There are some merchants who ask to much for their goods, but those who sell honest merchandise at a reasonable profit are entitled to your patronage.

If we will all stop and give the matter a little thought there will be fewer boosters for the mail order houses.

FOREIGN—

Vera Sassulitch, notorious nihilist, known twenty five years ago throughout the world, died at Moscow last week, according to a report received at Copenhagen.

German shipping interests are rapidly increasing their business by under-cutting freight rates and other charges, according to M. A. De Groote, vice president of the Antwerp Chamber of Commerce.

Australian wool prices showed an appreciable advance last week at the local auctions. Prices for skirtsings, suitable for the continent, went up 5 per cent, while rates for average crossbred fleeces showed a tendency to harden.

The Earl of Randon, who was kidnapped by Sinn Feiners early on the morning of June 21, was brought back to Buntry last week by his captors. The aged earl, for whose safety there had been some concern at various times, was uninjured.

Colonel Fred Levy of Louisville, Ky., former president of the National Association of Retail Clothiers and Furnishers of the United States, proposes the organization of one great international association of dealers on both sides of the Atlantic.

Not since the Furious and her sister Hush Hush ships were laid down in 1915 has so much mystery prevailed regarding the British super-fighting ships as surrounds the four dreadnoughts which will be built under the current navy appropriations.

Only two Lancashire cotton spinning companies maintained dividends of 20 per cent during the first six months of this year, according to an analysis by the Manchester Daily Dispatch. Eighty representative spinning companies were included.

American Ambassador Herrick scored the first hit of his terms by bringing rain to parched France. The minute he left the Elysee Palace last week, after presenting his credentials to President Millerant, the first shower of many weeks came pouring down.

Within three weeks unemployment in Canada will probably be cut down by 90,000 men when that number enter the harvest fields of the prairies, according to estimates of the Canadian employment service. General expectations are for the best crop since 1915.

DOMESTIC—

The once proud German dreadnaught Ostfriesland is now resting on the bottom of the ocean, sunk by the bombs of American army airmen.

The Oklahoma City Clearing House association has definitely pledged the Oklahoma Cotton Growers' association credit of at least \$1,000,000 to help finance the 1921 crop.

Former Governor O. B. Colquitt of Dallas, announces that he is a candidate for the United States senate, subject to the action of the democratic primaries in July 1922.

Investigation of an alleged branch of a secret night-riding organization, which he declared is in existence in Oklahoma City, has been ordered by Mayor J. C. Watson in a communication to Carl Ghtsb, chief of police.

Ice manufacturing companies over Oklahoma are responding in a very satisfactory way to the activity of the corporation commission, in an effort to reduce prices of ice in the different cities in the state.

Reports on crop and live stock conditions from all over west Texas and the Panhandle region for the current week indicate abundant feed and forage crops, unexcelled pastures, good grain harvest and plenty of food crops.

Thomas McMahon, president of the United Textile Workers, has denied the charge that the union had received funds from New England cotton mills with which to carry on the strike in the southern mills.

The German destroyed C-102 was sunk last week by a bombing plane from Langley Field. The destroyer, anchored at sea off the Virginia Capes was sent down by bombs rained down from the Martin bombing planes that led the attack.

The steamer Tehuantepec has sailed from Vera Cruz for the Tampico oil region with the fifteenth cavalry regiment on board.

In record-breaking time, the senate has passed the Sweet bill to consolidate all federal agencies dealing with veterans and extending additional benefits to disabled former service men.

Dr. H. F. White, plague expert of the United States public health service, has made the prediction that "it is only a question of time before Texas will again be threatened with a bubonic plague epidemic."

Twenty-seven persons are known to have lost their lives in the Mingo, W. Va., coal fields disorders since the middle of May, 1920. Harry Olmsted, representing operators, testified before the senate investigating committee.

For the first four months of this year the net revenue from operation of Texas railroads increased 1.086 per cent, as compared to the same four months of last year. Operating revenue increased over 8 1/2 per cent, while operating expenses advanced but .09 per cent.

