Ranch Sorting at Turkey Creek Rodeo Club, September 9th

The Turkey Creek Rodeo Club is holding a Ranch Sorting on Saturday, September 9th. The books open at 9 am and with the first class starting at 10 am. We welcome youth, adult, novice and expert riders. Adult Classes are \$25.00 per rider per run and youth classes are \$15 per rider per run, with a 50% payback. Unlimited entries are allowed, and the same team may compete up to 2 times per class. We will be having 5 classes; Beginner Ranch Hand (the sorter cannot be rated above a 2), Open, Youth (aged 16 and under), #8 (The combined ratings of the team cannot exceed 8), and a 1 Man class. The club is using the TCRC ratings (1-6).

If you don't know what Ranch Sorting is, it's a great combination of cutting skills, cattle knowledge, rider communication, and general horsemanship. You have a team of two riders vs 11 cows,

numbered 0-9, plus one blank "trash" cow in a divided pen. The riders are then given a randomly selected number and need to move the cattle through the "gate" between the pens, one at a time (in order) starting with the number they were given, and they only have 60 seconds. If the cattle are in the wrong order or one comes back across the line they are disqualified.

This is a wonderful sport, a lot of fun, and a great way for novice riders to ride with those more skilled, plus for those riders who prefer to do it on their own, we do have the one man class. Feel free to ride or come out to watch.

Buffaloes Win First Game of the Season over Menard

Goode leads Cross Plains to season-opening victory over Menard

Creed Goode and the Cross Plains Buffaloes are off to a good start to begin the 2017 high school football season.

Goode, a senior running back who rushed for 1,519 yards and 22 touchdowns a year ago, picked up right where he left off last season. Goode ran for 214 yards and three scores Friday night as he led Cross Plains to a 28-20 season-opening victory at Menard.

The Yellow Jackets' Christian Salazar scored on runs of 10 and 42 yards as Menard grabbed a 14-6 first-quarter lead. The two Menard scores were sandwiched around an 8-yard touchdown run by Buffaloes quarterback Caleb Hernandez.

Cross Plains tied the score at 14-14 early in the second quarter when Goode carried it in from 13 yards out and Joe Crockett ran for the two-point conversion.

The Buffaloes took the lead for good, 20-14, with 3:23 left in the third period when Goode broke free on a 44-yard touchdown run. Goode added a 1-yard touchdown plunge and a run for the two-point conversion with 8:32 remaining in the game to stretch the Buffs' lead to 28-14.

Menard answered with a 65-yard TD scamper by Noah Rosas just over a minute later to pull to within one score at 28-20. But the Cross Plains defense held Menard at bay the rest of the way to secure the win.

The Buffaloes amassed 353 yards rushing as a team but did turn it over three times with an interception and a pair of fumbles. Cross Plains outgained Menard 364-231 in total offense.

Cross Plains will play its home opener Friday at 7:30 p.m. with a non-district game against Perrin-Whitt.

gradually the churches became involved to show their support for the administration, teachers and all of the support staff by giving them a break from providing their own lunches for 3 days.

