# WASHINGTON GOSSIP

## Commercial Assaults on National Parks



WASHINGTON. — Preservation of our national parks and monuments against the organized assault of commercial water power and irrigation interests is a subject that is going to attract much attention at this session of congress and in the next congress. So important is the matter, in the opinion of Secretary Payne of the Interior department, that he begins his 1921 annual report with this discussion. He says, first thing: "This is a vital question. The conflict between the demands of commerce and the preservation of these wonder

places involves constant vigilance. In my view, their preservation is of the first importance. It should be the settled policy of the country, regardless of any question of utility, that when in the wisdom of the congress national parks or monuments are definitely set apart they must be preserved in their integrity, forever free from any form of commercialization. If this principle is not recognized, and commercialization in any form is allowed to creep in, it will be only a question of time when our wild West will be only a memory and the big game of our country will be extinct, and these places and objects, now so wonderful, will be seriously and permanently injured.

Secretary Payne then discusses a six-foot irrigation dam across the mouth of Yellowstone lake in Yellowstone National park, the project of an association of Montana people. He says that any material raising of the water would destroy timber, hot springs and scenery, and adds:

## Cost to Uncle Sam of War and "Peace"

NET cost of the war to the American government has been fixed by Secretary Houston at \$24,010,000,000.

A special message giving the complete expenses of the American peace commission during its work abroad has been transmitted to the senate by President Wilson. Total expenditures amounted to \$1,651,199.09 from December 1, 1918, to December 4, 1920. The amount actually paid out was \$1,703,712.03, but repayments and gains in exchange reduced this by \$52,520.97. Some of the larger items were:

Travel and subsistence, \$528,442; subsistence, \$193,629; salaries, \$200,871; wages and employees at Hotel Crillon, \$131,507; rents, \$176,853; food, hotel and kitchen supplies, \$283,500; hire and laundering of linen at hotel, \$64,909; damage and loss of property at hotel, \$125,870.

Various missions to Russia, Germany, Posen, Turkey, Holland, and Armenia cost \$239,120. Purchase of automobiles amounted to \$14,002, and confidential expenses of Presidential party to \$17,534.

E. M. House and Henry White re-



ceived monthly salaries of \$1,000 as commissioners, while Robert Lansing, former secretary of state, and Gen. Tasker H. Bliss, other commissioners, had their actual expenses paid.

The accounts showed refunds by President Wilson of 914.70 francs for expenses while at Rome; by E. M. House of 10,402 francs for official entertainment from December 1, 1918, to June 3, 1919, by Secretary Lansing of 1,500 francs for tips and of large sums for expenses of the wives of the commissioners.

Doctor Grayson was credited with frequent drafts of \$1,000 and more for "confidential expenses of the President."

## What's Uncle Sam Doing About Flying?



WHAT is Uncle Sam going to do about keeping up with the air procession? Your guess is as good as anybody's guess, these days.

One story is that the War department is preparing to call for bids for 300 new airplanes on designs worked out by the army aviation section, which include all latest improvements demonstrated to be valuable by recent tests. Approximately \$3,000,000, it is estimated, will be spent on the planes.

The total appropriation for the air service—exclusive of pay and maintenance of men, which is carried in other sections of the army bill—was \$83,000,000, of which it was provided that not less than \$5,250,000 should be spent

for experimental and research work and not less than \$6,000,000 for new machines and equipment.

The air service last year asked for \$80,000,000 and will ask this session of congress for \$60,000,000. Senators on the military affairs committee and members of the house military committee said that nothing like this much money could be allowed in view of the pressing need for cutting governmental expenses.

Aviation activities in the navy are scattered through half a dozen bureaus and efforts are being made to obtain legislation establishing a bureau of naval aeronautics, headed by a rear admiral.

In the meantime experts declare that the nation is lagging farther and farther behind European countries. The United States is so ill equipped as to be virtually defenseless and in commercial navigation it has scarcely begun to start.

The army air force is inadequate and most of the plants are either obsolete or obsolescent. The navy air force is primitive compared with that of the British and French navies.

