

The college struggled in its early years. One enduring story was that the college established a football team in 1915, but only because of the donation of \$800 nearly \$19,000 in 2016 dollars) rom one professor, John Kidd, for whom a future stadium would be named. Enrollment rose to only 39 students by 1916. That fall, the campus was hit by a devastating fire that destroyed the main building.

Spiny Soft-shelled Turtle

The main purpose of a turtles shell is for protection from predators, and almost all of the native species have a protective shell that is structurally hard. However, one species that is a common sight in our bodies of water lacks that hard shell, and that species is aptly named the soft-shelled turtle.

Spiny Soft-shelled Turtles (Apalone spinifera) naturally occur consistently throughout the eastern half of Texas. In the western half of this state, its range is a bit more scattered. Here in the western portions of the state, this almost entirely aquatic species is found primarily in the river drainages of the Rio Grande, Pecos, Concho, Colorado, Canadien, and Red Rivers, as well as any of their tributaries. The first book, Volume 1, has gas station photos, family histories, and many other photographs.


Volume 2, has many family histories and family photographs, as well as, a little bit of everything else. And, many, many photos.

Contest Winning Barbecued Chicken Prep Time: 10 Minutes Grill Time: 40 Minutes

Ingredients: 2 broiler/fryer chickens (3 to

4 pounds each), cut up SPICE RUB:

* 2 tablespoons onion powder

4 teaspoons salt or salt substitute * 1 tablespoon paprika

2 teaspoons garlic powder

1-1/2 teaspoons chili powder * 1-1/2 teaspoons pepper

* 1/4 teaspoon ground turmeric

* Pinch cayenne pepper SAUCE:

2 cups ketchup

3 tablespoons brown sugar

2 tablespoons dried minced onion

2 tablespoons thawed orange juice concentrate

1/2 teaspoon liquid smoke, optional

Directions

1. Pat chicken pieces dry. In a small bowl, mix spice rub ingredients; reserve 1 tablespoon spice rub for sauce. Rub remaining spice rub on all sides of chicken.

2. Grill chicken, uncovered, over medium heat 20 minutes, skin side down. Meanwhile, combine all sauce ingredients; stir in reserved spice rub. Turn chicken; grill 20-30 minutes longer or until juices run clear, basting frequently with sauce. Yield: 8 servings.
