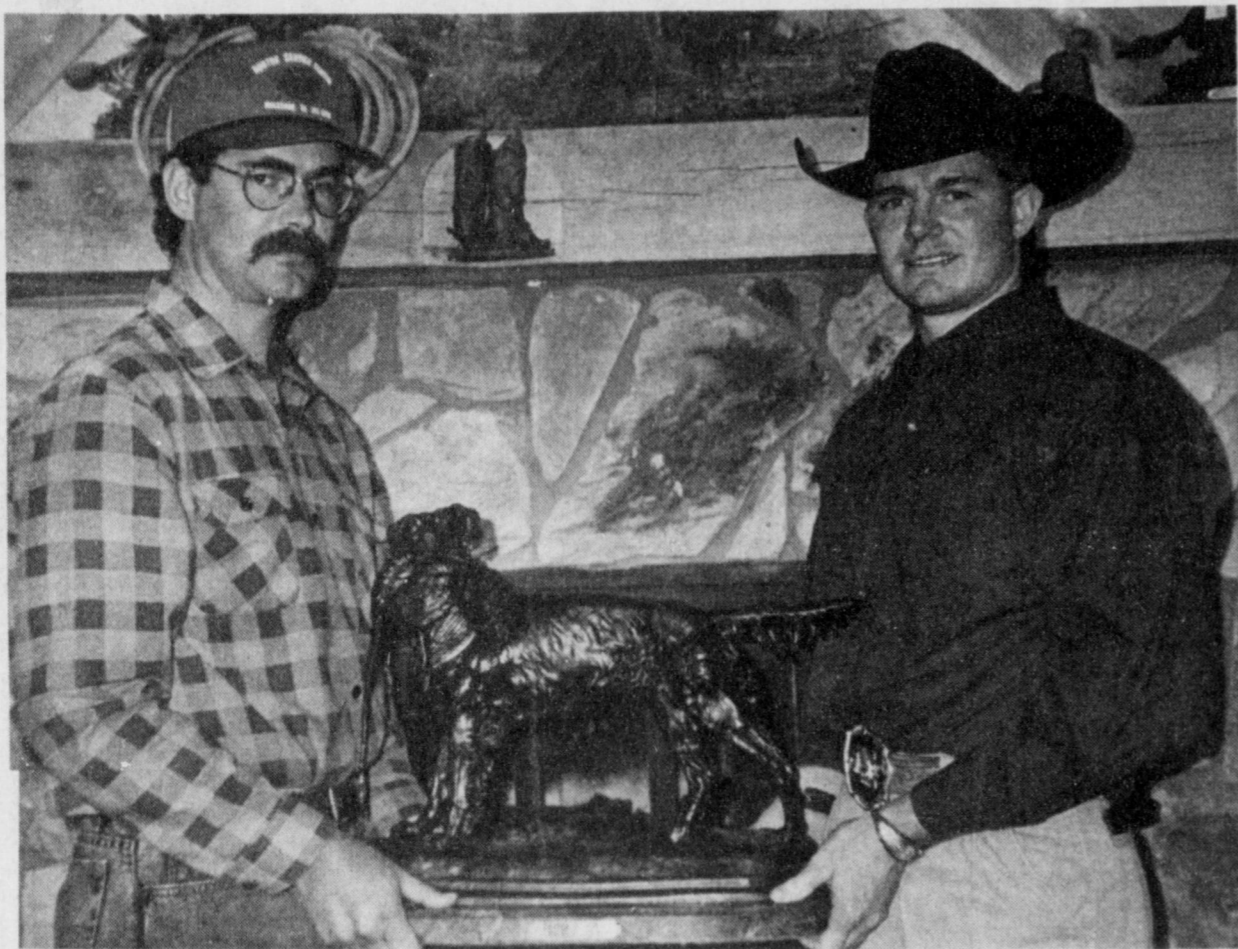

Jim Shafer Memorial Playground Dedicated

A dedication ceremony was held recently at the Jim Shafer Memorial Playground at North Alabama Sheriffs Boys Ranch at Banville, Alabama.

Shafer, a former Muleshoe resident, worked closely with the boys ranch from the time he moved to Alabama in 1982, until his death December 1, 1991. Mrs. Shafer stated that the ranch is similar to Carl Farley's Boys Ranch at Amarillo. The ranch has four resident houses and houses up to 12 boys.

Since the Boys Ranch in Banville had no playground, men who had worked with Shafer wanted to build a playground in Shafer's memory. Other friends and relatives picked up on the idea and donations

and skills, and help others in their communities, by taking part in the Texas Master Gardener training to be conducted in Lubbock in February and March by the Texas Extension Service.

"This is an intensive course designed not only to improve the horticultural knowledge of the participants, but also to give them a chance to help spread that knowledge to improve the quality of life with horticultural projects," said Dr. Bob Robinson, Extension Service district director.

Persons wishing to enter the program should already have knowledge and skills in basic ornamental horticulture, gardening and general related areas, Robinson said.

Participants selected for the program will receive 50 hours of

instruction during eight day-long sessions. Instructors will include faculty of the Extension Service, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Texas Forest Service, which are agencies of the Texas A&M University System; Texas Tech University; and members of the West Texas Arts and Botanical Association, and the

The course fee of \$50 includes a detailed Master Gardener Handbook, other training materials, a certificate and wallet identification card. All training will be at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Lubbock. It is on FM 1294 just east of Interstate 27 at the Shallowater exit.