## One Grand Jag to Get Rid of the Stuff

THE plans for enforcing prohibition in the United States were presented to the house ways and means committee the other day, two of them by prohibition advocates and the other by Representative Joseph R. Fordney of Michigan, committee chairman.

Wayne B. Wheeler, counsel for the Anti-Saloon league, suggested a tax of \$500 a gallon on the whisky, the mintage of all stocks in bond to render it unfit for beverage purposes, and genuine enforcement of the law by at least one federal district attorney.

Prohibition Commissioner John F. Kramer recommended that all liquor now in the government warehouses be concentrated in three or four warehouses in Kentucky, where heavy guards can be placed and illegal withdrawals be prevented. He said that 29,000,000 gallons have been withdrawn since January 14, 1920, leaving 40,000,000 gallons in storage.

Representative Fordney said that it might be turned loose by the government, sold to the buyers, and the



topers could have one grand jag and thereby end the trouble and expense for the government.

"Don't you think the cheapest way out of this problem for the taxpayers," asked Chairman Fordney, "would be for the government to open the warehouses, let this whisky be sold, and let the topers have one grand drunk and get rid of it all?"

"Yes, that has already been suggested to the bureau," replied Mr. Kramer. Considerable pressure has been brought to bear in favor of the proposal, but we haven't been able to see our way clear to do it."

### Funeral of British Officers Killed in Dublin

## HOW BRITAIN HOUSES PEOPLE

Problem Being Worked Out in Village Only Five Miles From London.

### PLAN FOR 800,000 HOUSES

Colossal Task Involves Expenditure of More Than \$100,000,000 Every Year for a Period of More Than Sixty Years.

New York.—"It's all jolly well to look to the government to solve your particular housing problem, but at the same time public-spirited men and women, working independently, with the right ideas, can do much toward aiding the government in reducing this problem to a minimum."

"That in substance is what Mrs. Henrietta Barnett had in mind when, with others interested in community welfare, she established the Hampstead Garden Suburb, five miles from London.

"Our village now is a most attractive place," said Mrs. Barnett, at the Cosmopolitan club, New York, where she is staying for a few days before returning to England. "Hampstead Garden Suburb now has a population of about 10,000. The ground was broken for it in 1907 and the present position of this pioneer experiment of town extension, in spite of suspension of building more than six years, is most satisfactory."

Many desperate homeseekers in New York no doubt would heartily endorse a similar scheme, says the writer of an article published in the Boston Globe.

#### Project for 800,000 Houses.

That the housing problem in England has been more serious than that in New York is indicated by the statement that England is engaged in the colossal task of building 800,000 homes for her people at the tremendous cost of more than \$100,000,000 every year for a period of more than sixty years. The necessity of sheltering homeless people became so acute that the government adopted this plan. In 1927 it will be considered again by the government. If it proves practicable, it may be continued; if not, some improved scheme may be substituted for it.

Under this plan the various municipal

ities issue bonds to carry out their particular schemes. Houses thus built are rented at the lowest possible rate and any deficiency beyond a certain figure is guaranteed by the national government.

This plan is helping to meet the present great and urgent housing emergency of England.

After long years passed in University settlement work, with her husband, the noted Canon Barnett, vicar of St. Jude's Whitechapel, for which they were the inspiration in England, Mrs. Barnett evolved her ideas for a country community in which every family could have its own bath and its own garden.

"Part of this village," Mrs. Barnett explained, "was built around an open space of eighty acres. In addition to the woods there are public gardens, playgrounds and sheltered seats which may be enjoyed by all the tenants, whatever rents they pay."

"The village represents a new community spirit and has been the means of promoting a better understanding between various classes by arranging that people with different sizes of income may live on the estate. It is not a charity enterprise. It is self-supporting and has made for the happi-

ness and improved health of the families who have taken cottages at Hampstead Garden Suburb.

#### Health Side Important.

"As women are the home makers and home dwellers, and as the house is the shell of the home, women should have a voice in housing plans. 'The Queen Anne style in the front with the Mary Ann style at the back,' to quote Sir Edwin Lutyens, must not continue when it means all the beauty and comfort for the rich and ugliness and discomfort for the domestic worker."