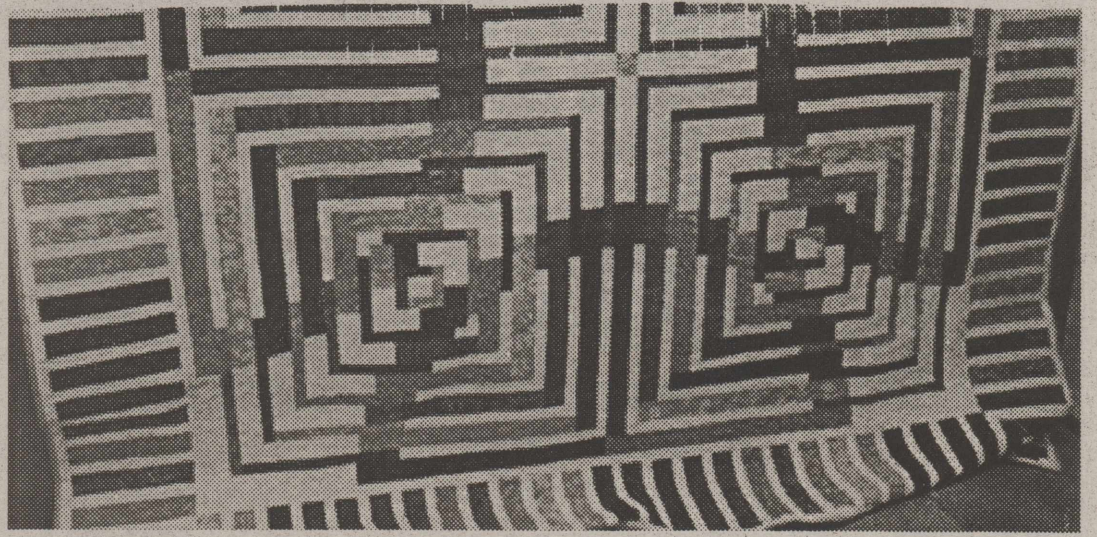

Sheriff's Corner

Last Sunday about 3:14 p.m. Callahan County Sheriff's Department Dispatch received a 911 call from a woman in the Eula area. She wanted to report a woman at her residence begging for water, acting strange, and wouldn't leave the property. This strange acting female was also carrying a hand gun. Chief Deputy Jowers was just finishing up on a suicide attempt call. He hurried to this latest 911 call. The dispatcher relayed the information concerning the hand gun to Chief Jowers. Upon arrived at the scene Chief Jowers approached the woman with caution. He could see her left hand and it was empty but her right hand was behind her back. He identified himself as a Callahan County Deputy Sheriff and commanded her to take her right hand from behind her back so he could see both of her hands. She did and in her right hand was a 9 Millimeter Smith and Wesson, fully loaded, and one round in the chamber. Chief Jowers drew his duty weapon and commanded her five times to drop her weapon. On the fifth command she dropped her weapon. He then ran toward her, kicked the gun away, put her on the ground and cuffed her. He put her in the back seat of his patrol unit and drove to

the jail where she was booked and placed into the female cell of the jail.

We observed her very closely from the camera system and monitored her from the speaker to the dispatch. She was talking as if someone was in the room with her. This imaginary person would say something like, "Would you like a cigarette?" and she would answer back "Yes I would, thank you very much." She said her parents lived in the Houston area where the flooding was and her and her husband had driven to Abilene and was staying at a hotel to get away from the flood. She said her father was the Pastor of a church and the church was flooded.

The next day, Sunday evening, Chief Deputy Jowers prepared an "Emergency Detention Order", she was evaluated and a room was located for her at Oceans Behavioral Hospital in Abilene. Kaylee Voigts was one of the dispatcher/jailers on duty and she assisted me. We placed her in the back seat of my county pickup. Kaylee got in the front passenger seat. We gave dispatch our beginning mileage and the closer we got to Abilene the louder and more demanding she became. She said she did not want to see a doctor of any kind and demanded I take her back or take her to Burger King to get a cheese burger.

When we arrived at Oceans I gave dispatch my ending mileage. Our detainee started trying to kick out the back windows of the county pickup with her feet. I got out and went to the back to open the door and stop her. With Kaylee on one arm and me on the other we helped her into the building. All this time she was yelling very loudly and calling me all kinds of names.

Kaylee and I returned the paper work to its place at the jail. I went home and had just relaxed in my recliner when the phone rang. It was the dispatcher who told me I needed to call Oceans Behavioral Hospital. I talked to the Oceans Behavioral Hospital employee and was told that after Kaylee and I left Oceans for Baird our detainee kicked out one of the glass windows. He said she picked up a long shard of the broken glass and was running down the street with it in her hand like a weapon. She still had on our black and white stripped jail uniform. Oceans called the Abilene Police Department. An APE officer arrived and tased her with his stun gun or taser. She was then taken to the Hospital in Abilene because of the effects of the taser. I thought, you, the citizens of this county might like to know some of the things that happen at your Sheriff's Department.

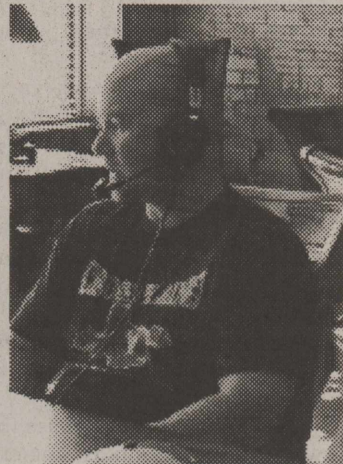

Wild About Texas

Woodhouse's Toad

The Woodhouse's Toad (*Bufo woodhousii*) is one of nine species of "true" toads that occur in Texas, and it by far has the most strewn distribution. It can be observed throughout the Trans-Pecos, the northern half of the Panhandle, most of the eastern portions of the state, and the very southern tip of Texas. Curiously, it is absent from the southern Llano Estacado and northeastern Edwards Plateau. Outside of Texas it occurs from Louisiana westward to Arizona then northward to southern Canada. It also appears in similarly scattered populations in northern Mexico.

