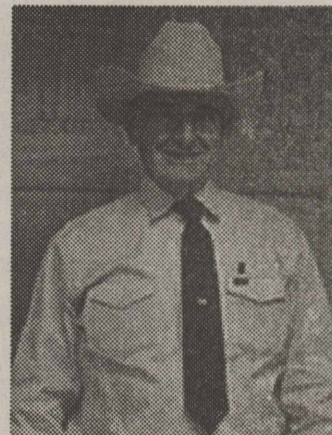
I will be seeking my second term as Sheriff of Callahan County. Now that the 2015 Constitutional Admendments Election is past and votes cast on important issues, focus can turn to the March 1, 2016, Primary Election. In that Election, I ask for your important vote.

I am a native of Callahan County, born in Baird, raised in Admiral and graduated from Baird High School. My wife, Lenora, is also a Callahan County native. She, too, was born in Baird and lived most of her life in Callahan County in the Eula area and in Baird.

I have dedicated most of my working life in Law Enforcement and the Criminal Justice System. I was a Police Officer in Lubbock, Texas, a Game Warden for the Great State of Texas, assigned to Llano County for 18 years. I was Captain Game Warden for 17 years supervising the San Angelo and Brownwood Districts.

I was elected Sheriff in the General Election of 2012, and for almost 3 years I have had the honor of being Sheriff of Callahan County.

I am a TCOLE Master Certified Peace Officer. I am certified to instruct other peace officers, and I am a Certified Firearms Instructor. I hold a Bachelor of Science Degree in Criminal Justice from Tarleton State University. 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Monarch Butterfly

For a naturalist, living in west Texas definitely has its share of fringe benefits. The diversity of the flora and fauna that can be observed here is nothing short of amazing. One of the amazing feats of nature west Texans are privy to are the roundtrip travels of a small insect. Of course, one does not have to be a naturalist to be impressed with the epic journey that the Monarch butterfly makes every year, as well as the beauty that this species possesses.

(*Danaus plexippus*)

The Monarch Butterfly's (*Danaus plexippus*) natural range is rather mushroom-shaped in appearance. It frequents the small Mexican states of Michoacan and Mexico during the winter months, while it occupies a large east-west ranging portion of the northern United States and southern Canada during the summer months. It is during its travels to these haunts that it passes through the corridor of west Texas. The Monarch will typically make its appearance here first in mid-April to early May as it heads north to its summer home, and then appear here again in late September to early November as it travels back to the warmer climate of its winter home. The Monarch is the only butterfly known to migrate on a regular basis.

The Monarch Butterfly is one of the most distinctive and colorful butterflies that occurs in west Texas. The upper wings are dark orange in coloration and are bordered in black. There are numerous small white spots randomly situated inside this black border, as well as along the rear edges of the orange-colored wings. There are also several orange spots close to the tips of the forewings, and the veins and margins are deep black. The head and thorax are black and the head is littered with small white spots, while the thorax is solid black. The abdomen has several pairs of white lines that traverse either side of this body part. As this butterfly lands, the wings are clasped together to reveal the under wings, which are yellow-orange in coloration, rather than being dark orange like the upper wings. The under wings also have larger white spots than the ones that appear on the upper wings. This species is also sexually dimorphic, which means that the males and females have differences in coloration. Males have a black patch of scales along the hind wings that are responsible for the release of female-attracting pheromones, and the black lines on the veins are much narrower than those that appear on the female. Males are also the larger sex, with adults achieving a total wingspan of approximately four

inches, while mature females only attain a wingspan of about three and one-half inches.

This type of butterfly is an almost plant-specific feeder, feeding on the flowers of most milkweed species. It utilizes an appendage known as a proboscis to feed on these items. The proboscis is long and almost threadlike, and in times of non-use is curled up under the head of the butterfly.