Speaking of the health side of the housing plan known throughout Great Britain as the "model village," Mrs. Barnett told how the district medical officer weighed and measured the village children and found them taller, heavier and broader than those of the same age in the city.

"That report was most gratifying to me," Mrs. Barnett commented, "because the pale faces of the little children of the Whitechapel district with which my husband and myself were so familiar, keep haunting me and urging me on to do something of this kind."

"I believe that the solution of many of our national differences and difficulties lies in a more neighborly attitude, not separation or isolation. Architects too often study how to get as many people as possible housed in a small space. It is hoped that those concerned with town planning will consider the natural intermixing of all social classes and the communion of the handicapped with the happy."

## SMUGGLERS RUN WILD

Traffic Carried on Huge Scale on German Border.

Customs Officials Are in Plots and Government is Unable to Check Evil.

Berlin.—Smuggling over the Dutch and Danish frontiers, which the German government had gone to great effort to suppress, again is flourishing "on a colossal scale," and at some points with the full knowledge and connivance of many government officials, according to reports here.

Smugglers are declared to be outbidding the government for the aid of dishonest officials, and the "veritable army of customs officers on the borders have permitted millions of marks worth of tobacco, cigars, cigarettes, coffee and sugar to cross the border duty free within the last few months."

Flying squadrons of customs officers have been organized by the government to catch the smugglers who are said to have so thoroughly systematized their operations that "customs receipts are rapidly falling back to nothing, for custom control is again only on paper."

Fifty thousand pounds of coffee are being smuggled over the border daily at one point, a report says, and smugglers everywhere are working with the sympathy and assistance of all dwellers along the frontiers.

Men, women and even children, are said to be engaged in this trade. High prices, low wages of customs officials and the depreciated value of the mark is credited as one of the principal causes for the widespread violation of import and export regulations.

The smugglers are described as being so well organized and so confident they carry on their business "by land and wholesale scale, and quite openly."

## FETE FOR NAPOLEON

United States Asked to Join in Great Celebration.

Foch at Head of French Committee Arranging for Observance of Death Anniversary.

New York.—American participation in the celebration by France of the hundredth anniversary of the death of Napoleon on May 5 next, was invited here by Prof. William Mulligan Sloane of Princeton, N. J., speaking for the French committee headed by Marshal Foch. A feature of the affair whose objects, it is stated, are "to bind the wounds of France," will be a great exhibition of Napoleonic relics at Malmaison, France, to which collections will be loaned from all parts of the world.

Professor Sloane, who for 42 years held the chair of history at Princeton, and latterly at Columbia university,

said that French statesmen, soldiers and men of law and letters as well as other professions compose the committee which is arranging the centennial.

"Making all allowance for every severe criticism of Napoleon's career," he continued, "it is still true that his work unified France, saved it from partition among its foes and in civil life prepared alike the foundation and structure of the society which in the World war saved France and helped to save all western civilization."

"It was by his impulse and guidance that the financial credit of France was restored, that the magistracy and administration took definite shape, that the civil code was promulgated, the Bank of France created, the University of France modeled on that of the state of New York and the council of state organized."

"He made private property safe, opened public charges, great and small, to all classes; founded schools, colleges and secondary schools, built

magnificent highways, dug an elaborate system of internal waterways, improved transportation of every sort and, above all, reorganized in his institutions the commanding position of belles-lettres, the fine arts and natural science. The superb inheritance of order, progress and prosperity which he bequeathed made the France of 1914.

"The French committee especially desires American participation by contributions, by the loan of Napoleonic relics from American collections and, above all, the moral support of intelligent interest on this side of the Atlantic."

#### Governor Pardons His Auto.

Lexington, Ky.—Police took Gov. E. P. Morrow's car to the station because a traffic officer claimed it was improperly parked. "I've come to pardon my car," the governor said, and after a warning, was permitted to drive it away.