At the end of the training, participants must pass a written examination and complete 50 hours of volunteer horticultural service in their county, under supervision of their county Extension Service faculty. Upon satisfactory completion of these requirements, a graduate will become a Certified Texas Master Gardener. to retain certification, a Master Gardener

Gramm Warns Of DWI Tragedy On Eve of 1993

Alcohol-related driving deaths have declined steadily since 1982 according to U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm, who called for Texans to take special care on the highways during the holiday season.

"According to a nationwide study by the Center for Disease control, drunk driving fatalities are declining--and that's great news," Gramm said.

"But with the approach of New Year's Eve and New Year's Day, the two days each year which generate more drunk-driving deaths and injuries than any others, the time has come to take special care," he said.

Gramm and police officers from across Texas and Mothers Against Drunk Driving this year are repeating the successful public education campaign against drunk driving that they have staged annually.

The senator noted that while fatality rates are down nationwide and "while everybody can be proud of the progress that has been made, drunken driving remains a tragedy and a crime."

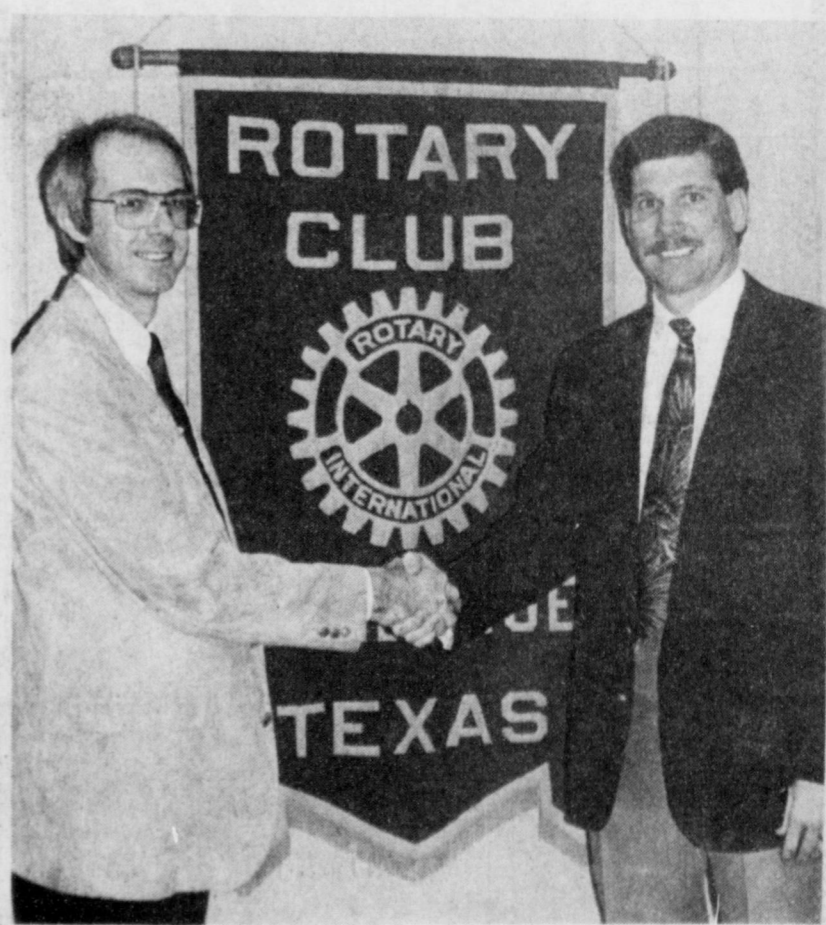
"Ultimately, the responsibility for stopping this menace falls to each of us as individuals," Gramm said.

VA Promotes Lender Appraisal Program

The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) has a relatively new program designed to speed-up the processing of VA home loans. Called the Lender Appraisal Processing Program, it's better known as LAPP.

Under LAPP, lenders who already have the authority to determine a VA buyer's creditworthiness also can be approved to receive appraisal reports directly from VA-assigned fee appraisers, review those reports, and close the loans on the basis of their review. That helps lenders close loans sooner by eliminating the mailing a processing time needed for VA to receive and review the property appraisal report and issue a notice of value to the lender. The amount of time saved can be particularly significant in very active real estate markets.

VA is strongly encouraging eligible lenders who have not applied for LAPP approval to do so.

Selective Service Says Men Age 26 Not Eligible For Draft

Young men who will turn 26 in 1993 will be reaching an important milestone according to the Selective Service System.

Beginning on Jan. 1, 1993, men who were born in 1967 and were required to register with Selective Service in 1985, will be turning 26 and will no longer be eligible for induction should a draft be reinstated. Selective Service does not have the authority to accept late registrations after a man reaches his 26th birthday.

Selective Service officials warned that, with few exceptions, a man who fails to register before turning 26 will permanently forfeit his eligibility for certain programs

such as federal student aid, job training and most federal employment, in addition to facing possible prosecution as a felon. Some states also require registration for state student aid, entrance to state-supported colleges and universities, state employment and permission to practice law.

Men ages 18 through 25 who have not yet registered can avoid the risk of prosecution and loss of eligibility by registering promptly at any local post office. Failure to register is a felony punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000, up to five years in prison or both.

A man is exempt from registering while he is on full-time active duty in the U.S. Armed Forces. Cadets and midshipmen at the service academies are included in the exemption. Members of the National Guard and Reserve Forces not on full-time active duty must register unless they have reached age 26 or are already registered.

Those who are unable to register due to circumstances beyond their control- for example, those who are hospitalized, institutionalized or incarcerated- do not have to register until they are released. After release, they have 30 days in which to register. Handicapped men who live at home must register if they are reasonably able to leave the home and go into a public place. A friend or relative may help a

handicapped man to fill out the form if he is unable to do so by himself.

