ROADS WILLING TO TAKE T. P. G.

Fort Worth, June 28—Major rail systems suggested by Examiner Boles of the Interstate commerce commission as logical ones to look over the Texas, Panhandle and Gulf railroad project are already willing and anxious to take it over, C. H. Powell, Chicago, President of the T. P. & G. said here Monday.

Powell characterized as "flimsy" the objection noted in briefs of exceptions to the examiner's report filed by contending railroads. He reiterated his former declarations regarding ability of the T. P. & G. to finance itself and declared his company was only waiting on granting of the certificate of necessity. Although he would not say who would represent his road at the hearing before the Interstate Commerce Commission next month, he declared it would comprise "a whole bevy of legal talent."

BRISCOE COUNTY WHEAT IS FIRST TO REACH TULIA

Wheat from Briscoe County was the first of the 1926 crop to reach Tulia. The wheat was sold by T. C. McCutchen and was harvested with a combine Thursday, June 17th. Mr. McCutchen lives eight miles east of Silverton and he received a bonus of \$20 given by the Fogerson Grain Company for the first wheat to be sold this season. The wheat tested 60 and produced at the rate of 33 bushels to the acre. He received \$1.18 per bushel in addition to his bonus. He harvested about 20 acres before having to quit on account of the rain which fell Thursday evening.

Fogerson and Alexander, of the Fogerson Grain Company, who have leased the Abernathy Mill's Elevator for the season say that they believe they would have shipped the first car of wheat in the Panhandle had it not been for the rain.

Johnnie Kendrick Pays Supreme Penalty In Truck Accident

Johnnie Kendrick, 29 years old, known to his friends as "Red", paid the supreme penalty in a truck accident Tuesday night. He was on the road to Tulia with a load of wheat and turning out of the road for a car, the lights of which blinded him, he ran head on into the rear of a big Patriot truck loaded with wheat which had been parked on account of a flat tire. The accident occurred two miles this side of Tulia or one mile just before crossing the draw. He was picked up within a few minutes and rushed to Tulia where doctors did not consider his injuries serious as he maintained consciousness and as there were no outside wounds. Severe ribs were caved in by impact with the steering wheel and almost without warning, upon being shifted from one side to the other, for further examination, he died. The watch that he was wearing was stopped at exactly 10:33 o'clock and he died at 12:15. So great was the momentum of the loaded truck that it was almost entirely demolished and was thrown back for a distance of eleven feet.

Johnnie was married to Agnes Northcutt, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tom Northcutt, a little more than five years ago and they made their home here since, he having engaged in a general trucking business. He had hauled for practically every firm in town and was universally liked for his chery and accommodating disposition. His death came as a distinct shock to the entire community and the business houses were closed for the funeral which was held Wednesday afternoon at the Methodist church, at 3:30 o'clock. Hundreds of friends gathered to pay their respects to Johnnie's memory and to offer words and tears of sympathy to the bereaved. It was one of the saddest funerals ever held here and yet one of the prettiest. Loving hands prepared the many beautiful floral offerings and the grave was carefully and artistically arranged. W. L. Jenkins, pastor of the Methodist church had charge of the ceremony.

Aside from his wife, Mr. Kendrick is survived by his mother and father, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Kendrick, who live here, and four brothers and one sister.

HE CAN'T CHANGE THE ISSUE

It has not been our purpose to discuss the candidacy of Lynch Davidson in this campaign, and shall not do so now, except to a very limited extent. We regard his candidacy more as an "aid society to Ferguson" than anything else, and believe that a vote cast for Davidson is half a vote for Ferguson.

Davidson has been a candidate since he was side-tracked at the first primary two years ago. At that time no one foresaw what has transpired since, though many knew the Ferguson nature, expected it.

But Dan Moody shot across the political horizon, just because he has honest and courageous enough to do his duty and did not fear Fergusonism, nor all the power, influence that the governor's office had to dispense through appointments. And he, above all else, did not fear Jim Ferguson's bullyism and was not afraid to track the law in all his efforts to do his duty.

