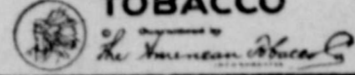

The Kitchen Cabinet

WHAT TO SERVE FOR DINNER.

A soup which is somewhat out of the ordinary and provides a nourishing dish for the bill of fare is:

Cauliflower and Tomato Soup.—Rub a head of cooked cauliflower through a colander, mix with two cupfuls of sifted tomato, add two cupfuls

of water in which the bones of a roast turkey have been cooked. Season with three teaspoonfuls of salt and one tablespoonful of pepper. Cook one tablespoonful of minced onion in three tablespoonfuls of fat until brown. Stir in four tablespoonfuls of flour and add the vegetable pulp and stock. Stir until boiling. Serve with rings of sweet green pepper as a garnish.

Mock Venison.—Hang a leg of mutton in a cool place as long as possible, while it keeps sweet. Then take off the skin and put the mutton into a dripping pan or kettle and pour over the following pickle: Take three heads of garlic or three sliced onions, one-half ounce of peppercorns, one-fourth ounce of allspice berries crushed, six bay leaves, a dozen sprigs of thyme and a dozen sprigs of parsley, all brought to a boil in three cupfuls of vinegar. This pickle should be rubbed into the meat, rubbing and turning for at least thirty minutes. Allow the meat to remain in the pan, covering the top with thinly sliced onions until the next day, then repeat the rubbing and lay in the pan the other side up, covering with onions again. Continue this for four days, then wipe the meat dry and rub for half an hour in a pint of hot molasses. Let the meat hang in a cool place until the next day, then wipe dry and roast the same as a leg of mutton. Serve with melted currant jelly. This sounds like a good deal of work but it is worth it.

Date Bran Muffins.—Sift one cupful of flour, three teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one teaspoonful of salt and one tablespoonful of sugar. Add one beaten egg to two cupfuls of bran and one and one-half cupfuls of milk. Beat thoroughly, add one-half cupful of dates cut in small bits, combine with the flour mixture and bake in muffin pans twenty-five minutes.

Rhubarb Soup.—Take six stalks of rhubarb, cut in small pieces. Add the rhubarb to one quart of veal stock, one small onion, two thin slices of bread and salt and pepper to taste. Let the mixture boil, removing the scum as it rises. Simmer gently until the rhubarb is tender. Strain and serve with toasted bread.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

The leather cushions of chairs and couches may be treated with ordinary tan or black shoe dressing, the cleanser and polishing wax. Rub it in with great care and scratches and stains will be removed, the leather preserved and made new looking.

The leftover pancakes broken in bits and added to scrambled eggs make a palatable dish and a saving on eggs.

Before roasting the leg of lamb place it in a kettle with one-fourth of a cupful of rice, salt, pepper and one onion, celery and parsley; add two quarts of water and simmer one hour. Remove and roast as usual. The broth will make a delicious soup.

Use any bits of leftover paint to paint the inside and outside of the garbage can. It will keep it from rusting.

Hair brushes are good to clean the brushes in the carpet sweeper.

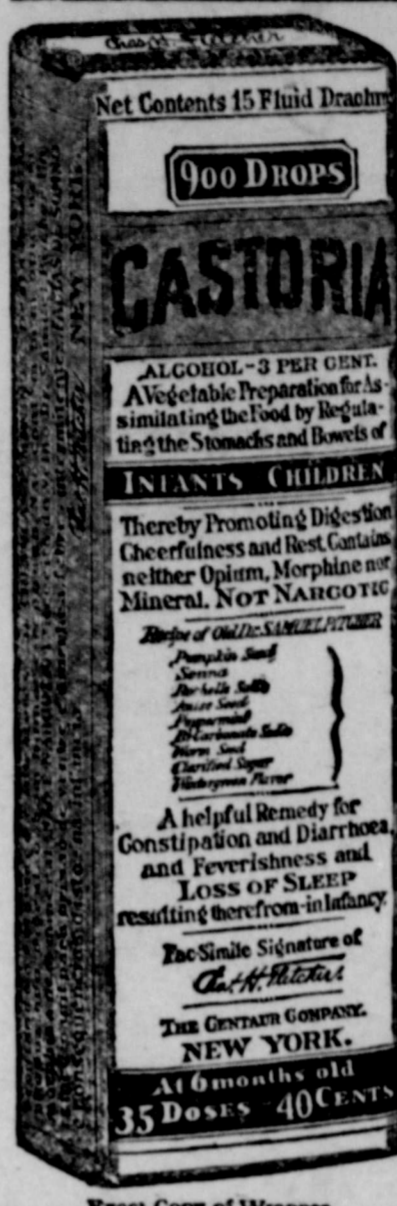
When rendering lard grind it through the sausage grinder and there will be much less waste. They will do this at small cost at the market if you request it.

