## Haulers of Livestock and Fowls Must Show Permit On Demand

### Any Person or Peace-Officer May Legally Request Proper Credentials Be Shown by Driver of Vehicle.

In order to prevent or lessen the effects of livestock and fowls through the use of trucks and automobiles, which have become prevalent the last few years with peace-officers helpless to investigate, a new law has been passed and is now in effect.

Any one who would transport livestock or fowls, alive or dressed, outside of his own property, owned or rented, must be able to show a permit from the owner or make a written statement himself to any person or officer who may demand it. The following information must be given upon demand:

Place of origin of the load, point of destination, number of livestock or fowls, description of each. Failure or refusal of driver to exhibit such information shall give the officer cause for searching the vehicle and to detain driver reasonable length of time, and driver shall be subject to a minimum fine of \$25.

If forged instruments are used to evade the officers, the driver shall

be subject to minimum fine of \$200 and two months in jail.

Heretofore no adequate law regulating movements of livestock by motor transportation has existed, and it is thought the above provisions will enable peace-officers to keep a closer tab on stock movements that are illegal. The process may seem tedious to legitimate stock shippers, but it is a safety measure, and was fostered and urged by stock raisers of Texas, especially the Sheep and Goat Raisers Association.

## Ed Manning Gets Sewerage Contract

### \$25,000 Sewerage System Installation Goes to Lockney Man.

The sewer contract has been completed with an acceptable bond made, and successful bidder is Ed Manning of Lockney, who secured the job at a price a little over \$24,000, covering only the work within the city limits, according to T. M. Nichols, mayor. An additional outlay is provided for in preparing the disposal site.

Work began the first of the week on the disposal site, and the ditching for the mains and laterals for the city lines will start at once, it is understood. The contract calls for completion of the system within 90 days or about the first of November.

## Fire Destroyed Northcutt Home

Fire of undetermined origin completely destroyed the home and furnishings of A. R. Northcutt here early Saturday morning in the southwest part of the city.

The Northcutt family was not at home, and the flames were bursting through the roof before the fire was seen by any one to give the alarm. The fire department rushed to the scene but could do nothing but prevent the spread of the blaze to out-houses.

### The \$80,000 School Unit Be Ready for Public Reception Between August 1st and 10th.

The new \$80,000 school building was accepted by the school board Friday, states C. D. Wright, president of the board, with the exception of the lighting contract which is not fully finished.

The stage scenery was set a few days ago. All the opera chairs for the auditorium and half the furniture for the building are on hand for arrangement in the building.

Arrangements will be made to fire the steam-heating system with gas said Judge Wright, also gas burners will probably be put in the old building furnace.

Upon arrival of the lockers and their installation in the wall niches, the building will be ready for dedication and any house-warming gathering that may be arranged, at some time between August 1 and 10, stated Judge Wright, who wishes the high school to be equipped fully and in most attractive form before being presented to the public.

## M. K. Summers Lost Studebaker in Fire

The Studebaker sedan of M. K. Summers of the Super Service Station was completely destroyed by fire in an accident Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock on the highway east of Wellington near the state line. The car was occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Summers and daughter, Anna, who was driving on their return from a visit in Oklahoma. The ladies were bruised rather severely, but no bones were broken or internal injuries resulted. Mr. Summers came out practically unscathed.

As Miss Summers drove the car down a hill a sandbank was hit, and the Studebaker skidded over the embankment into the edge of a canyon. The car was nearly halted when it tipped on over, permitting the occupants to escape before the blaze spread from the fire that started up near the front of the vehicle. A complete loss resulted. The car just had been equipped with four new Dayton tires for the trip.

A passing car carried the Summers family to Wellington. About nine o'clock Mr. Summers returned to the scene to remove any undamaged parts. Salvagers had beaten him to it and removed several valuable accessories. Even five hours after the fire, the metal was practically too hot to handle.

The Silvertown ball club staged a come-back Sunday afternoon and took the Brice boys into camp with a safe margin, 15 to 7. Parker starred for the visitors, knocking out three home-runs in four times at bat, covering the centerfield orchard in an able manner, doing some good pitching in the seventh inning, and ending up as catcher.