When the American Road Company and the Hoffman Construction Company was sued by Dan Moody, and later, when the American Road Company pleaded guilty to all Moody charged against them, and agreed to restore to the public treasury six hundred thousand dollars of their ill-gotten gains, Lynch Davidson immediately turned green with envy towards Dan Moody, presumably because Davidson saw Moody as an outstanding character, such as was needed to clean up the state of graft and rottenness.

Davidson seemed to feel that it was his duty to join the general public and "congratulate" Moody for doing his duty. "That's all Moody did," Davidson and his supporters are saying.

But the fact that "Moody did do his duty" seems to be neatly considered by the Davidson following. Is it unusual for a public servant to do his duty? If so, then all the more reason why the people will appreciate that fact and reward and endorse their "faithful servant" and send him up higher. That is in accord with Divine teaching, and this year will meet with public approval.

But Davidson felt like it was incumbent upon him to do and say what he could to discredit Moody. He pursued the same course toward Whit Davidson, one of his opponents, two years ago, with fatal results to himself. In his effort to minimize Moody's successful effort to expose graft and the waste of public money, in an interview given to the Dallas News and published November 24, 1925, Davidson made the following statement:

"The figures indicate a financial loss to the State by cancellation of the American Road Company's maintenance obligation on already constructed roads. By the same token it appears the road company received approximately \$750,000 profit."

Thus, he endeavors to jump astride of the Ferguson horse and ride with Jim and Ma and the discredited Highway Commission in an effort to destroy Moody. No sane man, not controlled by partisan favor or self-interest, could reach any such conclusion. In last issue we published Liberal extracts from the testimony in the American Road Company case. And that testimony shows that every engineer who testified, said that 30 cents a yard was an unreasonable price for the work the State had paid for, and the proof was overwhelming that the cost of the work actually done by the American Road Company was 8.75c per square yard, leaving 21 cents a yard as graft and profit. How can Mr. Davidson ask that the Governor's office be entrusted to him, and entertain such a low idea as to the value of a public servant doing his duty? Let him answer that question. The secretary of the Highway Commission testified the contracts were let without competitive bidding, and that there was not even a contract made—just letters written. Brodnax and Heysor, the two chief bread-roads of the American Road Company both admitted there was no contract but a verbal agreement and letters to confirm it. And both Heysor and Brodnax admitted under oath that the price and profits they got were unconscionable—so much so they later pleaded guilty and relieved their consciences, by confessing everything Moody had charged in his pleadings, and disgorge \$500,000 of the money they took from the State under the most damnable circumstances that every surrounded any public transaction in the history of the fair State of Texas. And this transaction, the Fergusons had the affrontery, after knowing all about it, to go into the courts and defend. And this transaction

the public honor? Was ever a State afflicted with such condoning moral cowardice?

Lynch Davidson has been trying to discredit Moody. He half apologizes for Ferguson. Instead of planting himself early on the solid ground built up by Dan Moody's courageous course, and giving it his whole-hearted approval, Lynch Davidson has done all he could, and said all he could say, to discredit Moody's discharge of duty. 1492—1607—1776—1926

If there ever was a year when every town and county in this nation should celebrate the Fourth of July it is this year of 1926. Let's take a look backward at only a few dates and facts, and try to locate ourselves in the eternal plan of our nation's history.

In 1492 the poet says, "Columbus sailed the ocean blue" and after weary dangerous days and nights on what seemed to be an endless ocean his little band saw a bird in the sky, and then a branch of some kind of a tree floating on the ocean. It gave them new hope and a few days later they saw the first land of a new world. What a great event that was in the history of the world! But how often do any of us stop to think what it meant to those unpaid seamen at that time or its significance to us today?