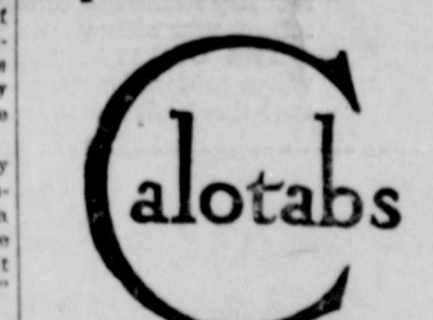

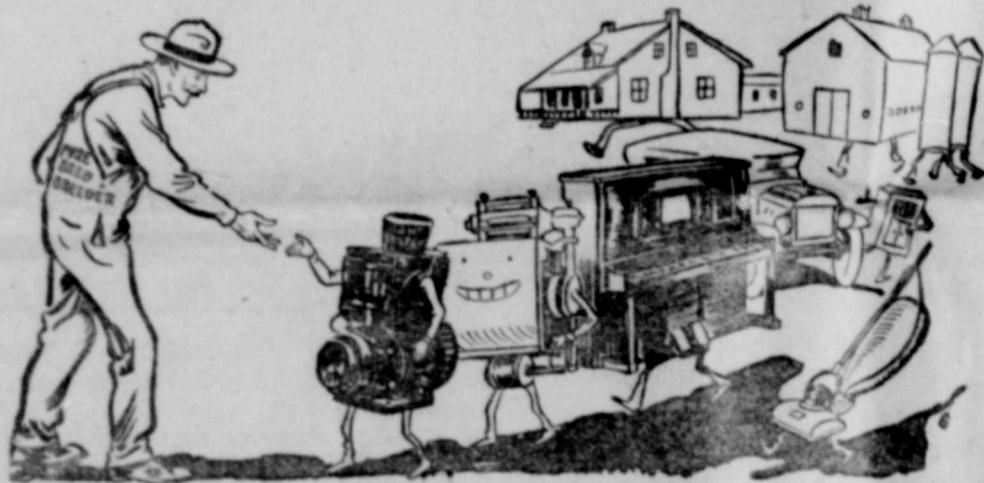

## The Kitchen Cabinet

### WHAT SHALL WE EAT?

With a cupful of leftover cooked ham one may have a most appetizing dish of



**Ham Timbales.**  
—Take two tablespoonfuls of butter, one-fourth of a cupful of stale breadcrumbs, two-thirds of a cupful of milk, one cupful of cooked ham, one-half tablespoonful of chopped parsley, two eggs and salt and pepper. Melt the butter, add the bread crumbs and milk, and cook five minutes, stirring constantly. Add the ham, parsley and eggs, slightly beaten. Season with salt and pepper, turn into buttered individual molds, have the mold two-thirds full, and set in a pan of hot water and bake 20 minutes. Serve with bechamel sauce.

**Carrot Salad.**—Take eight carrots, one egg, a pinch of soda, one-half teaspoonful of salt, four tablespoonfuls of olive oil, eight tablespoonfuls of vinegar, one-half teaspoonful of paprika, one-half cupful of whipped cream and a bunch of parsley. Wash the carrots, put them in a saucepan, cover with salted water and cook until tender. Drain, remove the skins and serve covered with dressing and garnish with parsley. Beat the eggs in the upper part of the double boiler, add soda and oil slowly, beating constantly until the egg thickens. Add salt, vinegar, paprika, and cook over hot water until thick, adding the vinegar and paprika. Remove from the heat and set aside to cool. Serve with cream at serving time.

**Oatmeal With Dates.**—Cook oatmeal as usual, add a cupful of quartered dates and mold in small cups. Serve with top milk as a dessert or supper dish for children.

### GOOD THINGS.

Cakes and cookies at this season are always an addition to any menu. The few that follow, are all good:

**Orange Chocolate Cake.**  
—Cut up one-fourth of a pound of bitter chocolate; when softened, add one-half cupful of sugar and one and one-half cupfuls of milk; heat to the boiling point, stirring constantly; boil five minutes. Cool and add two

teaspoonfuls of vanilla. In the meantime cream one-half cupful of shortening with one cupful of sugar, then add two eggs beaten well. Add three tablespoonfuls of hot water, then add two cupfuls of flour sifted with three-fourths of a teaspoonful of salt and one teaspoonful of soda, alternately, with the chocolate mixture, stirring thoroughly. Bake in two layers in a moderate oven for 30 minutes, decreasing the heat as necessary. Put together with orange icing, or a cooked orange cream filling.

