Wherefore plaintiffs pray the court that defendant be cited to appear and answer this petition, and that plaintiffs have judgment for the title and possession of the above described land and premises.

ises for cancellation of all liens, for removal of all clouds from title for writ of restitution, for rents, damages, for costs of suit, for general and special relief as is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

The officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law, and make due return as the law directs.