One hundred and fifteen long years passed (115 years) from the time Columbus dared to try to prove his convictions before the first settlement was made at Jamestown in 1607. What do you suppose the world was doing all those years? Looking backward from this day, of steam and electricity and airships it seems like slow movements. Thirteen years later, in 1620, the Mayflower landed at Plymouth Rock with the Pilgrim Fathers on board, and from those two dates people, white people, began to try to live in what is today the greatest nation on earth.

From 1607, the time when the first colonists made a settlement in the United States, until the Declaration of American Independence, July 4, 1776, it was just 169 years. Get that, Boys and Girls of Texas? Time is nothing to you now, but it will be some day when life takes on a greater value. And from the time the Pilgrim Fathers landed in 1620 and held that first Thanksgiving celebration until the colonists declared their independence it was 156 years. It took nineteen years longer for the first colony in Virginia to grow into the thirteen colonies and establish their independent government along the Atlantic border than it has taken those thirteen colonies to grow into the greatest Republic the world has ever known. What do you suppose those brave colonists were doing all those 169 years from the day the first ones unloaded at Jamestown until the 4th of July, 1776, when a new nation was born upon the earth?

When the Jamestown and Plymouth Colonies were founded there were scarcely a hundred souls left in them after the hardships of their first year in a new world. But when Old Glory was first unfurled over the infant Republic she floated over 2,500,000 souls. In the first 169 years of our country's history the people had multiplied from a few hundred to three and a half million. And that was just one hundred and fifty years ago. On July 4, 1926, when our nation celebrates its 150th birthday that same Old Glory will wave over 110,000,000 inhabitants scattered across the continent and almost around the world. There is not another nation in all this world that has grown so gloriously as the U. S. A. There is not another flag in this world that has brought so much joy and hope to all the nations of the earth as our own Old Glory which is among the youngest banners in this world. Take one day off this year, whoever you are and wherever you live, and spend it thinking about your country and what it means to you, what it has cost all the generations of the past to make it what it is today, and last, but most of all, what is our duty to our country in gratitude for all that has been done for us?

And do not let the day pass without thinking of our duty to our own Texas. Only 50 years ago there was no such thing as the State of Texas. Today there are more than five million men, women, boys and girls in Texas. More people in Texas today by nearly two million than there were in the whole United States a hundred and fifty years ago when the United States was first established. With such a start and such an amount of push and progress, and with all the resources and powers and possibilities within our own state what will Texas be one hundred and fifty years from now when our nation has simply doubled its presentage?

What a responsibility to carry on the work of the pioneers of the past and pave the way for greater achievements in the future. Here is one of the biggest problems for Texas, or any other child of America to ask themselves: Are we developing our people in the same ratio as our country and its industries? Or are we in some cases sacrificing the best interests of our people to make a bigger industrial show and pile up more money? What is America's and Texas' greatest danger in this the year of our hundred and fiftieth anniversary? Are we building enough men and women with enough vision and ability to take care of the future of our country? Or is our country outgrowing the development of its people? What happens when the wealth and commercial interests of a home, or a nation outgrows the character of its children? This state and this nation demands the wisest heads and the biggest hearts and the men and women of broadest vision for the future to direct its swift growth. As a big state family are we thinking and working together to make this possible? The Fourth of July, 1926, would be a good day for every community, great and small, to STOP, LOOK, and THINK for a few minutes about our patriotic duty to our homes, our state and our nation. What will the next hundred and fifty years mean to Texas and America?—By Phebe K. Warner, 24 Southwest, Plainsman.

Proposed Amendment To The Constitution

Senate Joint Resolution No. 7

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by amending Section 33 and Section 40 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas so as to permit officers of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States to hold public office in Texas. Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 33 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"The accounting officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person, for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding after Section 6 thereof 6a, which

shall read as follows:

Section 6a. All agriculture or grazing school land mentioned in Section 6 of this Article owned by any county shall be subject to taxation except for State purposes to the same extent as lands privately owned.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D., 1926, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "For the Constitutional amendment providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land owned by any county, to the same extent as land privately owned" and "Against the Constitutional amendment providing for taxation of all agriculture or grazing school land owned by any county to the same extent as land privately owned."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expense of publication shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

Proposed Amendment To The Constitution

Senate Joint Resolution No. 9

A Joint Resolution relating to the amending of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners; providing for the supervision and management of the Prison System, under such laws as may be provided for by the Legislature. Be it Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 16, Section 58 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 58. The Legislature shall have full power and authority to provide by law for the management and control of the Prison System of Texas; and to this end shall have power and authority to place the Prison System under the supervision, management and control of such trained and experienced officer, or officers, as the Legislature may from time to time provide for by law.

