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## Terrible Turks to Invade Silverton This Afternoon

### AGGIE BRIEFS

**Turkey Show**  
The annual Southwestern Dressed Turkey Show will be held in Silverton, December 7 and 8. This show is sponsored by a group of turkey growers in Hale county. Attractive premiums have been offered for quality birds in this show and it is hoped that Briscoe county turkey growers will get in there and take their share of premium money. Briscoe county turkeys have been in the money class each year that any entries have been made and since we're growing a better grade of turkeys each year we see no reason why Briscoe county producers shouldn't be well up toward the top in prize money. You'll never know 'til you try.

**1939 Wheat Measurements**  
We expect to get started on our wheat measurements right now. Those of you who have overplanted your allotted acreage and need to comply with the 1939 farm program should either plow up your excess or sow 25 percent by weight of barley or rye with the wheat on those excess acres. This must be done by December 15, and it should be done now so that the supervisors can check your farm now. We have to complete this measuring job by January 1st.

**Chains**  
The county association owns 8 measuring chains. These chains have been loaned out to first one fellow and then another. Of these chains only one has found its resting place back here in the office where it belongs. We have these chains charged out at \$3.00 each and if they are not returned at once we'll have to start collecting the 3 bucks. If we can't collect any other way we'll have to hold up some checks.

**Educational Meetings**  
For the past 10 days we have been holding community meetings throughout the county. These meetings have been for the purpose of acquainting the farmers with the present and the new farm program. The meetings held to date have been well attended and have created lots of interest. We expect to continue the meetings from time to time as new developments show up in the farm situation. Watch for the meeting dates in your community and be sure to attend.

**FARM RADIO PROGRAMS**  
More Production and Profits for the West Texas Farmer is the theme of a new series of radio programs called the West Texas Farm and Ranch Hour to be broadcast daily by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce over five West Texas stations from November 30 thru December 9.

Stations in the hook-up are KRBC, Abilene; KGKL, San Angelo; KBST, Big Spring; KFYO, Lubbock; and KGNC, Amarillo. All the programs will be heard at 8 p. m., except the one on Sunday, December 4, which will be broadcast at 9 p. m.

Designed especially to interest farmers with discussions of current farm problems such as soil conservation, the Domestic Allotment Plan which the regional organization endorses, acreage control, discriminatory freight rates, livestock feeding and cotton improvement, the programs also will be of interest to business and professional men and women, WTCC officials said.

Prominent farm, ranch and business leaders and officials will be speakers on the ten programs.

### Silverton Owls Promise To Turn Back Invader With Heavy Loss

The highlight of the day for Thanksgiving Day here is the game between the Turkey High School and the local team. A large crowd is expected for the last game of the season. With the dope on Turkey win, the Owls are expected to put up the best fight of the season. It will be the last game in their high school career for A. J. Rowell, center; Thomas Olive, tackle; Minyard Long, end; and Jack O'Neal, tackle.

**Paducah Wins**  
Last week the Paducah Dragons, exceeded even their own expectations by defeating the Owls 18-0. Getting off to a start equal to the one they made against Quitaque the week before, Silverton allowed the visitors to score two touchdowns in the first quarter.

Silverton braced up in the second quarter and out played the visitors the remainder of the half, making five first downs to Paducah's three.

Paducah opened the half by receiving the ball, and on the third play, a pass to Gibson was good for 65 yards and touchdown. No extra point was made, and the score was 18-0 for Paducah.

Only one serious scoring threat was made by Silverton during the game. Just before the close of the second quarter, the Owls carried the ball to the Paducah 6-yard line with four downs in which to score. Hank gained two and Walker lost six. Hank gained back five. With the ball on the three yard line, Paducah took over the reins as the half ended.

The entire second half was uneventful with Silverton making 94 yards to Paducah's 131, and Silverton getting 6 first downs to the visitors 7.

It was Paducah all the way, with the final score remaining at 18-0.

#### DRY WEATHER CONTINUES PLUS COLD WEATHER

The present autumn season is by far the driest in this section for many years. Wheat, if it is to survive the winter at all, must have some moisture. Cold, dry weather has not helped its chances any.

The fall has been an ideal one for the cotton farmer, with the result that more cotton and of a better grade has been ginned here than was expected at the beginning of the season. The Silverton Gin, at the beginning of this season, thought that 1,000 bales would be a long guess on the amount raised and ginned here. The Gin passed the 1,600 mark last week, with cotton still coming in. It is thought now, that perhaps 2,000 bales will be ginned here. The Plains cotton this year, is of a great deal better grade than that produced under the hill.

