**FARM SECURITY ADMINISTRATION**

Last week we explained how a rehabilitation loan was made, and how this loan was serviced after being completed. This week we will discuss methods by which the loan service is supplemented. The first method is by debt adjustment.

Repayments of all debts of the borrower are definitely planned at the time the FSA loan is made. In cases where a farmer is overburdened with excessive debts, an adjustment of such debts with the creditors is necessary. FSA offers a debt adjustment service through the cooperation of supervisors and a committee of local, public spirited citizens.

Through this service farm debtors and their creditors are brought together on a basis of mutual understanding. Debtors to whom this service is extended may or may not be borrowers. The Farm Security Administration has no legal authority to force or make any adjustments; it simply serves as an agency through which two parties may come together to adjust their difficulties to mutual satisfaction.

In conference the creditor and the debtor-farmer, with the assistance of the FSA representative, determine how much the debt-burdened farmer can pay over a period of time. Such planned payments are based on the farmer's probable income and capacity to pay. Many Farm Debt Adjustment cases are not rural rehabilitation borrowers. It is not the policy of the Farm Security Administration to encourage or assist any person to avoid payment of his bona fide obligations within his ability to pay. So successful has this service been in the Southwest that farmers have been saved more than four million dollars since this agency was first established and savings are now being made at the rate of approximately one hundred thousand dollars per month.

Another method of supplementing the rehabilitation loan is thru the Community and Cooperative service loan. This type of loan in some instances assists to further the rehabilitation of qualifying farmers. If several low-income farmers in need of a purebred-sire, heavy farm equipment or other group facility, agree to use the unit jointly, one or more of their group secure a community type loan through the cooperative section of the Farm Security Administration.

Cooperative loans are also made to clients and qualified low-income farmers to enable them to buy stock or membership in a new or existing cooperative.

All cooperative loans over \$50 bear interest at three per cent, while loans between \$20 and up and including \$50 draw at a five per cent rate. Loans under \$20 are not made or cooperative purposes unless they are a part of a rural rehabilitation loan to a client.

Several thousand farmers in Region Twelve are being enabled to more economically farm by reason of the cooperative loans made in the region. In addition the quality of their work stock, dairy cows and other animals is being improved through the use of purebred sires.

We now come to the tenant purchase program. Loans for the purchase of farms by eligible tenants are authorized under the Bank-

head-Jones Farm Tenant Act for which Congress appropriated \$25,000,000 for the present fiscal year ending June 30, 1939. Ten million dollars was appropriated during the first year of this program. This money will be loaned to a limited number of competent and qualified tenants, share-croppers and farm laborers to enable them to purchase their own farm homes.

Local farmer committees are set up in ten counties in Region 12 which have been designated as those in which the tenant purchase program is to function this year. Texas counties are: Hall, Hansford, Randall and Wheeler. From the lists of applications the county committees will recommend those who will secure loans as well as the farms to be purchased.

The counties in which tenant purchase operations are being carried on were selected by Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace upon recommendations made by the State FSA Advisory committees. The selection was based on prevalence of tenancy, farm population and geographical distribution. Last year in Region Twelve 23 farms were bought it is planned to provide loans for about 90 farmers to buy farms this year. The program will be expanded further as Congress continues its appropriations for this purpose.

This tenant purchase program is being supplemented by a plan of farm tenure improvement. The tenant purchase program can, of necessity, reach so few farm tenants that the FSA is attempting to bring about better relationships between tenants and landlords as a part of the rehabilitation program.

County supervisors are charged with the responsibility of assisting in obtaining better lease agreements, longer tenure and better farm lands for borrowers. To this end the FSA has developed a "flexible" farm lease which, it is hoped, will serve as a guide to bring about improved relationships between owners and renters; to make it possible for the renter to plan for longer periods of tenure; to provide for arbitration in cases of dispute and to make it worthwhile for tenants to maintain improvements, fertility of soils, etc. The lease is in no manner of-

ferred as a "model" or assumed to be technically complete or ideal and certain revisions will undoubtedly be made after recommendations from landlords, tenants and county supervisors have been received. It is, however, offered as a basis upon which landlords and tenants may work out a detailed written agreement which will fit the needs of their particular area and type of farming.

The Farm Security is directing the management and operation of three Resettlement projects at Ropesville, Texas; Fort Sumner, New Mexico; and Bosque Farms, near Albuquerque, New Mexico. Farmers are operating this land with the assistance of Farm Security specialists and in a cooperative manner in many respects. The projects were established under the Resettlement Administration and no further extension of their activities is contemplated. Farmers on these tracts of land are reporting sufficient success to warrant the assumption that they will eventually achieve the purpose for which they were set up—the economic rehabilitation of farmers who had lost their farms or who were on relief.



False teeth may be measured and sold by mail as readily as in a dentist's chair, according to a court ruling, says a recent news item in the Chicago Daily Tribune.

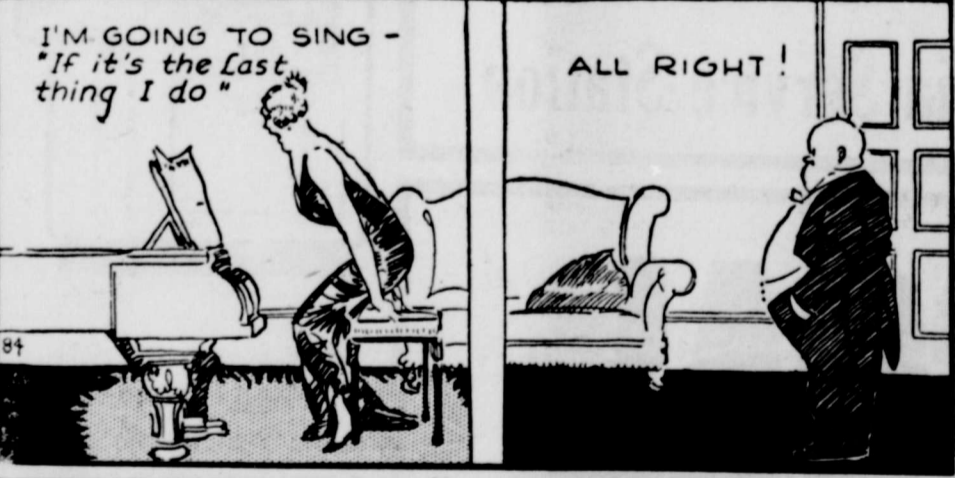

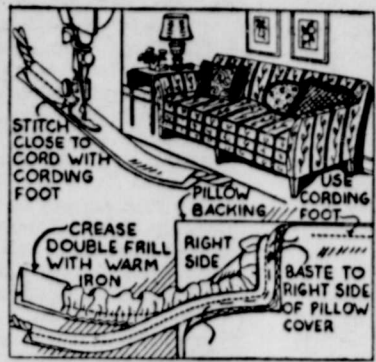
