



SOUND ADVICE

Jno. Burson struck a keynote Monday night at the railroad meeting when he warned the property owners of Silverton against holding their property too high.

If the proposed railroad becomes a reality, Silverton is bound to boom for awhile-but, there is a limit to what real estate is worth in a small town.

If you have property and find a buyer for it at a good price, take Mr. Burson's advice and SELL. You don't have to sell it all, but sell a part of it at a live and let live price, if the buyer will agree to put up a building on the property immediately.

You would then make your profit on the increased value of adjacent holdings. Mr. Burson said that his property was on the market at a reasonable figure and the only conditions were that building restrictions be stipulated in the deed, on business property, requiring brick buildings to be erected.

TERMINAL AND RIGHT OF WAY

If the committees that are at work now on securing options on a terminal and right-of-way for the proposed railroad from Plainview, meet with success, it looks like Silverton will soon be connected to the outside world by steel rails that will carry the wheels of progress and prosperity into our county. The surety of this railroad now lies in the hands of the property owners and the co-operation they give the committees in donating outright the necessary land-or making reasonable prices, will determine the date of the actual work on the building of the road.







