Subscriptions Being Taken For the Denver

The work of soliciting subscriptions to guarantee the right-of-way and terminal to the signers of the contract with the Denver has actually begun.

At a meeting Monday night, at which 28 men were present, the committee that had been appointed at a former meeting made a report recommending that a paper be circulated and pledges secured and that a contract be entered into between the signers thereof and the finance committee that will sign the contract with the Denver officials, so as to protect the men who sign for the community. It was unanimously voted to adopt this method of procedure and practically every man in attendance immediately signed the contract, pledging a certain amount, it being understood that if the amount raised is in excess of the amount needed to pay for the right-of-way and terminal that it will be prorated back.

A soliciting committee composed of the following was appointed by chairman, J. A. Bain: J. M. Heald, J. R. Burson, T. M. Nichols, C. D. Wright, W. E. Schott, Fred Lemons, U. M. Meeker, H. R. Brown, F. P. Bain and W. H. Crow. The following were appointed as a right-of-way committee: D. M. Morgan, Dan Montague, P. A. Jones, Jno Burson, Roscoe Fort, M. C. Potter and C. C. Garrison. The committees are to make a report Friday night at a mass meeting which will be held in the District Court room to report on the report.

W. C. MONTGOMERY KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT THURS.

W. C. Montgomery, 42 years old, who moved here from east Texas last spring and was living about four miles east of town, was killed late Thursday night when the car in which he was returning home left the highway at a small bridge near the cemetery. The coroner's verdict, as a result of the inquest held by Justice of the Peace, Morton, said that Montgomery met death from a broken neck as a result of an accident.

Ike McClendon and "Dutch" Meeker and another young man were returning from Quitaque and discovered the wrecked car and body of the man about one a. m. They immediately notified the proper authorities and the inquest was held. The victim's neck was broken and his chest crushed in. It was thought that he had not been dead long before he was discovered. Mr. Montgomery is survived by a wife. It is understood that he has two brothers living below the cap. The body was shipped to Mexia for burial.

The women folks, failing to get assistance, beat off the dog with sticks or anything they could lay their hands on, and finally corralled the dog in the bath room of the house with it fighting, biting and snapping continuously. They telephoned to town for help and in the absence of the sheriff or the "official dog killer" Bob Stevenson and J. L. Waters went to their aid. They stuck the muzzle of the gun through the bath room door and killed the dog. THE BEST MAN IN THE CHAPTER

WE WERE talking over the men who composed the active membership of his chapter, Greene and I, attempting to give a proper estimate to each man's character and influence. We were pretty well agreed until we came to Benton.

"Benton is the best man in the chapter," Greene asserted.
"Why do you think so?" I asked.
"Well, he's our best student," Greene affirmed, "or at least close to the best. He has good manners, he is well known about the campus, his morals are unimpeachable, and his family connections are excellent."

This was all true, but from my point of view Benton was far from the best man in the fraternity. He was selfish; he seldom gave any consideration to the interest or to the welfare of others. He had the most comfortable and the quietest room in the house. No freshman in trouble with his studies would ever have thought of going to Benton for help, though he was, perhaps, best able of any one in the chapter to give the help had it been asked. He made no sacrifices for other people. He knew less about how the fellows were getting on, what the standing of the individual men in the chapter was than many a freshman. He often came to my office to ask for some personal favor, but I should never have thought of asking him anything about how his fraternity brothers were doing, for he would not have known or cared. If there was anything special to be done for the chapter he was always busy; his own interests came first.

He could not work well with other people. He made no concessions, he yielded none of his opinions or preferences. He was invariably right and admitted it, and if things could not go his way, he refused to have anything to do with them. I was accustomed to grant such special favors as he might ask, for it must be said to his credit that he was a student who seldom, if ever, neglected his work, and who accomplished his assigned tasks regularly and well; but if he ever asked me for something which I could not quite feel I ought to grant, he was never willing to accept my view of the case gracefully, but he went out of the office flushed and angry. He was a bad loser.

He was well known about the campus, it is true, but he was not popular. He was indifferent or arrogant to the man who, less fortunate than himself, had not had a chance to belong to a fraternity, and even to other fraternity men he assumed an air of condescension which was maddening. It was evident that before we had talked to him for five minutes he felt that the men who were members of his fraternity were of a different class, were formed of a finer clay than were the commonplace members of other organizations. He was a selfish, conceited snob.