NEW SOLVENT IS GREAT FIND

Removes Paints, Varnishes, Enamels and Shellacs Without Injuring Wood.

WAS DREAM OF ALCHEMISTS

Dissolves Rubber, Glues, Hydrocarbons and Many Substances Heretofore Regarded as Most Resistant to Chemical Agencies.

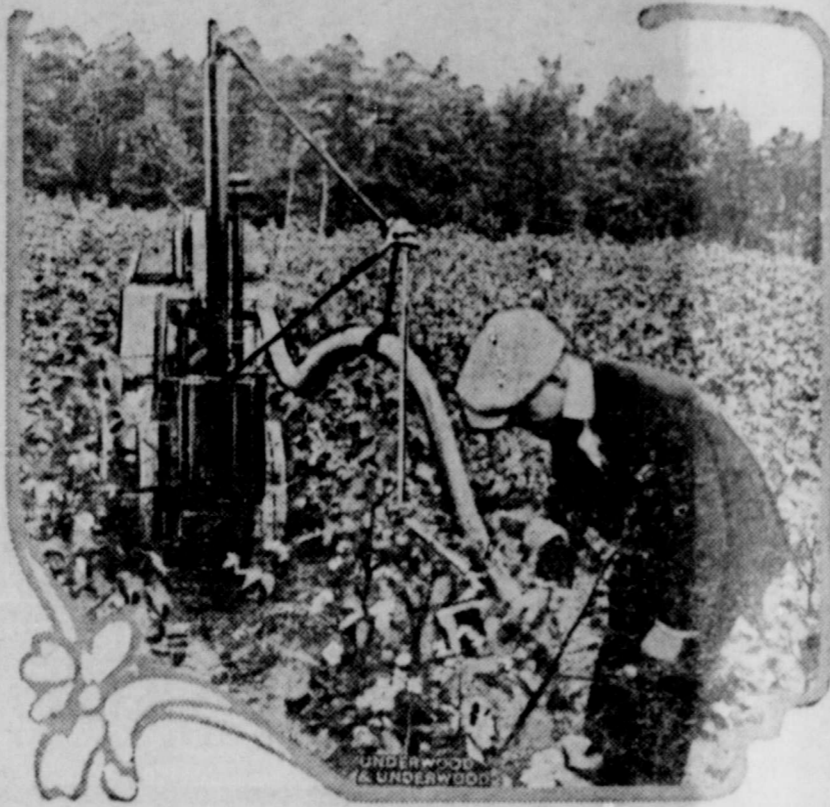
Lincoln, Neb.—New properties of a liquid described before the students of the department of chemistry of the University of Nebraska show that it almost realizes the dream of the alchemists of old who sought the universal solvent.

As described by Dr. Victor Lenher, professor of chemistry at the university of Wisconsin, who has come here to deliver a series of addresses on the subject, further tests have shown that selenium oxychloride as the solvent is called, is more powerful even than was indicated in his preliminary announcement made before the American Chemical society.

It dissolves rubber, glues, enamels, hydrocarbons and many other substances which hitherto have been regarded as most resistant to all chemical agencies except fire.

Other Substances Dissolved. Such products as redmanol, bakelite and condensite, which are used as substitutes for amber in the making of pipe stems and for many other industrial purposes, and have been until now regarded as insoluble in all known solvents, are readily dissolved by selenium oxychloride, according to the announcement of Dr. Lenher. After the picking head has removed the burr, the fluffy cotton is drawn by a small blower through the big flexible tubing into a container on the tractor.

its use ordinary paints, varnishes and shellacs can be removed from furniture and carriages and other objects without injuring the wood, and enamels can be taken from automobiles without affecting the steel body.