A total of nine homeruns was polled, five for Brice and four for Silvertown, yet the game was fast and well-played, with the exception of a few occasional wabbles on the part of the fielders. ## Revivalist Davis Prods Modernists

### Rev. R. P. Davis Delivered Old-Time Sermon on Hell-Fire in Concluding Union Revival.

Rapping the modernist and taking a full swing on the church hospital, Rev. R. P. Davis concluded the union revival at the Baptist church here Sunday night.

The speaker's text was read from Luke, recounting the episode of the rich man and Lazarus. In his prelude to an old-time sermon on fire and brimstone, as recorded scripturally in the final destination of the rich man, Rev. Davis used the keen rapier of ridicule on hospital maintainers by churches through their failure to be self-supporting and lack of humanitarianism in its doctors and attendants; and stilled with scorn the modernist view that there is no real Hell. This poniard was resorted to time and again as he took thrusts at what he termed "Monkey-face Baptist" and "hair-brain Methodist," churchmen who have scientific minds and are inclined to accept the theory of evolution as being the most plausible and intelligent means of the world's creation and progress.

An interesting lesson was drawn when the speaker reviewed the life, the death, and the life hereafter of Lazarus and his contemporary, the rich man, as he stressed eternal fire for the damned and everlasting glory for the saved. One youth went forward and made a profession. Apparently the fear of punishment is not the potent factor as in former generations in bringing men and women to repentance.

## Woolaroc, Art Goebel, Frank Phillips Here

### Briscoe County Folks Greeted Flyer and Ship on Farewell Trip of Famous Plane.

BARTLESVILLE, Ok., July 31.—Definite announcement of the complete schedule of the requested last flight of the famous "Woolaroc" airplane, which won the Dole prize flight from Oakland to Honolulu, was announced here today by Frank Phillips.

Art Goebel, who flew the ship to victory in the Hawaiian race is again at the controls and is piloting the plane on its last cruise before it is placed in a permanent hangar on the F. P. Ranch near here, for the benefit of future generations.

About three weeks ago, Mr. Phillips announced that he was building a fireproof stone hangar on his ranch and game preserve here, where the Woolaroc, which made a marked contribution to American aviation history, would be protected and saved for posterity. The announcement brought a flood of invitations from more than 200 cities to fly the ship on a last cruise before its final retirement, so as to permit thousands of people to see a famous trans-oceanic plane.

Mr. Phillips has found it possible to accept the invitations for such a trip, and has persuaded Art Goebel to fly the ship. Some fifty or sixty cities will be visited, but lack of adequate landing facilities for a ship of this size and character made it impossible to include many cities

QUITAUQUE, TEXAS, July 30.—

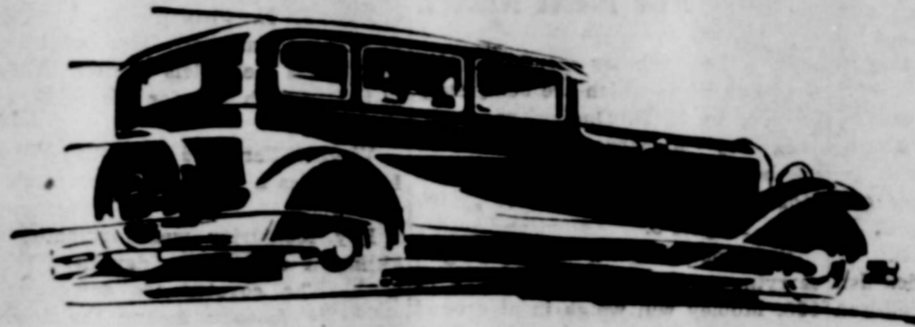

## Suggested MENU

### AL FRESCO MEAL ADDS JOY

Fortunate, indeed, is the family with a shaded porch where frequent meals may be served during the hot summer days.

The porch meal gives an opportunity to use gay colorful linens or other table coverings, glassware to harmonize or contrast, jaunty garden bouquets; and a chance to serve attractive buffet dishes which may be prepared well ahead of the time of the meal.