The prime habitat that this toad prefers to occupy varies from open woodland areas, prairies, and grasslands, although it can also thrive in open range, mesquite-filled pastures, and creosote flats. Essentially, this species can live anywhere that has loose enough sandy, well-drained soil where it can bury itself deep enough to escape the heat and drought conditions.

The Woodhouse's Toad is a robust amphibian that has dry, wart-covered skin. It is one of the largest toads that inhabit this state, with adult females (the larger sex) averaging a total body length of roughly four inches. The largest specimen on record was a very full-bodied five inches in length. The background coloration can vary from any shade of brown to olive-brown to olive gray. It has irregularly shaped darker green blotches intermittently spaced along the back and sides. These blotches ordinarily have a dark wide outline with a thin light outline surrounding them. There is also a distinguishing white line that runs down the center of the back. The belly coloration is off-white to gray in coloration while the chest typically has dark markings. The paratoid glands are the large "bumps" immediately behind each eye, and in this species, they are oval in appearance.

Woodhouse's Toads, like other amphibian species, live a dual-life. In fact, the word amphibian itself means "double-life". When the spring and summer rains begin, males of this species will congregate at

shallow pools to begin to attract a mate. This attraction consists of calling in loud, nasal bursts. When just one or two males is calling, the noise is nothing more than background noise. However when a large group begins to call in a chorus, the noise can be deafening.

Once a male successfully attracts a mate, they engage in the process of externally fertilizing the eggs. This process is known as amplexus. During this time, a male will wrap his forelegs around a receptive female and as she lays her eggs, he will fertilize each individual one as it exits the female's body. Many thousands of eggs may be laid each breeding session, and the number of sessions may vary from two to three annually to once every two to three years. Breeding is all based upon sufficient rainfall, for the eggs are often laid in shallow, non-permanent pools of water that dry up after just a few sunny days accompanied with unbearable heat.

The life cycle of the Woodhouse's Toad continues as the fertilized eggs hatch into tiny, dark tadpoles. These tadpoles are often referred to as "pollywogs". They are fish-like in appearance, and they obtain their oxygen from the water through gills. Within a day or two after hatching, they begin a miraculous metamorphosis where their lungs begin to develop, while at the same time, back legs begin to form on

their bodies. Within the next day or two from then, front legs begin to appear, the tail begins to shrink, the lungs continue to develop, and the back legs become larger. This process continues for about a week after hatching, when the tiny tadpoles have completed their change, looking like tiny replicas of the adults, thus beginning their "second" life.

This species is highly nocturnal, and it feeds on large amounts of insects when moisture levels are at a sufficient level to prevent desiccation, therefore they are beneficial to agriculturally-based ventures such as crops or gardens. Many myths surround toads, and the most common tale is the notion that toads cause warts on people if handled. This is not true of course, but rather, the secretions that are present when a toad is handled are either the poison from the paratoid glands, or urine as the toad is frightened. The poison of any native toad is not harmful to humans (although it has been said it is rather bitter), but this toxin can cause yard animals such as dogs or cats to froth at the mouth upon consumption.

So the next time you see a Woodhouse's Toad, fear not, for you do not have to run to your local drugstore to buy anti-wart cream. Just rinsing your hands with hot soap and water or hand-sanitizer will suffice!

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar Announces Eminent Domain Database Ready for Public Use

(AUSTIN)—The Texas Comptroller's office today launched a statewide online eminent domain database. This publicly available tool will show which governmental and non-governmental entities have reported to the Comptroller their authority to exercise eminent domain.

"This is clearly an area in which transparency is absolutely essential," Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said. "Knowing who can use eminent domain is the first step to ensuring that this potentially oppressive power is used wisely."

The database was created to comply with Senate Bill 1812, approved during the 2015 legislative session. The bill requires public and private entities with eminent domain authority to report certain information to the Comptroller's office.

The database contains

5,042 entities, including cities, counties, school districts, special purpose districts, pipeline and energy companies, water supply corporations, telecommunications companies and other public and private entities.

The database includes each entity's name and contact information and reported eminent domain information, including:

- the date upon which the entity claims to have been authorized to exercise eminent domain authority;
- whether the entity filed a condemnation petition in calendar 2015;
- the projects or purposes for which the entity holds eminent domain authority; and
- the provisions of the law granting that authority.

