FIRST BALE OF PLAINS COTTON GINNED SATURDAY

S. J. Ellis who lives in the Rock Creek community, about seven miles west of Silverton arrived here Friday evening, Sept. 17th with about 1500 pounds of cotton to be ginned. A little later in the day another party arrived with cotton to be ginned but too late. Mr. Blakney fired up Saturday morning and the cotton was ginned. The bale weighed a few lbs over 500. Mr. Ellis sold the cotton to R. M. Carter, receiving about 1/2 cents per pound above market as it was the first bale, also he received a cash premium of about \$22.50; a sack of flour from King's Grocery and the ginning free. Mr. Ellis asked the News to thank the public or parties who had a part in the donations.

He says that the seats are so large in some of the grades that the children cannot touch the floor with their feet when sitting.

MOODY FILED SUIT FOR \$1,750,000. AGAINST OIL CO.

Austin, Sept. 21—A suit asking an account of oil produced from University lands in Regan county \$2,750,000 damages, and for cancellation of leases held by the Tex. Oil and Land company and associated companies and the Big Lake Oil company was filed Tuesday in the fifty third district court by Attorney General Dan Moody, in behalf of the University of Texas. The Texon Oil and Land company of Tex. group number one, oil corporation group number two oil corporation, Big Lake Oil Corporation, Marland Oil Corporation. The Regan County purchasing company Inc. The Humble Oil and Refining Company and the Humble Pipe Line Company are named defendants in the suit.

Dan Moody R. J. Randolph assistant attorney general and Saner and of Dallas, Attorney for the University of Texas are signers of the petition.

At 11:15 each Thursday the school assembles in the chapel for their chapel exercises. The first program was given last week by the 1st to 4th grades.



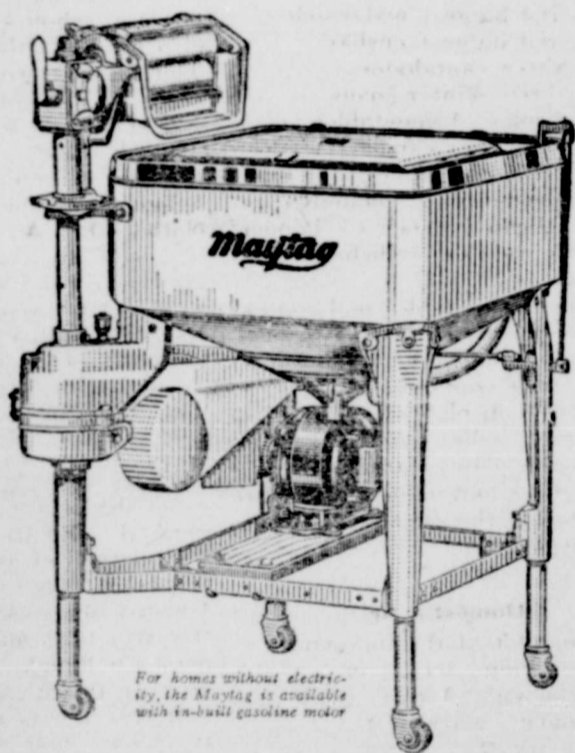

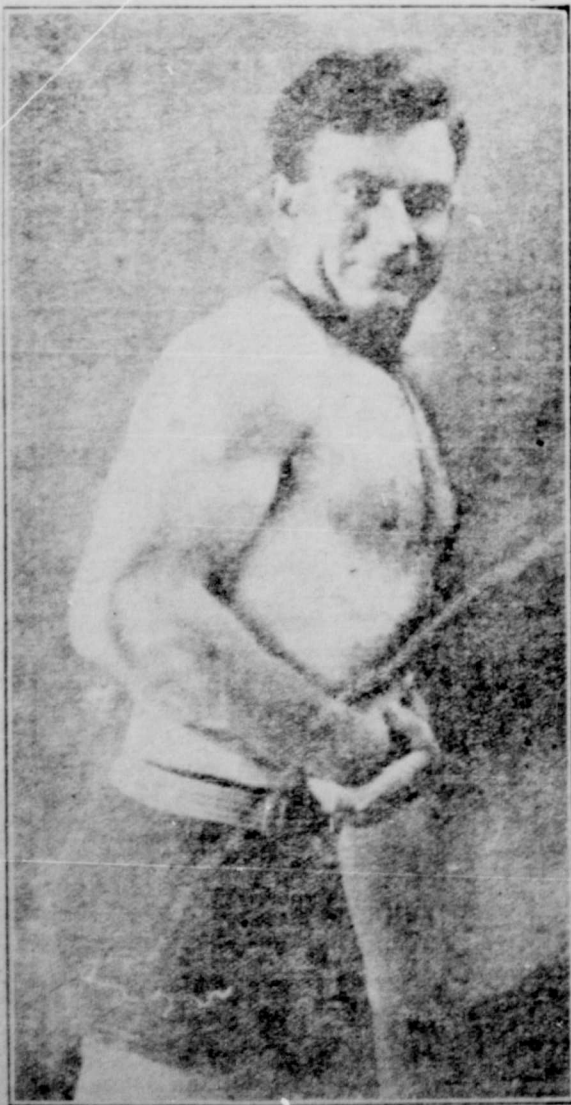