The Monarch, like other butterfly species, undergoes a four-stage life cycle that can be described as nothing short of miraculous. In the beginning stage, their life begins as an egg, which hatches after a few short days into the next stage. Upon hatching, the larvae are known as caterpillars, and at this stage, the growth rate is highly accelerated. Caterpillars can eat twice their body weight in a single day, and as such, grow quickly. As they grow, they literally grow out of their skins, and they shed their outer layer of skin up to five times (known as molting) before they enter the next stage of their life cycle. Caterpillars of the Monarch are quite colorful as they are banded with white, black, and yellow rings, and attain a length of about two inches. After the caterpillar finds a spot

in which it feels is secure, it will pupate as it forms a protective shell about it known as a chrysalis. The chrysalis version of the Monarch is pale blue-green with small golden spots. Inside of this shell, the larvae changes into the butterfly that it will soon become. After about a week, the adult will emerge from this shell with its wings intact, although they are crumpled into small balls on the sides of the body. The butterfly will then pump a clear fluid into the veins of their wings, causing them to expand much the same way a stick can reinforce a kite.

Upon reaching maturity, the Monarch will immediately begin searching for food, water and a mate. After mating, the males will continue their search for other receptive females, while the females will begin to look for a site suitable to lay eggs so a brand new life cycle can begin.

Like its close relative the Queen, the Monarch is a poisonous species of butterfly, said to be quite bitter and distasteful. As such, the Viceroy, another species of butterfly, has adapted to look like, or mimic, the Monarch.

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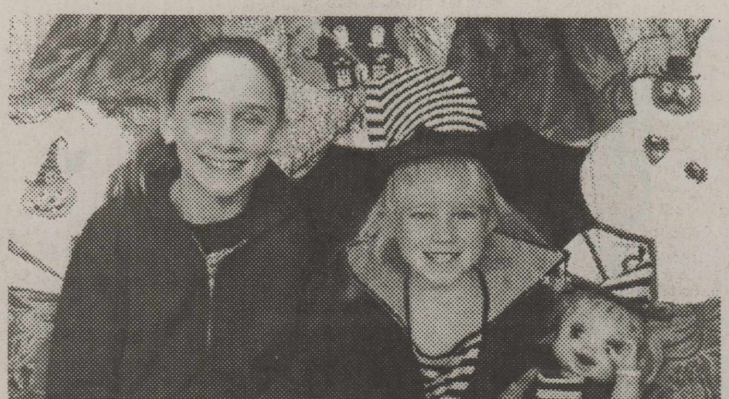
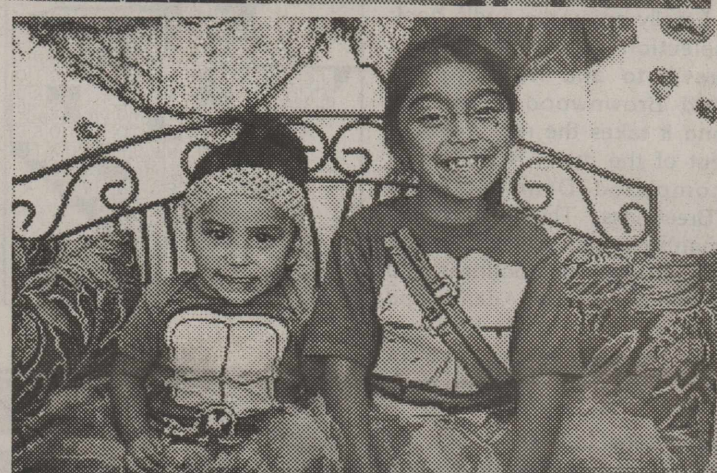
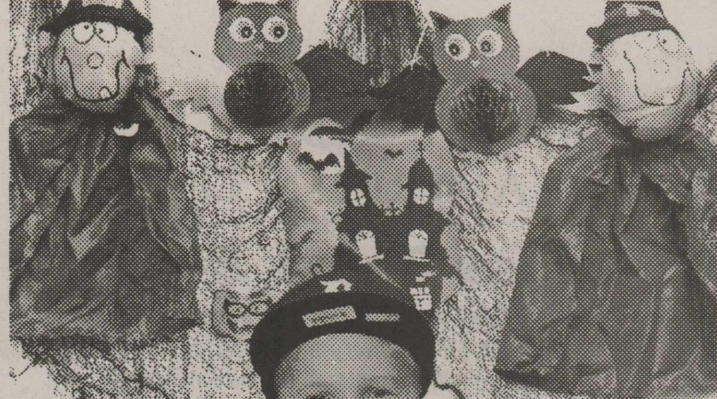
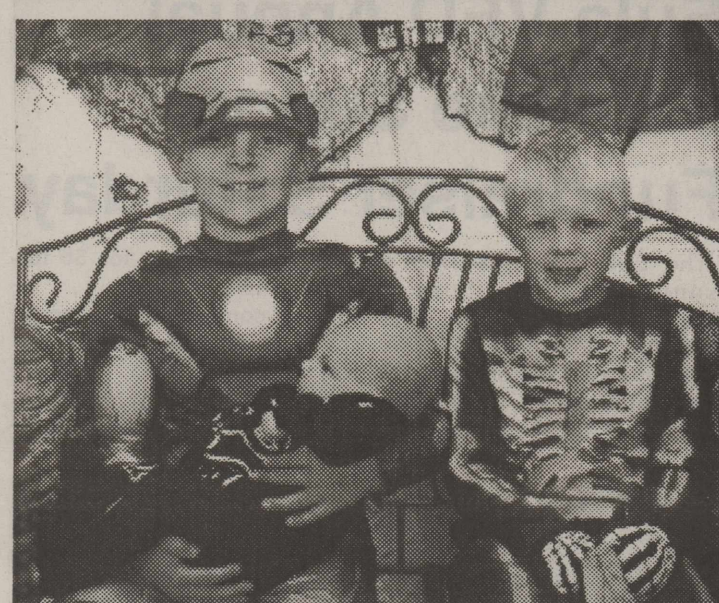
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War, Sacrifice and America's Veterans