The best man in any organization is one, of course, who does the work of the organization, but he should also give consideration to the other men in it, he should be willing to co-operate, he should have at heart not only his interests but the interests of every other man. The ideals of the organization should mean more to him than mere words, they should influence and control his life. The best organization man can never be a selfish man.

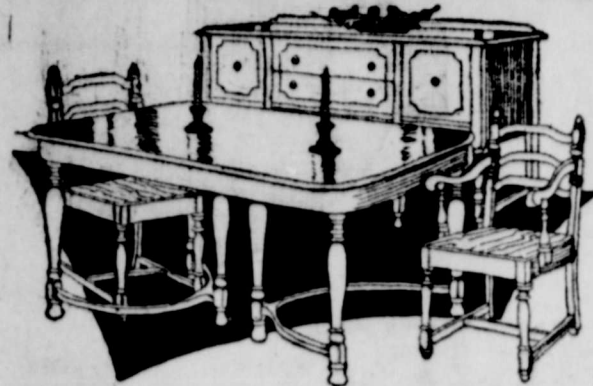

This is real thanksgiving.

THE PROFITS OF DECENCY

The biggest discovery of the twentieth century is the soundness of the principle of live and let live.

Other generations were convinced that "dog eat dog" was the hard rule of business. A man sought prosperity by outwitting or destroying his rivals.

That spirit lingers in places but it is dominant no longer. Instead of fighting to undermine competitors, men co-operate to promote the general prosperity. The growth of this habit of mutual helpfulness during the last few years is one of the remarkable developments of American life.

It is an outcome of another important discovery, the profit to be made out of multiplying and satisfying the wants of the average man.

Plato, the great dreamer of ancient Greece, described his ideal republic in which the fortunate citizens were kept prosperous and free by the labor of slaves. He could not imagine a state in which the men and women who performed the heavy labor of civilization also shared in its fruits.

The discovery that there is room enough for all is one of the epochal advances in human history.

The United States has learned the lesson first. Our rich natural resources developed by scientific industrial methods have provided wealth inconceivably abundant.

Forty years ago many business men were possessed of the idea that they could prosper as they took business away from their competitor.

The fact that the capacity of the human race to consume and consequently to produce has never been fathomed. Nobody can bound the possibilities of consumption.

The man who predicted that the money value of products manufactured in the United States would increase six times in twenty years would have been considered a lunatic. Yet that happened between 1899 and 1919 and the present rate of growth is even faster.

America has expanded miraculously because we are at last recognizing the fact that there is room enough for all. We have proved that high wages pay handsome dividends. We have seen the prosperity of one establishment open opportunities for others in the same industry. There is no room for jealousy or destructive competition.

A great thing has happened. The material advantages of decency have been demonstrated and a wide and promising vista has been opened. This, too, is America's gift to the world.—*Colliers Weekly.*

STABILITY

By THOMAS ARKLE CLARK
 Dean of Men, University of Illinois.

THEY were tearing down the old stone mill when I last visited the village near which I lived when I was a boy and putting up a brick garage upon its former site. They are nothing if not up to date in that town. The next time I go there I shall probably find that they are constructing apartment houses, though there is no lack of available land upon which to build.

The old mill was built a long time ago, or at least so it seemed to me, for it looked weather beaten when I was a boy and that is longer ago than yesterday. It must have dated back to 1850 at least, and that is almost as remote as the Stone age in middle west building.

"The old thing should have been taken down twenty-five years ago," I heard one of the boys of the town saying. "Isn't it wonderful how long some of these buildings will stand?"

"We've got to have a new house before many years," I heard some college fraternity boys saying not long ago. "This old shack in which we are living won't be any good very much longer. Why, the house must be at least twenty-five years old."

It was, indeed, almost that old and it was of brick and stone, quite substantially built, and with proper care should have done service for a century or two.

We do some things very well in our country which is, of course, the greatest country in the world, but in few instances do we build with the idea of stability and permanency. If a house or a business block is fifty years old we usually look upon it as a back number, an architectural antique which should either go into a museum or be torn down and replaced by something more modern and of a newer type of architecture.

The farmhouse in which I lived the first time I was in England had been built more than two hundred years, and it was as solid and well kept as if it had been put up twenty years ago.

The aqueduct at Segovia was built by Augustus Caesar, built without mortar, too, and rises in some places to a height of ninety feet, and it is doing business today as it did then and seems likely to be good for a thousand years more.

There are parts of the Abbey of Mont Saint Michel that look as solid and as substantial as when they were built more than a thousand years ago.