"Its solvent powers are so vigorous," said Dr. Lenher, "that it will remove the bitumen from soft coal, but will not attack the pure carbon of anthracite."

Dr. Lenher also sees a military pow-

er in this powerful solvent, as it can be employed in making more porous charcoals contained in the filter material of war gas masks, a process known as activation.

"The coconut charcoal used in the gas mask," continued Dr. Lenher, "can be activated by this new reagent by treatment at ordinary temperatures which is a considerable advance over the older steam activation at a white heat."

The use of activated charcoal in the extraction of gasoline from natural gas is one which is interesting chemists today, and still leaves the gas available for household and industrial purposes. As a laboratory reagent, Dr. Lenher said that the properties of selenium oxychloride are so unusual that it is likely to come into common use wherever research is conducted.

The solvent, which was formerly regarded as merely a laboratory curiosity, is finding its place in many industries. The original statements concerning its exceptional powers have been amply verified, the speaker asserted, by him and a group of students who have been attracted to the laboratories of the University of Wisconsin during the last year.

Once a Waste Product. The raw material from which it is obtained was once a waste product from the electrolytic refining of copper, for until recently the selenium from these electrolytic slimes, while known to the chemist as a rare element, had been considered as almost valueless.

The solvent itself is a heavy liquid, and nearly odorless. It can be readily handled in a commercial way, however, for were it the "universal solvent" of alchemy it could not be transported, as no vessel could withstand it.

This discovery of everyday uses for a substance formed from discarded material is regarded by scientists as a typical illustration of the value of research.

BIG DRIVE ON OPIUM TRAFFIC

Nation-Wide Campaign Being Made to Keep Illicit Drugs Out of the Country.

FAIL TO GET SMUGGLERS

Authorities Admit They Have Been Helpless in Preventing Addicts From Securing Dope—Where Opium Comes From.

New York.—A nation-wide campaign is being made against the sale of illicit drugs in the United States. Federal investigators have reported that more morphine, heroin, cocaine and straight opium are being used in New York city, Chicago, San Francisco, Philadelphia and Boston than ever before. While the authorities in these cities have the laws necessary to deal with the situation, they declare they cannot stop something they cannot see.

When it is considered that one man can cross the Canadian border or the Rio Grande and, without changing his appearance in any manner, return with several thousand dollars' worth of drugs, it may be realized how difficult it is for national, state and municipal authorities to cope with the situation. Besides this difficulty, the government has announced that the legitimate use of habit-forming drugs has increased anywhere from 25 to 50 per cent since the Eighteenth amendment became an appendix to the Constitution.

Virtually all of the opium lawfully sent to the United States comes from

London and Edinburgh. In these cities three manufacturers send out more opium than all the rest of the manufacturers in Great Britain. While some of the opium smuggled into this country comes from India, a larger portion comes from Turkey, Persia and Syria.

In New York city the narcotics squad of the internal revenue bureau has made frequent raids against the smuggler, the dispenser and the addict. They have discovered that such cocaine and opium are brought in by sailors on passenger and freight steamships.

The authorities realize that it is an easy matter for a harbor boatman to load his clothing with "dope" during the night. He is not subjected to daily search. So long as he maintains reasonable care and observance of common sense in his methods he can continue indefinitely. Drugs are easily concealed. Federal authorities have found opium in women's hair, sewed into men's hat bands, contained in artificial limbs, filling the inner tubes of automobile tires, in consignments of lumber and vegetables and even in collars worn by dogs trained to make daily trips across the Canadian border.

The solution of the problem lies in a federal act prohibiting the importation, manufacture and exportation of habit-forming drugs, except in such limited amounts as are necessary for the legitimate uses of the medical profession, according to Royal S. Copeland, health commissioner of New York city. He said every honest pharmacist should be made an agent of the government to handle opium and its derivatives.

AID IS ASKED FOR AUSTRIANS

World-Famous Physicians Picture Stunted Growth and Diseases From Hunger.

