STATE NEWS

Actual construction work has begun on McKinney's new \$30,000 auditorium. It is located near the square and is 50x100 feet.

Delmont Greenstreet has been appointed postmaster at Ennis, effective Sept. 1, according to a telegram received from Washington announcing the appointment.

The election held at Mexia last week for the purpose of issuing bonds to the amount of \$400,000 to be used in paving and storm sewer carried by a large majority.

Franklin M. Smith, Fort Worth oil man, was dashed to death in a fall from the sixteenth floor of the F. & M. building to a projection at the fifth floor, last week.

Dallas bricklayers voted at a meeting of the union held last week to reduce their wages to \$11 the day to become effective ninety days from Aug. 1, or on Nov. 1.

Explosion of a private still in a three-room cottage in the east end of Galveston last week was followed by a fire which destroyed the building and most of the liquor-making apparatus.

Strenuous efforts are being made by the organizers of the Dallas Girls' Band to get the organization into shape so that it will be ready to make its first appearance at the coming State Fair.

The San Angelo Water, Light and Power Company soon will lay one and one-half miles of six-inch mains in Angelo Heights and other sections of the city to relieve present low water pressure.

A meteoric stone, weighing forty pounds, fell to the earth last week in the city of Guanacavi, Mexico. It has been sent to Tepenhuanes and placed on exhibition there. The city of Guanacavi is in the State of Durango.

Land owners lost an aggregate of twelve sections of pasture in Coke County recently in a prairie fire, believed to have been started by the dropping of a cigarette by a Mexican sheep herder on the March ranch.

First official action of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan in Austin occurred last week when an unidentified man left a letter containing a \$100 bill with Miss Bessie Magee, matron of the Austin Children's Home.

The Independent Union News, a weekly labor journal, published at Texarkana for the last two years by R. J. Dowling, hereafter will be known as the "Union News and Farm Journal." Mr. Dowling will continue in charge.

Instructions were received at Taylor last week from the headquarters of the operative department of the L. & G. N. Railroad ordering the suspension from work of all employees of the company's shops, roundhouse, car shed and blacksmith departments at Taylor.

Some of the farmers west of Lufkin have been clearing their fields of watermelons, hauling out many wagonloads to their hogs. The prolific crop of melons in this section was too much for the local market, and no systematic plan of shipment was adopted in time for the season's crop.

T. D. Barton, adjutant general, has announced that new roofs will be placed on the buildings of Camp Mabry as soon as possible after funds from the departmental appropriations will be come available. He added that there was approximately \$4,500,000 worth of federal property stored at the camp.

Announcement has recently been made of the resignation of many faculty members of the University of Texas. This exodus is said to be due in part to the uncertainties occasioned by legislative debate over the abolishment or retention of faculty positions and in part to the usual change in academic circles.

J. M. Pittillo has accepted a place tendered him by Governor Neff as a member of the Industrial accident board, to represent employers. Mr. Pittillo is editor and proprietor of a labor paper at Waco.

The long bridge across the Neches River on the Palestine-Rusk road has been cut in two in order to prevent further passage of traffic. It had been condemned as unsafe, but when people persisted in using it, it became necessary to cut it in two.

WASHINGTON SIDELIGHTS

World Parley to Bar Gas, Submarines?



WASHINGTON.—President Harding has announced the selection of Secretary of State Hughes to head the delegation to represent the United States in the Washington conference on limitation of armament and Pacific and far eastern issues which menace international tranquility. The President further announced that he passed on to his secretary of state all responsibility for the conference henceforth, except, of course, the naming of other members of the American delegation.

The President does not believe that he, as the President of the United States, should push himself into the

conclave further. He will, of course, in his capacity as President of the nation which invited the conference, address the delegates when they convene here November 11, but after that his relation with it will be an advisory one.

The President's invitation to the powers points out the futility of looking for "stability or the assurance of social justice, or the security of peace while wasteful and unproductive outlays deprive effort of its just reward and defeat the reasonable expectation of progress." The invitation also says:

"It may also be found advisable to formulate proposals by which in the interest of humanity the use of new agencies of warfare may be suitably controlled.

Although none of the new agencies of warfare are mentioned in the invitation, it refers, of course, to the advisability of the nations of the world reaching an agreement to control the use of poison gases and other brutal agencies developed in the great war. It may also mean submarines.

