Editors are human beings the same ns teachers, preachers, and armers and appreciate polite with whom they deal. As a rule the majority of those who "refuse" papers at the postoffice are in arrears and have not the morI courage to do as they should in the matter. The editor would tave more respect for them if they would go to him and tell him they are not going to pay for his paper and that it will be saving to him to discontince their tubscription."
Unnecessary P-osecutions
When we watch the proceedings of the courts and see the number of prosecutions instituted through melice or nreddice, we are impressed with the importance of a law that
will compell the party who makes a complant against any one, to prove what he alleges in his complaint or pay the cost of such prosecution If such was the iaw in Tex as, the dockets of our courts would not be burdened with cases wherein the State and County are put to a great ex pense, and the officers of said courts, to a great deal of trouble and expense, without any hope of remuneration. Said officers not only lose their time in such cases, but have to pay out their hard earned money to satisfy the malice or predj. udice of some "wart" on socie ty. Some of the States have a law such as the one mentioned above, and those who file a complaint under said law, are forced to prove the same, or pay the cost of prosecation. If we had stach a law the a bove, Jury scrip would go to one hundred cents on the dollar, for the reason the draft on said fund would be reduced one half what it is, and we would no longer be confronted with the claim that we must have open saloons to supply our Ju ry fund. - Eastland Chronicle. Upon first reading the above one might readily conclucie that such a law as proposed woald be about the
proper thing; but a careful
looking into the matter is sufficient to convince one that it would be far from right. Such a law would discourage nvestigation in many instan ecs where a very serious crime had been connmitted; again, a man might be an eye witness to a crime and be doing his duty as a citizen in mak ng complaint, yet, being lone, he could not prove what he alieged in the complaint, and would be thrown in the cost while the criminal would go at liberty. Such a law would be unjust, notwithstanding the fact that it would prevent many complaints thru predjudice and malice.
