Railroad Incorporated

Articles of incorporation of the Panhandle Short Line Railway Company of Dalhart were approved by the attorney general Friday, in Austin.

The charter specifies that the road shall run from Dalhart through Dalham, Hartley, Oldam, Deaf Smith, Castro, Lamb, Hale and Lubbock counties to Lubbock. This route covers a distance of 200 miles.

The capital stock of the company is \$300,000. Incorporators who are also directors, are Wichita Falls men. They are E. G. Cook, W. R. Ferguson, C. O. Vernon and others.—Randall County News.

Now comes Dan Montague, who resides in Briscoe County, Texas, hereinafter called plaintiff, complaining of D. C. Lowe, who resides in the state of New Mexico, and of "Commonwealth Organization Company of Fort Worth, Texas" a joint stock company, whose place of business is to plaintiff unknown, and whose members and agents are all to plaintiff unknown, and their place of residence unknown, hereinafter called defendants, and for cause of action plaintiff avers:

That defendant D. C. Lowe on the 11th day of July, 1910, made, executed and delivered to plaintiff the following described note, to-wit: Note for the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) dated July 11, 1910, due twelve months after date, payable to Dan Montague or order at Silverton, Texas, bearing interest at the rate of 10 per cent per annum from date, and providing for 10 per cent additional as attorneys fees if placed in the hands of an attorney for collection. That Silverton is in Briscoe County, Texas. That said note was renewed and extended by written extension May 3, 1915, said extension making the new date of maturity November 30th, 1915. That interest on said note has been paid to January 11, 1918. That plaintiff is the owner and holder of said note and same is past due and unpaid except as herein stated.

That said note was secured by a deed of trust executed by defendant, D. C. Lowe, dated July 11, 1910, conveying to Jno. Burson as trustee for the benefit of plaintiff, the following described land and premises, to-wit:

Forty acres of land out of Section No. Twenty-one (21) in Block A, Cert. No. 71, A. & B., in Briscoe County, Texas, described by notes and bounds as follows: Beginning at a stake in the North line of Survey 21, Block A at 1306.4 varas East of its N. W. corner, the same being the S. W. corner of Survey 20 same block; thence East 237.6 varas a stake; thence South 950 varas a stake; thence West 237.6 varas a stake; thence North 950 varas to the place of beginning, same known as Block Three McMurry addition to the town

of Silverton.

That said deed of trust provided that said land should be sold to satisfy said note in case of default thereon.

That on or about the 1st day of December, 1910, defendant D. C. Lowe executed and delivered to defendant Commonwealth Organization Company of Fort Worth, Texas, his note for the sum of \$875.00, dated Dec. 1, 1910, due Dec. 1, 1915, bearing 6 per cent interest from date, and to secure said note gave said defendant a deed of trust on the above described land and premises, naming John Scarborough therein as trustee. That said note and deed of trust lien are second and inferior to plaintiffs note and deed of trust above described.

That plaintiff has placed his said note in the hands of Kenneth Bain an attorney, for collection and has agreed to pay him 5 per cent of the amount due as attorneys fees which is a reasonable and just attorneys fee.

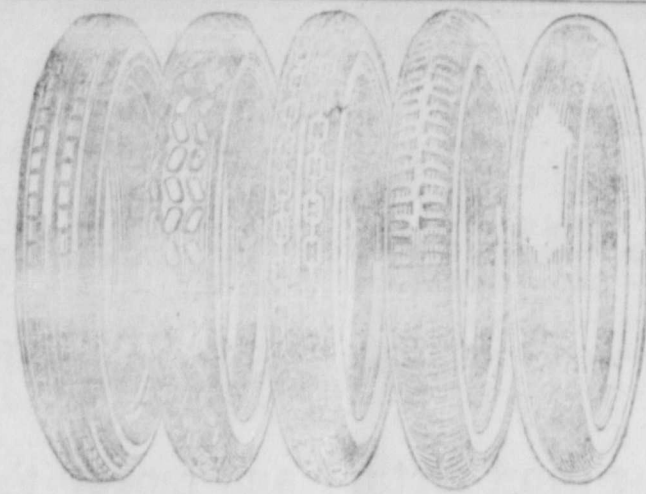

Get a Hand Grenade; Is Rarest Souvenir of Great World War



Hammering the Hun line until it bent and broke, bearing the Kaiser and his clans down to inglorious defeat, the American soldiers used one weapon in greater numbers than any other. It was a weapon they had never used before, one that had been obsolete for centuries—the hand-grenade—but when the brawny lads from the U. S. A. sent the old "eggs," as they were called, spinning into dugout and pill-box, the only Boches remaining on the ground were those ready to be buried.

Grenades were known to have been used five centuries ago. In 1427, at the siege of the Fortress of Casmagiore on the River Po in Italy, the defenders used a primitive grenade, made of a glass bottle filled with powder. For a time, grenades were made out of heavy paper, then out of glass and then out of metal. With the close of the eighteenth century, the grenade began to be discarded and little use had been made of it until the Russo-Japanese war in 1904.

It remained for the Great World War to see the grenade developed into its present efficiency. The grenades used by the American doughboys were as carefully manufactured as their rifles. But the end of hostilities found a limited supply on hand and these were turned over to the Savings Division of the Treasury Department, the explosives extracted and they have been made over into savings banks.

Thus a weapon of war has been transformed into a "weapon of peace." Instead of being used to battle the Hun, it is now being used in the fight against the High Cost of Living and the arch-enemy, Thriftlessness. Any boy or girl can secure a grenade by purchasing a \$5 War Savings Stamp; any adult by investing in three or more War Savings Stamps, but these must have been bought after July 15, 1919. These hand grenades will be distributed through local banks and by a few merchants.

If you want a grenade, get busy. Make arrangements with your banker immediately. Only a limited number of these rare and unique souvenirs of the World War could be secured and when they are gone there will be no chance of obtaining one. You don't have to wait until the grenade is received to begin saving. Do that now. Then when the grenade arrives you will have that much of a start toward owning it. Ask your banker