"At Last, a National Military Policy"

AN AUTHORIZED statement, with the title, "At last, a national military policy," has been issued from the War department, prepared by Col. John McA. Palmer. It deals with the national defense law, which President Harding has described as establishing "an economical and democratic military policy thoroughly consistent with our national traditions." After explaining the law providing for a small regular army, to be augmented by trained citizen forces from the National Guard and National army reserve in event of national emergency, the statement says, in part:

"It is our traditional military policy that we are to maintain a small regular or standing army in time of peace, and this small peace establishment is to be augmented, or re-enforced, by great armies of citizen soldiers when a national emergency calls for greater forces. The defeat of our military system in the past has been that the organization of these larger forces has been deferred until after the declaration of war.

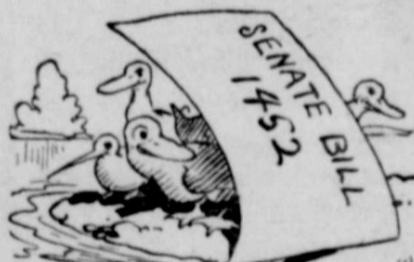
"The obvious remedy was simply to provide for their organization in time

of peace. This is the underlying, dominating feature of the new law, simple—as all really great constructive measures are simple.

"Congress has thus settled the military policy of the United States and has prescribed that the military organizations required at the outbreak of war shall be constituted by the President in time of peace.

"Congress has assigned a great constructive mission to the President and the President has accepted it. These two harmonious acts of the legislative and executive branches of the government finally define our military institutions."

Sportsmen for Public Shooting Grounds



SENATE bill 1452, introduced by Senator Harry S. New of Indiana, and house bill 5823, introduced by Congressman Dan R. Anthony, Jr., of Kansas, are commonly known as the Public Shooting Ground—Game Refuge bill.

This measure provides that every gunner who hunts migratory birds shall first take out a federal hunting license costing \$1 per year. Every cent of the money received from the sale of such licenses is to go into a special fund known as the "Migratory Bird Protection Fund." Forty-five per cent is to be expended for the purchase of suitable areas for use as public shooting grounds and migratory bird refuges.

Forty-five per cent is to be used for protecting and caring for the birds.

Sportsmen claim that this bill has great merit. They hold that when this bill is enacted into law, wild-fowl shooting will be perpetuated for all time to come. Breeding, feeding and resting places for our migratory birds are necessary. No matter in what section of the country a man shoots, he is dependent upon the protection of the birds during their entire migration—in every section of the country they visit.

Moreover, drainage is as hard on the waterfowl as lack of protection. At the present rate at which suitable ducking territory is being drained, immediate action is necessary. This bill will permanently set aside lakes and marshes where the birds may be hunted by the public, and also areas as refuges where the birds will receive protection.

Under the federal migratory bird law the waterfowl are increasing in numbers. It is claimed that this bill, if enacted, will admirably supplement the present law.

Effects of the New Curtis-Nelson Act

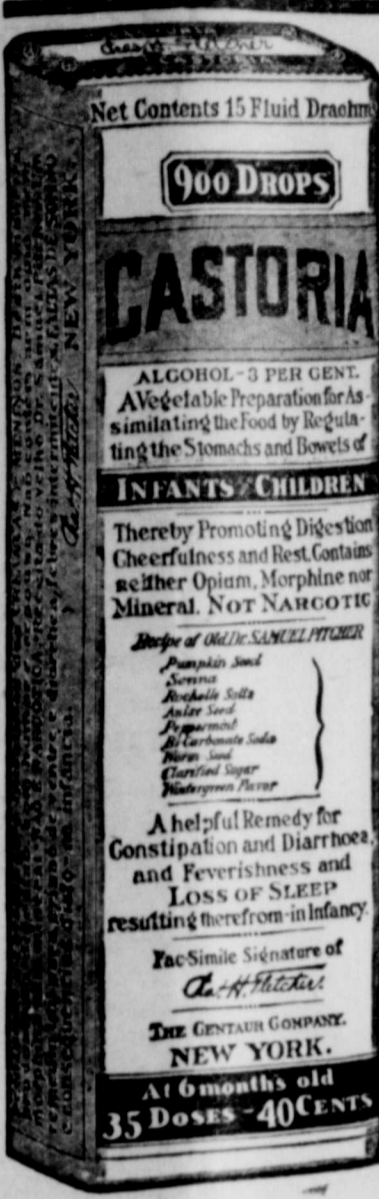
HANDING a billion dollars to business—through the process of liquidation which will relieve to that extent the present financial stringency—and giving ready cash to one-half of the purchasing public so that they can buy the materials they need for another year, and thus making the whole of industry hum. That is what the Curtis-Nelson act, recently passed, adding \$25,000,000 to the capital and deposits of the federal farm loan system, means.