Section 2. The above Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a general election to be held November 3, 1926, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "For the amendment of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners." And all those opposing said amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words "Against the amendment of Article 16, Section 58, of the Constitution, abolishing the Board of Prison Commissioners."

Section 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by law.

Section 4. The sum of \$5,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the funds in the Treasury of the State, and not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

Proposed Amendment To The Constitution

House Joint Resolution No. 9

A resolution proposing an amendment to Art. 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas by changing Section 3, eliminating the provision authorizing the Legislature to create special districts and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 3, Article 7, of the Constitution be so changed as to read as follows: (creating new section.)

"Section 3. One-fourth of the revenue derived from the State Occupation taxes and poll tax of one dollar on every inhabitant of the State, between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, shall be set apart annually for the benefit of the public free schools; and in addition thereto, there shall be levied and collected an annual ad valorem State tax of such an amount not to exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred (\$100.00) dollars valuation, as with the available school fund arising from all other sources, will be sufficient to maintain and support the public schools of this State for a period of not less than six months in each year, and it shall be the duty of the State Board of Education to set aside a sufficient amount out of the said tax to provide free text books for the use of children attending the public free schools of this State; provided, however, that should the limit of taxation herein named be insufficient the deficit may be met by appropriation from the general funds of the State and the Legislature may also provide for the formation of school districts by general laws; and all such school districts may embrace parts of two or more counties, and the laws for the assessment and collection of taxes in all said districts and for the management and control of the public school or schools of such districts, whether such districts are composed of territory wholly within a county or in parts of two or more counties, and the Legislature may authorize an additional ad valorem tax to be levied and collected

within all school districts heretofore formed or hereafter formed, for the further maintenance of public free schools, and for the erection and equipment of school buildings therein; provided that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the district voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax not to exceed in any one year one (\$1.00) dollar on the hundred dollars valuation of the property subject to taxation in such district, but the limitation upon the amount of school district tax herein authorized shall not apply to incorporated cities or towns constituting separate and independent school districts, nor to independent or common school districts created by general or special law."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1926, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provision which authorizes the Legislature to create special school districts," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provision which authorizes the Legislature to create special school districts."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and existing laws of the State.