Money Talk

It's early to become overly-enthusiastic about the economic recovery, which now seems under-way.

Even if this time the trend continues upward and the recession is ending, for many stocks it will take time to justify sharply higher prices.

John Templeton, on a recent Wall Street Week program, is optimistic about the stock market for the long run and believes mutual funds are the best investment for most Americans.

He noted how much money has been accumulated and believes most individual investors need professional guidance in choosing their investments.

And even Templeton admits he and his associates miss on many investments. He suggests a batting average of eight out of ten years--for gains--is about as good as anyone should expect.

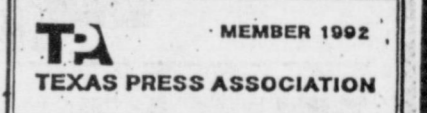

Hospital Schedules Monthly Diabetes Clinic

Diabetes is a disease that affects more than 12 million Americans. In addition to being one of the leading causes of death by disease in the United States, diabetes also contributes to the onset of other diseases, such as heart disease, stroke, renal failure and blindness.

Insulin transports glucose, or blood sugar, to body cells where it is used as immediate energy or stored for later use. When insulin is low, glucose transport is slowed, compromising the body tissues' access to essential energy. This reduced amount of insulin flow leads to diabetes.

Treatment for diabetes involves a strict diet to meet special nutritional needs and to control blood sugar levels. This diet also allows diabetics to maintain an appropriate body weight. Some diabetics require insulin injections or oral hypoglycemics to manage their diabetes.

Methodist Hospital's Monthly Diabetes Clinic helps diabetics manage their disease. The next one day clinic will be conducted January 16 from 8:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. Reservations are required and can be made by calling 793-4301.

Treating The Common Cold

There's no cure for the common cold, and recent studies indicate that paying more for a multi-symptom medication may be a waste of money.

"More than 200 different viruses can cause the common cold," said Lowell Johnson, M.D., family physician on staff at Methodist Hospital. "And, recent studies show that antihistamines, which are a common ingredient in many cold remedies, aren't of much help in relieving symptoms. However antihistamines being taken regularly for allergy should be continued."

According to the new research, the best approach for treating a cold is to deal with specific symptoms by taking individual-ingredient medications.

*Use a decongestant for a stuffy nose. Sprays or oral medications that contain pseudophrine work best.

*For a cough, try dextromethorphan, which is found in many syrups and lozenges.

*For fever and achiness, try ibuprophen or acetaminophen.

*A warm salt water gargle is still the best bet for a sore throat, and for a nose sore from blowing, try a little petroleum jelly.

Start Food Safety Practices At The Grocery Store

Consumers concerned about the quality of their food in grocery stores can follow a number of tips to ensure food is safe before they take it home.

"A good starting point is to look for cleanliness and sanitation when selecting a food store," said Dr. Peggy Gentry-Van Laanen, nutrition specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. However, shoppers also need to know what they can do to maintain safety and quality after buying groceries."

Meat is a highly perishable food that can harbor bacteria, which can cause foodborne illness, and should be closely scrutinized, Gentry-Van Laanen said. Shoppers should use their senses to determine the freshness of raw meats as well as poultry, fish, fruits and vegetables before buying them.

Meats should have a pink, red or brown color, while the color of poultry should range from white to yellow, she said. Meats and poultry should be moist and have a fresh odor. Produce that appears slimy or cloudy and has a rancid or putrid odor should not be purchased.

In the seafood department, fresh shellfish such as whole clams, oysters, mussels and lobsters should be purchased live, Gentry-Van Laanen said. Finfish should have a clean, fresh smell--no fishy or off-odors. For whole fish, the gill should be bright red or pink. Flesh should be firm and elastic, and the skin should be shiny with firmly attached scales. When fish is fresh, the eyes appear bright and clear and protrude away from the head.

"Fillets should be firm, not slimy and have a fresh smell," she said. "Fish should be displayed in coolers at near freezing temperatures or in ice and not piled upon one another."

When buying fresh fruits and vegetables, check the color, she said. Produce should also be firm, relatively blemish-free and mold-free and have a pleasant odor.

Other guidelines that can help consumers make wise choices when grocery shopping include:

*Buying from only reputable retailers.

*Avoiding food in leaky, bulging, or severely dented cans. Don't buy cracked jars or jars with loose or bulging lids.

*Selecting sound packages of food; avoid items that are in torn, dented or damaged packages.

*Making sure refrigerated and frozen foods are below the cold line

in their respective cases. Refrigerated food should feel cold and frozen food should be rock hard.

*Not buying food from a display where raw food is on the same bed of ice as cooked food.

*Avoiding anything with a use-by or sell-by date that has expired, or that you won't consume by the use-by date.

*Visiting your store late in the evening to see if personnel have torn down fresh prepared food displays in the deli so that dishes and cases can be cleaned.

*Avoiding unrefrigerated shell eggs or unpasteurized dairy products.

*Buying cold and frozen foods last, right before you check out.

*Putting meat, poultry, or fish in a plastic bag, preventing juices from dripping on other foods.

"Even when you take the best precautions, you may end up with food that's spoiled," Gentry-Van Laanen said. "If this is the case, take it back to the store manager immediately. If you repeatedly find you have bought poor quality food, change stores and tell the manager of the old store why you have done so."

"It is smart to become a knowledgeable shopper," Gentry-Van Laanen said. "You'll have confidence in the food you select at the grocery store and know how to prepare it safely after you get your groceries home."