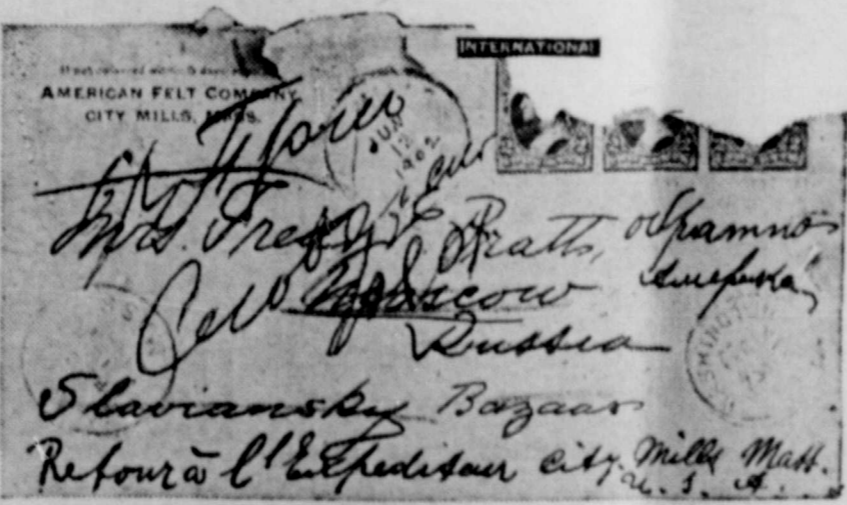
Vienna.—Three internationally known Austrian physicians have joined in a statement to the effect that Austrian children will remain permanently stunted in growth unless adequate relief is given immediately.

The physicians are Dr. Eiselsberg, Vienna brain specialist and one of the leading surgeons of the city, and Drs. Lorenz and Pirquet, the latter inventor of the tuberculin test and for two years professor at Johns Hopkins university.

"At the end of juvenile growth the average boys of Vienna are about four inches below normal height and about sixteen pounds below normal weight. Girls are correspondingly stunted," they say.

"We also believe from a medical standpoint these children will never have their normal weight and height, but will go through life in this stunted condition."

Letter Traveled Nineteen Years

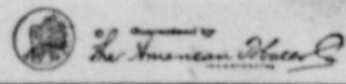

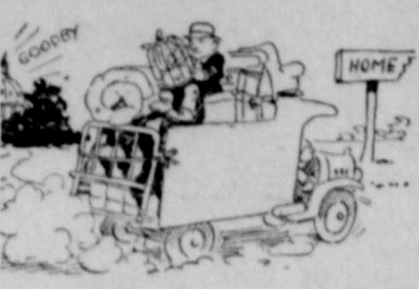

WASHINGTON SIDELIGHTS

What the "Formers" Are Doing Nowadays



WASHINGTON.—What are the members of the Wilson cabinet doing these days? Well, "Tom" Marshall spoke for several of them when he remarked, "Eight years of it has kept me poor; I've got to be starting to make some money." It seems that the annual stipend of \$12,000, less the income tax, has made the studding hard for cabinet members. So the former vice president is making an extensive lecture tour. Then he's going to make his first European trip; then he's going back to the practice of law in Columbia City, Ind.

Former Secretary of State Colby springs a surprise. Washington and New York are to have a new law firm, of which the partners are Woodrow Wilson and Bainbridge Colby.
March 3 President Wilson appointed the retiring secretary of labor, W. B.

Wilson, a member of the international joint commission on the United States-Canadian boundary line.

A. S. Burleson, "which was" postmaster, is one who isn't worrying about finances; he took the fast mail back to his Texas ranches and cotton fields. Newton D. Baker made a forced march from the War department to his law office in Cleveland. That bluff old sea dog Josephus Daniels is back at the wheel of the Raleigh (N. C.) News and Observer. E. T. Meredith of the Agricultural department is again busied with "Successful Farming" in Des Moines, Ia.

John Barton Payne doesn't need the secretary of the interior's job to keep the wolf from the door of the Chicago club on Michigan boulevard, where he maintains residence. Whether he will practice law again or travel is undecided. Incidentally he is president of the South Park commission of Chicago. Former Attorney General Palmer has gone back to the practice of law, some of which, at least, will be done in Washington.

