Broad West Texas Idea.

What questions are fermenting in the minds of the men who are captaining the development of West Texas is shown pretty well by the list of topics to be discussed at the meeting which will be held next month at San Angelo. They are going to talk about the "promotion of a still more friendly feeling on the part of North, East and South Texas," to consider how "to get farmers and homeseekers in general," and how to induce "the investment of foreign capital," to discuss "what is needed for the encouragement of railroad building," and "the improvement of educational conditions," and there is to be a "consideration of needed legislation and how to secure the same."

These are some of the problems which, in the estimation of its most enterprising minds, oppose the ambitions of West Texas. They are not unique, nor exceptional even. Indeed, they are not even peculiar to that section, a circumstance which emphasizes the fact that though it is a State of vast distances and varied interests, the problems whose solution means the growth of Texas are pretty much the same in their larger aspects. There are some things which perhaps West Texas more urgently needs to do than South Texas, just as there are problems that press South Texas harder than they do West Texas. That difference of degree justifies different distributions of sectional pride and energy, but it makes all sections, however remote, partners in the

grand enterprise of making all Texas bigger and better. Does not Northeast Texas, too, need more railroads, more farmers and more developing capital? And hasn't Southeast Texas as much concern as West Texas in the quality of even that legislation which bears on industrial affairs?

There has grown up a notion that because some sections of the State are more advanced industrially than other sections, the measure which helps one may hurt the other. That is very largely a fancy, a theory, which has more of the appearance, than the substance of fact. There is not yet that disparity of need between any two sections which makes the self-interest of one conflict with that of the other. It is easily conceivable that West Texas should support some measures with more zeal than South Texas should, but the positive attitude of West Texas can afford South Texas, for example, no reason to assume a negative attitude. It might hurt West Texas thereby, but it would not itself wholly escape some part of the resulting damage.

Those West Texans show a pretty firm grasp of their problems, but in defining them they have proved again that their interests are the interests of the whole State.—Dallas News.

A Lowly Heroine.

A woman born blind scrubbed floors for twenty-three years and from her labors saved money enough to have an operation performed which restored her sight. Immediately upon

recovery she announced that she would go back to work to save money that her brother, similarly afflicted, might also receive surgical treatment. And the world is full of us fellows who have normal bodies and brains and have not done anything for anybody else's comfort that wouldn't, if we started to tell about it, shrivel up and look so little we'd be ashamed to try to talk about it.—Fort Worth Record.

It is very true. The good we have done when compared to that we might do is pitifully insignificant and short reached. But the incident cited by the contemporary carries another text upon which a sermon might be grounded. The afflicted woman's exemplification of the virtues of patience and industry is no less notable than her unselfishness and broad charity. And it is worthy of remark that it was the sister, not the brother, who toiled and waited and hoped twenty-three years for a cure. It is women upon whom such princely endowments in the way of patience, fortitude and repression are bestowed.—Dallas News.

The daily papers of the state have published the following dispatch:

"Major T. E. Durham, assistant superintendent of the state penitentiary at Rusk, was indicted today by the Hill county grand jury on a charge of murder. Durham, while sergeant of the Steiner-Valley farm in this county in 1905, is alleged to have severely whipped, or caused to be whipped, a white convict named Athens, who died shortly afterwards from the effects of this lashing, it is alleged. The indictment charges that the whipping was done with a large leather strap.

"Sheriff Cox left for Rusk this afternoon with instructions to take Durham into custody instantly. Further than to admit the bare fact that Durham had been indicted for murder, local officers declined to talk of the case. It is generally understood, however, that the grand jury's action is the result of disclosures made before the legislative penitentiary investigating committee, which recently made a tour of the prison farms."

The investigating committee have unearthed some infamous conduct in connection with the treatment of the state's convicts, which is a blight on the pages of the history of the government of Texas, and a stench in the nostrils of decency and justice. It is worse than criminal that the state officials would permit those she had engaged to mete out justice to and reform to be the prey of such barbarity and cruelty as has been practiced for so long a time in our state prisons. It is hoped by those who still cherish a little respect for right that those responsible for the cruelties which have been practiced on these helpless unfortunates will be called to account, for their conduct.

Silverton is already taking on the appearance of holidays. The streets are beginning to be thronged by anxious seekers for Santa Claus.

County Court.

The following disposition was made of the cases on the docket in the county court last week.

In the case of the State of Texas Vs. Lewis Creg, charged with unlawfully carrying a pistol, continued until January term of court.

In the case of the State of Texas Vs. Mrs. K. E. Bain, charged with unlawfully branding cattle, case continued to next term of court.

In the case of the State of Texas Vs. O. B. Witcher, charged with gaming, case continued.

In the case of the State of Texas Vs. Tom Christian, for assault, case continued.

In the case of the State of Texas Vs. Bernice Poe, for carrying brass knucks, plead guilty and fined \$100 and cost.

In the case of the State of Texas Vs. Bill Milton for carrying a six-shooter, acquitted.

The time of holding county court has been changed from the first Monday in February to the first Monday in January and every three months thereafter.

In the report of the shooting up of Quitaque in the Enterprise of week before last we stated that the boys arrested were brought to Silverton and placed in jail and afterward released on bond. We have later been advised that the boys were not put in jail and we gladly make the correction. In another place in this paper is the report of the disposition of the cases against the boys which were arrested, as far as they have been disposed of.

On last Thursday the following petition, as published in the Dalhart Evening News, was sent to Gov. Campbell by the citizens of Dalhart, asking for his assistance in bringing relief to one of their former citizens who is being detained in prison at Guadalajara, Mexico.

To Hon. T. M. Campbell, Governor of Texas.

We, the undersigned citizens of Dallam and Hartley counties, respectfully desire to call your attention to the fact that one, James A. Cook, formerly a resident of Dalhart, Texas, has been incarcerated in a Mexican jail at Guadalajara, Mexico, for several months past, having been held there upon a charge of robbing two cars on the Mexican Central Railroad, never having been given a trial upon said charge, and earnestly declaring his innocence of same.

During his residence in Dalhart, Mr. Cook was a man of honest, upright principle in every respect and a cred-

ible citizen, and we confidently believe that he is at least entitled to a hearing thereon, and we, as citizens of the State of Texas, appeal to you as our chief executive, to render such immediate assistance as may be necessary to bring the condition of this man before the proper Federal authorities in such a forcible manner as will inaugurate the necessary steps to at once bring him relief. The conditions under which he is held and the harsh and cruel treatment to which he is subjected, is so injurious to his health as to amount to nothing less than murder by a slow and cruel process, and relief must come without delay in order to protect his life.

We feel that it is necessary to acquaint you with the facts in this in order to procure your speedy assistance, and that your high sense of justice to mankind and especially to a citizen of Texas will impel you to act promptly in this matter in such manner as may be proper in the premises.

The Commissioners Court held its session this week to receive bids on the county's school land. Co. Judge, Carley Gibbs and C. A. Goldsmith, present lessee of the county school lands, both of Midland county, Dr. Marrow of Dublin, Texas, and others were present and bid on the land; but the bids were all lower than the court was willing to consider.

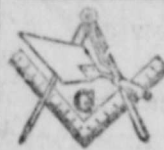