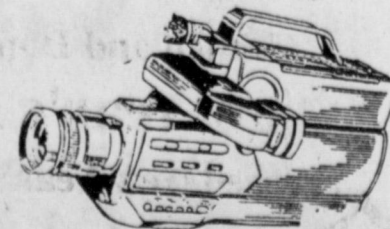

Western Equine Encephalitis Confirmed In Emus For First time

Outbreaks of western equine encephalitis in emus have been confirmed for what is apparently the first time, according to the Texas Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory.

The findings in emus were confined to isolated areas of West Central and West Texas, said Dr. Konrad Eugster, director of the lab.

The virus causing the disease is carried by mosquitoes and potentially harmful to humans and livestock. However, producers and others taking normal precautions against mosquitoes have no cause for undue concern, he said.

The disease is suspected of causing an undetermined number of emu deaths in West Texas and was confirmed in three separate cases. Western equine encephalitis, or WEE, is among four common types of encephalitis in the United States.

The others are eastern equine encephalitis (or EEE), Venezuelan equine encephalitis and St. Louis encephalitis.

Eugster said it is difficult to confirm WEE in emus or other ratiates and that there is no licensed vaccine for the virus that causes the disease. Emu producers have used the vaccine licensed for horses with no adverse effects, Eugster said, but producers should check with local practicing veterinarians for more complete information, including information on the equine vaccine.

Eugster said symptoms reported by owners of the emus included birds being lethargic, depressed, or without appetite. The birds sometimes cannot walk well and often lie down and will not get up. However, all these behaviors could be symptomatic of "a million other things," Eugster said.

Some birds recover on their own, while others may die within a period of 12 hours to two weeks, he said. There is no known cure for the disease except the

organism's own immune system, he said.

"Fortunately, we're at the tail end of the mosquito season, and I don't expect to see many more problems this year," he said.

Emu owners should call their veterinarians immediately after noticing any symptoms, Eugster said.

Although EEE was confirmed in ostriches in Louisiana in 1991, the recent WEE finding in emus is unique.

"This has been the first isolation ever of the western strain in ratiates," Eugster said. Ratiates are flightless birds without breastbones, including ostriches, emus and rheas.

The WEE virus was first suspected by Dr. Jon Ayers of the lab's Amarillo branch. During a post-mortem analysis, he found lesions he suspected of being caused by a virus and recalled the cases of EEE in Louisiana.

He then sent tissues from several birds to the College Station branch of the lab, where more extensive testing led by Dr. Thomas Lester confirmed Ayers' suspicions.

Eugster said, "I would bet that within a few generations, the emus will become more resistant to the virus, as are many birds in this hemisphere which carry the virus without clinical signs."

He said he'd like to see research to help license a vaccine--perhaps the vaccine already used in horses. However, he acknowledges that it might not happen because licensing is an expensive process, especially given the cost of emus themselves, which he said can be up to \$20,000 apiece.

"In the meantime, emu owners probably don't want to wait for evolution to take care of this," he said. "We may have enough empirical evidence to recommend the use of the equine vaccine in emus within the next few years."

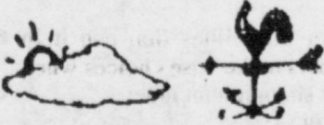
Know The Weather

How fast do cold fronts move across the country? Why do they "sneak in" on us, on some occasions, almost without warning?

Cold fronts usually move 30-35 m.p.h. or faster.

Is an inch of rain heavy rainfall? How does it compare with an inch of snow?

An inch of rainfall is a very heavy rain. Over a one-acre parcel of land, an inch of rain means 603 45-gallon barrels of water have been released, or



27,143 gallons of water. An inch of snow, however, does not constitute a heavy release of water from the clouds. It is estimated that ten inches of snow are required to equal, in water content, one inch of rainfall.

Thus, an eight or ten inch snowfall actually represents less than an inch of precipitation, measured in water or rain, which some of us hadn't realized.

The Billion Dollar Windfall

With medical costs continuing to climb faster than inflation, millions of conscientious Medicare patients have done the prudent thing--look for cheaper alternatives to save money. They have turned to hospital outpatient clinics for a wide range of treatments, from x-rays to physical therapy.

But because of a legal loophole little-known off Capitol Hill in Washington D.C., those individual cost-containment efforts have turned into a huge windfall for Medicare and the nation's hospitals--more than \$1 billion in 1991 alone, the figure for this year is sure to be higher and it will only get worse unless Congress takes corrective action soon.

The problem is that Medicare beneficiaries unwittingly have been overpaying for outpatient procedures intended to save both them and Medicare money. Both Medicare officials and members of Congress have been aware of the problem but have been unable to agree on a solution because it will cost both the hospitals and Medicare money at a time when their wallets are thin.

It is symptomatic of an American health-care system that is beyond reason and out of control.

It stems from two complex hospital payment formulas used by Medicare under which the more a beneficiary pays for a procedure, the less Medicare must pay. In many cases, the more a beneficiary pays, the greater the payments a hospital may receive.

For most Medicare Part B services, such as doctor visits, beneficiaries are supposed to pay just 20 percent of the Medicare approved bill. But because of the loophole, outpatient beneficiaries in 1991 paid the equivalent of a 31 percent copayment.

Take the case of Wendall Haas of Covina, Ca.

In 1991, Mr. Haas underwent six months of physical therapy treatments as an outpatient at a local hospital. Mr. Haas was billed and paid \$1,462--20 percent of the total charged by the hospital, but not the amount approved by Medicare. If Mr. Haas had paid 20 percent of the lower Medicare-approved fee, his bill would have been \$594--a savings of more than \$860.