The main dish of the meal may well be a platter of assorted cold meats, meat loaf, jellied meat dishes, meat salads and mousses.

### Attractive Jellied Meats

An attractive way of serving the jellied meat dishes or a meat mousse is in individual molds. The molds may be arranged in nests of water-cress or curly endive on a large green glass platter which will add to the cool appearance of the dish.

If desired a large mold may be used instead. The ring form can be used extremely well in this way. The meat dish may be molded in it and then turned out on a large round platter and surrounded with individual servings of vegetable salad in lettuce cups. Or if one wishes a jellied salad may be molded in the large or small molds and served as an accompaniment to the platter of cold sliced meats.

A cool and appetizing salad to serve with the platter of assorted cold meats is:

- Jade Green Salad
- 2 tablespoon gelatine
- 3-4 cup cold water
- 2 cups cut pineapple
- 3-4 cup lemon juice
- 1-2 cup diced cucumber

Make like any jelly, heating the pineapple juice with the sugar and lemon juice and dissolving the soaked gelatin in this. There should be a scant two cups of liquid altogether. Color the liquid a delicate green. Canned or fresh pineapple may be used. Mold in individual molds and chill.

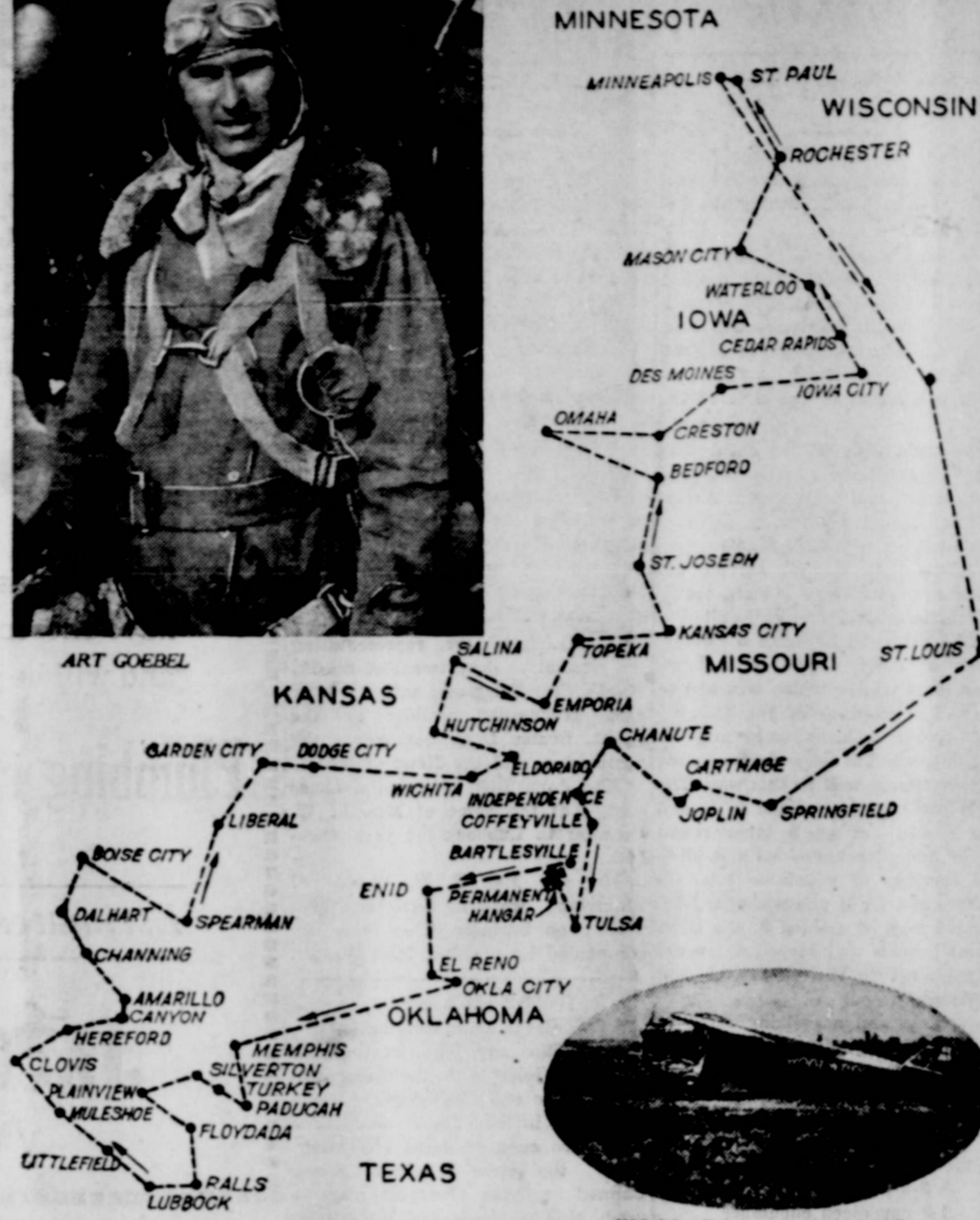

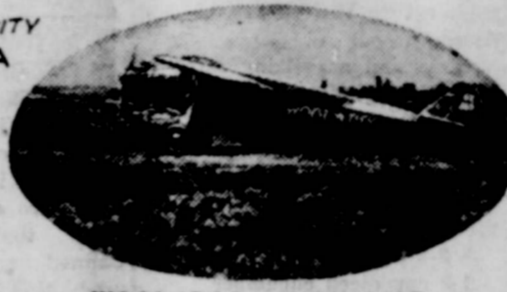

WOOLAROC LANDING AT WHEELER FIELD, HONOLULU

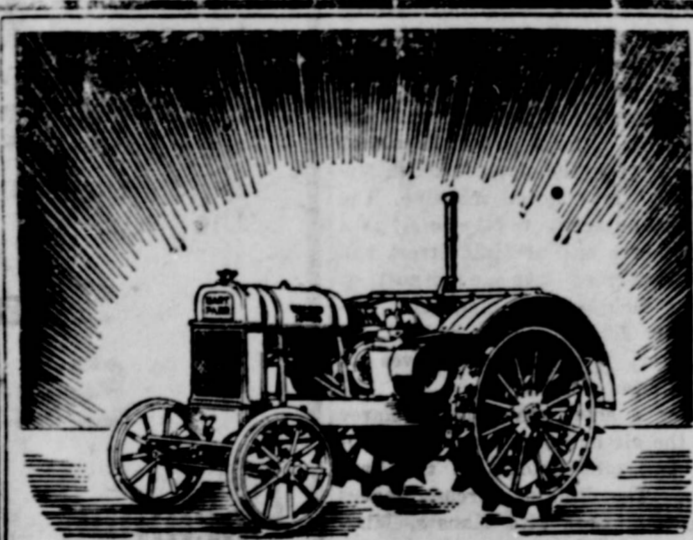