While we can all rejoice this Veterans Day that the steady flow of U.S. casualties in Iraq and Afghanistan has slowed to a trickle, we must never forget the incredible sacrifice that America's defenders continue to make on our behalf.

Such is the case of Master Sergeant Joshua Wheeler, who died leading a Delta Force rescue mission of ISIS hostages held in Iraq on Oct. 22nd. A veteran of 14 combat deployments, his sacrifice is shared by four boys who are now fatherless and his wife, who became a widow far too early. But another important part of his legacy are the 70 hostages who were spared brutal executions by an enemy that is as ruthless as any that America has faced.

The willingness to face pain and death so others can be spared isn't unique to just the fallen. Consider the case of two American veterans and their longtime friend when they bravely stopped a terrorist attack aboard a train bound for Paris this summer.

Airman First Class Spencer Stone, Army Specialist Alek Skarlatos and Anthony Salder could have run from the danger when a heavily armed gunman boarded the train.

Instead, Specialist Skarlatos said, "Let's go," as the men ran toward a future that could have easily meant instant death or maiming for them and all of the other innocent people within range.

Fortunately, this story is remembered not for the horrific tragedy that nearly happened but for the heroism that did. Even after enduring serious stab wounds that were inflicted as he disarmed the gunman, Airman Stone administered life-saving first aid to a passenger that was shot.

The terrorist was carrying 270 rounds of ammunition. But because of the actions of these three young Americans, and two Europeans who assisted them, the death toll aboard the train was zero.

There is also the incredible story of Chris Mintz. As others were understandably fleeing from a

mass shooting at Oregon's Umpqua Community College on Oct. 1st, the 30-year-old former Army infantryman bravely confronted the gunman at a classroom door, as he attempted to save others who were inside. Mr. Mintz survived the attack and continues to recover after being shot five times.

These stories are inspiring, but certainly not surprising to me. As national commander of The American Legion, I meet veterans all of the time who have demonstrated tremendous heroism yet blend in our communities without fanfare.

There are many ways to thank the men and women who have served in our Armed Forces, but I cannot think of a better method of showing gratitude than to hire one. Employers who make this smart decision will usually benefit from the discipline, skills and loyalty that are found abundantly in today's military.

