There is just not anything that can think of worth relating that will pass the censor, so will close with best wishes."

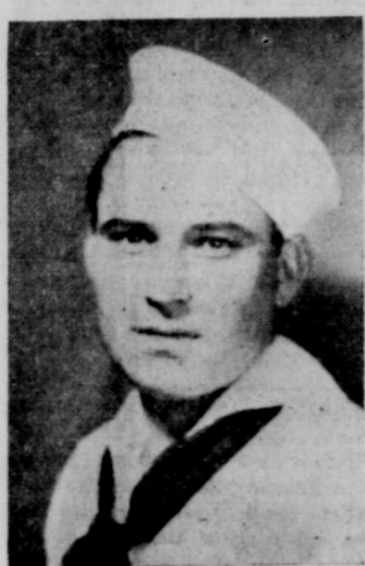

AND SPEAKING OF the letters this week—that Alvy Gardner has

it in the bag when he tells of the nurse coming to "rub his little back"—Oh, death, where is thy sting?"

SEVERAL MORE PICTURES of service men in this paper. It took me a long time to get up my nerve and ask each family to pay that \$1.25 engraving cost. I am very glad that I did. And I am very grateful to you folks for bringing the pictures in. It makes a better paper, and every time I publish a picture it is with the thought of trying to honor the boy for the job he is doing—and some of those jobs now, you know, are not child's play.

I'LL MAKE SOME mistakes on these pictures no doubt—for instance, last week, after they were all printed, I noticed that I had run the picture of Gardner Guest. Why, I don't know, just one of those dumb printer's mistakes.

IF YOU WANT to have a try at the \$10.00 prize for the tallest tale, why start thinking about it now. The theme of your story can be anything from jack rabbits to prohibition. One pretty good one I read one time told of the intense cold in Iceland. The old boy was sleeping on his back and his breath froze in solid columns of ice many feet high over his nostrils. Before he could get up that morning he had to go to the tool shed, get the axe and chop down the pillars of ice, before he could get himself out of bed.

ANOTHER IS THAT of the ab-

sent minded professor who started to school and found he had forgotten his watch. He took his watch out of his pocket and looked at it to see if he had time to go back home after it before school.

SOME THINK that Congress should not have overrode the president's veto. Whether it was right or wrong as far as that particular measure is concerned, it is the healthiest thing that has happened in Washington for years.

MUCH HAS BEEN done in the past to discredit Congress. We have become accustomed to "cuss" out our representatives for everything we didn't like. The time has come when we should give Congress our support instead of our opposition. Of course they are not always right. However, there is no object in having just a rubber stamp Congress. They are pretty useless. And useless things have a way of being thrown in the discard. They are our only connection with our government, and I for one am glad that they seem to be coming to life.

RED NYE, a bond salesman that used to come through here was an expert on money. He not only had studied the American system, but had travelled Europe and had a thorough knowledge of their systems. He told me one time that a person, even himself could go crazy if they really got down to business in trying to figure out what an American one dollar bill was. He said, "The Silver Certificate says that upon demand the United States Treasury will pay to bearer, one dollar in silver. Okay. You decide to cash it in and you go to the bank and demand your money. And they pay it. They give you a little round trinket made partly of silver that says on it ONE DOLLAR. It is just a little round thing about like a watch fob and if you wanted to, you could trade three or four of these round silver dollars for a watch fob made of about the same amount of silver. You could wear the fob while and perhaps trade it for two dollar bills again. And then you could trade those two dollar bills for a couple more silver dollars"—oh, well, Red said you could go nuts. You figure it out. Millions of dollars change hands every day just by a book-

keeper moving a figure from one column to another. Beats me!

OUR COINS say "In God We Trust". Also in Uncle Sam.

THE RED CROSS does more than take care of our boys in service. Money is always available for use in any local disaster, fire, flood or riot. This town could be burned up completely and within 12 hours the Red Cross would have the place in hand, taking care of the injured and homeless and providing medical care. Have you made your donation?

"The Red Cross is at his side". That is an awful good slogan. Roll it over in your mind. Ask the lads overseas and in enemy prison camps if it is so.

ONE THING reported to be slowing our boys advance on all fronts is that they constantly must be on the watch that Eleanor Roosevelt does not get caught in the front line cross-fire.

RATION TOKEN PLAN

During the three-week period from February 27, when the new ration token plan began, and March 20, when the last of the green stamps good for buying for processed foods run out, one-point green stamps, along with tokens, may be given "change" when processed foods are bought, the Office of Price Administration provided today.

While one-point brown stamps (for meats-fats) have been used for change making in the past, use of one-point green stamps had not, before now, been authorized by the rationing regulations. It is desirable to permit their use during the three-week transition period since it is possible that tokens may not be well distributed in some sections, and for a time the one-point green stamps, along with the one-point brown stamps, may be needed in a few localities for change making.

During the three-week transition period from the old rationing program to the simplified token plan, two sets of stamps will be used for processed foods and two meats-fats.

Blue 10-point stamps A8, B8, C8 D8, and E8 in War Ration Book IV, may be used for processed foods

from February 27 through May 20. Green stamps K, L, M, in the same ration book may be used for processed foods from February 27 through March 20. Blue tokens and green one-point stamps may be used as change.

Red stamps A8, B8, C8, D8 and E8 in War Ration Book IV, may be used for processed foods from February 27 through May 20. Red stamps D8, E8 and F8 will be good March 12 through May 20. Brown stamps Y and Z in War Ration Book III will be good thru March 20. Red tokens and brown one-point stamps may be used as change.

Green stamps K, L, and M and brown stamps Y and Z will retain their old values of 8, 5, 2 and 1 points.

Tokens will be given as "Change for blue and green, red and brown ration stamps only when a purchase is made. No more than nine tokens may be given as "Change" in one transaction.

Since both the green and brown stamps run out on March 20, the simple token plan will be fully in effect on March 21.

OPA reminded merchants, meanwhile, that ration tokens would be available at banks immediately, and urged them to pick them up.

SUGAR: Stamp 30, Book IV, good for 5 lbs. effective January 16 thru March 31. Stamp No. 40, Book IV good for 5 lbs. sugar for 1944 home canning.

MEATS and FATS: Book III, Stamp "Y" became valid February 13, good through March 20. "Z" became valid February 20 good through March 20. Book IV, red stamps A8, B8, and C8 good for 10 points each, valid February 27 through May 20, D8, E8, and F8 became valid March 12th, good through May 20.

PROCESSED FOODS: Book IV, Stamps "K" "L" and "M" expire March 20. Book IV, blue stamps A8, B8, C8, and E8 are good for 10 points each, valid February 27 through May 20.

SHOES: Book I, stamp No. 18, and Book III, stamp one with airplane picture, are each valid for one good indefinitely.

GASOLINE: (Coupons must be endorsed on the front) "A" coupon 3 gal each, with No. 10 coupons, expiring March 21. In B-2 and

C-2 books valid on December 1, the coupons nationally have a value of 5 gallons. Other "B" and "C-2" coupons, including B-1 and C-2 still outstanding will retain their two-gallon value. "R" and "T" 5 gallons each, and "D" one and one-half gallons. "B" one gallon. TIRE INSPECTION: "A" book holders before March 31, 1944; "B" before February 29; "C" before February 29; and "T" every six months or every 5,000 miles, which ever comes first.

As you probably know this is a B-20 (Marauder) medium bomber base, which happens to be the fastest medium bomber made, and is sometimes called the "Flying Cigar". I heard an officer mention the fact today that they had quit calling them B-25's in combat.