The original capital of the 12 federal land banks was too small to permit a reasonable flotation of farm-loan bonds without adopting some artificial machinery other than is provided in the act. The Curtis-Nelson bill amends the farm loan act by increasing the depository privileges of the federal land banks with the treasury from \$6,000,000 to \$31,000,000. Without such privileges the system would have found itself within the last month without any available loanable funds.

The Curtis-Nelson act makes certain, so long as bonds can be sold, the

continuous, uninterrupted loaning operations of the federal farm loan system. It is estimated that there is a demand in this country for such a character of investment as our farm-loan bonds to the extent of \$200,000,000 a year. The machinery of the farm loan system, operating normally, is capable of putting this amount yearly into the hands of farm borrowers.

Assuming that these facts are warranted, the conclusion follows that the enactment of this legislation shall result in the liquidation of about \$1,000,000,000 of debts annually.

QUEER METHOD OF DEFENSE

Fishes That Have the Power of Inflating Their Bodies, Frightening Their Enemies.

The swell fishes of tropic coast waters have the power of suddenly inflating the body with water or air until they assume an approximately globular form several times the normal diameter, which must be disconcerting to any enemy about to seize one. The porcupine fish, in addition to doing this, has the body everywhere covered with long, sharp spines which project in every direction like the quills of a hedgehog. The trunk fishes, instead of being protected in this way, have the body encased in a bony shell, like a turtle. In the East Indies there are rectangular species, but ours are three-cornered, beechnut shaped. They go by various names—cuckoid, shell-fish, and so forth, the cowfish being a species with two hornlike spines projecting from its forehead. They are excellent eating, cooked in the shell like a lobster. The back muscles of the swell fishes are sometimes eaten, but make a risky delicacy, as there are well-authenticated instances of severe poisoning from eating these fishes. The poison seems to be localized in the viscera and to permeate the rest of the fish after death.

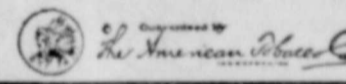

ONE-PIECE DISHES.

A few dishes which may be prepared, baked and served from the baking dish will be greatly appreciated these spring days when extra work is crowding.

Potatoes and Bacon, Country Style.—Slice potatoes lengthwise and very thin. Put a layer of potatoes in a baking dish or casserole, add a sliced onion, salt and pepper, then a layer of thinly sliced bacon. Repeat the layers, having the bacon on top. Do not add any liquid, and see that the bacon is well spread so that the fat will season the dish well. Cover tightly and bake one hour in a moderate oven.

Baked Stew.—Take one and one-half pounds of lean boiling beef, one-fourth pound of suet, six medium sized potatoes, three small onions and six small carrots, with a small bag of mixed spices. Wipe and cut the meat and vegetables as for stew. Fry the suet till all is rendered. Pour off the fat and add the meat and onion, fry until brown, remove and add the potatoes, fry them and add the carrots. Put all into a casserole, add a generous sprinkling of flour, and salt with the bag of spice, bake two hours in a moderate oven. Remove the spice and serve from the casserole.

Baked Hamburger and Spaghetti.—Macaroni may be used in place of spaghetti in almost all dishes. Take a package of spaghetti, cook in boiling salted water, drain, add one can of tomatoes, five or six medium sized onions, chopped, one and one-half pounds of hamburger, fried in two tablespoonfuls of sweet fat. Stir and season all until well mixed, then bake for half an hour in a moderate oven.

Roast Beef With Yorkshire Pudding.—Roast the beef as usual, basting often. Mix two cupfuls of flour, one-half teaspoonful of salt, two cupfuls of milk and three well-beaten eggs; beat well and turn into well-greased pans, filling half full and basting with the gravy from the roast, after the pudding has finished rising. Serve around the roast as a garnish.

Apricot Dainty.—Take one-half pound of dried apricots, cook until tender. Mash and add enough sugar to sweeten. Add one cupful of minced marshmallows and let them melt. Put into sherbet glasses and top with coconut, or chopped nuts.