Sec. 4. That the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars or

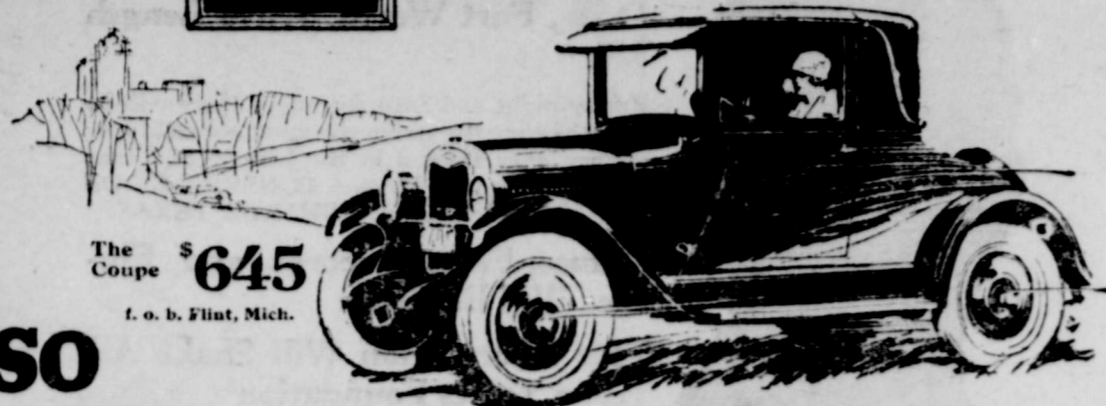

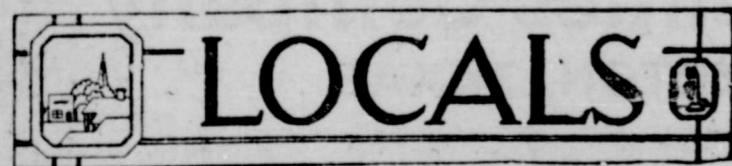

people of the great State of Texas have a Constitution? 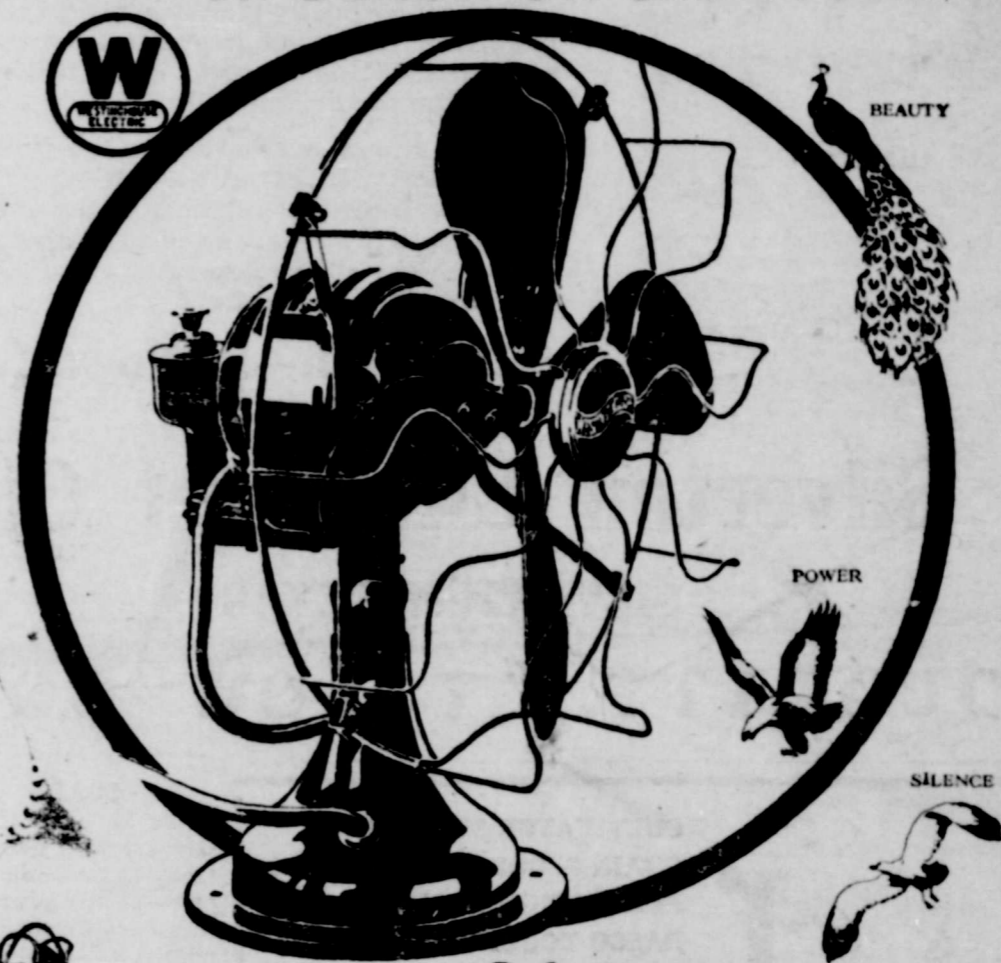