## Poll Taxes Must Be Paid---Honea

Folks, there has been a lot of misunderstanding on this payment of Poll Taxes. A lot of folks think that you pay Poll Taxes only when you want to vote. Well, the laws of this state say differently. Any person who is between the ages of twenty-one and sixty, shall be assessed a poll tax of \$1.50 per year. This is not optional with the citizen, it is COMPULSORY.

Now we have been very lenient heretofore in the collection of these taxes, and personally I'd like to continue being lenient. But the thing has been taken from my hands, as the following quotation from the Attorney General, shows:

"This being the law, it is plainly the duty of the Tax Assessor of each county to assess each person, both men and women alike, resident in his county on the 1st day of January, who were then 21 years of age and not over 60 years of age, and who are not exempt therefrom, with a state poll tax of \$1.50 beginning with the year 1921, and to extend on the rolls of his county for each year. This is not optional with the tax assessor, but a duty placed upon him by law and he has no right nor authority to omit from his assessments, any person, either man or woman, against whom the law has levied such tax."

So as you see, poll taxes MUST be paid. If not paid they are held against you, and any property you may have will have a bad title, in fact it is mortgaged property, as long as your poll taxes are unpaid. To show this, here is Article 8, Section 15, of the State Constitution:

"All property, both real and personal, belonging to any delinquent taxpayer shall be liable to seizure and sale for the payment of all the taxes and penalties due by such delinquent; and such property may be sold for the payment of the taxes and penalties due by such delinquent, under such regulations as the Legislature may provide."

Now all I am trying to do here, is to make my own position clear. Poll taxes and small personal taxes make up about \$11,000 of the county's \$80,000 delinquent taxes. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, backed by the Attorney General and the Constitution of the State of Texas, have ordered me to collect these Poll Taxes, and have used plain enough language that I know they mean business.

I am an officer of the law, sworn to do my duty. I hope that if you owe a few dollars in back taxes, you will not embarrass both of us by forcing me to seize and sell some of your property. You owe this debt, just as surely as you owe your month's grocery bill. Come in to the office. Let's get it straightened out before it is too late!

Bluegill Hooked on Artificial Fly Found as Sporty as the Black Bass

When the average fisherman thinks of game fish he usually associates the term with stream trout or black bass. The so-called pan fishes of our inland waters, bluegills, sunfishes, perch, crappies and rock bass, are essentially food fishes to him, possessing very little fighting spirit or gameness, writes Albert Stoll Jr., in the Detroit News.

Still, many have watched families fishing from docks and out of flat-bottomed rowboats and noticed that all thoroughly enjoyed hauling in wriggling perch and side-sailing bluegills. They appeared to find them sporty, especially the children, and best of all a toothsome, sweet fish for dinner.

Many of us can find sporty qualities in most any species of fish, while others must either play a large brook trout on a dry fly or hook into a record tuna or sailfish to get a thrill. But once for once a one-pound bluegill hooked on an artificial fly and light fly rod is just as sporty as a six-pound small-mouthed black bass on the end of the line. No trout fly fisherman ever experienced more excitement when he

hooked into an oversized rainbow or brown than the pan fish angler when he fights a big bluegill on light tackle.

This type of fishing is becoming popular. There was a time when the bluegill fisherman used nothing but crickets, grasshoppers and worms as bait, fishing in deep water, but today he flicks a fly in the shallows as he would for bass and generally returns to shore with a fine string.

only during a war, Frenchmen have only one alternative—financial and economic collapse. Although the success of France's rehabilitation effort rests solely on co-operation, Premier Edouard Daladier has one strong right arm in the support of 7,000,000 World war veterans.

Domestic

After 23 years of bickering, the U. S. and Mexico have reached a settlement over Mexican expropriation of American-owned farm lands. On December 1 a two-man committee will meet in Mexico City to determine the amount of Mexico's liability, after which a \$1,000,000 initial payment will be made.

Politics

Like all natural phenomena and many not so natural, U. S. political fortunes run in cycles of liberalism and conservatism. Thus every lengthy Republican administration has been succeeded by a shorter Democratic one.