I have seen buildings constructed before Columbus discovered America that look better, are better designed, and are in better repair than others in our American cities that were erected in 1880, and the difference does not lie in the materials used.

Perhaps the reason lies in the fact that we build for today to satisfy a present need; we build hastily and without a sufficiently well-considered plan, and so there is little permanence or stability in our buildings.

WHEN I count up the everyday heroes whom I have known—those simple, unselfish souls who meet sorrows and the sacrifices of a life of toil uncomplainingly and well—I always think of John.

His was, indeed, a very unheroic figure. He was round-shouldered, and thin, almost to emaciation, and if the truth must be told, a little unkempt, his thin iron-gray hair a little ragged and uncombed.

In early life he had been a farm-hand; later he apprenticed himself to a barber, and in recent years he had kept an untidy barber shop at the edge of town. Frugal wives beat him out of his earnings by trimming the hair of their husbands and children; the work was sometimes crudely done, but a penny saved is twopence earned, and there was no evidence of an inflated currency in the village. He could adapt himself to various sorts of work. He was a host in himself at the time of spring housecleaning, wielding the paint brush skillfully within and without the house, putting on wall paper, and acting as general carpenter and repair man.

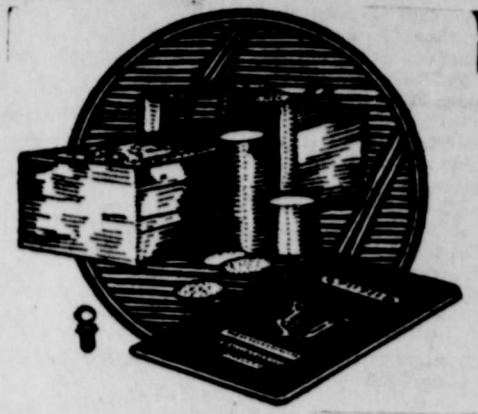
He had a ready wit, a keen insight into the characters of men, a strangely simple accurate judgment. He had no knowledge of literature, he was not much given to religion, he was quite ignorant of political science, and yet the village teacher always dropped in to see John when he struck a hard snag; the minister would never have got quite successfully through a revival service without consulting him, and there was never a political scheme in the county carried through without his being on the inside.

He knew everyone within twenty miles, and everyone whom he knew had a good word for him. Children told him their troubles, mothers named their babies for him, men out of luck and out of work came to him for help, and young boys asked his advice and took it. No one was too low or too insignificant for his consideration.

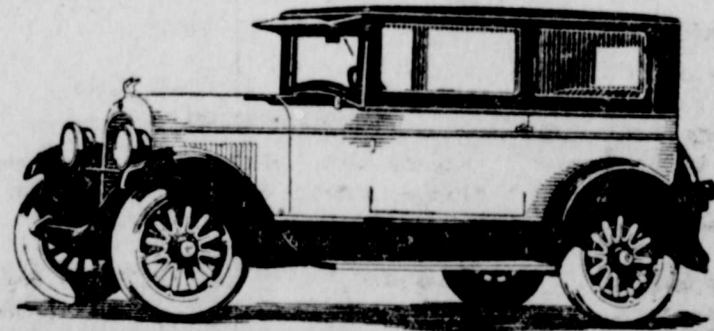

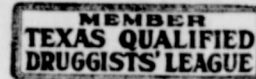

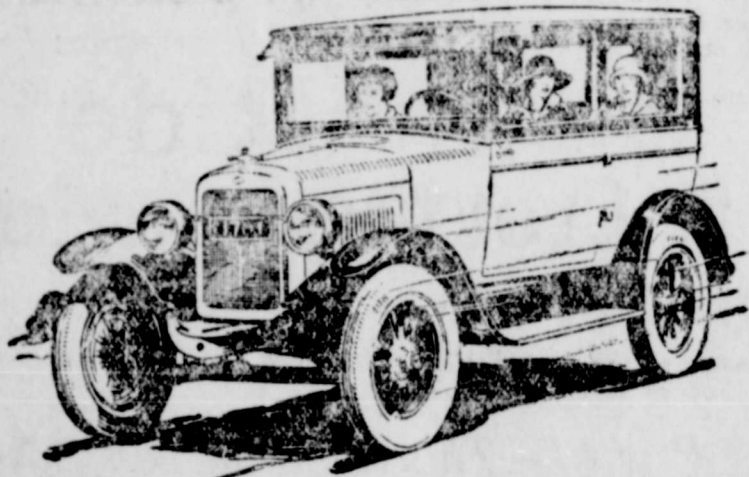