DESSERTS AND OTHER DISHES.

A meal is never quite finished without something in the form of a dessert. It may be a stuffed date or two, a bit of fruit or simple confection; omitted, the meal is unsatisfactory.

Bread Pudding.—Take one and one-half cupfuls of fine soft bread crumbs, measured lightly; one egg, beaten, one-fourth of a cupful of sugar; one-half teaspoonful of salt, two cupfuls of milk. Beat the sugar and salt into the beaten egg, add the milk and gradually stir into the crumbs. Let stand half an hour, then bake in a dish of hot water.

Spaghetti de Luxe.—Take a small package or less of spaghetti, one can chicken soup, one can mushrooms, one shredded green pepper and one-fourth cupful of buttered crumbs. Cook the spaghetti in boiling salted water until tender, drain and blanch with cold water. Butter a baking dish, place in a layer of spaghetti half of the mushrooms, and pepper and repeat until all are used. Cover with the can of chicken soup and sprinkle with buttered crumbs. Bake until brown.

Apples Scalloped With Bananas.—Take two large apples sliced, two bananas sliced, sprinkle in layers with sugar and orange juice. Dot with bits of butter and repeat; bake in a buttered dish forty minutes.

Banana Float.—Take one pint of milk, two eggs, one tablespoonful of cornstarch, one-half cupful of sugar, salt, vinegar, two bananas and whipped cream. Mix the cornstarch with a little of the cold milk, seal the remaining portion, add the cornstarch mixture and cook over hot water for ten minutes. Beat the eggs slightly, add sugar, salt, to the egg mixture. Stir the milk into the egg and return the custard to a double boiler and cook until thick and smooth. Cool, flavor and pour over two large ripe bananas cut in slices. Chill, and just before serving decorate with tiny floating islands of whipped cream and banana slices.

Caesara Bark.

A shipment of five tons of caesara bark from the coast valleys of British Columbia has revealed the fact that the only known supply of this valuable medicinal bark, in large quantities, is in British Columbia, the forests in Washington and Oregon having been completely stripped. Owing to the depredations of Japanese loggers, who ship to American and British drug firms, this valuable provincial asset is in danger of being exterminated, and steps are being taken to protect this valuable herb in order that it may be properly cultivated and in time become an established industry of British Columbia.—Scientific American.

Old Almond Trees Bear Well.

That age is one of the assets of an almond orchard in point of bearing is claimed by Edward Wyckoff, pioneer resident of the Woodland district, who has on display in the board of trade rooms limbs from almond trees on his place planted in 1857 by his brother, David Wyckoff, former sheriff of Yolo county, writes a Woodland (Calif.) correspondent. Though 64 years of age, the orchard is the best bearing in the valley and the trees are strong and virile. Records of the production are being kept for grandchildren that they may make some comparisons of crops when the orchard reaches the century mark.

People Lacking Curiosity.

If there is a skeleton in your closet, rest assured that the few inhabitants of Easter Island, 2,300 miles off the coast of Chile and the easternmost inhabited Polynesian Island, will make no effort to bring it forth into the light as one traveler says of them that they are not curious enough to turn around on the dock to look at the boat that calls there about once in eighteen months. Gigantic statues, stone houses and sculptured rocks, relics of an ancient people, are found on the island.—National Geographic Society Bulletin.

America's Gift to the World.

The cocoa bean is one of America's gifts to the world. The world's consumption of chocolate is increasing constantly, and the plantations of tropical America are being enlarged to supply the demand. The tree was cultivated in Mexico and Peru centuries before the arrival of Columbus. Chocolate was first made in the United States in 1765, and has been used constantly ever since, with the demand constantly increasing.

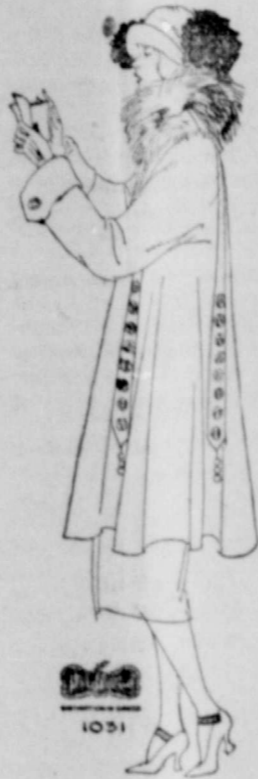