The problem is being felt in all 50 states. In California, for example, excessive copayments totaled more than \$103 million in 1991.

In Florida, the overpayments totaled more than \$80 million and more than \$71 million in New York state.

These are tough economic times and Medicare beneficiaries should not have to pay more than their fair share. But the likelihood is they will unless Congress moves soon to close this loophole. Call your members of Congress and ask them to investigate this problem, then back legislation to correct it. It's only a matter of fairness.

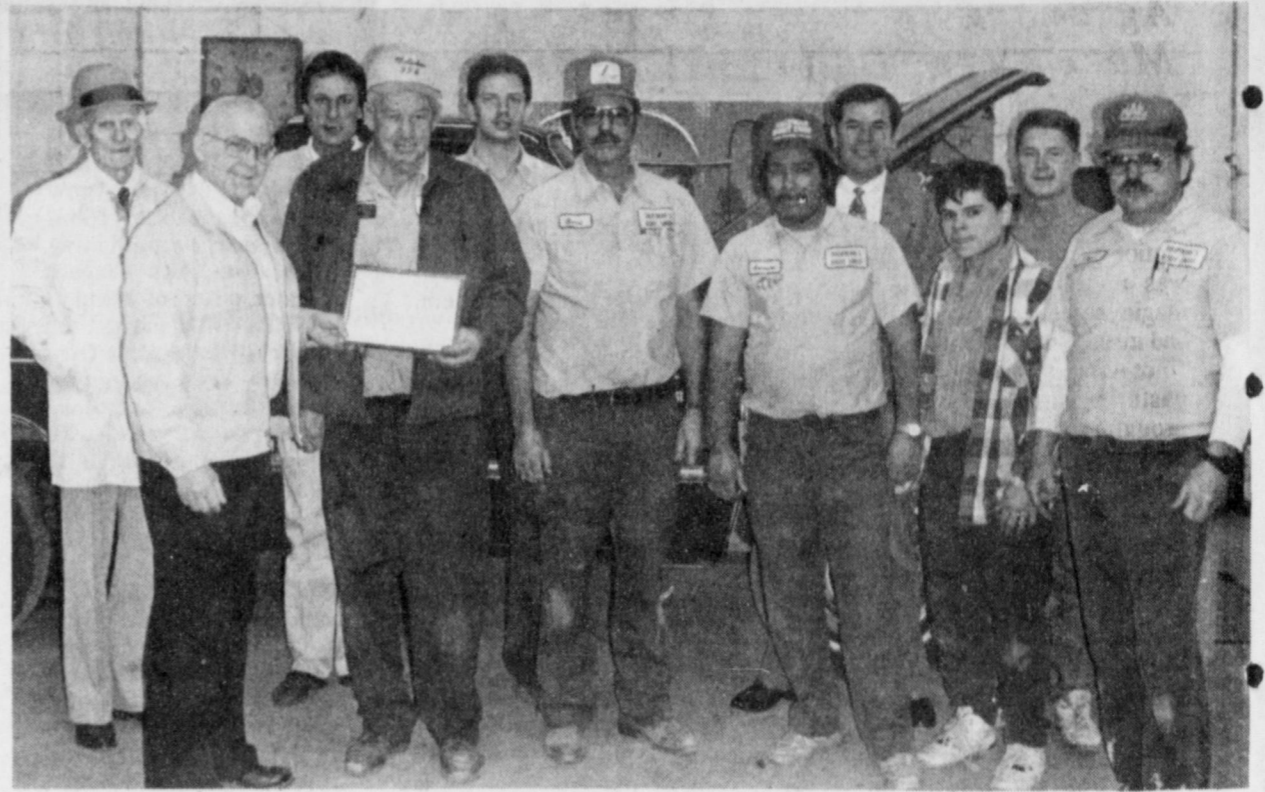

AUSTIN — Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro rocked the State Capitol last week by announcing that he had filed for personal bankruptcy, listing debts of more than \$4 million.

A second Republican Congressman, Jack Fields of Houston, filed as a candidate in the yet-to-be-announced special election to replace U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen.

Texas Democrats continued urging Gov. Ann Richards to appoint herself as Bentsen's interim successor and run as their party's choice in the election sometime this spring.

Meanwhile, Richards visited with six more men about the senate seat: Congressmen John Bryant, Jim Chapman and Mike Andrews; Railroad Commissioner Robert Krueger, former Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle.

However, the governor told reporters she is not close to a decision

on Bentsen's successor.

Many Capitol insiders are prone to consider Richards as the inevitable choice, particularly since speculation about Richards as the new senator has been making the Capitol rounds since August, well before the election.

Mauro's Real Estate Busts

Mauro told reporters he blamed the 1986 real estate bust for the devaluation of his trust fortune once worth almost \$10 million.

He said he now has no checking account, his \$77,000 state salary and a homestead worth more than \$300,000, after spending all other assets to pay creditors.

By filing Chapter 7, Mauro is walking away from payment of the remaining debts.

Mauro to Washington?

Ironically, Mauro manages the state's public lands trusts and the Permanent School Fund; now that his own trust is bankrupt, he is certain to relive his bankruptcy past if he seeks re-election in 1994.

Mauro, now beginning his 11th year as land commissioner, served as Texas campaign manager for President-elect Bill Clinton, and a protege of Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock.

He declined to press for a Washington appointment to keep his financial troubles out of the headlines, particularly any linking him to Clinton.

But Mauro's political fortunes in Texas are viewed as in a nosedive; many think he may soon resign for a post in Washington, D.C., or use his connections to build a new beginning as a lobbyist there.