Isn't it likely that people who have survived firefights in Afghanistan can handle whatever tasks are thrown their way at the office without too much stress?

My old classmate, C. Hughes Clark, summed up the humble nature of most veterans. "I can say without regret that I wouldn't have done anything different through it all, simply because it has given me a sense of accomplishment that I couldn't have accomplished any other way."

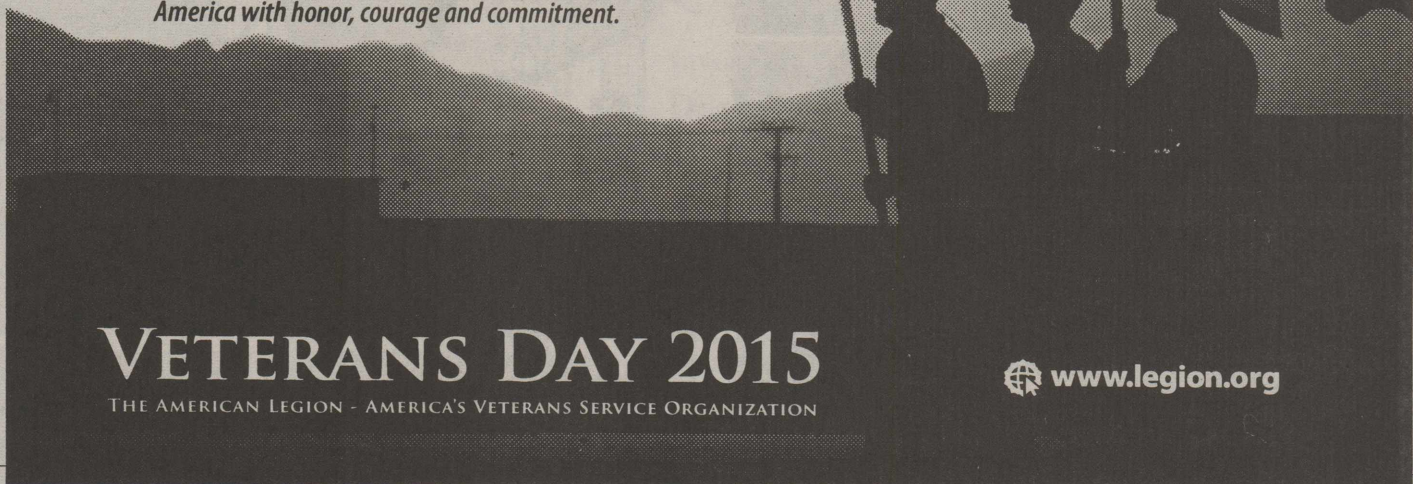

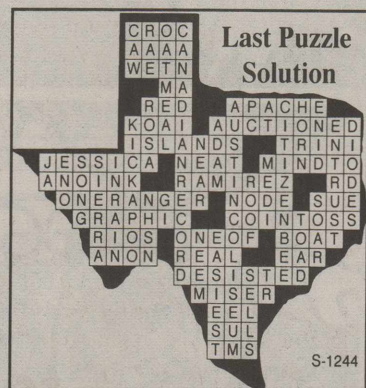
What Are You Reading?

by the Bookworms



I really enjoy the audio book selection at our library. I travel to and from Abilene and Brownwood frequently and it takes the repetitiveness out of the drive. Hence I just completed Dean Koontz's "Breathless." The story is one of man's pain, his evil tendencies, his struggle for goodness and evolution: Grady Adams and his wolfhound Merlin spot two creatures in the meadow that are unlike anything seen before. They are the size of large dogs, but very limber, like cats. Grady enlists the help of his veterinarian friend, Camillia Rivers, to identify them and they end up running with the pair to protect them from becoming guinea pigs for lab experiments by the big, bad government. Koontz does a good job of depicting the emotions and rich histories of the characters (a la Stephen King), but is lacking in his description of the creatures and tedious in his portrayal of the surroundings. At times the story lags and you are thinking "just get on with it."

