Mr. Tracy's Letter,

In a letter to the Plainview Weekly Messenger of last week Harry Tracy of Wright, Texas, sums up the plains situation as a farming country as follows: "A glance at the physical map will inform one that the plains is a semi-arid country; that the average annual rain fall is from 10 to 20 inches; that it is not therefore, an all round farming country, and any who locate in it with the intention of tilling the soil exclusively for a living will make a mistake."

Being a resident of the plains and well pleased with the country it follows as a matter of course that I desire it filled up with my old acquaintances and others whom I believe it will benefit to locate in it, but being opposed to all booming schemes I cannot refrain from informing those who think of moving to the plains to first come and look carefully at the country before making a purchase.

Nearly all who I have spoken to on the subject believe that railroads and tillage will greatly increase the rainfall, I can't believe this, because all arid countries whose histories tell us were arid 4,000 years ago are arid still and the only thing that has ever made an arid country a productive farming country has been irrigation and such I believe will be the history of this country.

Irrigation will make the plains the greatest farming country in the world, and I believe there is sufficient water from 40 to 150 feet under the surface to irrigate three-fourths of the surface.

The difficulty is not in drawing the water to the surface, but in storing it till needed.

Like Mr. Tracy we are opposed to all "booming schemes," and we would be glad if our fellow editors would be more considerate in what they say in regard to this country. Some of our exchanges are continually laden with things that remind us very much of the bait we have seen on the fisherman's hook—attractive but rotten. But we are not going to misrepresent it in any respect in order to get people to come, only to go away dissatisfied and a heart full of hard things to say

Our school geographers have given the country the name of a high dry plain, unfit for anything but the Indian and the Buffalo etc; they have classed the plains among the arid belts; and yet we find them extremely "off" concerning the plains. We believe that all that is necessary to make the plains a farming country is "farmers and farming" Settle the country, cultivate the country, and our candid opinion is that the rainfall will be sufficient to make crops and mature crops, even beyond the expectations of the most enthusiastic.

There is one thing sure, this is NO LONGER A CATTLE COUNTRY, the big cowman has already acknowledged this.—Crosby Co. News.

O, ye shades of Jot Gunter! Wouldn't this pair of articles take your hair off! Did anyone ever read such rot? Gotten up, too, by men who ought to know better. Referring to Mr. Tracy's part of the foregoing we can easily prove that the plains, farmer makes more money than the same class of men are making in Mr. Tracy's old home county (Milam), even if he has to do

it in a "semi-arid region." And the News article is so simply preposterous that we don't know where to begin. Charles should be more explicit and name the papers that are using "rotten" bait. It has ever been the policy of this paper to tell the plain unvarnished truth about the plains country but when we read a set of adlepted article like the foregoing we cannot help but enter a protest. Just read again the last part of the News article: "There is nothing sure, this is no longer a cattle country" etc. Now if the news refers to his own county we have no means to dispute it, but if he refers to "the plains" then we should like to call his attention to the fact this is conceded to be the great breeding grounds for the northern feeders. In Briscoe county alone there are over 39,000 head of cattle, while in the News own county there 34,911 head, and in the Panhandle there are 1,040,949 head of cattle. Oh, no this is not a cattle county. Rats!