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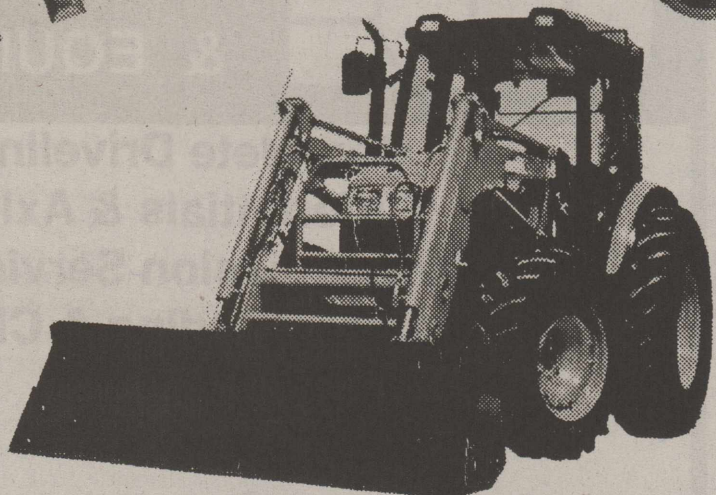

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The Texas History Minute

Jesse Chisolm, creator of Chisolm Trail

The Old West became notorious for the violence that befell communities and individuals. Some individuals, however, acted as peacemakers. Jesse Chisolm, a merchant who developed a network of trading posts from Texas up to Kansas, became known for his mediation efforts and his efforts to expand commerce in the area. He was never wealthy, but his reputation as a guide, translator, diplomat, trader, and explorer gave him an important role in shaping the West. His most lasting legacy was creating the legendary Chisolm Trail, which became a vital pipeline for the famous cattle drives of the late nineteenth century.

Jesse Chisolm was born in the Great Hiwassee area in the mountains of southeastern Tennessee around 1805, inside what had been Cherokee territory. His exact date of birth is uncertain. He was the oldest of six children born to Ignatius Chisolm, a Scottish immigrant and trader, and Martha Rogers, a Cherokee.

Chisolm's lifetime would be marked by the dramatic collapse of tribal control of their territories. Even as a child, he was already living with its effects. By this time, relations between the Cherokees and the settlers were breaking down. Many settlers were encroaching on Cherokee lands, seizing it for themselves in violation of treaty while the federal government did little to stop it. By the early 1810s, many Cherokees were started moving west, the Chisolms included, settling in what is now western Arkansas.

In the 1820s, the family moved further west near Fort Gibson in what was soon to become the Indian Territory, or modern-day Oklahoma. His father brought him into the merchant business, and he made a respectable living as a guide and a trader. Chisolm steadily built and maintained a series of trading posts throughout the area.

Though he spent most of his adult life as a merchant, Chisolm's most sought-after product was peace. Respected among both white politicians and Native American tribes, he was routinely sought out to mediate disputes between the tribes and the settlers. Chisolm reportedly spoke a dozen languages, mostly the languages of the different tribes of the Great Plains. As a trader, such skills of language and diplomacy were vital to his business success.

Sam Houston, while serving as President of the Republic of Texas, sought out Chisolm often to negotiate between Texas and

the tribes. Houston himself had lived among the Cherokees for a time and believed that peace was possible between the settlers and the tribes. Chisolm managed to convince several tribes in the North Texas area to meet with Houston and Texas officials in a series of meetings called the Tehuacana Creek Councils in 1843 and 1844 near Waco. Through these efforts, several treaties were established between Texas and the different tribes.

During the Civil War, tribes in the Indian Territory were deeply divided and often sided with the Confederacy. Chisolm tried to stay out of the conflict, often trading with both the Union and Confederate sides. By 1864, he was operating out of Wichita, Kansas, and serving as an interpreter for the Union Army.

In 1865, Chisolm hoped to resume his trade business. He loaded a team of wagons with goods and left Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, marking a trail south to his trading post near modern Oklahoma City. He extended the trail south to the Red River. Word of this safe and well-marked trail spread. As Texas ranchers saw the potential profit in driving cattle to Kansas for sale, Chisolm's trail became the obvious route to use as the cattle drives began by 1867.

