REPORT IS OUT THAT I.C.C. WILL MAKE A DECISION THIS WEEK

Reports have arrived in Silverton from Plainview that the chamber of commerce there has it on good authority from Washington that the I. C. C. will hand down some sort of a decision on the South Plains railway permits this week.

The rumor is also current that the Santa Fe and the Denver have reached an agreement whereby they will not contest the decision of the I. C. C., once it is given, but there is no such report with regard to the proposed T. P. & G. The belief is strong at Plainview that both the Denver and Santa Fe will be given permits on at least part of the construction that they are asking for.

LEE, HILL AND HORN TO SPEAK AT LITTLEFIELD

Littlefield, Feb. 16—Three presidents will appear on the program of the district convention of the West Texas chamber of commerce to be held at Littlefield, Monday, Feb. 22. President R. Q. Lee of the West Texas C. of C., Dr. P. W. Horn, president of Texas Tech. college and Dr. A. J. Hill, president of the West Texas Teachers College, have prominent places on the program. This is believed to be more presidents than have yet been assembled on any one program at a district convention.

President Lee will speak on his subject of diversified and intensive farming. He will take his doctrine throughout the South Plains section during a week speaking campaign which opens in Haskell, Wednesday, Feb. 17. He is going to into the plains country as planting season draws near in order to get his program before the farmers complete their plans for the forthcoming crop year.

Mr. Lee campaigned the South Plains during the past summer preaching diversification to a country whose cotton fields bore promise of yielding a record breaking crop. He warned of over-production or of crop failure and urged limitation of cotton production to a people whose fields seemed to dispute the wisdom of the speaker's words. However, subsequent events proved that Lee was right and mother nature's smiles changed to frowns when an unseasonable freeze spelled ruin to many throughout the region.

Now, Mr. Lee is returning to get his doctrine before the people before it is too late. He urges production of cotton, but advised a diversified farming program with feed and livestock as a part of the program and a policy of better cultivation of fewer acres by the individual farmers.

His campaign will reach a climax at Littlefield and a record breaking attendance is expected to hear him. This will probably be the last South Plains campaign Mr. Lee will make during his term of office as president of the West Texas C. of C.

JUDGE WRIGHT SECURES STATE HIGHWAY AID

As a result of a recent trip to Austin by Judge C. D. Wright, the State Highway Commission has made an appropriation of \$940 to help pay for the right-of-way which will provide a new crossing on the Silverton-Quitque highway.

The commission had already appropriated \$3,500 for the construction of a new bridge but it was thought inadvisable by the engineers to build the bridge at the present crossing. A new crossing a few hundred yards up the creek was determined upon but there has been a delay in securing the bridge on account of the road district being unable to get the right-of-way without assistance. With the state aid now available work will go forward immediately and the most dangerous point on the Ozark Trail improved. A contract for the building of the bridge has already been let to Austin Bros. of Dallas.

COL. WOODBURN DEAD

Col. E. T. Woodburn, 83 years old, pioneer of the Panhandle and Texas, who died Monday night, was buried beside his wife in the Hereford cemetery yesterday afternoon. Funeral services were held in the Presbyterian church. The Masonic lodge had charge of the burial.

Col. Woodburn died Monday night. He had been in failing health for several months, and all his children had been summoned to his bedside, last week when it was feared the end was near.

Col. Woodburn was a confederate veteran. He was born in Tennessee. He enlisted in the confederate army at the outbreak of the Civil War and served four years. He was wounded several times.

After the war he returned home but soon moved to Weatherford at the time Fort Worth was a frontier town. Leaving Weatherford a few years later he moved to Silverton about 1890, thence to Hereford in 1906. He has lived there since.

Col. Woodburn has not been active in business affairs for some time, but up until a few months ago he was active in civic, church and fraternal affairs.

Surviving him are four sons: William, of Dimmitt, Estes of Lockney, Jim, Sheriff of Armstrong county, Ernest of Amarillo, three daughters: Mrs. Edgar Betts of Claude, Mrs. Carl Frye, of Hereford, and Miss Mattie also of Hereford. Another daughter, Mrs. Cross, died at Texico recently, leaving several children. His son, Charles P., died in Claude some time ago. Mrs. Charles Woodburn and son, Charles Russell, reside in Amarillo.

JUDGE C. D. WRIGHT ANNOUNCES FOR DISTRICT ATTORNEY

Judge C. D. Wright, County Judge of Briscoe County, herewith makes his official announcement for the office of District Attorney for the 64th Judicial District subject to the action of the voters in the July primary. Judge Wright is well and favorably known throughout the district and his friends hope for him a successful campaign.

To the Voters of the 64th Judicial District of the State of Texas:

I wish to submit myself to you as a candidate for the office of District Attorney for this district.

I am a native Texan, and "an old timer" in this region, having moved, thirty-five years ago, from Milford, Texas to Tulia, Swisher County, and the following year—January 1892—we came over into Briscoe County to live.

I received my education in the public schools and at Clarendon College for four years, and at Austin, studying law. I was admitted to the bar in 1902, served a part of two terms as county attorney of this county; and, in December 1907, moved to Hereford, Texas, to form a law partnership there. In 1910 was elected County Judge of Deaf Smith County and served two terms, not seeking the third term. In 1915 was appointed County Attorney and was, in 1916, elected to that office, but on account of poor health in my family we moved to Seattle, Wash., where we resided until Oct. 1921 when we came back to Briscoe County to look after some private business. In 1922 I was solicited to make the race for County Judge and was elected.

I have been urged by friends in all parts of the district to enter the race this year for District Attorney. I have had about twenty years experience as an attorney, four years of which I served as County Attorney and am now serving my eighth year as county judge. With the experience which I have had I feel sure that I understand and can discharge the duties of District Attorney. If I did not feel capable of filling the office I would not ask for your support.

As to my official success I refer you to my records in Briscoe and Deaf Smith Counties. I have had similar experiences as judge in both Deaf Smith and Briscoe Counties; I went into office at each place right after the erection of a new court-house, when there had been no provision made to pay the additional expense. With the help of good commissioners, was able to meet it with no additional tax. In this county all departments are in much better condition than when I went into office. Schools, finances and roads are all improved.

I have always worked hard to conduct the affairs of the office in a business-like way for the benefit of the people as a whole. I believe in strong enforcement of the law as that is the greatest insurance we have against the commission of crime; but I would persecute no one, nor would I use the office to help any one to wreak vengeance upon an enemy.

The only promise I have ever made in any campaign I now make to the people of this district—I will discharge all the duties of the office to the very best of my ability, without fear or favor; I will at all times be at your service, "though I should go at midnight and alone." Mistakes I may make; but I will profit by them and study hard to avoid them.

I am sure that my experience as an attorney in the general practice of law, as a County Attorney, and as a Judge on the bench well qualifies me to fill the office to which I aspire.

I will endeavor to see all of you but owing to the time required and to the duties of my present office I may not be permitted to see every person. However, I will appreciate the vote and influence of each one; and if you elect me I will do my best to so conduct the office as to render myself worthy of your confidence.