The bodies of Mrs. William Wood, her father, John Pennil, and her two children, Henry, aged 5, and Robert, aged 2, were drowned near Cedar Vale Kan., last week when a cloudburst brought a wall of water down Cedar Creek, on the banks of which they were camping, have been recovered.

Mrs. Emma C. Bergdoll of Philadelphia told a house committee investigating the escape of Grover Cleveland Bergdoll, her slacker son, that she gave \$5,000 to Major Bruce Campbell, an army officer at Governor's Island, for use "among high officials at Washington" to help obtain his freedom.

WASHINGTON—

According to a treasury announcement arrangements have already been made at Chicago by the bankers' \$50,000,000 cattle pool to accept about \$1,000,000 of loans.

Orders have been issued to close the government's helium plant at Petrolia, Texas, for the present, according to the bureau of mines. The plant was constructed during the war.

Surplus military units which exist now in the regular army as a result of congressional action in reducing enlisted personnel will be placed "out of commission" until congress authorizes an increase.

The tentative value of the St. Louis Southwestern railway of Texas, including the Stephenville, North & South Texas Railway company is announced by the interstate commerce commission to be \$26,029,939.

The Japanese government, hesitant and wary, apparently is seeking more information on the scope of the world conference to be held in Washington. Japan wants to know more definitely than she has been informed thus far what subjects of Far Eastern and Pacific interest are to be discussed by the assembled nations.

By separate votes on the Fordney tariff bill the house defeated the embargo on dyes and placed cotton, oil, asphalt and hides on the free list. No roll call was obtained on the oil amendment, which had been defeated in committee of the whole, but on the hide amendment the vote stood 239 for free hide and 174 for a duty of 15 per cent ad valorem. The house passed the tariff bill as a whole by a vote of 28 to 127.

Manufacture of mail sacks at the Atlanta federal penitentiary is expected to net the government a profit of about \$75,000 above bonuses paid the prisoners, Attorney General Daugherty announces.

The request of the shipping board for an appropriation of \$300,000,000 to meet operating losses, and other demands on the treasury, are threatening to knock into a cocked hat the economy program of the administration.

Director of the Budget Dawes has informed President Harding that an estimated saving of \$112,612,628 would be effected in the appropriations for the current year ending June 30, 1922.

The Texas members of the farm bureau federation voted by referendum, 236 for and 92 against the legislation to increase the loan limit of the federal land banks from \$19,000 to \$25,000, according to a letter to Senator Sheppard from J. R. Howard, president of the federation.

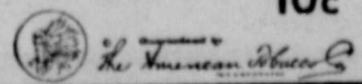

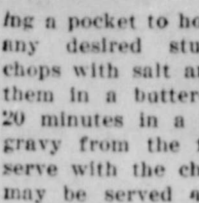
THE KITCHEN CABINET

To make good tea for you and me, We'll heat this earthen pot, you see, Then in it place just one, two, three Full teaspoons of the fragrant tea, One each for urn and me and thee, And when the water boiling be, Turn on; then steep it thoroughly Three minutes to set the flavor free.

MEATS THAT ARE DIFFERENT.

Lamb chops may be cooked with a stuffing making them a dish quite elegant and different. Choose the loin chops and have them cut quite thick; remove the surplus fat and slash them from the edge in to the bone, making a pocket to hold the stuffing. Make any desired stuffing, sprinkle the chops with salt and pepper and place them in a buttered pan to bake for 20 minutes in a hot oven. Make a gravy from the fat in the pan and serve with the chops. A mint sauce may be served also.



Calf's Liver a la Begue.—Cut a pound of calf's liver into half-inch cubes, add two onions cut in slices, a dash of paprika, and half a dozen stalks of parsley cut fine; cover and let stand a half hour; shake the liver from the onions, roll in flour and fry in a basket in deep fat.

Sweetbreads a la Newburg.—Parboil a pair of sweetbreads half an hour with two bay leaves. Drain, cool, remove the membranes and cut in small dice. Chop fine one cupful of fresh mushrooms. Heat a cupful of thick cream in a double boiler, add the sweetbreads and mushrooms. Beat three egg yolks, add salt, paprika and two tablespoonfuls of lemon juice, one tablespoonful of Worcestershire sauce and stir into the cream. Serve hot in ramekins.