**Pomona Pudding.**—Mix four tablespoonfuls of flour with one-half cupful of sugar and one-fourth of a teaspoonful of salt, until thoroughly blended. Stir this mixture into one-half cupful of warm sweet elder and keep stirring until thick and smooth. Add the juice and pulp of three oranges. Pour into a dish, make a meringue of the whites of three eggs beaten with six tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar; beat this into two cupfuls of soft-cooked rice and arrange in a border around the orange mixture in the dish. Bake or steam until the meringue is set, and decorate with glazed orange sections or any candied fruit.

**Orange Pudding.**—Take three cupfuls of boiling water, three-fourths of a cupful of sugar or honey, one tablespoonful of butter, the juice of two large oranges. Pour the water, sugar, fat and juice into a saucepan and boil ten minutes. Take one-half cupful of honey, one and one-half tablespoonfuls of butter, one-half cupful of milk, two teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one and one-half cupfuls of flour and one-half teaspoonful of salt. Cream the honey and butter together, add milk, flour sifted with the other ingredients, beat well and drop by spoonfuls into the hot orange sauce. Bake 25 minutes and serve hot with a few sections of orange as a garnish.

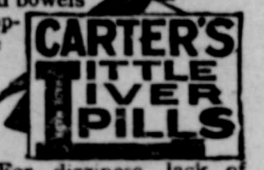

Writer Asserts White Races Made Bargain in Exchanging Reality for the Artificial.

When the later voyagers of Europe came to the uncharted spaces of these warm South Pacific seas they found in the Polynesian group a culture which was beyond the understanding of most of them, and which only a few fine souls glimpsed as an astounding revelation of the natural development of humanity, and, by contrast, of the depravity of civilization.

They found health and high spirits abounding to a degree utterly strange to them, the hardiest and most adventurous of their white kind. Murder, mutiny, shipwreck, and desertion wrote red their reactions to the entrancing liberty of thought and action they found here, and the contrast with their rude, ugly restricted lives in Europe, America, or on their ships. If you would be ashamed of what the pursuit of profits and proselytism, hand in hand, has done, read the reports of explorer, missionary, captain and trader in these waters, and view the remnant, after beauty and honesty had been replaced by modernity and hypocrisy.

It was in clothing that the first invidious approach was made.

In this valley where I am now the only foreigner, with my word and example, life resumes for a time at least much of the old Marquesan way and appearance. The mission church, the first Christian edifice within a thousand miles of here, is fast rejoining the wilderness. Its walls are falling in decay, and its garden is but a jungle. The schoolmaster who taught Vaitahu's children to say, "La France est le plus bon pays du monde," is gone.

Existence is become almost as devoid of invention and divested of artificiality as before the white man came. I am able to rebuild in my mind the structure of Marquesan customs and to view in imagination the attractive aspect of Vaitahu and its idyllic days of old. We have brought out of the huts the native garments of tapa, and we live as much as possible a perspective of the past.

The Tahitians thought the whites who first arrived were gods, and when they found they were men, with their same passions, they thought they were ill. That is the first impression one who lives long with Polynesians has when he meets a group of whites. They look pale, sharp-faced and worried. We pay dear for factories and wheeled vehicles.—Frederick O'Brien in Century Magazine.

Copy American Methods.

Four French cities where Y. W. C. A. loyers are maintained have recently put on finance campaigns in true American fashion, and have raised sums of money exceeding the most optimistic predictions, according to a Y. W. C. A. secretary just returned from France. They are St. Etienne, Tours, Bourges and Mulhouse. The finance campaigns were mapped out and directed by American secretaries and accomplished by the French directors. Sufficient money to carry the 1921 budget of expenses for Y. W. C. A. work in these cities is now in the bank. In Mulhouse 120,000 francs were raised for joint Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. work.