State Children in Poverty

One in every four Texas children is born into poverty, the state Health Commissioner David Smith said last week, calling for investment in youngsters' well-being.

Smith cited statistics that were part of an annual report by the Children's Defense Fund. The report said that nationally, one in every five children lives in poverty.

Smith said that for black and Hispanic children, the number born into poverty is one out of two. One in every four Texas children has no medical insurance.

Citing figures from other recent studies, Smith said 30 percent of Texas' 2-year-olds are fully immunized against childhood diseases, compared to a national average of 60 percent.

He challenged the state to invest in children's health. Childhood immunizations should be free and available to all Texas children, Smith said.

That would cost about \$50 million a year in state and federal funds — \$15 million more in state money than the Texas Department of Health's current budget for vaccine and immunizations.

Agronomists Work Feverishly To Make Corn, Pasture Look Bad

Turning the town of Groom and the city of Plainview, Texas, into the fictional town of Rustwater, Kan., for Steve Martin's newest motion picture, "A Leap of Faith," was a matter of simple movie magic: some road signs, billboards and made-over storefronts.

But turning lush, green roadsides, pastures and a cornfield into drought-stricken movie sets for only four weeks took some scientific sleight-of-hand and feverish work by two faculty members at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center at Amarillo.

"How can I make my cornfield show stress and turn brown?" is just the opposite of the type of questions they usually get, said Dr. Brent Bean, agronomist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and Dr. Clay Salisbury, plant physiologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. But that was just what the visitors

from the Texas Film Commission and Paramount Pictures needed.

"About February, a location manager (from the studio) came by and wanted to know what (crop) conditions would be like in April," Bean recalled. "We told them up front we'd be looking brown unless we got record rains," Salisbury said. Normally the Texas Panhandle has lower rainfall than other parts of the Midwest, he noted.

The plot of Martin's movie, in which he portrays a traveling evangelist, called for parched, brown countryside. But before shooting began, the counties where the studio had arranged to film this summer had experienced one of their wettest springs in many years. Everything around was lush and green.

"We told them that if we did get unusual rains, they'd better be prepared to artificially create the conditions they needed," Salisbury added. At the request of the film

commission, Bean and Salisbury undertook that task.

The studio was thinking about filming wheat under stress, but shooting schedules were delayed past wheat harvest and cornfields were substituted. Bean and Salisbury suggested several possible locations, from which fields at Groom were selected.

"We had no information on how to deliberately make things look bad," Salisbury said. "You rarely find a (chemical) compound that's designed to make a cornfield or pasture look bad."

So he and Bean put out some demonstration plots using various combinations of herbicides on the different turf and crop situations. Bean said they tried 70 plots in corn, 70 in sorghum, 12 in pasture and 12 on turf.

The project offered its share of challenges, the crop scientists said. All the chemicals had to be properly registered by the Environmental Protection Agency for use on the particular crop. The treatments had to be safe for people in the treated areas. They had to be cost effective. And they couldn't

have any lasting effect on the grass or crop.

"We had to get the look they wanted, it had to stay that way during the time they'd be shooting the crop and revival tent scenes, and then as soon as (the film crews) left, the fields had to recover so they wouldn't have to pay the farmer for a lost crop," Bean recalled, chuckling.

"Of course, the studio wanted to hold filming costs down. And they didn't want to have to buy the farmer's field, or the fields around it, for years on end," Salisbury said.

The two scientists wanted to get a realistic effect with their treatments. "In drought stress, you always have some areas where there is moisture," Salisbury said. "You don't have everything dead, so you should have green intermixed with brown" on the pastures and roadsides.

In the cornfields, the trick was to make the bottoms of the plants brown, get the bright green out of the tops, and create more wilt, they explained. It took them until July to come up with the right combinations for each situation.

Once they had the chemical combinations identified and the proper application times determined, one more concern bothered the pair. Everything was based upon shooting the critical field scenes during a particular four week span in July. The chemicals had to be applied the proper number of days before each scene was shot.

If bad weather or other conditions upset that schedule, the fields couldn't be re-treated with proper results. The scientists wanted an emergency plan that would give a drought appearance within one to two days, even if it destroyed a small amount of the crop.

As an "insurance policy," Bean and Salisbury didn't chemically treat a few rows along the back side of the cornfield. They had found in their experiments the proper appearance could be obtained in 48 hours by cutting off a stalk, then standing it in place by inserting a small metal rod, such as a welding rod, into the severed stalk and its stump.

With the proper camera angle, a few rows of the severed corn would suffice in an emergency, they decided.

Fortunately, they never had to resort to that. The film crew, the cast...and the crops...all performed on cue.

Baby Facts

Many parents expect their babies to sleep more soundly and for longer periods of time than they actually do. While each baby has his/her own sleep habits, most newborns sleep 16 or 17 hours

during the first few days of life.

But, according to Lauri Dalrymple, R.N., parent educator at Methodist Hospital, not all babies get that much sleep in one stretch. Some babies will sleep for only two hours at a time while others will sleep up to 10 hours at once.

Dalrymple said that at first newborns usually split their sleeping hours equally between daytime and nighttime. As they get older, their sleep patterns become more like an adult's--less sleep during the day and more at night. And, by 3 months, most babies will begin to sleep through the night.

