When attempted the most promising measures are, first, to make large incisions into the tumors to allow the liquids to escape, and then to treat the wounds with a solution of carbolic acid. Internally give spirits of turpentine in doses of 1 to 2 ounces. This should be sbaken up with oil or beaten up with eggs in order to protect the mucous membranes of the mouth and throat from its irritating ef-

As the animals in the best condition are most susceptible to this disease, attempts at prevention have been made with considerable success by reducing the condition of the animal in various ways. When the disease breaks out among a lot of young cattle some owners bleed all those which remain well, and repeat this bleeding two or three times. Others put a seton in the dewlap, which sets up a discharge and in that way reduces the condition Still others give diuretics and laxatives to reach the same result. The remedies most frequently given are nitrate of potash, sulphate of soda, epsom salts, sulphur and lime.