There are several subplots that explore the dark past of other characters and have you wondering what they have to do with the story - but Koontz weaves them into the ending and wraps up most of the loose ends - but not all. I was left wanting more about the strange creatures. The story was entertaining, but not Koontz's best work.

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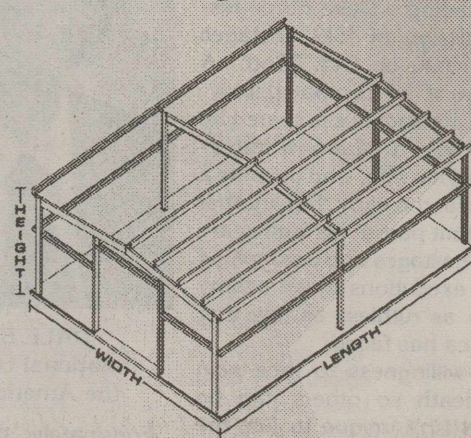
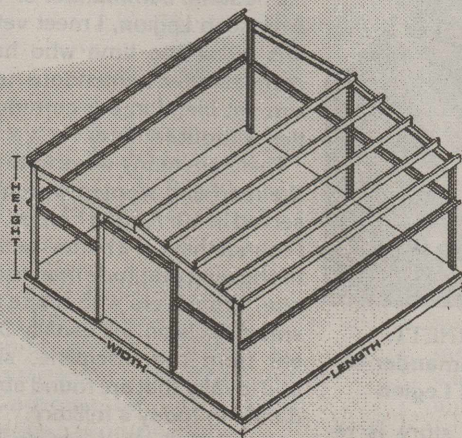
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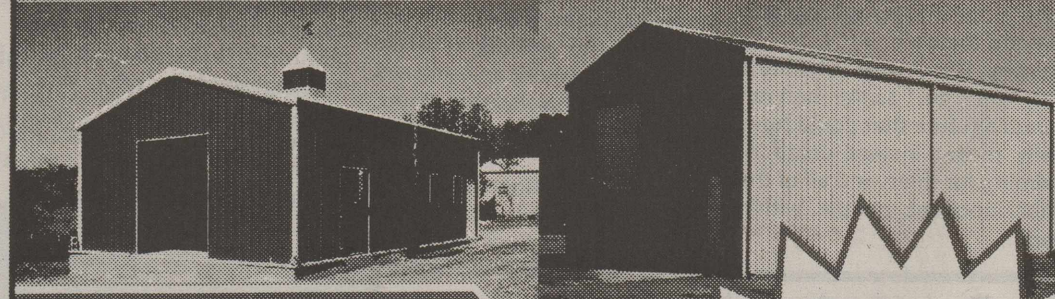

Gary P. Nunn Concert at the Majestic

A Texas Legend is coming to Eastland on November 12th at the Majestic Theatre. Gary P. Nunn who has been "Taking Texas to the Country" and Texas country to the world for some 40 years will be performing along with the Sons of the Bunkhouse Band. The concert benefits the West Texas Rehabilitation Center, a non-profit, outpatient facility. In addition to his music awards, Nunn has earned a number of notable awards and honors including being named an Official Ambassador to the World by Texas Governor

Mark White and Ambassador of Texas Music by Governor Rick Perry. TPPF Statement on Election Day Bonds

Financial Implications of Bonds Should be Provided to Voters

AUSTIN, TX - Today, Texas voters will be asked to approve several billion dollars in new debt propositions for all manner of projects. While the merits of each project may vary, one thing is true about them all: voters won't have any meaningful information about them provided at the voting booth.

"Local government debt in Texas has reached a staggering \$338 billion dollars, or roughly \$12,250 owed per person," said James Quintero, director of the Center for Local Governance at the Texas Public Policy Foundation. "Helping to propel Texas' local debt into the stratosphere is the fact that voters aren't provided with basic financial information when they

enter the voting booth.

"Keeping voters uninformed about simple facts—like the potential tax increase or the total cost of the bond—is not a recipe for success. It's critical that the next Texas Legislature take steps to remedy this situation with ballot box transparency."