After the end of the Civil War, it became increasingly obvious that the federal government intended to clamp down control over the tribes and force them

onto reservations in spite of existing treaties. Chisolm attempted to bring tribal leaders together with federal officials in the Indian Territory to discuss the issues at hand. Tribal leaders were reluctant to meet, realizing that any treaty at that point probably meant a surrender. Within two years, leaders slowly gathered to talk with federal representatives. The result was the Medicine Lodge Treaty, a series of three treaties signed between the tribes and the federal government starting in October 1867. The treaty stipulated that the tribes would be assigned reservation territories within the Indian Territory, effectively putting an end to their way of life.

In April 1868, Chisolm died suddenly, apparently of food poisoning, while in the Indian Territory. He was respected for his efforts to broker peace on the plains. His efforts at expanding trade, however, would become his most famous legacy. As he died, the great age of the cattle drives was just beginning. As more ranchers began shipping their cattle to Kansas from the late 1860s through the 1880s, his trail became a popular route and soon became known as the Chisolm Trail.

Crispy Barbecue Chicken Tenders

Prep/Total Time: 30 Minutes

Ingredients:

- * 1 cup (8 ounces) sour cream
- * 1/4 cup minced fresh chives
- * 2 garlic cloves, minced
- * 1/2 teaspoon salt

CHICKEN:

- * 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- * 2 tablespoons light brown sugar
- * 1 teaspoon ground mustard
- * 3/4 teaspoon pepper
- * 1/2 teaspoon salt
- * 1/4 teaspoon cayenne pepper
- * 2 eggs, lightly beaten
- * 2 cups coarsely crushed barbecue potato chips
- * 1-1/2 pounds chicken tenderloins
- * Oil for frying



Directions

1. In a small bowl, mix sour cream, chives, garlic and salt. In a shallow bowl, mix flour, brown sugar and seasonings. Place eggs and potato chips in separate shallow bowls. Dip chicken in flour mixture to coat both sides; shake off excess. Dip in eggs, then in potato chips, patting to help coating adhere.

2. In a deep skillet, heat 1/4 in. oil to 375°. Fry chicken, a few strips at a time, 2-3 minutes on each side or until golden brown. Drain on paper towels. Serve with sauce. Yield: 6 servings

I love the smell of August. The fragrance of morning dew on sun-dried grass says the seasons are changing. In a few days, dove season will kick off the start of new hunting seasons. So HAPPY NEW YEAR!

Dove season opens Friday, September 1 in the North and Central Dove Zones. Hunters in the South Zone can hunt whitewings during the first two weekends of September (Sept. 2, 3, 9, 10) throughout the zone. (See map). Formerly, the special early white-winged dove season zone was much narrower, but whitewings have expanded.

Since it's easy to make a mistake on fast-flying, darting doves, regulations allow hunters to include two mourning doves and two white-tipped doves in the bag limit. The smaller and slower-flying Inca doves and ground doves, though, are illegal. Let 'em fly.

And be careful to not hunt close to a feeder. Baiting is illegal and costly. Friends once got ticketed by a warden for hunting in a flyway between roost trees and a deer and turkey feeder.

Hunters opening the season on land owned by a state official once made headlines by hunting near what seemed to be an intentionally baited area. Grain had been dumped in a pile. The state official claimed no knowledge of the baiting, wasn't present, and wasn't ticketed. The hunters were.

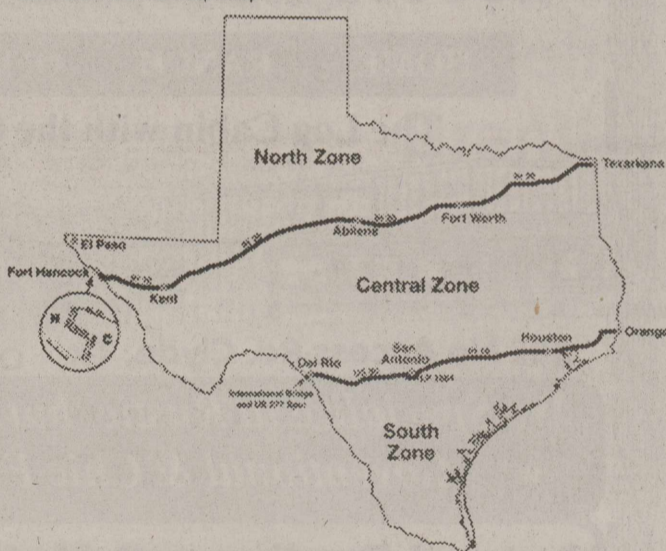
Wardens will be out in force, so follow the rules. An embarrassing incident involved men I knew. I was on a magazine assignment to write about the first female Texas game warden, and was riding with her during the early part of dove season one year. We checked a few hunters, and all were legal: nobody was over the 15-bird limit, all pump and automatic shotguns were checked to hold no more than three shells, and everybody had a hunting license.

