

MEATS THAT ARE DIFFERENT.

Lamb chops may be cooked with a stuffing making them a dish quite ele-



ent. Choose the loin chops and have them cut quite thick; remove the surplus fat and slash them from the edge in to the bone, mak-

ing a pocket to hold the stuffing. Make any desired stuffing, sprinkle the chops with salt and pepper and place them in a buttered pan to bake for 20 minutes in a hot oven. Make a gravy from the fat in the pan and serve with the chops. A mint sauce may be served also.

Calf's Liver a la Begue.-Cut a pound of calf's liver into half-inch cubes, add two onions cut in slices, a dash of paprika, and half a dozen stalks of parsley cut fine; cover and let stand a half hour; shake the liver from the onions, roll in flour and fry in a basket in deep fat.

Sweetbreads a la Newburg.-Parboll a pair of swetbreads half an hour with two bay leaves. Drain, cool, remove the membranes and cut in small dice. Chop fine one cupful of fresh mushrooms. Heat a cupful of thick cream in a double boller, add the sweetbreads and mushrooms. Beat three egg yolks, add salt, paprika and two tablespoonfuls of lemon juice, one tablespoonful of Worcestershire sauce and stir into the cream. Serve bot in ramekins.

Fricassee of Veal .- Cut a slice of veal in serving sized pieces—a cut from the leg. Pound each piece to reduce the thickness, roll in flour and fry in salt pork fat until brown on both sides. Remove to a casserole, pour broth or hot water over the meat; the broth is made by rinsing out the frying pan with hot water. Add salt and pepper and cook covered an hour or longer. Carrots and other

vegetables may be added if desired.

Almond Salad.—Blanch and shred one-half cupful of almonds, add six olives stoned and chopped, one-half cupful of celery, one-half cupful of mayonnaise or a good boiled dressing. Serve on head lettuce.

GOOD DISHES WORTH TRYING.

of these: Corn, California Style. Orleans, La. -Mix a can of corn with chopped green pepper and one-half cupful of thick white sauce, well seasoned with salt. Turn into a buttered casserole and cover with strips of bacon. Bake

in the oven until the bacon is cooked. Cabbage With Veal Balls .- Cut the center from a firm head of cabbage and boil the shell in a cloth to keep it from breaking; drain when tender and season well with salt and pepper. To the cabbage taken from the center, chop and add half as much minced veal, one chopped onlon, one cupful of cooked rice and one-half cupful of butter, mix and form into balls, the size of a walnut, dip in egg and crumbs and fry in deep fat until brown. Serve the balls in the cabbage shell both steaming hot.

Stuffed Rabbit .- Mix together a cupful of bread crumbs, two tablespoonfuls of chopped parsley, two tablespoonfuls of poultry dressing or any desired herbs, four tablespoonfuls of chopped suct, one teaspoonful of grated lemon rind, one egg and salt and pepper to taste. Add milk if more moisture is needed. Fill the well cleaned rabbit with this mixture and sew up carefully. Simmer for an hour or longer, according to the age of the rabbit. Serve with parsley and butter and serve buttered onions as a vegetable.


Preserved Berries. - Currants, crushed, or any fruit which can be well mashed and mixed with an equal quantity of sugar, allowed to stand overnight in a cool place, or long enough to have the sugar thoroughly dissolved and mixed through the fruit, may be canned in cold sterile jars and scaled, keeping perfectly if kept in a cold cellar or in the bottom of the ice chest until cold weather comes on. Keep the jars from the light.



Secretary Mellon Tells of His Plans For Funding Debts of Foreign Governments.

Washington.-The administration, it is now indicated, has won its fight for "blanket authority" to fund the debts of foreign Governments.

The Senate Finance Committee Thursday voted to report out the administration's bill with a single amendment, which would limit the funding operations of the committee was quieted by information which Secretary of the Treasury Mellon submitted on his funding plans and the extent to which the United States is bound by previous "negotiations.

The fight on the measure will be transferred to the floor, but Republican leaders count on the "regular" maority to put through the bill in spite of its enemies. Senators LaFollette and Borah, among the Republicans, will seek to impose the aid of Senator Reed, Senator Walsh of Massachusetts and other Democrats.