Texas A&M Forest Service awards \$15.7 million in grant funds to volunteer fire departments

Oct. 29, 2015 COLLEGE STATION, Texas -- Intense wildfire seasons and life-altering emergencies call for better equipment and more training for our firefighters on the frontline. With over 85 percent of Texas fire departments being operated by volunteers, funding for essential equipment and training can be hard to come by.

The Texas Legislature allocates funding to Texas A&M Forest Service for pass-through grants to Texas volunteer fire departments in an effort to help them better protect lives and property.

This year the agency received \$24.3 million to distribute to volunteer fire departments through the Rural Volunteer Fire Department Assistance Program. On Oct. 7, the program awarded \$15.7 million in its first of three meetings for the 2016 fiscal year.

"No other state understands or supports their first responders like Texas. By increasing the Rural VFD Assistance Program grant fund, the Texas Legislature drove home that point and we are extremely grateful," Texas A&M Forest Service Director Tom Boggus said.

The program allows TFS to

build the capacity of communities by providing funds to volunteer fire departments to purchase lifesaving equipment, including firefighting vehicles, fire and rescue equipment, protective clothing, dry-hydrants, firefighting training and training aids.

"We were honored to present the awards at our first meeting, knowing that they will make a tremendous difference in the protection of life and property," Jason Keiningham, capacity building department head.

"These grants provide firefighters with much-needed equipment to more effectively respond to a variety of emergencies." Established by the 77th Legislature in 2001, the program has provided funds for 1,630 engines, 4,166 grants for fire and rescue equipment, 4,024 grants for protective gear and 17,997 training request for 64,268 firefighters, awarding more than \$213 million total since its inception. While we are extremely proud of this accomplishment, there is a big job left to do with \$155 million in unmet needs.

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Hunters, Landowners and Wildlife Enthusiasts Must Speak up to Protect Texas' Wild Deer Herd

The threat of Chronic Wasting Disease (CWD) is real. Appropriate and timely actions must be taken to protect our wild deer herds, hunting markets and rural economies. Yet, the Texas Deer Association (TDA) continues to downplay this disease and avoid prudent accountability for its presence and potential spread through unnatural movement of captive-raised deer around the state. TDA and its members have lambasted, vilified and degraded Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) personnel who have worked night and day to protect ALL of our interests since the June detection of CWD in a Medina County deer breeding facility. Despite deer breeders' claims, TPWD's actions have been guided by science, caution, and utmost concern for wildlife. On Oct. 1, members of TDA took another step toward minimizing this disease and revealing their disregard for wildlife, by filing a lawsuit against TPWD. In spite of active participation by multiple deer breeding trade associations-including TDA--in the construction and approval of the CWD management plan and the Aug. 19th emergency order, breeders are now opposed to the agreed-upon increased mandatory testing and restrictions on breeder deer movement.

These breeders are also claiming ownership of the deer in their pens and challenging the centuries-old Public Trust Doctrine, which establishes a trustee relationship of state government to

manage wildlife for present and future generations. Private ownership of wildlife would take us back to the days of English Kings and does not fit with today's American values that all citizens, regardless economic status, have ownership interest in wildlife and a responsibility to invest in conservation. This model, coupled with the abundance of private land in Texas has resulted in a unique public-private partnership that has facilitated effective management of wildlife for decades, and should not be abandoned to appease a narrow stakeholder group that views wildlife simply as a commodity to be exploited for personal gain.

Although deer breeders would have the public believe they are responsible for the success of hunting in Texas, the reality is that they represent a measly .5 percent of Texas landowners, .1 percent of Texas hunters and the deer in their pens account for just 2.5 percent of the state's wild population. With PAC funds that rival the trial lawyers and the realtors, a propensity to claim economic impacts that are little more than a figment of their imagination, and a business model based largely on canned shooting; deer breeders and the trade associations that represent them are the antithesis of the real stewards and sportsmen responsible for healthy wildlife populations and hunting economies in Texas. Despite all of this, their shrill political megaphone continues to shut down the interests of Texans and Texas

wildlife.