Another consideration, one that received less attention than eventually proved justified, was dissatisfaction among America's numerically important farmers. Since the agricultural vote can control congress, it looked bad for the administration when this year's highly touted farm program failed.

Agriculture

The U. S. department of agriculture's efforts to export surplus wheat have never enjoyed the state department's sympathy, since foreign wheat-growing nations would be angry if their domestic prices were depressed by U. S. dumping of surplus grain.

Upshot was a protest to the state department, delivered in Washington by Argentina's Ambassador Don Felipe Espele. The problem's crux:

Cardinal Innitzer's palace in Vienna. Now this battle has spread to Munich, where Michael Cardinal von Faulhaber's palace was stoned. At Salzburg the Catholic university society has disbanded.

The immediate excuse for a 36-hour anti-Jewish hysteria was the assassination in Paris of Ernest von Rath, a German diplomatic attache, by a 17-year-old Polish Jew.

This seemingly ill-reasoned solution of the Jewish problem apparently typifies the Nazi method of dealing with enemies, real or imaginary. Observers are certainly not inclined to accept the Von Rath murder as a reason for the latest wave of persecution.

Foreign

To ward off Germany's aggression on southeastern Europe, Turkey's late President Kemal Ataturk led formation of a Balkan entente. Its members: Greece, Turkey, Rumania and Yugoslavia.

Meanwhile, although the entente will be strengthened by this shift of frontiers, Turkey's anti-Nazi position is not nearly so strong under her new president, Ismet Inonu, as under Ataturk.

If Argentina could prove the agriculture department was assisting Mr. Theis in selling his wheat to Brazil, Buenos Aires would consider it equivalent to an "international incident."

So did Mr. Wallace, but he could not refrain from worrying publicly about the U. S. agricultural problem. Since future "international incidents" will almost inevitably result if the U. S. tries to sell any more wheat abroad, Mr. Wallace must now concentrate on solving the problem domestically.

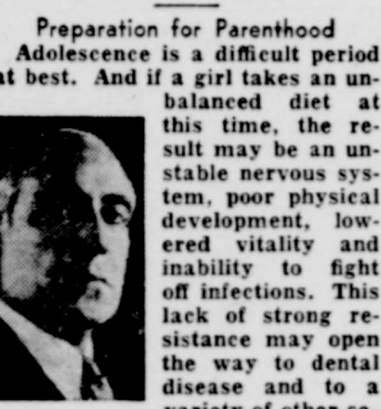

WHAT to EAT and WHY

Feed Adolescent Correctly or Tragic Consequences May Result, Warns C. Houston Goudiss; Teeth Must Receive Special Consideration
By C. HOUSTON GOUDISS

OFFHAND, it may seem as if there could be very little connection between a deficient diet during adolescence and painful childbirth in later years. Yet it has been demonstrated clinically that there is a definite link.



Preparation for Parenthood
Adolescence is a difficult period at best.

Results of Calcium Deficiency
If her diet has been deficient in calcium, for example, her pelvic bones may be imperfectly developed, so that she suffers unnecessarily during the birth of her child.

An Aid to Dental Health
For although expectant mothers are not always aware of this important fact, it is true that the first or "baby" teeth are developed within the jaw during prenatal life, and the foundations for the second set are also laid at this time.

Calcium-Rich Foods Required
Leading nutrition authorities hold that the average American diet is more deficient in calcium, perhaps, than in any other single nutrient. This is especially likely to be the case in the diet of the adolescent.

Washing Dingy Bath Towels.—Bath towels that have become dingy should be put into boiler of cold water, soap added and a little lemon juice. Heat water to boiling point. Rinse towels in lukewarm blueing water and hang in the sun.

To balance the diet properly, these necessary protein and energy foods should be supplemented by milk and cheese which are rich in calcium; by green leafy vegetables which are also a good source; by eggs and fruits, valued for their minerals and vitamins; and by bulky foods which supply sufficient cellulose to help promote regular health habits.

Mothers of adolescent children should make a conscientious and determined effort to feed them a diet rich in calcium and vitamins A, C and D—the substances required, especially, for maintaining sound, healthy teeth.

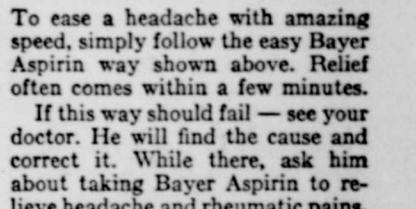