In a letter to Senator Penrose, chairman of the committee. Mellon said this Government had been committed to a postponement of interest for two or three years, of which more than two have elapsed. He said further it had been understood no interest was to be charged on this deferred interest-amounting to a billion dollars at this time-but that it was to be added to the principal. The United States agreed, Mellon said, to accept German bonds for Belgium's indebtedness, but he was not able to say whether this would be a matter "for further consideration." There is no intention. he declared, of accepting bonds of other than the debtor nations.

The Secretary urged that broad powers be granted the Treasury.

"The situation which confronts the Treasury is exceedingly complex," said he. "and to deal properly with it the Treasury must have ample powers to enable it, when the condition of each debtor country has been definitely ascertained, and the claims of all parties interested have been presented. to deal with the situation broadly in such way as will, in its judgment, best protect the interests of that country and secure the payment of the principal and interest of the debts owing to

\$400,000,000 OF WAR FINANCE FUND LEFT

Washington.-In a statement of its Anancial condition issued Monday, the War Finance Corporation showed a cash credit on hand with the Treasurer of the United States of \$403.827. 711.29. Outstanding loans amounted to \$99,903,839.39, of which \$65,856,479,-59 represented loans made under its war powers. Outstanding loans under export finance authority totaled \$34,-647,359.80. Total loans heretofore made aggregated \$359,586,049.58, while

While the \$400,000,000 credit with the Treasurer would be available for payments to the railroads in the event of the passage of legislation suggested to Congress by Fresident Harding. corporation officials declared it probably would not be considered advisable to withdraw the whole sum from the Treasury, as it would necessitate the Treasury's borrowing the money for the purpose, which could be done by the corporation itself.

Washington.-Acting with the approval of President Harding Surgeon General Cumming of the United ette County and Senator Woods of States Public Health Service has in Navarro County to cut salaries of Senate Monday morning. vited State Health Officers of thirteen Southern States to meet in Washington to consider the situation in connection with reports of a threatened pellagra epidemic in parts of the cotton belt.

The Health Officers of the following States were asked to meet with Public Health Service officials: Texas. Louis'ana, Oklahoma, Arkunsas, Tennessee, Mississippi, Georgia, Alabama, Kantucky, Florida, North and South Carolina and Virginia.

UNIVERSITY BUDGET **DEFEATED IN HOUSE**

VOTE 37 TO 84 AGAINST SUBSTI-TUTE-BONHAM'S AMEND-MENT ACCEPTED.

Austin, Texas.-By the overwaelming vote of 83 to 37 the House Thursday went on record as favoring a reduction in the salaries of University faculty members. This came after a two days' debate and the rejection by vote of 37 to 84 of Satterwhite's proposition to give the University its present salaries but require the exclusive use of the available fund for the erection of buildings.

Arguments of the last two days created more interest than any since the days of Ferguson impeachment. The members were in their seats, the galleries were crowded and applause was frequently bestowed on the speakers. The fight waxed warm and culminated in the adoption of the amend ment by Bonham to cut the salaries after the Satterwhite substitute had been so decisively turned down.

By this action the House reduces the University appropriation approximately \$435,000. If the same policy is followed with the A. & M. College the cut there will amount to approximately \$225,000. There are similar reductions at the C. I. A. and a few of the normal colleges.

Austin, Texas .- So far as the Thirty Seventh Legislature is concerned the invisable empire may remain invisible. BEAUMONT OIL FIRE LOSS OVER MILLION

Beaumont, Texas.-Fire in a tank farm seven miles south of the city began at 10.45 o'clock Friday night. The loss is still undertermined, but it is estimated the damage has reached approximately \$1,250,000.

The Magnolia Petroleum company has lost 100 000 barrels of distillate valued at \$2.50 a barrel. The Sun company has lost 500,000 barrels of Oklahoma light oil valued at about \$2 a barrel, including the piping cost from the field. The value of the tanks destroyed will approximate \$100,000. The fire was started by a bolt of lightning which struck into the center of an earthen tank containing 300,000 barrels of oil. Chemical processes were brought into play to save the oil and would have succeeded had not the wood in the tank roof set the fire again each time it was extinguished.