que, a few scattering cotton showers being all the moisture received in this section.

## ALVIN P. HOWARD INSPECTS LOCAL HOLDINGS TUES.

NEW ORLEANS MAN WHO ONCE OWNED HALF OF BRISCOE COUNTY IS VISITOR IN SECTION—NEW TOWNSITE IS RUMORED AFTER VISIT.

QUITAQUE, TEXAS, July 30.—Alvin P. Howard, president of the Hibernia Trust Co. of New Orleans, and a member of famous firm of Howard Bros., who at one time owned every other section of land in Briscoe County, was a visitor in Quitaque on Tuesday of last week. Mr. Howard was accompanied here by W. M. Massie of Floydada, who handles the Howard interests in this section.

After visiting friends and acquaintances in Quitaque for several hours, Mr. Howard left for Silvertown and other sections of the Plains

where his firm has land holdings. Following the visit of the New Orleans banker, rumors which were prevalent at the time of the building of the railroad to this section were revived to the effect that the Howard interests plan a townsite on the railroad extension at White Mule, some 8 miles south of Quitaque. No intimation of such purpose was given by Mr. Howard, however, and nothing definite regarding the proposed new town has been given out for publication.

The White Mule section is located just over the county line in Floyd County, and takes in some of the best farm lands in the Quitaque trade territory. At the present time a cotton gin, a filling station and a general store are located on the proposed townsite.