Meanwhile, TPWD is forced to refocus its time and funding from the important work of managing and conserving wildlife for all Texans, to dealing with the antics and tantrums thrown by this narrow interest group. CWD is the latest in a laundry list of concerns regarding deer breeding practices, and this lawsuit represents the latest evidence of deer breeders' unwillingness to be accountable for their actions.

We stand by TPWD's decisions in response to CWD and support continued sensible regulatory protocols. If you value wildlife, please attend the TPWD Commission meeting on Nov. 5 at 9 a.m. at their headquarters in Austin where deer breeders will likely pressure the agency to redact emergency rules for CWD and seek privatization of deer.

Deer breeders should not be allowed to dominate the response. TDA does not speak for mainstream hunters and landowners. It is time for the silent majority of hunters, landowners and wildlife enthusiasts to speak up to protect Texas' wildlife and ensure testing continues on both captive and wild deer, the emergency rule remains in place, and liberations of captive-raised deer never again occur on low-fenced land.

Keep Texas Wildlife WILD!

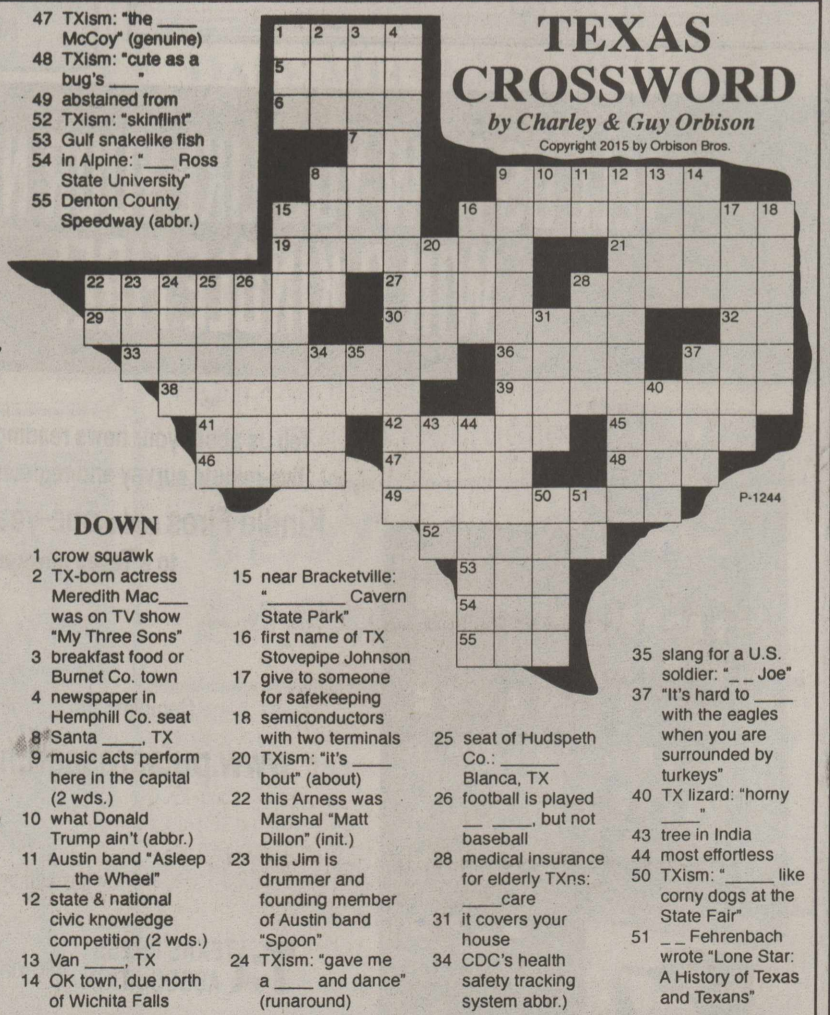

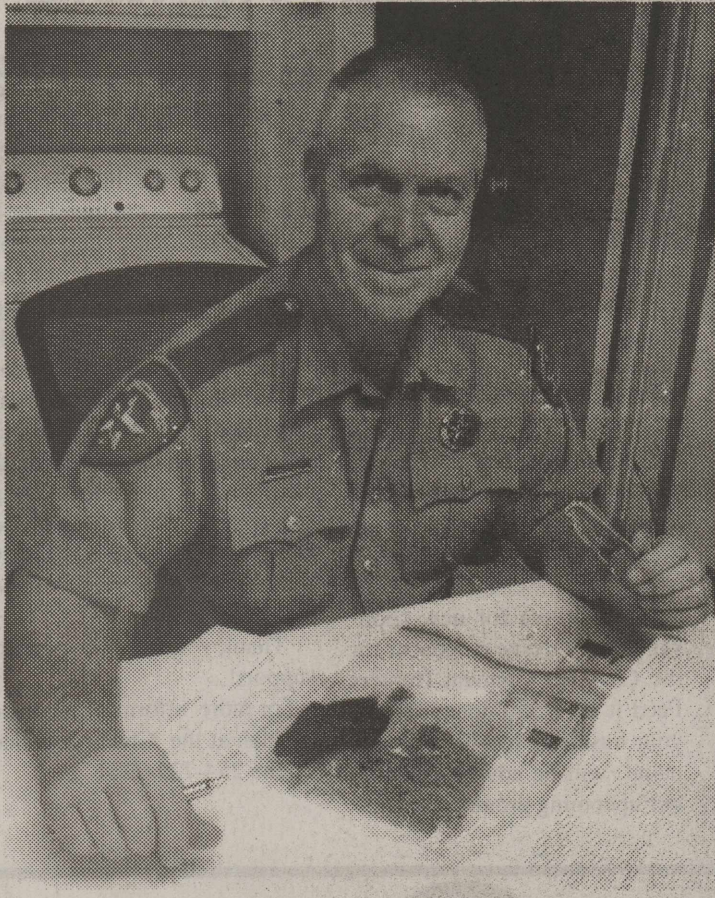

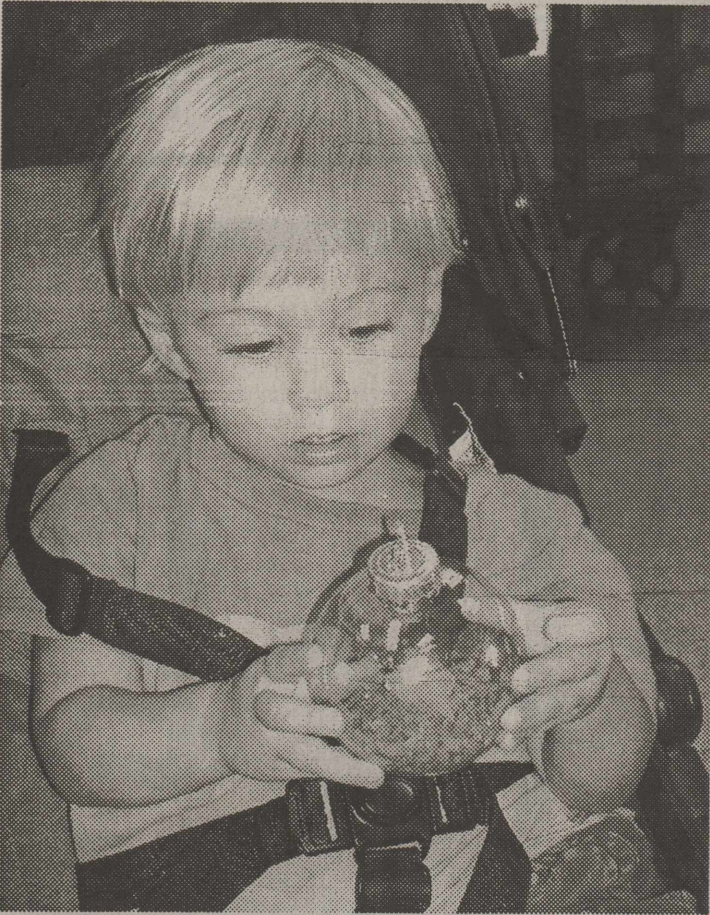