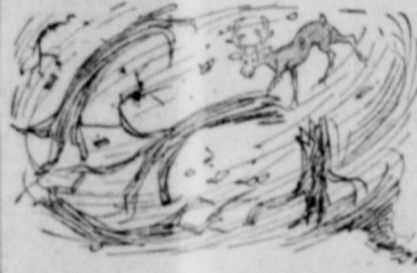
D. F. Houston, who was a Missouri college professor, is undecided about his plans, but says he most certainly will not write a book. J. W. Alexander will go back to his law practice in Missouri.

A Wind That Blew Down Whole Forests

IN the closing days of the last congress Senator Jones of Washington submitted an amendment to the deficiency bill proposing to appropriate \$100,000 for emergency expenditures incident to the disposal of wind-thrown timber on the Olympic National forest; and the repair and construction of roads, fire lines, trails, telephone lines, etc. This is an aftermath of the cyclone of last January, which created a most dangerous fire trap.

"A tremendous tornado," states Assistant Forester E. A. Sherman, "blew down timber estimated at 5,000,000,000 to 8,000,000,000 board feet, in a strip 75 miles long and 30 miles wide, 1,600,000,000 board feet of which is within the Olympic National forest. This is the greatest disaster ever recorded in lumbering."

"The wind-thrown timber," said Mr. Sherman, "which lies in a tangled mass over an area of 2,500 square miles, is largely western hemlock and spruce, both of which are subject to rapid decay. Transportation is lacking for much of this region.



"Where the full force of the wind was felt practically every tree was thrown down, and all roads, trails and telephone lines were completely obliterated.

"A large number of buildings were destroyed and some cattle killed. It is believed that many of the elk were killed and that others will slowly starve. The storm zone reached entirely through the best winter feeding grounds of these animals."

Airplanes will have to be used for survey, since it is impossible to traverse the uprooted forests.

World War Makes Work for the Lawyers



MILLIONS of dollars—and probably billions—are represented in the great tide of lawsuits beginning to pour into the United States Court of Claims as one of the results of the World war. The court was expressly created to determine legal controversies between private citizens and the government.

Actions upon claims involving approximately \$124,000,000 have already been filed. The ultimate aggregate of claims, it is estimated, will reach between two and three billion dollars.

The personnel of the Department of Justice having charge of the defense of these actions has been doubled to enable it to cope with the flood of new litigation.

These war claims are brought into the court by plaintiffs having claims against all departments of the government. The bureau of Internal revenue now has pending claims for refunds and rebates aggregating \$650,000,000. There are also claims proportionately large in amount arising from the housing corporation, the war risk bureau and the food and fuel administrations, and it is known that there is a large amount of other claims of miscellaneous character which have not yet been filed.

Among the claims already filed in the court are \$20,000,000 for shipping, \$20,000,000 for railroad requisition, \$26,000,000 for patent infringement, \$2,200,000 for aircraft engines and guns, \$2,000,000 for transportation of troops and supplies, and \$2,500,000 in suits by the packers.

"Christian, American and Republican"

THE new congresswoman from Oklahoma, Miss Alice Robertson, cafeteria proprietress and school teacher, is not sure that the nation is ready for a federal department of education with a cabinet officer. At the session of one of the groups of the National Education association in Atlantic City Miss Robertson spoke to several thousand educators.

"I do not feel that enough deliberation has been given to the subject of a federal department of education," said Miss Robertson. "This does not mean that I am opposed to such a thing or even that I will not vote for it."

"Miss Altee," as she is familiarly known in Oklahoma, says that a woman can do anything she sets out to do if "she keeps her mouth shut and her ears open."

Defining the position she will take in congress, she said:
"I would rather be like a humble little light that shines a long distance across the prairies than a bright sky



rocket that flashes in midair for a few seconds and then falls to earth with a dull thud. If people think I am going to do something sensational, they're mistaken. I am conservative. The platform upon which I was elected is: "I am a Christian; I am an American; I am a Republican."
Discussing woman's dress, she said:
"I do not believe that the modern short skirts, if they do not go to extremes, are much worse than the prudish long skirts of the mid-Victorian period that were held so high when crossing the street."

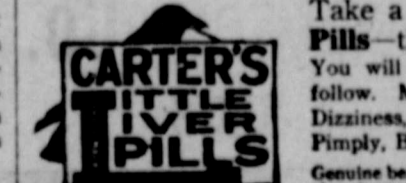