The warden received a call from a woman about bird shot falling on her roof, so we drove toward her house just before sunset, the end of legal shooting hours. We heard a shot and stopped nearby. The sound of an old pickup truck

creaking along a rocky hillside got our attention. The warden, Stacy Bishop, pointed toward the sound. By that time, the sun was going down. The creaking of the old truck stopped and immediately we heard two shots. After a couple of minutes, the creaking resumed. The truck was coming right to the gate by which we had parked. The occupants were surprised to see the warden waiting for them -- and equally surprised to see me. The warden warned them

about shooting near houses, and then told them it was illegal to shoot doves from a motor vehicle. They sat in silence. She also told them it was probably past legal shooting hours when we heard their shots, but she wasn't going to ticket them since they possibly couldn't see the sunset. They nodded. Their embarrassment was obvious.

Traditionally it rains the last week of August, scattering the doves. And right now, it looks like rain. Better be prepared.

A Ramble Over Jay Gould's Experimental Farm, at Baird, Texas

Some weeks ago we read some erroneous statements of this farm in a Texas paper, copied from the St. Louis Post Dispatch, which we intended to notice but mislaid the paper. Monday morning we called at the T. & P. land office and in company with D. Richardson, who has charge of the farm, visited and examined it.

The farm is situated just south of the depot here, and consists of about 60 acres fenced in the old worm fence style but surrounded on the west by a good wire fence which encloses about 160 acres of pasture land. Among the livestock Mr. R. showed us ten head of horses and mules and five head of cattle, belonging to the company and used on the farm. There are lasting pools of water in the pasture, in one of which Mr. R. placed 50 German-carp last spring. There is a fine spring of water about 40 yards from the farm house - a stone dam below where we saw ducks and geese washing. There turkeys, guineas, pigeons, two kinds of geese

and several kinds of chickens on the farm. The farm house is an old anti railroad log hut formerly on a stock ranch. A substantial stone fence surrounds the house and garden.

The farm has been run in oats, rye, wheat, barley, millet, sorghum corn, potatoes, melons, cotton and many varieties of small crops, garden truck, &c, this season and so far as we can judge from what we saw has been a grand success. The wheat - several varieties - barley and rye made an average yield of about 15 bu. per acre. The oats of three varieties averaged about 35 bu. per acre. The corn, two varieties, so far as we can judge, will make from 25 to 30 bu. per acre. The cotton seems to be the boss crop of the farm. We have seen no plot of cotton in any country in any season more promising, and should a late fall be our season here it will make a bale per acre. We saw hundreds of pumpkins, squashes, cucumbers and musk-melons that would be called fine in any market-garden north or east. Water-melons and musk-melons of several varieties were rotting on the ground. The sweet potatoes vines cover the ground so deeply the ridges are hardly noticed. The growth of the sorghum and millet is wonderful. As a matter of fact, all in all we have seen no farm in any country where the evidence is more clearly shown that the soil is rich and that it lies in a farming country. To be continued.

Weight Warriors meets weekly and is always welcoming new people. This is time to think about weight loss and new healthy eating habits.

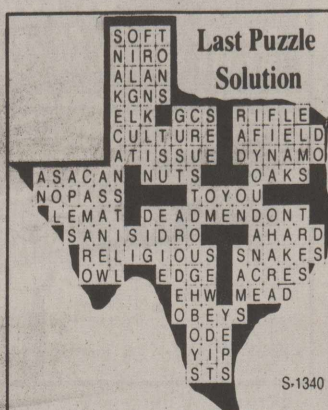

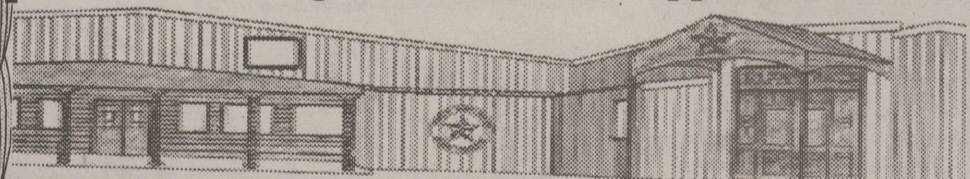
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