Fricassee of Veal.—Cut a slice of veal in serving sized pieces—a cut from the leg. Pound each piece to reduce the thickness, roll in flour and fry in salt pork fat until brown on both sides. Remove to a casserole, pour broth or hot water over the meat; the broth is made by rinsing out the frying pan with hot water. Add salt and pepper and cook covered an hour or longer. Carrots and other vegetables may be added if desired.

Almond Salad.—Blanch and shred one-half cupful of almonds, add six olives stoned and chopped, one-half cupful of celery, one-half cupful of mayonnaise or a good boiled dressing. Serve on head lettuce.

Our day is that of short cuts, labor saving devices and greater efficiency in all forms of labor. In steam and electricity man has come into possession of well-nigh unlimited possibilities.

GOOD DISHES WORTH TRYING.

When ideas seem scarce and one does not know what to serve, try some of these:

Corn, California Style.—Mix a can of corn with chopped green pepper and one-half cupful of thick white sauce, well seasoned with salt. Turn into a buttered casserole and cover with strips of bacon. Bake in the oven until the bacon is cooked.

Cabbage With Veal Balls.—Cut the center from a firm head of cabbage and boil the shell in a cloth to keep it from breaking; drain when tender and season well with salt and pepper. To the cabbage taken from the center, chop and add half as much minced veal, one chopped onion, one cupful of cooked rice and one-half cupful of butter, mix and form into balls, the size of a walnut, dip in egg and crumbs and fry in deep fat until brown. Serve the balls in the cabbage shell both steaming hot.

Stuffed Rabbit.—Mix together a cupful of bread crumbs, two tablespoonfuls of chopped parsley, two tablespoonfuls of poultry dressing or any desired herbs, four tablespoonfuls of chopped suet, one teaspoonful of grated lemon rind, one egg and salt and pepper to taste. Add milk if more moisture is needed. Fill the well cleaned rabbit with this mixture and sew up carefully. Simmer for an hour or longer, according to the age of the rabbit. Serve with parsley and butter and serve buttered onions as a vegetable.

Preserved Berries.—Currants, crushed, or any fruit which can be well washed and mixed with an equal quantity of sugar, allowed to stand overnight in a cool place, or long enough to have the sugar thoroughly dissolved and mixed through the fruit, may be canned in cold sterile jars and sealed, keeping perfectly if kept in a cold cellar or in the bottom of the ice chest until cold weather comes on. Keep the jars from the light.

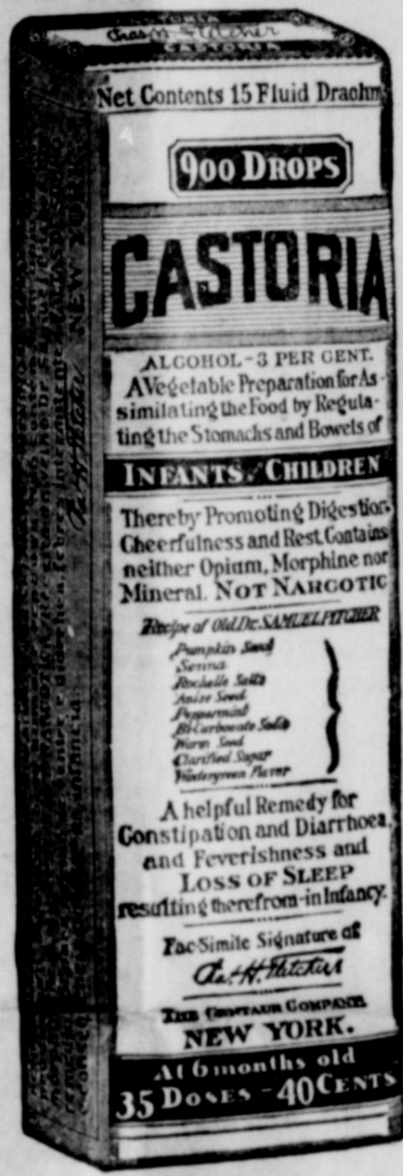