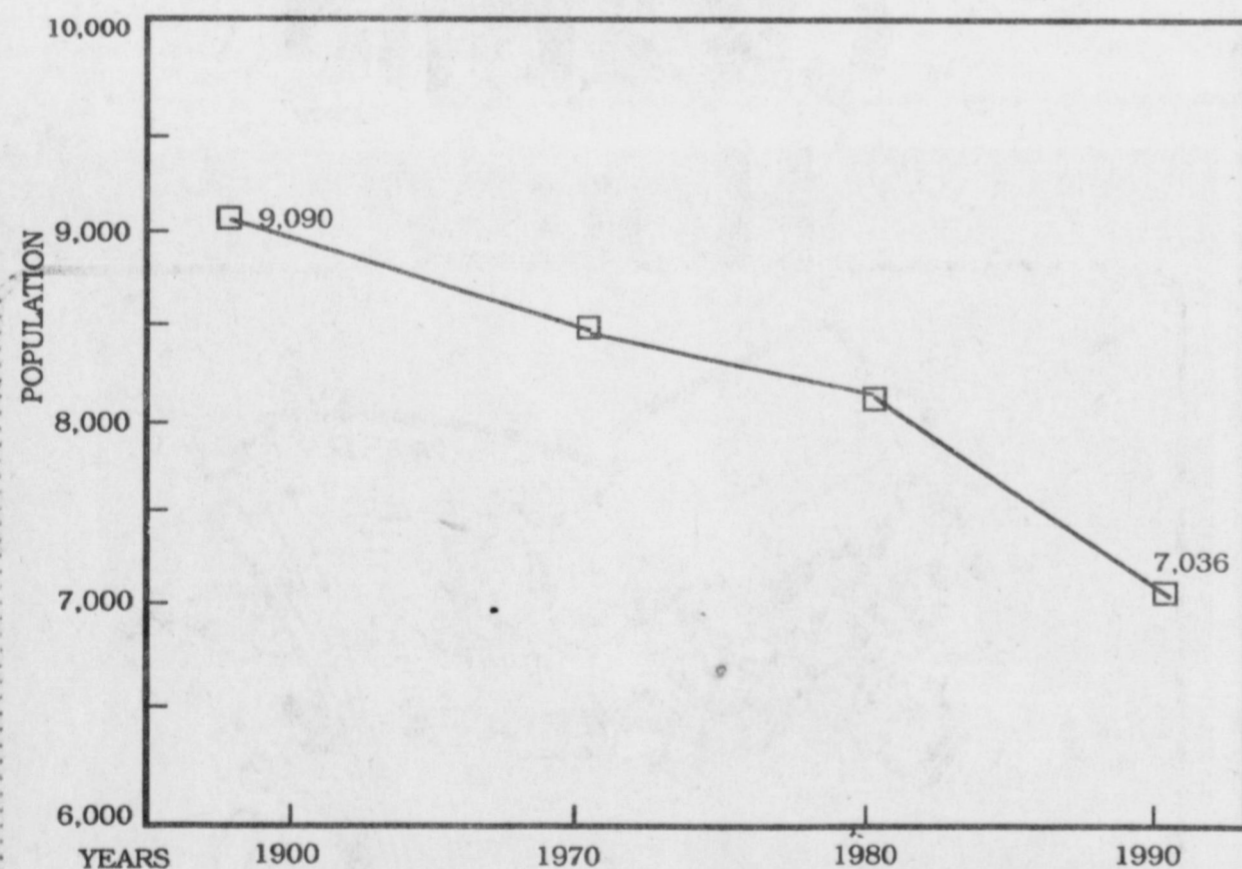

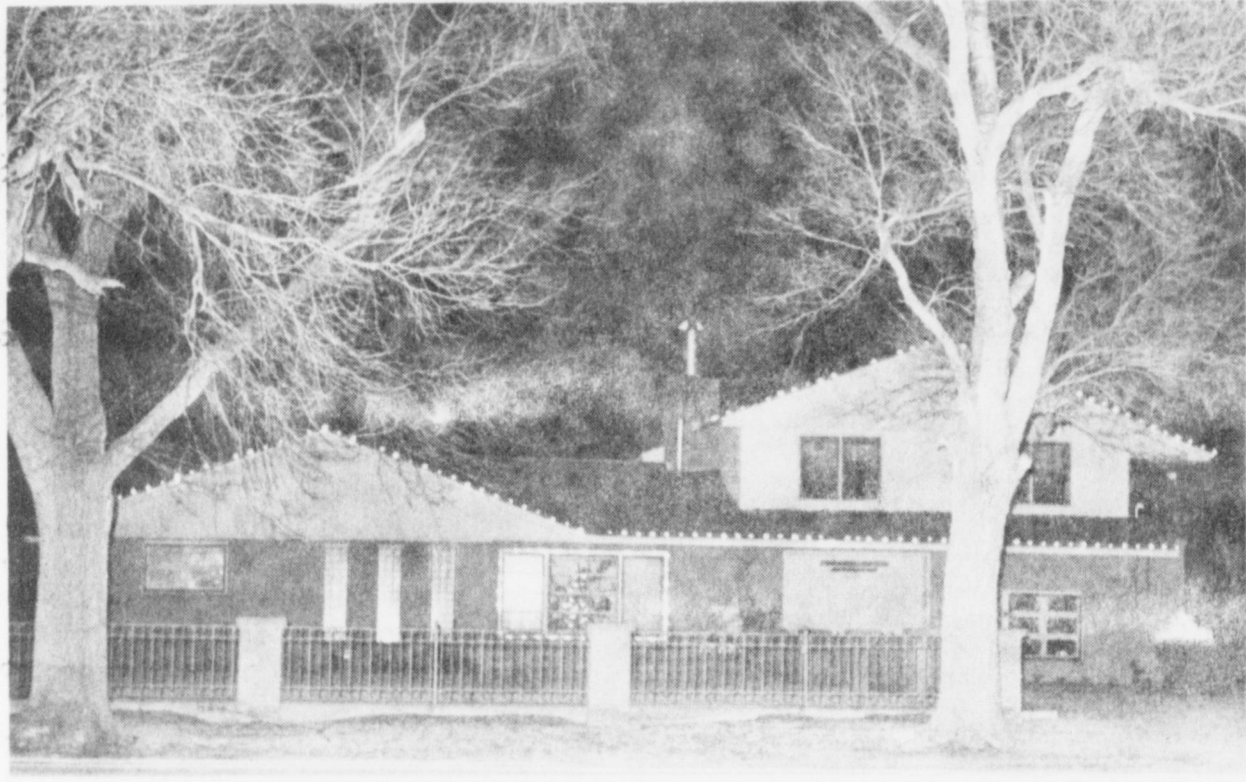

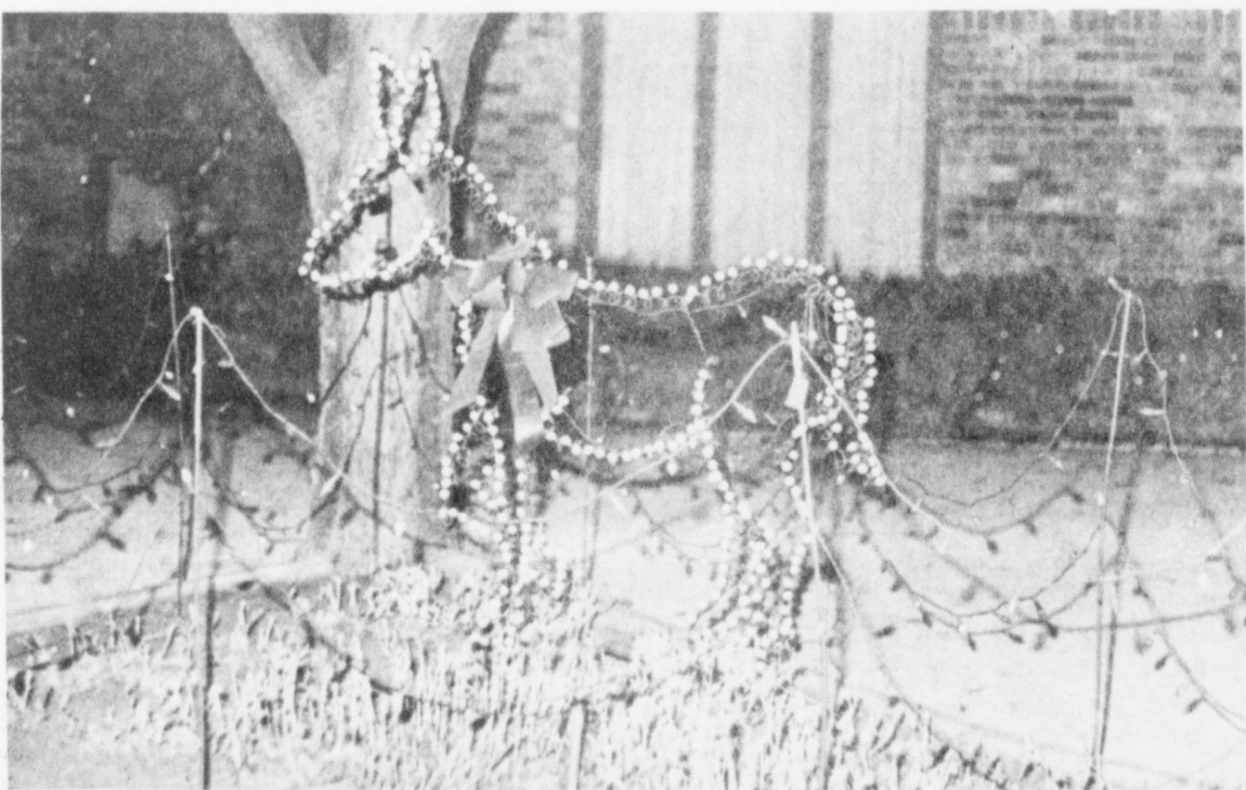

Combat Readiness Redefined

The US Military might be taking tips from the National Football League (NFL). Years ago, the NFL discovered that its players-many tipping the scale at 250 pounds or more-didn't exactly meet traditional definitions of fitness. Coaches quickly recognized that bulk, whether from fat or muscle, comes in handy when blocking opponents and protecting quarterbacks. Unlike the NFL, the military has had a long tradition of requiring veterans and new recruits to meet strict weight-for-height standards. Although such standards are useful in determining health status, they are not indicative of a soldier's ability to perform typical military tasks requiring lifting, carrying, and moving heavy equipment.

Thus the U.S. Army asked the institute of Medicine's Committee on Military Research, which has been advising the Army since 1982, to evaluate whether military standards predict more about soldiers' physical appearance than performance.

After months of study, the committee concluded that, "There is no consistent relationship between body fat content and physical performance."

Research has shown that while smaller and lighter-weight individuals do well in running and physical tests, they may not perform as well on military tasks like lifting, often required in combat. On the other hand, most moderately overweight individuals perform reasonably well in load-carrying ability.

Although the committee did not recommend that the military abandon its weight standards completely, it did advise

establishing a minimum standard for lean body mass and developing job-related physical performance tests. Such standards would eliminate the need for a body composition standard as an indicator of combat readiness. direct response and a growing number of retail stores across the country.
